No secret had been made of this, for I openly acted in that capacity in the courts. I had specially asked the premier, Sir James Winter, if it were desirable that I should remain in the cabinet, and had remained at his request. Under agreement with the company some years ago they were given the right to run a surface street railway, but terrible conditions of overcrowding had resulted. In fact the courts had found that the railway company had been maintaining a common nuisance. In order to relieve that condition the city wanted to establish the motor bus service—in other words, the city wanted the right which a private company can get.

Mr. Osler said that at the time the agreement was made between the city and the company the moral understanding was that the railway company should have a monopoly of the streets. At the time the agreement was completed the streets were in such a condition that nothing but steel rails was centemplated as a means of conducting a regular system of passenger traffic.

"For three or four years the company has been blocked in its effort to extend new lines," added Mr. Osler. "The railway board ordered them, but the city blocked them."

Mr. Osler believed that no system of cars or buses would relieve the rush that comes at factory closing hours.



The Oxford and Cambridge boat race the most popular athletic contest in British sport, will be decided to-day. As usual, the course will be on the Thames, between Putney and Mortlake. This year's race promises to be a particularly year's race promises to be a particularly exciting one, as both crews have shown exceptionally good form. Over the full course of three and a quarter miles between Mariow Point and Cookham Bridge, where they were practising, Cambridge knocked half a minute off the best authenticated record time, covering the distance in 15 minutes 34 seconds. At Henley, Oxford, too, is credited with some excellent performances. This year Oxford has the heavier crew, and is called to win.

off the 68 races rowed between Oxford and Cambridge since 1829, Oxford has won 37, Cambridge 30, and one (that of 1877) was a dead-heat. Cambridge won in 1899 for the first time in ten years, and repeated in 1900, but in 1901, after a terribly hard race, Oxford again won. In 1902, 1903 and 1904 Cambridge won easily; in 1905 Oxford secured the verdict by three lengths, but in 1906, 1907 and 1908 Cambridge again won. In 1909, 1910 and 1911 Oxford won, the last year by 2½ lengths. The fastest time on record for the race is 18.29, made by Oxford in 1911.

In answer to a question by a member, Mr. Crothers stated that as near as he could arrive at some forty or fifty had not been reinstated. Of those taken back, very few, if any, had been reinstated, but had been taken on as "new men," and he was not aware of anyone who had got the situation equal to the one he had at the time of the strike.



I have frequently explained how to wash out baby's mouth: Wrap a piece of absorbent cotton around the little finger, pour the solution over the swap and wine out the solution over the swab and wipe out every part of the mouth, taking care lines the mouth.

Sometimes older babies have ulcerated mouths, caused by poor health or neglected teeth. The symptoms of this disease are drooling at the mouth, bad breath, coated tongue and inflamed gums. Later yellow spots appear in the mouth and on the gums. Often the the mouth and on the gums. Often the gums bleed and the mouth is so sore that the child refuses food. Prompt treatment is 'necessary. Give the child soft. nourishing food, such as junket, broths, jellied eggs. Wash the mouth out every two hours with a solution of five grains of alum to an ounce of boiled water. If the child is taken to a doctor, he will apply nitrate of sliver to the ulcers, but the mother cannot do this herself. 



Must Do So or Lose New England Business, Says the Board of Public

Utilities.

BOSTON, March 29,-The public utilities commission to-day granted the Grand Trunk permission to build to Boston. In part its judgment says: "The relations between the Grand Trunk and the former Boston & Maine management were such that the Grand Trunk was content to remain on the edge of a district within a radius of 100 miles from Boston. Since the con-trol of the Boston & Maine passed to the New Haven, the situation is dif-ferent, as the Grand Trunk is now dependent for its connections with Boston upon a road whose interests will be with competing trunk line systems.

"Financial interests in active control of the New Haven are the dominant factors in three of the four New York trunk lines, the Eries, Baltimore & Ohio, and the New York Central. situation has developed which is tending toward this result: That the Grand Trunk must either build to Boston or be prepared to lose a consid erable proportion of its present New England business, abandon any effort to develop new business thru Boston and cease to be a factor in the Boston railroad system."

Lease of Providence Docks, PROVIDENCE, R.I., Mar. 29.—(Can. Press.)--The application of the Grand Trunk Railroad for a lease of part of the new state docks, which are in progress of construction at this port, was followed to-cay by the introduction in the general assembly of an act authorizing the harbor improve-ment commission to lease the docks for terms of 20 years or less. At the same time a message was sent to the senate by Gov. Pothier, urging the authoriza-tion of the issue of \$1,060,000 bonds to complete the construction of the docks and other harbor improvements.

Controller McCarthy moved at the meeting of the board of control yesterday afternoon that E. A. James, the North Toronto engineer, be appointed to the position as head of the waterworks department and given full charge over everything with the exception of the levying and collection of the water rates, but when the motion was voted upon, Controller Hocken was the only other member to support it. The salary mentioned was \$6000 per annum. Con-troller Church, who was to have a recommendation ready for the meeting, stated that he had not yet got into nmunication with his candidate. The board have thus made no recommenda tion to the council and as yet no ap-plication has been seriously considered for the position.

The question of engaging the New York firm of experts to make a report upon the local transportation conditions at a cost of \$33,000, came up as having been referred back from council, and the board allowed the matter to drop. Controller Hocken advocated that some memorandum of what the city required in the way of advice on traffic conditions should be tabulated before the matter was again taken up.

The city engineer announced to the

board that construction work in con-nection with the high level interceptor sewer had been completed. He also made recommendation as to what tenders should be accepted in connection with the supplies for the civic car lines. and these will be dealt with by the council on Monday. Mr. Rust also made another protest against the action of the council in striking out his recommendation that a system of water me-ters be established in the city. The appeal, however, had no effect upon the board of control.

As essment Commissioner Forman wrote to the board in reference to numerous communications he had received in reference to tax reform. He was advised to keep in touch with the gov-
