





#### THE MONEY STRINGENCY

The Telegraph suggests that the Mari time Board of Trade might properly con sider the present attitude of Canadian banks toward Canadian customers, at a time when they have over \$55,000,000 on call in New York. In this connection a manufacturer writes to the Montres

call in New York. In this connection a manufacturer writes to the Montreal Star, giving a luminous exposition of the whole case against the banks, pointing out among other things that they cannot fairly argue that they are keeping so much money on call in order to have it ready to move the crops, since they constantly have enormous sums outside of Canada. We quote:—

"Thus, during the month of January last (1907), their call loans outside of the country were \$90,000,000; in February, \$89,000,000; in March, \$84,000,000; in April, \$76,000,000; in May, \$77,000,000, and in June, \$78,000,000. I give the round figures.

"During the year 1906, and for every month of that year the government returns show that the banks had an average of about \$85,000,000 loaned on call in countries outside of Canada.


