

#### Perforation.

By "STOKES."

The means for dividing or separating stamps are numerous.

When stamps were first issued in England in 1840, they were usually separated with a pair of seissors; the same method has been adopted in all the early issues of a great many countries, although a large number of the stamps look as if they had been separated with an axe or hoe. In 1848 an Englishman by the name of Henry Archer tried to remedy this defect by having thinner paper between the stamps which were to be torn apart resulting in the stamps having very rough and After several sether irregular edges. attempts, he finally succeeded by having rows of small holes punched out in straight lines between the stamps.

There are two methods of separating namely "rouletting" and "perforating." By rouletting, the paper is cut partially through but removing no paper. First there is the "English roulette" when the paper iscutin short straigt lines, commonly found in the Chilian stamps; sometimes the lines are inked, as in some of the early Luxemburg issues. Another form is "pin perforating" the name of which is misleading, as this separation is made by holes being pricked in the paper, but no paper is removed, and it is therefore a roulletation and not a perforation. This method is commonest among Mexican stamps

(See Mexico in Scott's 58th numbers 423 to 431.) Other forms are, "sawtooth" roulette in which the cuts form small triangles, "Serpentine" or wavy impressions "Lozenge" or diamond shape impressions.

The other method namely "perforating" is best and almost universally used. By this process the paper between the stamp is cut away in a line of holes, leaving little bridges joining the stamps together; when the stamps are torn apart these bridges are separated, leaving little projections or teeth: the diameter of the holes and the width of the teeth are usually the same. The diameter of the holes vary in the different stamps; and we say a stamp is perforated ten or eleven, it does not mean that there are ten or eleven holes in the two or side of the stamp, but that there are ten or eleven perforations in the space of two centimeters, which is about four fifths of an English inch.

When the holes are small and close together it is called "fine" perforations; when they are large and far apart they are known as "coarse" perforations; when the holes are not cut clean through, it is called "rough" perforation; when the gauge of the top differs from that of the side, its perforation is "compound" When the measurement of the top and side are given the top always comes first.

# Names by which Stamps Are Known.

Ву "Јамво"

Adhesive--Any stamp which can be gummed and stuck to the envelope.

Revenues—Stamps that are used on articles of merchandise, legal papers, etc., which have a duty placed on them.

Albino-A stamp that has no color.

Colonials—Stamps that are used in the colonies of any country; such as British, French and Spanish Colonials.

Counterfeits — Imitations of genuine stamps.

Reprints—Stamps that are printed from old plates.

Seebeck— A stamp made for some foreign country, under the direction of Mr. N. F. Seebeck, of New York.

Departmentals—Stamps used by the Government departments. The following stamps were formerly used by the United States in the various departments: viz.: Agriculture, Executive, Navy,

Interior, Justice, Post Office, Treasury and War.

War stamps.—Any stamp issued by a country for war correspondence

Bogus Stamps. - See Counterfeits.

Continentals.—This is the name given to the more common varieties of stamps from Europe.

Double impression.—Stamps that by mistake have been printed on both sides.

Registration Stamps.—Stamps used on registered letters to ensure safe delivery.

Surcharged.—A stamp that has a new value printed across the face of it.

Provisional.—A stump that is issued for use, for a limited time only, when the regular issue has been exhausted and another has not yet been produced. They are generally made by surcharging a sellom used stamp.

Perforated,—A stamp that has holes punched around it so that it can be easily separated from stamps on the same sheet.

Part Perforated—A stump that is not perforated on all its sides.

Imperforated or Unperforated--Stamps which have no perforation.

Forgeries—See Counterfeits.

Locals—Stamps used by some private company and used only in a limited district. Envelopes—Stamps printed

Envelopes—Stamps printed on envelopes.

Envelopes consist of three kinds. Entire—Those that are not taken from the envelopes. Cut-Square—Those which have a square margin left around the stamy.

Cut-to-shape—Those that are the shape of the stamp.

Fiscals—Revenue stamps.

Error—A stamp that has

The error is usually made by printers using the wrong color ink or in the spelling.

Proprietary—Revenue stamps ased on medicine or matches.

Officials - Stamps used by Government officials.

Obsolete—A stamp that is out of use.

