## FIFTIETH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

## ST. ANDREW'S SOCIETY

OF TORONTO.

On the 5th May, 1836, in the old District School House, referred to in almost affectionate terms by Dr. Scadding, in his book "Toronto of Old," a meeting of Scotchmen was held, at which it was decided to form a society under the name of the St. Andrew's Society, having for its object the relief of destitute Scotch emigrants. The meeting was presided over by the Rev. D. Macaulay, who was then teacher of the school, and the Secretary was Samuel Spreull. The records do not give the number or the names of those present, but we can gather from the resolutions proposed that there were at least ten at the meeting, the names, in addition to the two already mentioned, being Alexander Wood, Grant Powell, John Strachan, jun., William Ross, John Roy, John Ewart, John Somerville, Walter Telfer and William Proudfoot. A Committee was appointed to draft a constitution, the Chairman being the Hon. William Allan. This Committee reported to an adjourned meeting on the 19th May, at the same place, when the constitution was adopted substantially as it still exists, and the first office-bearers were appointed. The first regular quarterly meeting under the constitution was held on the 11th August, when it was reported that forty members had enrolled their names, and it was resolved to admit as original members those whose names were on a list presented by the Secretary. These appear to have amounted to twentysix, making in all sixty-six original resident members, to which must be added six honorary members, making in all seventy-two. Of these only two survive; George Denholm, who has long since left Toronto and become a resident of Montreal, and Robt. Gillespie, an honorary member, residing in London. The last to depart were the venerable Samuel Spreull himself, who died

in 1880, at the patriarchal age of eighty-four, and the Hon. Joseph C. Morrison, whose death since our last anniversary the Society has had to deplore. The first Preparatory Meeting took place on the 10th November, 1836, and on St. Andrew's Day the members met at the City Hotel, when the President, the Hon. William Allan, presented the Society with two flags, the Royal Standard and the Royal Lion and Arms of Scotland, which were forthwith borne aloft at the head of a procession, by Messrs. J. R. McKnight and George Denholm to St. Andrew's Church, where a sermon was preached by the first Chaplain, the Rev. William T. Leach. In the evening, a party of fifty-eight dined together at the City Hotel. We know not what was said and done at that dinner party, but we may be sure that the "perfervidum ingenium Scotorum" manifested itself as heartily as it has done at many a dinner since, and as it will to-night, when, fifty years later, we, a new generation, with new faces and in new circumstances, but with the old spirit and the old loyalty to Scotland, celebrate our jubilee. It appears, however, that this first St. Andrew's Dinner, not unlike some others that have followed it, was not altogether without its unpleasant afterclap, for we read in the minutes of the quarterly meeting of May, 1837, that the proprietor of the City Hotel, Hutcheson by name, had made an overcharge, by reason of which, Mr. Newbigging could make no settlement with him, and it became necessary to levy a contribution from those who were present. History repeats itself in the affairs of societies as well as in those of nations. Not alone to social enjoyment did the Society devote itself in those early days, for we read of numerous gifts of money and provisions to poor people, and of liberal donations to the Dorcas Society and the District Sunday School, "for behoof of Scotch children attending the same."

In August, 1837, the place of meeting was changed from the District School to the North American Hotel, and at the next preparatory meeting the first change in the constitution was made on the motion of Wi liam M. Gorrie, by which the

admission fee was reduced from £1 to 10s.

On St. George's Day, 1838, an affair happened which seems to have ruffled the *amour propre* of the Scotch in no ordinary degree. Mr. Ewart, one of the Vice-Presidents of St. An-

drew's Society, was present at the St. George's Society Dinner in his official capacity, the President, Mr. Isaac Buchanan, not being able to attend, and took umbrage at being assigned a place at the table beside Mayor Gurnett, Vice-President of St. George's Society, and when called upon to respond to the toast of "The Sister Societies," replied to it merely as an individual member and not as a representative. So serious did he deem the supposed slight cast upon him that he had a special meeting called three days afterwards, at which resolutions were passed upholding his action and instructing the Secretary to request an explanation from the St. George's Society. This was given, and at the next meeting, on the 10th May, was accepted as satisfactory, not, however, without the affirmation that, "this Society distinctly approve of every part of Mr. Ewart's conduct."

