



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

II. The second is an eclipse of the Sun, May 15th, and visible, as follows:

Beginning	7h 21m	Mean time morning.
Greatest Observation	8h 26m	
End	9h 52m	
Duration	2h 31m	

Digits subtended 74° on the Sun's southern limb. This eclipse will be central and annular at noon in latitude $49^{\circ} 17' N.$ and longitude $70^{\circ} 20' W.$ from Greenwich.

III. The third is an eclipse of the Moon, October 24th, invisible at Montreal 8 at 8h 10m morning.

IV. The fourth is an eclipse of the Sun, Nov. 8th, invisible at Montreal 8h 40m evening.

POST OFFICE REGULATIONS.

Letters for the United States must be post paid to the Lines, and those intended to go that way for Europe must be post paid to the port from which they will depart.

Letters for Europe, intended to go by way of Quebec, must be post paid to that place and those meant to go by the Halifax route must be post paid to Halifax.

All Letters for Baye Chaleur, Berthier, (below) Bic, Coconia, Gaspé, Isle Verte, Kamouraska, Rimouski, River du Loup, (below) River Ouelle, St. Andre, St. Aune Lapocatiere, St. Jean Port Joli, St. Roch des Aulnés, St. Thomas, and trois Pistoles, which are to the eastward of Quebec, are despatched from that office only.

Unless attention is paid to the above notices, any letters put into the offices will remain there and be lost to all concerned.

All letters for places beyond the seas, in addition to the inland Postage to Halifax, must pay the following rate of Packet Postage for every single letter sent, giving date and place of delivery:

- To West Indies, 1s5d; Bermuda, 1s6d; Portugal, 3s2d; Maderia, the Azores, or the Canaries, 3s3d; Gibraltar, 3s6d; France, 3s9d; Netherlands, 3s1d; Germany, Switzerland, Turkey, Russia, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, or the Brazil, 4s 3d; Italy, the Ionian Isles, Malta, Corfu, or the Mediterranean, 4s7d; Spain, 4s10d.

Letters for Newfoundland may be forwarded on paying the postage to Halifax only.

All letters conveyed by post from Great Britain to Ireland, and from Ireland to Great Britain, are chargeable with the like rates, according to the distances such letters are conveyed, as would be payable if they were conveyed the whole distance in Great Britain, in addition to the separate rates of Packet Postage and the several rates payable under the Acts for building the Menai and Conway Bridge, respectively.

All Merchants' Accounts, Bills of Exchange, Stamped Receipts, Invoices, Bills of Lading and Proceedings at Law, written on one and the same piece of paper with a Letter, to be charged as a single Letter only; and any sheet of paper on which Letters to several and distinct persons are written shall not be chargeable with any higher rate of Postage, in Great Britain or Ireland, than if one Letter only were written upon each sheet of paper.

I.—The said rates are for the whole distance from Lachine to Montréal (9 miles) and so in proportion for each mile of the distance that Goods, &c. may be transported on the Canal, but all Boats, Scows, Vessels or Rafts, loading or unloading, below the Lock No. 4, whether in ascending or descending, shall pay the same as if they passed through all the Locks. A fraction of a mile shall be deemed a whole mile. A fraction of a ton in the measurement of a boat or vessel, shall be taken according to the number of quarters of a ton therein. A fraction of a quarter of a ton shall be deemed a whole quarter. Timber, Boards, Plank and Scantling in Rafts, to be calculated by the quantity of feet; no quantity under 25 feet shall pay less than for 25. Boats and Scows laden solely with Firewood or other Timber having passed down the Canal and paid the rates, are exempted from toll in ascending, if unladen and empty. Boats, &c. having descended by the River are subject in ascending the Canal to pay one-third more than the above rates of toll. Square rigged or other vessels from sea, schooner, sloops, steamer, barges, boats, scows or vessels of any kind and Rafts and Cribs, not using the Canal, are prohibited from entering the part of the Canal below Lock, No. 7, or using the Canal Wharf below the said Lock, in order to leave the same free for the use of such vessels, &c., as navigate upon the Canal.

II.—Conductors must be provided with a manifest or list of the packages or pieces comprising the cargo of each boat, vessel, or scow under their charge, distinguishing the species thereof; and also the measurement, if the toll thereon be so payable. The toll on Merchandise being fixed by the ton, the weight must be marked on each package whereof the rate is not specifically provided for in the Tariff.

III.—If the Collector sees good reason to doubt the correctness of the manifest or list, the cargo may be unloaded and examined; if found incorrect, the expense shall be paid by the owner or conductor of the boat, vessel or scow; if correct to be reloaded at the Canal's expense.

IV.—Boats, &c. shall be detained until the tolls are paid; and the same power of detention is given, if any damage is done by persons navigating boats, &c. or being passengers therein.

V.—Horses employed in towing must not be driven at any pace but a walk. Boats, vessels and scows meeting others in the Canal, those coming down shall keep the side next the tow-path, and those going up give way so as to allow of the others passing over the tow-rope.

VI.—Cribs, boats, scows, or vessels of any kind meeting under any bridge shall pass in succession, the first that reaches the bridge passing first; and they shall pass through the Locks in the same order and agreeable to the directions of the Lock-keeper.

VII.—Cribs or Timber, when overtaken by boats, scows or other vessels, must give way thereto, and sheer off to the side opposite to the towing path, so that such boats, scows, or other vessels may pass and there shall be with all cribs, timber, boats, scows or other vessel a sufficient number of men for the management thereof.

