SYMPATHY.

Miners Want Full Measure Locals Reject Peace Terms

Report That Several Districts Had Instructed Delegates to Oppose Proposition and to Demand Recognition—Mitchell's Reply to President Roosevelt a Marvel of Moderation.

Scranton, Oct. 17.—Reports were circulated to-night that the locals of the Pittston and some other localities had voted to instruct their delegates to oppose the acceptance of the operators' proposition unless the companies would agree to discharge the non-union men, take back all the old employees, drop the suits instituted against strikers and recognize the union. It was impossible to verify these reports, but they are persistently and generally circulated.

A significant fact in this connection was the concern of District President Nichols to-day over a published report that he was at the head of a movement to oppose the acceptance of the proposition. "This report," said Mr. Nichols, "is doing no good, and is causing much mischief. It has caused our men to view the position with suspicion, and when they suspected it which they supposed I had found in place, I have heard of localities in different places being disposed to vote against the proposition, and I must admit it is causing some worry among the miners. I am satisfied, however, that the convention will accept the proposition, and I want it stated that I am opposed to the proposition is absolutely false and without foundation. I have heard of no such thing from the officers recommending its acceptance to the convention was unanimous."

MAJORITY WILL ACCEPT.

Wilkes-Barre, Oct. 17.—In accordance with the call issued yesterday by order of the executive boards of the anthracite districts of their union, "all locals," through the coal fields began electing delegates to-day to the convention which will be held here next week to consider the acceptance or rejection of the proposition submitted by President Roosevelt. Many of the local unions held their meetings to-night. It is positively certain that a majority of the delegates will vote in favor of the acceptance of the arbitration scheme. Prominent officials of the union say there is no fear that the proposition will be rejected enough to defeat the efforts of those who favor ending the strike by arbitration. President Mitchell does not care to anticipate the action of the convention, but he has not the slightest doubt as to the result. He will go back into the coal fields to make a strong speech for the acceptance of the arbitration scheme.

The indications are that the convention will last two days, and there will be much debate on various features of the arbitration scheme. The conditions of some of the colliers are different from those existing at other places. The principal question to be discussed before the union is accepted by the miners will be that of taking care of all the men. The conditions of the miners are such that all workmen cannot be given work immediately, and some will have to wait for weeks before the companies can take care of them. The operators will not dismiss a non-union man in order to give employment to a returning striker. It is understood the union will take care of all men who fall to find employment. This will be done by drawing funds from the relief fund, which is said to be growing.

Laurier Welcomed Home Returns From Coronation

Ancient Capital Brilliantly Illuminated and Masses Turn Out to Extend Their Loyal Greetings—Congratulated Upon Success of His Mission Abroad.

Quebec, Oct. 17.—The arrival of Sir Wilfrid Laurier was attended by one of the grandest demonstrations ever extended to a Canadian statesman by the people of Quebec, irrespective of party politics, as a mark of personal esteem, as well as in honor of his return from his participation in the King's coronation.

The special train from Rimouski with Sir Wilfrid and party on board reached St. Joseph de Levis about 8.45 o'clock, where the train stopped to allow the Premier to disembark when they proceeded to the Island boat wharf and took the steamer Druid, which brought them to the King's Wharf. Thousands of people were assembled on the King's Wharf and vicinity, and when Sir Wilfrid came ashore with his cabinet Ministers, who accompanied him, they were escorted to waiting carriages, and a procession formed, when Canada's Premier was escorted through the principal streets of the city, first by way of Mountain Hill along Buede to the drill hall, where Sir Wilfrid was presented with an address of welcome on behalf of the citizens of Quebec after a display of fireworks took place from the large square in front of the drill hall, and Sir Wilfrid was ushered to the Chateau Frontenac.

Preparation had been made on a large scale for the illumination. The hall was one blaze of electric lights, with the words "Welcome" in French and English, surrounded by electric lights. The Parliament Buildings, postoffice and other public buildings as well as private houses were decorated. Other illuminations at Levis, the Island and other places along the shores of the river were viewed from Dufferin terrace.