The procession on St. Andrew's Day, 1838, was made imposing by the Band and Pipers of the 93rd Highlanders, and it is noted in the minutes that a visit was paid to Government House, and the Dinner in the evening at the North American Hotel was graced by the presence of the Lieutenant-Governor, Sir George Arthur, and several other distinguished guests

In 1839, the place of meeting was again changed to the "Ontario House," and at the Preparatory Meeting in that year, Mr. Isaac Buchanan presented the Society with the bag-

pipes which we still preserve.

Two special meetings were held in 1840, one occasioned by the movement for erecting in Edinburgh a Memorial to the Duke of Wellington, and the other to determine the part the Society should take in the reception of the Governor General on his visit to Toronto. Unanimity prevailed at the first, in cordially supporting the proposal, but the heated state of party feeling at the time is shown by a motion at the second meeting to decline the invitation of the Mayor to wait upon his Excellency on his arrival, because the doing so "would impart a political character to the Society." The majority, however, did not accept this view, and the motion was voted

At the Preparatory Meeting in November a design for a seal was approved, and on motion of Captain Colcleugh the seal was ordered to "be got and paid for." In this year the Marquis of Lorne, now Duke of Argyll, was made an honor-

ary member.

In 1841 another change in the place of meeting was made to "Osborne's Rooms," and the first death among the members is recorded, that of Thomas Carfrae, and at the Preparatory Meeting Mr. Isaac Buchanan presented a St. Andrew's Cross and Chain as a President's Badge, and Mr. John Ewart a St.

Andrew's Cross for the first Vice-President.

At the February meeting in 1842 attention was directed to the distress among the operatives in the manufacturing districts at "home," and Committees were appointed to make collections in the different wards of the city. Complaint was made too that "the Room where the meetings were held was too expensive," and the Managers got a strong hint that some other place was desirable. Accordingly we find that the Preparatory Meeting that year was held in Stone's Hotel. Some one had evidently got the Society in debt for we read that a motion was made by Mr. C. S. Ross and carried, "that the collector be authorized to call on each member for one dollar in addition to the Annual Subscription for the purpose of defraying the cost of the new colors lately got for the Society."

In 1843 a new departure was taken in the mode of celebrating the day, Dr. Telfer and Mr. Spreull having succeeded in carrying a motion to substitute a ball and supper for the Annual Dinner. That it was successful there can be no doubt, for the experiment was repeated the following year, although it was necessary in 1845 to raise a special subscription to

defray the expenses of the Balls of 1843 and 1844.

The first instance of the Society, as a body, attending the funeral of a member occurred in April, 1844, in the case of Peter Paterson, senr., who died in office. In that year also the meetings began to be held in Mrs. Dunlop's confectionery, and on St. Andrew's Day after the procession occurred the only instance in the annals of the Society of the expulsion of a member, the charge against the unfortunate individual being that of peculating in the Post Office.

In 1845 the Society reverted to the practice of celebrating the Day by a Dinner, and here trouble arose. The Governor General, Lord Metcalfe, had just left the country under very melancholy circumstances, and the President, the Hon. Mr. Justice Mc Lean, took occasion to make some complimentary references to him, which excited the ire of Mr. George Brown,

who got up and made an excited speech, resulting in a scene of great confusion. The report of the proceedings in the Globe newspaper appears to have contained an attack upon the character of the President, which called forth at the next Quarterly meeting a series of resolutions defending the President and condemning in very strong terms the conduct of Mr. Brown in bringing "before the public grave charges against a gentleman holding the highest office in the Society, without having in the first instance brought such charges before the Society for its consideration." Mr. Brown's friends, being dissatisfied with this action, had a special meeting called for the 9th March, 1846, to re-consider the matter. The interest taken may be judged of from the unprecedented attendance of seventy-three. Motion after motion was made, the year and nays being recorded in every case, with the object of reversing the action of the previous meeting, but the majority clung to the President, and only consented to expunge from the minutes one of the resolutions which attributed malice to Mr. Brown's statements. It remains on the minutes nevertheless. Mr. McLean on St. Andrew's Day following retired from the Presidency, which he had held for seven years. The day was celebrated by a Ball at the Wellington Hotel.