VIII.—No timber of any kind whatever shall be allowed to be drawn up the banks of the Canal, or to lie over the sides thereof.

IX.—No Cribs of Timber, Boats, Scows or other vessels shall be admitted into the Canal unless they are in good order, and they must

proceed immediately to their place of destination without stopping.

X.—The entrance of the Canal at Lachine and Montreal must not be obstructed under any pretence whatever; and all boats, scows or other vessels therein, must be ranged in conformity to the directions of the Commissioners, or the Superintendant or Overseer, whom they may appoint.

XI.—Boats, scows or other vessels, or cribs of timber, waiting either above or below the Locks at the Windmills, (No. 5, 6 and 7,) must remain on the south-east side of the Canal, so as to leave the other side free for the convenience of loading and unloading.

XII.—No cribs of timber or boats, scows or vessels of any kind shall remain in the Canal, except during the time of loading or unloading or passing up and down; if detained, however, by unavoidable circumstances, they shall not remain along the wharves without the special permission of the Commissioners or their Superintendant, and they must be placed in conformity to their or his directions.

XIII.—No cribs boats, scows or other vessels, not in immediate employ, shall be allowed to remain in the Canal, or in any basin of the Canal, without the special permission of the Commissioners.

XIV.—No boats, scows or vessels of any kind, shall be allowed to be drawn up the banks or slips of the Canal, without the special permission of the Commissioners being first obtained.

XV.—No cribs, boats, scows or vessels of any kind, shall be left in the Canal, either afloat, sunk or otherwise; and in the fall of the year, at the close of the navigation, none shall remain in the Canal without the special permission of Commissioners.

XVI.—Persons employing boats, scows or vessels of any kind, are prohibited, in cleaning them, from throwing chips, dirt, rubbish or filth, into the Canal, and from allowing any timber or fire-wood to remain in the Canal, either sunk or afloat.

XVII.—No Merchandise or effects, or wood of any kind, and particularly Cordwood, shall remain on the banks or wharves of the Canal, longer than forty-eight hours; and at the wharf below the river lock near the Windmills, no Cordwood shall, on any account, be landed between the said lock, and a distance of about forty feet below the second crane.

XVIII.—No cribs, boats, scows or vessels of any kind, which have passed through the Canal, shall remain near the wharf, below the river lock, longer than a sufficient time to unload, and take in the loading at the same place.

XIX.—The regular hours for the working of the Locks, shall be as follows:—From the first of May to the first of September, from four o'clock, A. M. to eight o'clock, P. M. and at the seasons preceding or succeeding those dates respectively, from day-light until dusk of evening.

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USEFUL RECEIPTS.

Preservation of Eggs.—Relative to the preservation of eggs by immersion in lime-water, M. Peacher has given most satisfactory evidence of the efficacy of the process. Eggs which he had preserved six years in this way, being boiled and tried, were found perfectly fresh and good; and a confectioner of Geneva has used a whole cask of eggs preserved by the same means. In the small way eggs may be preserved in bottles or other vessels. They are to be introduced when quite fresh, the bottle then filled with lime-water, a little powdered lime sprinkled in at last, and the bottle closed. To prepare the lime-water, twenty or thirty pints of water are to be mixed up with five or six pounds of slackened quick-lime, put into a covered vessel, allowed to clear by standing, and the lime-water immediately used.

Corns.—Dr. Brown, one of the physicians of the New York Hospital, in a practical dissertation on the use of lunar caustic, has given the following directions for removing corns, which he says he has found more successful than any plan that has been recommended:—After bathing the foot in warm water (at bed time) till the corn becomes considerably softened, shave the substance down with a knife or scalpel, but not so close as to occasion bleeding; then moisten the surface with saliva, and rub over it the lunar caustic. The application of this article should be extended a little beyond the edges of the corn, and continued till such a quantity adheres as, in a short time, will change it to a dark gray, and eventually, completely black. There is no hazard in applying too much, especially on the corn itself. A little raw cotton or lint should be then applied over the part, so as to prevent its coming in contact with the stocking. In about four or six days the part acted upon by the caustic will peel off, including every vestige of corn, leaving the part quite smooth, and of a natural appearance.

Planting Potatoes whole.—A correspondent of the *Gardeners' Magazine*, No. 35, for December, writing upon the above question, agrees with Mr. T. A. Knight in recommending that they should be planted whole; and adds as "A testimony, I will state as experiment of mine in 1828: I planted four plants containing two eyes to each; four, the crowns containing perhaps five or six eyes each; four small whole potatoes, (what are here termed chits;) four large ones, (or what are termed waxy potatoes.) Now for the weight of the produce of each kind: the produce of the first four roots weighed 8lbs.; that of the second four, 11 lbs.; that of the third four, 15 lbs.; that of the fourth four, 16 lbs. I think this will make clear to any one, the reverse of what is generally followed ought to be practised; namely, to plant crowns or whole potatoes in lieu of a plant with two eyes. This is even the second trial I have made, and found it the same; but I was not so particular in the first experiment as in the second, having determined by my eye, the difference was so obvious. I think this of the greatest importance to the agriculturist. If it hold good for an acre, what a difference in the produce! The object of a little extra seed board, no comparison to the extra produce; and besides, the labour of cutting is saved."
