A Life of Great Hardship and Exposure.

MUSIC IN A TORONTO CHURCH.

Sketch of the Organist of Sherbourne-street Methodist Church.
It is somewhat remarkable that most of the musicians organists and music teachers of this city received their training in England. Dr. Stockham, organist and choir-master of St. James' Cathedral, and Mr. Arthur Blakeley, who so efficiently directs the same duties at Sherbourne-street Methodist Church, were each born in the North of England, almost as the saying is, within a stone's throw of the latter-day London. Mr. Blakeley, who is now in his 40th year, was born in Yorkshire, and his father was a well-known English organist and composer. Mr. Blakeley tells, by way of anecdote, that he was first attracted to the study of music at an early age, and that he was particularly fond of the organ. He was first appointed as organist at the age of 18, and has since that time been engaged in the study of his art. He has received several prizes for his playing, and has been a member of several musical societies. He is a well-known and popular organist, and his playing is highly appreciated by the congregation.

REVISION OF THE LOCAL IMPROVEMENT SYSTEM
One of the great questions in municipal politics today is that of the revision, abolition or amendment of the local improvement system. This system, which has been in operation for many years, has become a source of much controversy. It is a system by which the cost of local improvements, such as the paving of streets, the construction of sewers, and the improvement of public squares, is levied upon the property owners in the vicinity of the improvements. The system is based upon the principle of "benefit to the land," and is intended to ensure that the cost of the improvements is borne by those who benefit from them. However, the system has become increasingly unpopular in recent years, and many people are calling for its revision or abolition. The City Engineer, Mr. Arthur Blakeley, has been asked to prepare a report on the system, and to recommend any changes that may be necessary. The report is expected to be published in the near future.

A PREACHER'S FALL

Rev. Oliver J. Booth, formerly of Montreal, is a week owing to his weakness for drink.

New York, Nov. 20.—Five years ago in the city of Montreal, the course of drink drove the Rev. Oliver J. Booth from his pulpit and his church. He sought a refuge and a living in this city and tried hard to get along, even enduring the separation from his wife, but the cure came slowly, and his latest step was that of early this morning, when he was removed to Bellevue Hospital from his lodging at No. 233 West Fourth-street.

The Rev. Mr. Booth is a fine-looking man, with a strong character in his session of many attainments. Upon reaching this city from Canada, he was employed by the Rev. Dr. Greer of St. George's, and with Mr. Thompson, manager of the "Under the Polar Star" theatrical company. All three attended the same college together, and the Rev. Mr. Booth's friendship continued the friendship then formed.

Mr. Booth's weakness overcame him upon several occasions, and he determined to save his friends from the humiliation he felt he was causing them by living intemperately.

He went to West Tenth-street, where he lived for a long time, or until about a month ago, when he occupied a residence, where he occupied a back parlor. On Tuesday he left, and his return showed signs of being drunk. RICH SLOAN SILVER REGION

A Few Pointers Regarding Its Output and Bright Prospects.

Those who bonded the Monitor for \$20,000, paying down \$500, may now regret a lost opportunity, as the Monitor, the owner, having begun to develop a lot of rich ore, has decided to look out eight claims, which would bring him \$16,000.

The rich Sloan mine in the Sloan district shipped two cars of ore netting the owners \$18,000. They are putting the rich Sloan mine, as it is called, on a \$1,000,000, and the shares are now offered at \$1 per share.

N. Clarke Wallace has bought a three-quarters interest in a Sloan silver mine for \$200,000.

The Eldon Company, Wellington and White Water camp will be shipping the first vein in January. Mr. Booth will be the Charles in the same camp, and the Lone Star, which is being shipped, is now shipping out 4000 tons per month.

Rufus Pope has bonded a silver claim in the Sloan for \$100,000.

The Goddards of Toronto have an option on silver mines in the Sloan district. They have bonded a forty-five miles from which ore has been shipped within the past few months, and so far as is known there are more producing mines than in any similar area on the continent.

The Sloan silver mine is being worked by at least 50 per cent. more shippers. It will be difficult to estimate the output of the Sloan silver mine, as it is getting it out of the country, and only the first vein from one side of the hill to the other, a distance of 400 feet, and the ore is now being shipped out \$1,000,000 worth of ore from April last to Dec. 31, this year. One of the veins of the Sloan silver mine is the high grade of the ore. At present in some cases the ore is being shipped down the mountains to the shipping point. What this output will be when railroads are built in the country and an easy outlet is secured, is beyond calculation.