Having now reached the end of ten years in the history of the Society, it may be interesting to note the names of those who still remain with us from that early period. Of those elected on St. Andrews Day 1837 we have three, Isaac C. Gilmor, Robert Hay, and William Henderson, still active working members, who may indeed well be called the Patriarchs of the Society, tempering the frosts of a green old age with a genial, kindly, youthful vivacity that earns for them the admiration, esteem, and affection of all who have the happiness to come in contact with them. Long may Father Time touchlightly their venerable forms, and preserve them to us as types of true genuine honest sons of auld Scotia.

Besides these there remain Russell Inglis and William Mitchell, who have withdrawn from membership; and of those elected in 1838 we have George P. Dickson and Alexander Grant; in 1839, James Sinclair; in 1840, John Fisken and Hon. Adam Wilson; in 1841, John Henderson and John Riddell; in 1842, George Leslie, Rev. Dr. Barclay and Hon. Oliver Mowat; in 1843, Hugh Miller; in 1845, Alexander

Henderson; and in 1846, T. W. Anderson, J. Gordon Brown, James Dick, John Kay and John Laidlaw, all good men and true.

In the autumn of 1847 the Governor General, the Earl of Elgin, made a tour through the western part of the Province and was loyally received in Toronto by his brother Scots, who presented him with an address and elected him an Honorary

Member and Patron of the Society.

On the 11th November of that year, the Secretary, Mr. Angus Morrison, presented a design for a certificate of membership, which was ordered to be lithographed, and copies given to members on payment of 2s. 6d. Three blank copies of this certificate remain in the Secretary's box. It exhibited a beautiful picture of Toronto as it then appeared to one viewing it from the Bay, and it is deeply to be regretted that the plate from which it was printed has been lost.

In 1848 the Society invested £60 in the purchase of a mortgage. This was the commencement of the permanent fund which under the careful management of successive Treasurers has grown to the handsome amount shown by recent

Treasurer's Reports.

1848 was a year of social and political upheaval in Europe. Famine and pestilence had desolated Ireland; the Highlands and Islands of Scotland had felt the pinch of hunger; France, Italy, Hungary were in the throes of revolution; and on this side the water men's minds were held in uncertainty and expectancy. Thousands of famished, fever-stricken emigrants were poured upon our shores, and the energies of all charitable organizations were taxed to the utmost in endeavoring to alleviate the universal distress. Depression under the circumstances was natural, and this may account for the quiet observance of the Day in that year, there having been neither procession, nor sermon, nor dinner nor ball.

The next year, 1849, was a notable one in the history of the Society as well as of Canada. The political riots in Montreal culminating in personal violence towards Lord Elgin and the destruction of the Parliament House ought not to have disturbed the equanimity of a charitable society as such, but the hasty and ill-considered action of the St. Andrew's Society of Montreal in expelling the Governor from membership on account of the part he had taken in certain measures

"We the St. Andrew's Society of Toronto and the Home District associated, as Your Excellency is aware, for patriotic and benevolent purposes would, in ordinary circumstances, have hesitated to advert to any topic calculated however remotely, to excite political differences among us. The tacit understanding to exclude such topics from our discussions we had borrowed, as we thought, together with our constitution from the St. Andrew's Society of Montreal, and until a recent occasion having reference to our Patron as well as theirs, we considered the rule inviolate there as well as here. Not only, however, has our Patron been personally assailed in the most violent manner, but a portion of the press has endeavored to represent that assault as in unison with the sentiments of Scotchmen throughout the Province. It would, therefore, be unpardonable in us to give the assent of silence to that mis-The attempt to cast unmerited odium on the representation. most honored name in the history of our country we regard with mingled feelings of indignation and shame. Nothing can, in our opinion, account for the extraordinary character of that attempt, unless it be the supposition that feelings of the most intemperate nature had for the moment 'paralyzed in a measure the reason and the patriotism of those engaged in it. That a Scottish nobleman—a Bruce—should for mere party purposes be traduced by Scotchmen appears to us so unworthy of our countrymen, that were the fact disputable it would be incredible. If Your Excellency had acted inconsistently with the most strict interpretation of the principles and practice of the British Constitution as it exists in this Province, that same Constitution would have furnished the appropriate means of correction and rendered the censure of a private society needless as it would have been impotent. But when in Your Excellency's conduct we find the most admirable impartiality, firmness, and adherence to the Constitution guaranteed to us by the Imperial authority, it is to us wholly incomprehensible how all fairness and candour, all generous nationality, could have given place in the breasts of

