## BYE - LAWS,

Passed at the Ninth Annual Meeting of the Society, in Charlottetown, December 28th, 1852, and since amended.

- Ist. His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor for the time being, if a member of the United Church of England and Ireland, shall be respectfully requested to be joint Patron of this Society, as now incorporated by Act of Colonial Parliament, with the Societies for the Propagation of the Gospel and for promoting Christian Knowledge.
- 2d. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be President of the Society; and his approval shall be necessary for the confirmation, revocation and alteration of any of the Bye-Laws, and for making any addition to them.
- 3d. All members of the Church are invited to unite with this Society as Subscribers. Any sum, however small, paid in advance, shall qualify a person to be a member for a year; and Ten Pounds at one payment, shall entitle one to be a member for life.
- 4th. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall take place in Charlottetown, on the 4th Wednesday in January, when a Report of the proceedings of the past year, and the Treasurer's Account shall be presented, and all Officers chosen. A Special General Meeting may be called at any time, when the President,—or in his absence, two or more Vice Presidents,—or the Executive Committee, shall consider it desirable.
- 5th. The Committee Meetings shall be held on the 3d Tuesday and 4th Wednesday in January, and on the 3d Tuesdays in April, July and October,—seven members to constitute a Quorum; and Special Meetings on such other days as the President, or one of the Vice Presidents, and five members of the

Committee may deem advisable; and all applications for Money Grants shall be in writing, and sent to the Secretary a month previous to the Committee Meeting to be held on the 4th Wednesday in January, at which all appropriations shall be made.

6th. The Quarterly Meeting held in October, shall be open to the attendance of two Committee members of each Country Association; at which Meeting all Resolutions will be framed, and all notices of motions, about to be brought forward at the General Meeting, sent in.

7th. All Meetings of the Society, or its Committees, shall be opened with the form of prayer at present used by the D. C. S. of Nova Scotia.

Sth. There shall be two or more Vice Presidents, of whom the Archdeacon of the Island, for the time being, shall be the, First; and the others, with such Officers as may be required for the proper working of the Society, shall be nominated by the Executive Committee,—such nomination to be subject to the approval of the Annual General Meeting.

9th. That where District Committees are formed in country parts of the Island, the Clergymen of those districts be requested to furnish to the Secretary of this Society, one month previous to the Quarterly Meeting in January, all such matters as they may think advisable to be embodied in the Aunual Report,—a draft of which shall be laid before the Committee for its approval.

10th. The Accounts of the Society shall be closed on the 1st of January, and be audited previous to the Annual Meeting.

11th. No change in the Bye-Laws of this Society shall be proposed at a General Meeting, unless the proposed alteration shall have been previously fully canvassed (at least) at two Quarterly Meetings of the Committee.

12th. The principal objects which shall engage the attention of the Society, shall be as follows:

- 1. The employment of Missionary Clergymen in the Island.
- 2. Assistance to the Endowment of Parishes.
- 3. Assistance to the Erection or Enlargement of Churches or Chapels, or Parsonage-houses belonging to the United Church of England and Ireland.

- 4. Aid to Sunday, and other Schools, in which due attention is paid to instruction in the principles of the Established Church.
- 5. Aid to the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, such aid being afforded by persons contributing to that especial object.

To these purposes generally, the contributions will be applied; while those, who desire it may have their subscriptions appropriated to any one or more of these objects, as they think fit.

## ANNUAL MEETING.

The Seventeenth Annual General Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society, was held in the School Room on Tuesday evening 22d January, 1861, and was largely attended by the Clergy and Laity. The Chair was taken at 7 o'clock by His Excellency George Dundas, Esq., Lieut. Governor.

Archdeacon Read commenced proceedings, by giving out a Hymn, which having been sung, prayer was offered up by the Rev David Fitz Gerald.

His Excellency made a few remarks as to the position he occupied as Chairman, and stated the objects of the Society.

Capt. Orlebar, R. N., then read the Report and Financial statement for the past year. These shewed progress generally in the affairs of the Church throughout the Island, both pecuniarily and otherwise. The Report stated that from Charlottetown alone there was collected for Church purposes, during the year, about £1200 although the amount passed through the Society, was only a little more than £50.

The following Resolutions were then passed unanimously, having been first ably and at some length spoken to, by the various movers and seconders.

