The above signals are worn at the main. Upon a vessel arriving in sight from the Light House so wearing her signal, a similar one is hoisted on the Telegraph Staff, or at the yard arm of the Signal Staff at Fort George, with a Pendant under it, descriptive of the class of vessels she belongs to.

TO TRAVELLERS ;

*For the information of Travellers between Windsor and Parrsboro', &c.*

**T**HE Parrsborough Packet sails regularly between Windsor and Parrsborough every week, from the 1st April to Christmas, viz. leaves Parrsborough on Monday, wind and weather permitting so as to be at Windsor on Tuesday ; and will sail from thence the first high water that happens at or after eight o'clock in the morning of that Day : The Packet frequently goes twice or three times a week, when business requires it.

*Time of going through the Falls.*

**T**HE Falls are level (or still water) about three hours and an half on the Flood, and about two hours and an half on the ebb, which makes it passable four times in 24 hours, about 10 or 15 minutes each time.—No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River St. John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by winds, and in the proportion to the heighth of them.

### ECLIPSES FOR THE YEAR 1818.

There will be four Eclipses in the Year 1818, two of the Sun, and two of the Moon, in the following order :—  
 1st,—The first will be of the MOON, April 20th, in the afternoon, partial and visible as follows :

Beginning of the Eclipse.....	6h. 58m.
Ecliptic ☿ .....	8h. 9m.
Middle .....	8h. 8m.
End of the Eclipse.....	9h. 18m.
Digits Eclipsed...5° 32'...on the ☽'s South Limb.	

2d,—The second will be of the SUN, May 5th, in the morning, at 2h. 29m. invisible.

3d,—The MOON will be Eclipsed 1 4-5 digits from her North Limb, on the morning of the 14th of October, visible, as follows :—

Beginning of the Eclipse.....	12h. 40m.
Ecliptic ☿ .....	1h. 16m.
Middle of Eclipse.....	1h. 26m.
End of the Eclipse.....	2h. 11m.

4th,—The last will be of the SUN, October 29th, at 1h. 15m. afternoon, invisible here on account of the ☽ being considerably advanced in Southern Latitude.

♀ Venus will be Morning Star until March 12th ; Evening Star until December 26th, thence Morning Star throughout the year.

♃ Jupiter will make his most splendid appearance during the Months of June and July, he will be in that part of the Heavens, opposite to the Sun ; on the 30th of June and will pass the Meridian at midnight ; the time of his continuance above the Horizon or from his rising, until he sets, will be nearly equal to the length of the night.

♄ Saturn will shine with the greatest lustre during the latter part of August and the whole month of September, he will be in opposition with the Sun the 7th of September, and will pass the Meridian at Midnight, his diurnal Arch will be nearly equal to the length of the night.

The Georgian Planet will be in opposition to the Sun June 9th, and will pass the Meridian at Midnight with 22° of Southern elevation above the Horizon.

**S**AMBRO island and light house is in latitude 44 deg. 30 min. N. and longitude 63 deg. 32 min. W.

From the westward, bring the light to bear N. E. ; if it bears more easterly, stretch to the southward till it bears N. E. and as much more northerly as you please, there being no shoal or ledge to the southward ; then keep it open on your larboard bow ; give it more than a mile and a half birth, as much more as you please.

Note.—The western ledges lie from the light S. W. distant two mile, the other W. S. W. about one league ; the eastern ledges lie in a range nearly, some above water ; the outermost one mile and a half from the light, bearing from it E. N. E.

When the light bears north, distant about 2 miles, run N. E. 4 miles, then north will carry you to Chedabucto Head, at a proper distance clear of all danger.

When a-breast of Chedabucto Head, run N.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. for the south point of George's island.

When within  $\frac{1}{2}$  a mile of George's island, you may enter the harbour west of it in 12 fathoms, or east of it in 15.

In passing between Sandwich point and Meager's beach, run nearest the point, to shun a shoal which runs off S. W. from the beach.

There is also a shoal lying one mile south of Sandwich point.

Coming from the westward, run for the light, and you cannot see Chedabucto Head as you open Halifax harbour ; the light is 4 miles distant from the Head to the S. W.

**T**HAT in and about Minas Bason, Windsor, and that neighbourhood, at the full and change of the Moon, it is high-water about twelve o'clock, and of course, when the Moon quarters it is high water about 6 o'clock.

At Cumberland and Annapolis it is high water at the full and change of the Moon, about 15 minutes after 11 o'clock. In five hours from the time of high water at Windsor, the river is fordable at Falmouth, and remains fordable for three hours in the summer, and two hours in the winter season. High water at Windsor about 50 minutes later than at Boston, and in Cumberland Bason and Annapolis Bason, nearly the same as at Boston.