Scotchmen to qualities of a totally opposite character. Since however that evil condition of mind has arisen and has exerted itself, we deem it our duty in justice to Your Excellency as our Patron, to our own feelings as Scotchmen, and to the feelings of our countrymen in the Province who agree with us, to declare that we feel a national pride in the character which Your Excellency has sustained since your arrival among The great Bruce of our national history had fierce factions to contend with in his native country as well as formidable enemies from abroad, yet his lofty spirit did not falter in their presence, and we have a strong confidence that the present turbulence of Canadian politics will soon subside and that it will then appear manifest to all men that Your Excellency gave the most faithful example that ever was given in this Province of the strict, honest, and impartial working of our Constitution. In these circumstances we most respectfully tender to Your Excellency the assurance of our high admiration of the exalted character uniformly exhibited by Your Excellency in the government of this Province."

This address was adopted on the 10th May and signed by Thos. G. Ridout, President, and A. Morrison, Secretary. But before presentation, an effort was made to recal it, and a special meeting took place on the 19th May, with an attendance of 108, when a resolution was introduced, "That this Society having been established for objects of benevolence, charity and mutual goodwill, in the promotion of which Scotchmen and the descendants of Scotchmen of every kind and party might always cordially unite, everything having a tendency to create dissension in this Society of a political character, ought to be carefully avoided, and this Society, therefore, upon further consideration, regret the introduction of the Resolution and address to Lord Elgin adopted at the last quarterly meeting and resolves that they be erased from the minutes of its proceedings." The year and nays were taken and the motion was defeated by 73 to 33. An inspection of the lists shows that political parties were then constituted somewhat differently from their present composition.

His Excellency replied to this address in a voice tremulous with emotion, to the effect that if detraction and misrepresentation had been a source of bitterness, it was cause for the highest gratification to know that he possessed the confidence of he from he to to to to poss pass the the

la of of his fellow-countrymen, represented by the deputation from Toronto, and then, on the impulse of the moment, he took from the wall a portrait of himself and presented it This portrait remains as one of the most treasured possessions of the Society, and in accordance with a resolution passed on the return of the deputation to Toronto, is kept in the custody of the president for the time being and decorates the hall on all festive and public occasions.

At the same time, the son of the Governor, Lord Bruce, a Canadian born, the present Earl, was made an Honorary

Member.

In October of that year, His Excellency paid another visit to Toronto. The St. Andrew's Society wished to take part in the public reception, but the Mayor, Mr. Gurnett, fearing disturbance, refused permission. Scotchmen are not easily balked of their purpose, and though they bowed to the authority of the Mayor and took no part in the public procession, they got up one of their own on a subsequent day, headed by three pipers, and presented their address. They were graciously received and at his own request, every member present had the pleasure of shaking hands with His Excellency.

The only notable circumstance recorded in the year 1850 is the celebration of the Queen's Birthday, by a grand ball under the joint auspices of the St. George's, St. Patrick's and St. Andrew's Societies. In 1852, the meetings began to be held at McConkey's, and in 1853, the national societies again

joined in the celebration of the Queen's Birthday.

At the Preparatory Meeting in November 1854, the following notable resolutions were passed:-"That the members of the St. Andrew's Society of Toronto do this year forego the usual celebration of their festival, and instead thereof devote the exertions and funds of the occasion, towards promoting in combination with the other national societies, and their fellowcitizens at large, the collection of a subscription to be transmitted to the parent country in aid of the Patriotic Fund now in process of formation there for the relief of the widows and orphans of the brave soldiers who fought and fell in foreign lands for a cause involving the welfare, it may be truly said, of the human race.

"That this Society put itself in communication with the other Societies of St. George and St. Patrick and also with the mayor of the city with the view of together concerting the best measures for at once entering upon the collection of liberal subscriptions within the City of Toronto, and promoting the same object wherever it may be thought expedient

throughout the Province.