 Moved by Rev. D. Fitz Gerald, seconded by Hon. Joseph Hensley—

Resolved, That the Report now read be adopted and printed under the direction of the Committee.

2. Moved by Rev. Wm. Meek, seconded by Rev. Mr Dyer—
Resolved, That this Meeting recognizes, with thankfulness to Almighty God, the many mercies vouchsafed to this Island during the past year, especially in making known the way of salvation through the Gospel of His Son.

3. Moved by Rev. Mr Parnther, seconded by Capt. Hancock, R.N.—

Resolved, That the continued aid and liberality of the "Society for the propagation of the Gospel" and "Colonial Church and School Society," in maintaining in this Island the ministration of the word, call for the grateful acknowledgments of this meeting.

4. Moved by Rev. R. T. Roach, seconded by Charles

Resolved, That this meeting rejoices in the opening now afforded for the propagation of the Gospel in distant lands, and trusts that it will be accompanied by that outpouring of the Holy Spirit, which has been so remarkable during the past year.

5. Moved by Hon. T. H. Haviland, seconded by W. Cundall, Esq.—

Resolved, That the Annual General Meeting of this Society shall take place on the 4th Wednesday in January, instead of Tuesday as heretofore; and that the Committee Meeting for making appropriations shall be held on the same day; and that the following gentlemen be the Executive Committee for the ensuing year, viz:—(see Executive Committee, 1st page,) and that the Rev D. B. Parnther and Mr H. J. Cundall, be the Secretaries.

Owing to the lateness of the hour, Archdeacon Read was prevented from speaking at any length; but referring to one or two remarks in the Report said—that it was not want of funds, but want of men, which prevented the Church Societies from being able to fill up vacancies in their Missions, so soon as they occurred. He expressed his satisfaction, and tendered the thanks of the meeting generally to His Excellency, for his presence on this occasion, and also for his kindness in presiding over the proceedings of the evening.

A collection was made, realizing more than the usual amount; a Hymn sung, and the meeting dismissed with the customary benediction.

## REPORT.

3. Moved by Rev. Nr Parabler, seconded by Copl.

In laying before you, the Seventeenth annual Report of the "Diocesan Church Society," the Committee would renew their expression of humble and sincere thanks to the author of all good, for the gracious tokens of His favor continued to the Society, and for the measure of success

which has attended its operations.

The Mission of the Society is comprehensive. 1st. The employment of Missionary Clergymen in the Island. 2d. Assistance to the endowment of Parishes. 3d. Assistance to the erection and enlargement of Churches, or Parsonage-houses belonging to the United Church of England and Ireland; and having been incorporated by Provincial Statute, and numbering amongst its Members the Clergy and a large body of the Laity of this Island, it cannot fail, if adequately supported, of attaining under the Divine blessing, the purposes of its establishment.

Since the presentation of the last Report, the Committee are thankful to say, that this far distant portion of his Diocese, has received a visit from the Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, who after admitting several candidates to the holy and scriptural rite of confirmation, and giving his usual marked attention to such matters as required his adjustment and advice in Charlottetown, proceeded to the most remote part of our Island, to cheer by his presence and strengthen by his counsels, the attachment of its

Members to their Church.

The Committee are also happy to report, that the Island has now assumed, a more important position in the extensive Diocese, of which it forms a part, by its erection into an Archdeaconry, and the appointment of the Rev. Herbert Read, D.D., as the first Archdeacon of P. E. Island.

The Clergy throughout the Island generally, have through God's mercy been spared to continue their labors, over that portion of the Lord's vineyard which he has committed to their trust, and laboring (as the Committee believe they have) in dependence on His blessing for the conversion of souls, the fruit will surely be found to the praise of His grace.

Nor have the members of our several churches in the various Parishes of the Island, failed to afford evidence of their attachment to the church of their Fathers—their attendance on the ordinances of religion has been punctual and devout, and a good hope is entertained, that many during the past year have been strengthened and refreshed under the preaching of the pure and simple truths of the Gospel.

The Committee are glad to report that the subscriptions to the D.C.S. exceed by several pounds, those of the previous year, and would fain believe, that the more the principles of our Church are understood and her pure and scriptural doctrines are taught, the deeper will be the hold which she will have in the affections of a people ready to receive and cherish the truth.