The words "Welcome Home" in large letters lighted up by electricity were located on the Levis heights. At other points of vantage, such as the Island Orleans, St. Joseph's, etc., large bonfires sped out the welcome to the Premier, while the towers of the Chateau Frontenac were brilliantly lighted up by electricity and elaborately decorated.


The address of welcome to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, said in part: "We are actually here on offering you more than an ordinary reception for you are one of our own, a distinguished member of the great Canadian family, and most prominently so, as you are not simply as a traveler from distant shores, but in the capacity of an ambassador, whom the nation had sent abroad as her representative to share in a solemn function which has impressed all loyal subjects throughout this empire with the sense of our most glorious and beloved King Edward the Seventh. To the most representative gatherings of the old world you have responded in glowing terms of the boundless wealth and resources of our country, and you have faithfully portrayed us."



RECEPTION AT MONTREAL.
Montreal, Oct. 17.—A demonstration in its heartiness will be the welcome to be given to-morrow by the civic officials, the residents and commercial organizations to Sir Wilfrid Laurier on his arrival in Montreal. The Premier will be received at Place Vigier Station at 1 o'clock by Mayor Cochrane, who will read an address, the text of which is an appreciation by the citizens of Montreal of the Prime Minister's services for Canada abroad in promoting the peace for extended commercial relations with England and France and in giving greater prominence to the resources of this country.

Mayor Cochrane will be accompanied by a delegation of aldermen, members of the Senate and House of Commons, representatives of the Provincial House and commercial bodies, as well as delegates from a number of clubs.

It is expected that Sir Wilfrid will turn in as not simply as a traveler from distant shores, but in the capacity of an ambassador, whom the nation had sent abroad as her representative to share in a solemn function which has impressed all loyal subjects throughout this empire with the sense of our most glorious and beloved King Edward the Seventh. To the most representative gatherings of the old world you have responded in glowing terms of the boundless wealth and resources of our country, and you have faithfully portrayed us."

THIEVES GET DRYAN, JEWELS WORTH \$1000 AT REVOLVER'S POINT OFFICER GIVES UP MAN

Slick Operators From Buffalo Get Into House in Queen's Park While Family Are at Dinner—Two Men Escaping in Buggy Overtaken After Exciting Chase—One Caught, But Daring of His Free Pal Effected His Release.

One thousand dollars worth of jewelry was carried off last night from the home of John Dryan of the W. A. Murray Co., at 75 Queen's Park, by two of the most daring "porch-climbers" who ever operated in this city. The robbers took a buggy with them, when they went to enter the home, and the outfit materially aided the men in escaping from the house. Witness went out with Bell, who was in his buggy. Bell smiled and handed Judge an envelope. When Judge reached for it Bell let the envelope drop at his feet. Judge picked it up and later found \$2 in it. He returned the envelope in court.

The charge of treating a hotel-keeper at London, Elginfield, preferred against the respondent, was denied by the respondent and John Fraser, who accompanied him. No decision was given upon any of the treating charges, the court preferring to hear one argument on the point.

The court adjourned at 6 o'clock to 9.30 to-morrow morning.

PETITIONERS FAIL TO PROVE SEVERAL ELECTION CHARGES

Protests Being Heard in Woodstock and London So Far Appear Devoid of Incriminating Circumstances, But Are Nevertheless Decidedly Interesting.

Woodstock, Oct. 17.—The proceedings in the present trial here to-day were uninteresting, and thus far the petitioners have failed to prove any of the charges. To-day three were abandoned and in the case of the others the judge has not yet given judgment.

The charges advanced have reference to the whole to the payment of sums between \$1 and \$5 for votes, but the respondent succeeded remarkably well in disproving the testimony of the petitioners.