"That it is the duty of this city and Province, so highly favored with peace and prosperity, to testify in an intelligible manner their appreciation of the great interests involved in the issue of the war now raging in Europe, and also their deep sympathy with those who suffer irreparable losses in a cause which affects so profoundly the interests of the whole world." A committee was forthwith appointed to carry out the object of these resolutions and the magnificent result of their labors forms the most splendid achievement in the history of the Society. Many remember the large and enthusiastic meeting in St. Lawrence Hall, which was the substitute for the usual celebration, and the eloquent speech of the President, the Hon. John Hillyard Cameron in introducing the scheme to public notice. The committee had the satisfaction of handing through the Treasurer, Mr. James Shaw, to the Mayor Mr. G. W. Allan, for transmission to England the sum of £1050.

In the minutes of the meeting of 6th March, 1855, appears the following item:—"A few juveniles appeared and handed to the Treasurer one pound one shilling, having been collected by them for the Patriotic Fund. A vote of thanks was given by the Society for their praiseworthy conduct." It is an interesting fact that the leader and spokesman of these "juveniles" afterwards became president of the Society and mayor of the city. His name is William Barclay McMurrich.

In the summer of 1857 the terrible calamity of the burning of the steamer "Montreal" when coming up the river St. Lawrence, crowded with emigrants, profoundly stirred the sympathies of the whole country; and this Society took its full share in the benevolent work of alleviating the sorrows of the stricken survivors. This was the year of the Indian Mutiny, a year of terrible memories. Depression and gloom pervaded the British Empire, while a handful of Europeans held at bay a nation of infuriated fanatics. In the suspense of that deadly struggle there was little disposition for conviviality or feasting, and consequently the members of the

Society for celebration of the Day contented themselves with passing a resolution of thanks to the President, Mr. John Ewart for his gift of "The Ram's Head Snuff Mull, most magnificently mounted, a beautiful specimen of art so thoroughly associated with Scottish customs and traditions," and directing that it "be constituted a badge of office for the Presidents of the Society in all time coming, and that they continue the engraved list of Presidents on the box." The winter of 1857-58 was one of great distress among the poor of the city, and this Society at a special meeting in January decided to raise a special collection among the members. In a short time the sum of £70 was raised, of which £10 was given to the House of Industry for the soup kitchen.

In the summer of 1859 the Townships of Kinloss and Bruce inhabited chiefly by Scotch settlers were overtaken by a famine, the inhabitants being entirely destitute of provisions and having no means to procure any before harvest. An appeal was made to the Society on their behalf, not for charity, but for a loan on the security of Township debentures. Such sturdy Scottish independence could be met in only one way; the Society made a loan for two years of \$500 to the two Townships, the members present signing a guarantee for the repayment of the money. It need scarcely be added that the guarantors were never called upon for a dollar.

1860 was the year of the visit to Canada of the Prince of Wales. When he reached Toronto, the St. Andrew's Society were, of course, prepared to do their utmost in giving him a loyal reception, but their plans were seriously marred by the unfortunate troubles with the Orangemen.

The year 1861 was signalized by a Society Steamboat Excursion, the first of a series that extended over a number of

This brings us to the end of the first twenty-five years of the Society's history. The last twenty-five years have been characterized by little that is striking, or that calls for special mention. In 1863 the meetings began to be held at the Queen's Hotel, where they have ever since been held, at no expense to the Society. For this the Society owe a deep debt of gratitude to the proprietors of the hotel, which has been frequently given expression to in resolutions on the minutes. In 1865 the practice of having Divine Service in connection with the

Anniversary was resumed, and has ever since been kept up. It is eminently proper that this should be so, and it is to be hoped this recognition of our duty to the Almighty Father will never again be forgotten.

In recent years there has, fortunately, been no special appeal made to the Society for aid on any large scale, save in the cases of the Memphis sufferers in 1873, and the victims of the

failure of the City of Glasgow Bank in 1878.

In 1867 it is recorded that a concert for the benefit of the Society's funds was given voluntarily by Mr. Kennedy, the celebrated Scottish Vocalist, whose recent death in this country has sent a thrill of sorrow into the hearts of thousands all over the world, who have listened to his wonderful interpretations of Scottish song and story.