The Removal of the Missionary from Crapaud to Charlottetown, has left the former place unprovided. Application has been made by the Parishioners, to the Bishop of the Diocese, for a successor to Mr Parnther, but from causes with which the Committee are not acquainted, that section of the Mission field is still without a clergyman.

The Church at Springfield, has been occasionally served by the clergymen from St. Eleanors, New London, and Charlottetown.

The Committee now present abstracts of the Reports from the various Missions.

#### CHARLOTTETOWN.

The Rev. David FitzGerald reports, that during the past year, there have been 72 Baptisms, 15 Marriages, 34 Funerals, and the accustomed services four times a week, besides occasional extra services. The attendance of the congregation generally on all the means of grace,

has been regular, and many of its members have manifested an increased desire after spiritual things. The efforts of the people in pecuniary matters have not been behind those of former years, as the following statement will shew.

The Library now numbers 1180 volumes, being an addition of 75 since last year.

The Sunday School has been continued without intermission morning and afternoon, and now numbers 230 scholars.

A Parsonage-house and garden in a convenient situation has been obtained, £336 of the purchase money has been raised, leaving a balance of about £300 still to be provided. The burying ground has been fenced in front, with a substantial paling, but no attempt has yet been made to lay out the ground.

On the whole the aspects of the Church are encouraging and would be more so, did every member make a hearty surrender of himself to God, give according to his ability to the furtherance of the cause of his Redeemer, and exercise with activity and diligence those talents with which he has been entrusted.

The collections amount to £53 15s 7d, being about £15 over those of last year.

#### ST. ELEANOR'S.

The Venble. Archdeacon Read reports, that in his somewhat laborious mission, their prospects are increasing-

ly cheering, and is thankful to God to be permitted to trace indications of spiritual life in their midst. With few interruptions, he has been enabled to perform his pastoral duties, as heretofore. The Sabbath services continue to be well attended, encouraging him to hope that the advantages which our Scriptural Church offers, have not been in vain in the Lord.

The admission of Rev. Mr. Dyer to the order of Priesthood, and the Baptism of eight adults, afforded increased interest to the Bishop's visit. Thirty nine persons also renewed their baptismal obligations, who he trusts were thus confirmed in the Faith of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The exterior of the new Church at Summerside, is nearly completed. Its appearance is neat, and the style of Architecture (the early English) is an improvement in our Church building.

The Sunday Schools numbering 210 Scholars, are as presperous as could be expected, and assisted by some of the zealous members of the Church at Summerside, the School there, has far exceeded his anticipations.

Dr. Read, whilst permitted to report favorably of the general aspect of the Mission, has not been without his discouragements, in the apathy of some and the indifference of others which too often chill the efforts of the clergy, in the discharge of their difficult and responsible duties. He however hopefully anticipates the future, and fervently prays that the Spirit of God may be poured out in our midst, and make the new year a time of renewed spiritual life and refreshment. During the year he has held 251 religious services, and made 540 pastoral visits, and travelled in the discharge of his various duties 2533 miles. There have been 61 Baptisms, 11 Marriages and 13 Burials The collections amount to £21 14s. 1d.

#### NEW LONDON.

The Rev. Wm. Meek reports, that the usual services on Sundays and Weekdays, have been regularly and uninterruptedly attended to, in his Mission, with the addition of an occasional service at the vacant Mission of Springfield.

While he acknowledges with thankfulness, the constant health, which has enabled him to preach and visit so often, in his widely scattered district; he is constrained to admit, that increasing years and diminishing physical powers forbid the hope of thus continuing the work; and although his will is to preach on and to preach more, yet he feels that he must leave to younger persons to do, what he is no longer equal to.

The church at Irish Town, was consecrated by the Bishop last July, having been so far completed at an

expense of £260.

Owing to circumstances beyond his control, the attendance at the New London Church, has not been so large as in former years, frequently not exceeding 70 persons. In addition to the subscriptions to this Society, £9 10s 4½d, the sum of £36 6s, has been collected for the C. C. S. and £17 for Church purposes.

#### PORT HILL.

Rev. H. B. Swabey reports, that in his Mission, increased interest is felt in the operations of the Society, as evidence of which the sum collected this year is greater than the previous one. At the Bishop's visit, 19 young persons presented themselves as candidates for the solemn rite of confirmation.

The Parishioners at Port Hill and Lot 11, are adding Vestries to their respective Churches, and at New Bideford, attempts are being made to finish the Glebe School

house.

