

### RYAN'S DENIAL OF CAUSING EXPLOSIONS

President of the Ironworkers' Union Says He Knows of Outrages Only Thru the Papers.

### ARRANGED FOR "JOBS"

But Term Had Reference to Purely Legitimate Endeavors Is His Emphatic Statement.

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 3 .- (Can. ss.)-Letters written by Frank M. yan, president of the International Association of Bridge and Structural ron Workers, were read in conjuncexamination of Ryan by the government at the "dynamite conspi-

acy" trial today. Ryan testified that his knowledge of aumerous explosions which occurred fter he had written a letter from New York was gained entirely thru newspaper accounts. He said newspaper accounts of explosions on nonmion jobs often were enclosed in letters as news.

Extracts from the New York letter. Which Ryan testified he wrote on April 27, 1910, as head of the union, to Secretary John J. McNamara, and the explosions which the government cited as having occurred later, were:

"Let Legistier take care of the jobs in his district." Henry W. Legisliner, now of Denver, was then a member of the executive board, stationed at Pittsburg. An explosion occurred at Mc-Kee's Rocks, near Pittsburg, in July, 1910.

Meaning of "Jobs."

"Let Hockin arrange for Cleveland, Cincinnati and Detroit jobs." Herbert 5 Hockin is charged with being leader of the "dynamiting erew." An explosion occurred at Cleveland June 22, that year.

"Davenport, Iowa, and Peoria, Ill., can be handled by Hockin." Explosions occurred at Davenport and Peoria on June 4.

"What did you mean when you said let Legleitner and Hockin take care of these jobs?" asked District Attorney



### NATIONAL HIGHWAY IS ASSURED FACT

Way Blazed by Reo Pathfinder From Halifax to Vancouver.

Out of the haze of dreams, out of the realm of visions, the Canadian Highway emerges, proved feasible on the first attempt at a transcontinental

The tour officially ended at Victoria on October 18, on the return Island, when a barquet was given to the pioneers by the president of the Automobile Association, Mr. A. E. 'rodd; and at which mayor Beckwith, W. W. Foster, Deputy Minister of Works, and other leading citizens were present

occupied forty-nine days' elapsed time, the start having been made from Haiffax about 4 o'clock in dull, cold weather, and the arrival at Vancouver, by a coincidence, was made at the same hour and under the same weather conditions. The actual runming time was forty-one days and the mileage was 3900 miles, which gives an average of 95.13 miles per day.

Road conditions were bad, owing to the immense rainfall in every part of the country. Many parts of the country, we specially Manifole were turned.

the country. Many parts of the country, especially Manitoba, were turned into swamps and quagmires; this reduced the daily average considerably. In addition to the 3900 miles, 700 miles were covered under other than the car's own power, owing to the absence of trail or road. This applies particularly to New Ontario. As far as North Bay no shipping had to be undertaken, altho this was the first car that had ever come thru all the way from Halifax to that point.

At first it was not difficult to keep up an average of 120 miles a day, but from the Prairie Provinces on this was reduced to as low as sixty mile was reduced to as low as sixty mile. The highest daily run was made in Alberta. 185 miles between Maple Creek and Lethbridge; the lowest in Manitoba fourteen miles, from Winnipeg to Headlingly, owing to the wretched state of the gumbo roads.