Barriester Dunean of Norwich told on the stand this morning that Mustard made a declaration before him and got \$10 for it. The declaration was now with C. C. Hulet of Norwich. Succeeding this the charge of Mustard getting \$1 from D. C. Beattie of Norwich was dismissed. "F. R. Avey of Norwich swore his cousin, W. W. Avey, agreed to give him a receipt for \$1 on account if he would vote for Sutherland. It turned out that F. R. Avey had an account of \$40 against him in favor of C. G. Hulet, which was cancelled as a reward for signing the declaration to the effect that he got money from W. W. Avey. The latter was called in rebuttal and denied all facts concerning the bribe. Judgment reserved.

William Collins declared that Stephen King, an English Conservative, paid him \$2 for his vote and had promised him \$10. King denied it and several witnesses called as to whom gave Collins a bad reputation for veracity. Judgment deferred.

The charges that respondent got \$5 from John Outbrett and that W. Green received \$5 from T. C. Waller were not proven.

The last charge heard to-day was that John Henderson was paid \$2 for his vote by Ed. Johnston, colored. Judgment was reserved.

STRAWBERRY JAM WAS FAKE

Glucose, Turnips, Millet Seeds and Annaline Coloring Made Up the Deception.

HEALTH OFFICER AFTER SWINDLERS

In Nineteen Out of Twenty-One Samples of Catnap He Found Adulterants.

Montreal, Oct. 17.—Health Officer Laberge to-day reported to the Civic Health Board that in addition to finding adulterants in 19 out of 21 samples of catnap, that he had secured samples of strawberry jam and preserves in a number of stores in which there was an utter absence of strawberries or sugar.

"The concoction is composed of glucose, turnips, millet seeds and annaline coloring," said Dr. Laberge, "and is manufactured right here in Montreal."

An official analysis will be made, and it is not unlikely that prosecutions will follow.

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BAPTISTS GROW IN THE WEST

In 28 Years Number of Churches Has Increased From 1 to 98.

UPHILL FIGHT ON PACIFIC COAST

Some of the Churches There Are No Longer Self-Sustaining—Plea for Support.

Montreal, Oct. 17.—At the Baptist Convention to-day the status of the church in Manitoba, the Northwest and British Columbia was discussed on the reports of Superintendent Slack, house of Manitoba, Superintendent McEwen of British Columbia. The former gave statistics showing the growth of the church during the last 28 years in Manitoba, and the Northwest. Then, he said, there was only one church of seven persons; to-day there were 18 churches, and upward of 150 preaching stations. Then the church preached to the English-speaking people exclusively; to-day it preached to 20 different nationalities. In British Columbia, said Mr. McEwen, the church was having an uphill fight. There were 10 churches, and some of these, owing to business depression, were no longer self-sustaining.

THE LATE PATRICK MCBRINE.

The late Patrick McBrine, who for over thirty years was messenger of the Bank of Montreal, died at his residence, 73 Isabella-street on the 13th inst. Mr. McBrine, who was well-known to almost every citizen of Toronto, was born in Ireland in the year 1820 and came to Toronto in 1838. He was, therefore, a citizen of Toronto for 60 years. He joined the Dragoons, commanded by the late Capt Magrath, when they were sent to Kingston, the

then seat of government, and was ordered to His Excellency Governor-General Lord Sydenham. For many years he lived on Midland-street, Toronto, which was then called "Wood's Bush." On his leaving the Dragoons late Postmaster Fiere of Montreal secured for him the appointment as messenger in the Bank of Montreal, which position he held for over thirty years, retiring in 1878 on a pension. It was said of Mr. McBrine that during his thirty years' service as messenger of the bank he had never been known to make a single error that resulted in loss to the institution. He was a faithful, upright servant, who commanded the respect not only of his superiors in the bank, but of the mercantile community with whom he had daily transactions. The deceased leaves three sons and two daughters, the eldest son having been in the Bank of Toronto for over twenty years.