Plimpton issue—Envelopes printed by the Plimpton Manufacturing Co., for the U. S. Government.

Reay issue—Envelopes printed by G. H. Reay for the U. S. Government.

Newspaper—A stamp used to carry newspapers through the mails.

Postage Due—A stamp used on a letter to indicate that enough postage has not been paid to ensure its delivery.

Telegraph—Stumps that are used to prepay telegrams.

Remainders—An old stamp that is in a post-office after a new issue has come into use.

Provincial—Stamps that are used in only one province.

Municipal—A stamp that is to be used in a certain municipality only.

Rural-Stamps used in certain districts

in Prussia where the regular mail service is not in use.

Split Stamp— One that is cut in two or more parts and is sometimes allowed to pass for part of the face value.

Susse—French stamps that were perforated without the consent of the government, by the

Susse brothers of Paris.

Carlist—Stamps that were issued by Don Carlos for the use of his revolutionary followers.

Tete-beche—A stamp that has a certain part printed upside down.

Special Delivery—Stamps used in the United States on letters that are to be delivered speedily.

Speculative issue—An issue of stamps by some government, that are intended (but on the sly) to be sold to collectors. They are generally used for postage.





Although it is quite possible that a few of these stamps were issued unperforated, through carelessness, this copy was probably taken from the side of the sheet and will show traces of perforation on a close examination.

Nassau St., New York, famous for its

numerous stamp dealers, is now losing instead of gaining dealers; We have received notice of removal of: E. T. Parker, Universal Stamp Co. and the J. Krebs Stamp Company.

Four new varieties of the U. S. 15c 1869 has been found. The difference is in the punctuation after the U. of the U. S.

The philatelic Lottery now seems to be a reality. We note in an English publication, a collection valued at \$35.00 is offered in a prize drawing. Tickets are being sold at 12c each.



Mr. A.G.Allison in "Mekeel's Weekly" asks about a period after the word "cents" in the new 3c Canada. In answer

to this, it is stated that the marks before the words are mere blotches and of no interest to philatelists. If these are uninteresting we are sorry to say that the period is in the same state, as we have one stamp with no mark in front of the "three" but has a "blotch" extending from the word "cents" almost to the word "postage," This is probably more or less covered by ink causing it, in some cases, to look like a period. We have a 3c as described by Mr. Allison and the marks would certainly be taken for periods. We also have half cent with a small period after the word "cent."

The present issue of Canada stamps is to be changed; figures will take the place of the maple leaves. It would do no harm if the Queens ear-rings were made smaller.

DANGEROUS COUNTERFEITS.

Collectors are warned against counterfeit- of the Eagle 1867 issue stamps of Bolivia which, having been obtained by the photh-lithographic process, are very dangerous imitations, being the exact reproduction of the genuines.

They can be detected by;

THE PAPER.—Is much too white and looks too new for such old stamps.

THE COLORS—Are different and generally too light, the 5c is plum instead of violet; 10c is light brown instead of brown; 50c is lemon instead of yellow; 50c is light blue instead of blue or dark blue; 100c is light green instead of green; 100c is green-

ish blue instead of blue.

THE ENGRAVING—Is also much different; The genuines were deeply engraved on copper plates and show a heavy set off which the counterfeits have not but are so well made that they seem to have it, if you do not examine them in the proper light.

These counterfeits are to be found unused and used with Per cancellations and different postmarks, the commonest being an oblong red one.—Geo Carion, San Francisc Cal.

#### Some Stamp Troubles.

From Toronto Globe.

The new issue of Dominion postage stamps while a pretty one is not without its disadvantages some of which cause slight inconveniences to business men. For instance, the two dollar stamp is the same color as the four dollar one, and while not


many persons make use of these there is some danger of confusion. There have also been seen some Canada letter cards bearing an engraved 1 cent stamp instead of a three, which the law calls for. The most important feature, how ever, is the confusion arising from the color of the new one cent stamp, which corresponds with that of the old two cent. Cases are very numerous of city deliverv letters. whether in error or not, having the new one cent stamp affixed, going safely through the mails without detention or the collection of the excess postage

due. Of course this is to the loss of the Government, but there are cases where even the stamp vendor at the General Postoffice has sold ones instead of twos owing to mixing of colors.
