They say that the Kaiser has no intention of interfering in matters that do not concern Germany."

All Sorts of Rumors.  
The conference between Emperor William and Marquis de Nalles, French Ambassador at the Berlin Court, is the chief topic of all sorts of rumors, for the most part pure guess work. The conference seems, however, to have taken place on Sunday, and the Emperor William has long endeavored by artful civilities to extinguish the French chronic hatred of Germany. His amenities toward France, since the war, have been French interests, as is now the case, he has begun to cultivate Germany, while the concentration of French hatred upon England tends to deflect it from Germany. This situation Emperor William apparently proposes to utilize in furtherance of his policy.

## CUTTING RATES AGAIN!

What a C.P.R. Man Has Heard About Great Northern.

## RATE WAR MAY BE RENEWED

Twenty Dollars Said to Have Been Lopped Off on Through Business.

A Case of Cutting Rates All Through Between Companies Doing Transcontinental Business—Situation Always Bad at Chicago—Companies Can Never Be Trusted—A Grand Trunk Official, However, is of Opinion That the Situation is Not So Bad—His Road Not Affected.

Montreal, Jan. 10.—(Special.)—The rate war may be renewed, as the C.P.R. claim has made a cut of \$20 in its through rates. "I have every reason to believe that the statement is perfectly true," said a prominent official of the C.P.R. to-day. "It has been a case of cutting rates all through, between the companies doing transcontinental business. The rate situation in Chicago is always bad. The companies can never be trusted. In my opinion, the situation is now just as bad as it ever was. As my rate I would not like to say that there was any improvement, without making very special inquiry. I do not think this is an attempt on the part of interested persons to create trouble in order to benefit themselves, but were such the case the rates would be just as bad."

What the Grand Trunk Says.  
A long official in the traffic department of the Grand Trunk also said: "I have read the story of the Great Northern making a cut of \$20 in its through rates. It looks like a put up job. Don't place too much faith in it. It does not concern the Grand Trunk in any way. Personally I should be surprised if the hand of the scissor was at work in it. It is an old dodge. They set to work and cut a dime and sell it again at a reduced price. They are willing to lose \$5 or \$10, in the hope that by getting the master expected to the other road, they may create a rate war, by which they may reap a harvest of some \$2000 or \$4000. From information which we have had from Chicago we have every reason to believe that the rates are being maintained."

## THE COMING ARCHBISHOP.

There is a large measure of expectancy throughout the Roman Catholic diocese of Toronto as to the successor of the late Archbishop Walsh. The name of Bishop O'Connor of London was the first of the three names sent to Rome for the office; it is not known, however, that His Lordship is willing to leave London, a diocese with which he has long been familiar, and assume new responsibilities in Toronto. The bishops of the Province of Quebec, it is believed, are pressing Bishop O'Connor to accept the Toronto see. The second name in the three sent to Rome is that of Rev. Father Tealy of St. Michael's College, and The World would not be surprised if the high honor came to him. Certainly, no priest in the diocese is more worthy, or more fitted to undertake the charge. He is a good Catholic, a learned scholar, a native of the diocese, a successful teacher, and thoroughly acquainted with the diocese and the entire Province of Ontario. He is also familiar with the needs of the diocese, and with the relation that Catholic higher education in Toronto bears to the Provincial University. He is a young man, has first-class administrative capacity, and his appointment would be one gratifying, not only to Catholics, but to the whole community.

ANOTHER OMINOUS STRAW

Which Shows Which Way the Wind is Blowing as Regards Philippine Insurgents.

U. S. CONSUL WILDMAN DENOUNCED.

Filipinos at Hong Kong Have Broken Off Relations, and Charge Him With Breach of Trust.

Hong Kong, Jan. 10.—The Filipino Committee here has broken off all relations with the United States Consul, Roswell Wildman. The committee today issued a writ in the Supreme Court to recover the sum of \$47,000, which the Filipinos claim to have deposited with Mr. Wildman as treasurer of the Philippine independence fund in June last. The members of the committee further allege that confidential disclosures are probable, showing, they add, that the American Government recognized the Filipinos as belligerents by affording them assistance in arms and moral influence to co-operate against Spain. Thus endorsing the agreement made with Aguinaldo at Singapore in April.

GERMANS IN THE SLAVE TRADE.

Officers of the German Colony of Togo Indicted in a Memorial to the Reichstag.

Berlin, Jan. 10.—Dr. Krause, a German traveler in Africa, has caused a sensation here by his memorial addressed to the Reichstag charging the Imperial officers managing the German colony of Togo, Southwest Africa, with conveying at slave-dealing on the coast. In three days, he says, he saw more than 15,000 slaves sold in the town of Kete alone. These sensational charges led mainly against Governor Des von Futtner, who has been involved in other colonial scandals.

SETTLED FOR \$750

Insurance Case in the Civil Assize Court—Said Over a Mortgage-Bill Against Taggart.

In the Civil Assize Court yesterday, Barister A. J. Mackinnon of Acton sued the Manchester Insurance Company on a policy for \$200. The plaintiff acted for the estate of Norman Brown of Ottawa, Ontario, and his claim was alleged to be due by virtue of a policy of the company on the loss sustained by fire in a general store in Limestone, owned by the estate. Shortly after the opening of the case counsel for the parties withdrew and cause to a settlement, the plaintiff agreeing to accept \$750, with costs.

In the afternoon the suit of George H. Wildman against the Ontario Savings & Loan Company was commenced. The plaintiff claims damages for alleged improper charges and imprudent exercise of power of sale contained in a certain mortgage. The case was not finished at adjournment. Mr. George H. Watson, Q.C., appears for the plaintiff, and E. F. E. Johnston, Q.C., and J. R. L. Starr for the company.

The grand jury returned a true bill on the charge of wife-stealing against Robert Frederick Taggart. The prisoner was arraigned, and promised to be ready for trial next Monday. It is said that the defence will urge a plea of insanity.

ANOTHER PHASE OF THE DRUG CASE

An Intervenor Now Confronts Mrs. Druce in the Shape of the Home Officer.

London, Jan. 10.—The Home Office are now intervenors in the Druce case. A NEW INDUSTRY

Improved Packing Cases Made From Hard Woods—A Very Large Business Anticipated.

As the pine tree is passing, no industry of real magnitude appears in sight to create a value for the standing hard woods. The pine diminishing leaves a dreary-looking crowd of hard woods, untouched by the lumberer's ax; and despoiled of their commercial worth by King Coal's competition. It also too often falls a prey to the bush fire. But a new industry is now coming forward to bring it into prominence and greater value. It has been seen that, especially beech, birch and maple, cut into thin veneers, and cemented together, three or the thickness of the whole about 5/16ths of an inch, make very superior packing cases for carrying all kinds of heavy and light merchandise. To show that this is a very extensive field, it is stated that about 40 per cent. of the pine now cut goes into packing cases. The veneer box is less bulky, more durable and very much lighter than the one-inch pine case now in use. By this reduction of weight, the saving in freight and express charges over long distances will give the slippier his packing case free of cost.

A veneer factory solely for this purpose, to be worked by an English company, is now being established in Toronto. Another mill, by a different English company, is being erected in New Brunswick, where hard woods abound close to the seaboard, whence shipments to Great Britain can be made direct to the London factory. Here the veneer is manufactured in sizes and shipped to the London factory. Mr. G. D. Prosser is the pioneer of this business in Canada. Mr. G. W. Varner of Toronto acting for him.