BLACK JACK WOUNDED

Western Outlaws Get the Worst of It in an Encounter With Officers—A Bold Highwayman Is Killed.

Tucson, Ariz., Nov. 20.—News has reached here of a desperate fight near the Chihuahua line. For some days a party of desperadoes, headed by a man known as Black Jack, has been in pursuit of Sheriff and his gang of bandits. Several times the desperadoes were taken to the desperadoes, but not near enough to engage them. Finally, however, they caught them in a position where they had to fight. At a first fire the notorious Bob Hayes was killed. Black Jack was badly wounded, but escaped. One of the posse were injured. The officers are still in pursuit of Black Jack.

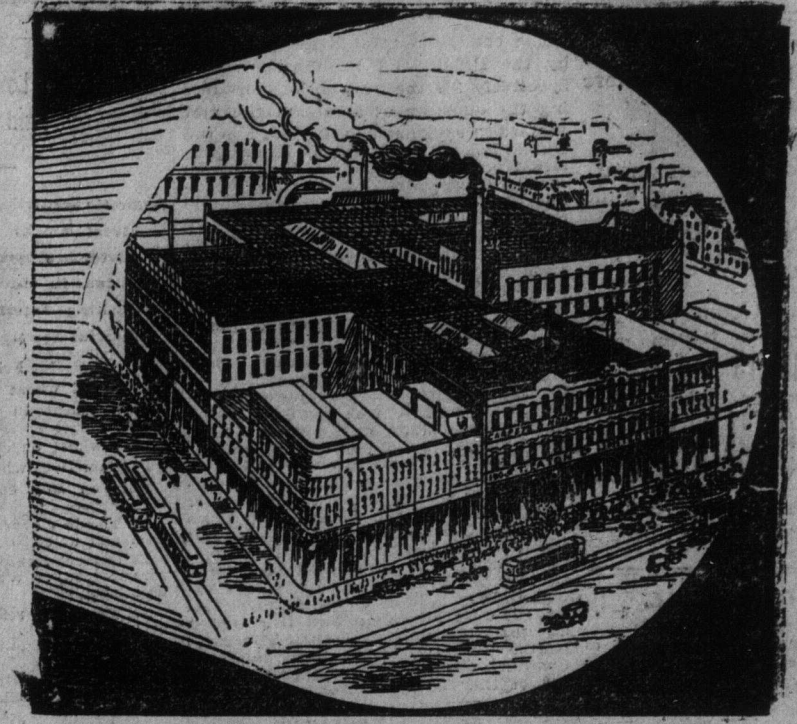
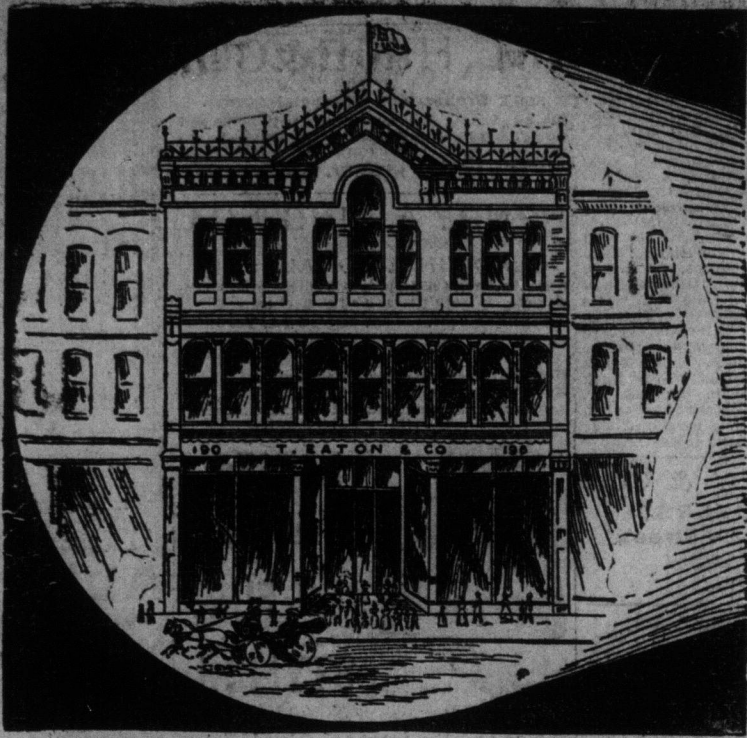