In 1879 the Marquis of Lorne and the Princess Louise paid their first visit to Toronto. The St. Andrew's Society proposed giving a grand ball in their honor, and raised a guarantee fund of about \$4,000 as a preliminary, but as a citizen's committee also mooted a ball at the same time, the Society

withdrew and did nothing further in the matter.

On St. Andrew's Day, 1880, Mr. James Graham presented

a badge of Office for the Second Vice-President.

On 13th January, 1883 occurred the only instance of the death of a President in office, the Society having then to mourn the loss of Mr. James Michie, a man respected and beloved by all who knew him. It was a graceful thing as well as a testimony to his worth that from respect to his memory, the Society held no festival that year.

During the past year two members have passed away, the Hon. Joseph C. Morrison and Mr. Forbes McHardy. Mr. Justice Morrison was the last resident of the original members, was a past President, and had for many years taken an active interest in all the concerns of the Society. He leaves behind him the reputation of an estimable citizen, an upright Judge, and a

true Scotchman.

In 1864 the Society purchased in the Necropolis a plot of ground in which to bury the bodies of poor Scotchmen dying in the city without means or without relatives to pay the last rites of affection. The filling up of this plot has necessitated the purchase of another, which has within a few weeks been effected in Mount Pleasant Cemetery. It is in contemplation

the charitable work of this Society.

In 1851 a-move was made looking towards the incorporation of the Society, and again in 1865, but at neither time does anything appear to have been done, beyond naming committees to carry out the object sought. Then it was necessary to get a special Act of Parliament passed, and probably the expense and trouble attending such proceedings stood in the way. But a general Act applicable to such cases passed a few years ago by the Ontario Legislature, enables us by a very simple procedure to obtain corporate powers, and we can at length announce that the St. Andrew's Society of Toronto has become a corporation.

In reviewing the record of fifty years there is much to feel satisfaction for. Our charities have been constant and continuous, though for the most part quiet and unobtrusive. Could all be viewed together the mass of sorrow that has been alleviated by the Society's work would be seen to be wonderfully great. The primary object of the institution of the Society was the relief of destitute Scotch emigrants, and this has never been lost sight of. Right nobly has the belief been

Scottish good fellowship also has been cultivated with enthusiasm in these fifty years. The celebration of "The Day," whether by dinner, or ball, or supper, or concert, has always been hearty, and, what is more, has always been one of the great social events of the year in Toronto. Scotchmen are proverbially sober and canny in their ways. They are not apt to be carried off their feet by sentiment or impulse, except on great occasions, and if sometimes on St. Andrew's Day they appear to become possessed of another nature, the fault, if it is one, is pardonable. Mirth and jollity once a year can do little harm. There are traditions lurking about in the memories of old members of large bills to pay for broken glass-ware, of decanters used for nine-pins, of midnight processions of noisy revellers headed by "skirling" bagpipes, but that was the manner of the time, and gave offence to none, even the gravest winking at what was but the boiling-over of the imprisoned warmth of Scottish hearts.

And there were giants in those days. In looking down the

roll of membership these past fifty years, it is uite a revelation to note the number of names of Scotchmen who have held leading positions in Toronto. Dignitaries of the church, statesmen, premiers, judges, eminent lawyers, leading physicians, prominent merchants, bankers, men in all walks of life, have their names inscribed on our roll. We have no reason to be ashamed of our company. May it always be so!

The Revision of the Roll has engaged the attention of a Committee for some months past, and a new Roll-book has been obtained, in which have been inscribed the names of 222 Resident Members who have paid their dues for the current

year, 4 Honorary Members and 14 Life Members.

The Annual Sermon this year was preached on the evening of Sunday, the 28th November, by the Rev. G. M. Milligan, one of the Society's Chaplains, when a very large congregation assembled, and a collection in aid of the Charitable Fund was

taken up, amounting to \$55.

Herewith are appended the Reports of the Managers and the Treasurer, as also an extract from the *Mail* of 1st December, 1886, giving an account of the Ball by which the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Society was commemorated. It is interesting to record that the Lieutenant-Governor remembers attending the Ball of the Society 40 years ago.

## REPORT OF THE MANAGERS OF ST. ANDREW'S SOCIETY

For the year ending 4th November, 1886.