The Parsonage still remains unfinished. The services of the Church have been tolerably well attended during the past year, and the Sunday School continues to prosper, and is sustained through all weather. A fortnightly week day service at Port Hill, has been kept up pretty regularly.

Notwithstanding many difficulties, Mr. Swabey is thankful, that in some particulars, he has reason to take courage in the discharge of the high and holy duties of a Minister of the everlasting Gospel. Collections amount to £10 3s.

#### GEORGETOWN, &c.

Rev. R. T. Roach, thankfully records the goodness of the Lord, in having been permitted in health and strength to continue the solemn service of his Church during the

past year.

In Georgetown, the Congregation has slightly increased and is fervent and devout. A prayer meeting has been established by the Parishioners, and a Friday evening lecture is well attended. There are registered 16 Baptisms, and 4 private one's, 5 Marriages, and 8 Burials. Confirmed 26. Religious services including Lectures 161. The offertory contributions, &c., towards the support of the Rector amounted to £44 3s. Contributions for general purposes £52 17s 4d.

At St. Alban's, Mount Stewart, the Church is progress-

ing and the congregations are good.

At Hart's settlement, the little building has not been finished, on account of the extreme poverty of the people.

#### CHERRY VALLEY, &c,

Rev. Wm. Stewart reports, that his duties during the past year, were considerably interrupted by an illness which confined him to his room for three months. During this time, as well as on other occasions, the church at Bedford was kindly served by the Rev. Dr. Jenkins and others of the Clergy. In addition to the regular services, Mr. Stewart preached at the Barrens, Georgetown Road; on the Back Road, Lot 48; and at St. Pet n's Island. He regrets that lukewarmness and a want of vital piety prevail in his parish, notwithstanding his many faithful exhortations and warnings. There are some however, who he trusts have found the Saviour precious to their souls. The collections amount to £3 13s. 5d.

## MILTON & RUSTICO.

Rev. J. S. Smith, reports, that the Sunday services have been held at both stations as usual. Thursday evening lectures held during the Summer were largely attended. During the same period, the Sunday School

at Milton was encouraging, but that at Rustico failed for want of Teachers.

The Parsonage is now occupied, having been entirely completed. Towards the expense, a Tea—with the kind assistance of the Ladies' of Charlottetown,—was held in June last, which realized £36 15s. A debt of £20 still remains on it. Though his congregations of late, have not been so large as at first, yet a more fervent zeal and a deeper interest in the cause of true religion is manifested. The collections from Milton amount to £4 9s. Rustico, £2 2s. 6d.

### CASCUMPEC, KILDARE, &c.

Rev. R. W. Dyer reports, that the newly formed Mission of Cascumpec, &c., is progressing favorably, and may now be considered as fairly established. It is now about 17 months since he entered the Mission; during that time, the Church at Kildare Cape, has been sufficiently completed for him to hold Divine service in it. The Parishioners assisted by kind friends in Town, also commenced the erection of a Parsonage in June last, which is now far advanced towards completion, and if liberally assisted by this Society, will be fit for occupation next Summer.

Mr. Dyer preaches regularly at Cascumpec, Kildare Cape and Bridge, Tignish, Western Road, and French Village, and although the congregations are generally composed of different denominations, yet they are regular and attentive, and seem truly to appreciate the word preached. During the 17 months there have been 51 Baptisms, 5 Marriages, and 12 Funerals, 44 were Confirmed by his Lordship the Bishop of N. S. at his visit in June. £50 has been collected for the C. C. S during the past year. The collections amount to £7 7s 6d.

The Total receipts of this Society during the past year, amount to £132 15s. 11d., which sum has been appropriated for objects connected with the well being of the Church, the details of which as well as of the expenditure of last year's Balance, will be presented in the Treasurers account.

#### IN CONCLUSION.

It ought to be an unnecessary duty for this Committee to urge on Members of the Church of God, a spirit of liberality in aiding a cause, which tends to the good of our fallen man and to the Glory of our common Lord, but they are constrained to say, that though an advance has been made in the sum received towards the funds of this Society, it can hardly be said that we have all done our duty in this respect.

Let us hope however, that the increase of the present year, will be the precursor of a steady advance, and as our members grow in grace, and in the appreciation of the high and holy privileges which they enjoy, they will abound yet more and more in every good word and work to the praise