Your Managers in submitting this their Annual Report do so feeling that they have endeavored conscientiously to discharge their duties for the best interests of the Society.

Acting upon your expressed desire that we should make more liberal donations to applicants for relief, we have therefore much pleasure in reporting that we have expended the sum of \$632.30, a much larger sum than has been spent for many previous years, and we have relieved in all 344 persons, including children, and we think no deserving case has gone unaided.

Many, and we believe, the most of those aided, have been thankful for your bounty, but there will always be some who are unworthy of relief, and this class is generally the most

troublesome.

We have long felt the want of some place where we could give able-bodied men a chance to earn their daily bread, and we trust some scheme will be devised to help the Managers to apply the real test (which is a willingness to work by those seeking assistance). There have been two burials in our new burying ground. In the case of one of these the funeral and hospital expenses, which amounted to about \$40, were refunded to the Society in full by a cousin of the deceased, and one who may be called upon to subscribe to the Monument Fund, he having expressed his willingness to do so. The Good Old Book says: "Seest thou a man diligent in his calling he shall stand before kings," etc.

And we believe that many of the tramps who seek relief have got weary of well-doing, and have forgotten the use of their Bible, the book which made Scotland glorious, and which made Scotchmen honored and respected throughout the world. For in our experience as Managers we have never seen the

## Brilliant Celebration of the Fiftieth Anniversary.

(From The Mail, 1st December, 1886.)

THE St. Andrew's Society celebrated their fiftieth anniversary last night by a ball in the Pavilion Music Hall. The event was one which naturally excited great interest among the Scotch citizens of Toronto, and had been looked forward to by them for weeks past with feelings of pleasurable anticipation. The society must be congratulated that their ball proved to be one of the most brilliant affairs of the kind which had ever been held in the Pavilion. Over three hundred and fifty couples attended, the large majority of whom, at some time or other during the evening, participated in the liberal programme of dances arranged for by the managing committee. The hall was most beautifully decorated according to a plan arranged by Messrs. Macdougall and Gray, the members of the society who had superintendence of this department. It presented a perfect blaze of colours, the whole of the front of the balcony and the platform being shrouded in bunting of various tints, while appropriate mottoes were conspicuous from all points of vantage. Two mottoes which elicited much comment were those from the balcony and and platform beginning, "Fear God and honour the Queen," and "All we that are Scotch." These were taken from the famous blue blanket of Edinburgh—the banner under which the tradesmen of that city fought at the battle of Flodden. The original flag is still in existence, and was borne at the late procession at Edinburgh. The Gaelic mottoe on the side of the platform was, "Tir nan beaner nan gleann's nan gaesgeach," meaning "Land of the mountain, clan and heroes." The music for the dances was supplied by the band of the Royal Grenadiers, who were stationed in the front of the balcony and played an excellent selection during the evening. The refresh-

ment tables, which were most tastefully arranged, were under the management of Mr. Harry Webb, who was chosen caterer for the occasion.

His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor and Mrs. and Miss Robinson arrived after nine o'clock, and were received with the usual loyal music from the band. Dancing was then commenced, and was kept up with energy and enjoyment until a late hour. Perhaps the dance which excited the most interest was the first Scotch reel, in which only a few couples took part. The majority of the guests ascended to the balcony and became enthusiastic spectators. The principal couples in the reel were Lt.-Col. Caverhill, of Montreal, with Miss Ross; Dr. Mc-Michael, president of the North American Caledonian Society, of Buffalo, with Miss McLeod; Mr. Matheson, of Hamilton, with Mrs. F. C. Moffatt; Mr. Forbes Michie with Miss Walker, and Mr. Ince with Miss May Walker. The reel was danced con amore, and at the conclusion the couples participating were greeted with a round of enthusiastic applause. The scene on the floor of the hall during the dancing was exceedingly bright and varied in colour. The ladies with their entrancing and delicate tinted toilettes and gleaming white shoulders and arms presenting a grateful contrast to the eye amid the throng of red and dark green-coated volunteer officers, kilted Scotchmen and black-coated civilians. The Scotch characteristic of the assembly was emphasized by the presence of a Highland piper in the person of Mr. Munro, who played an inspiring selection of the national music at intervals between the dances.
