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LAWS AND REGULATIONS
OF THE
UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

As adopted at a General Meeting of the Society, held in the City of Toronto, on the third day of August, 1855; and Amended at a General Meeting held on the 13th day of April, 1880.

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be denominated the "UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY," having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society—that is, the circulation of the Bible, without note or comment.

II. This Society shall endeavour to unite all Bible Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operations, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III. This Society shall maintain, in the City of Toronto, a general depot of Bibles and Testaments, from which all Societies in connexion with it shall be supplied with the Scriptures, at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV. The business of the Society shall be carried on by a Board of Directors, to consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Secretaries, and a representative from each Branch, as provided in Article V., together with twenty clerical and twenty lay members, so selected as to give the Board always, as before, a representative character as regards the principal religious bodies interested in the work of the Society, five of whom shall form a quorum. The five clerical and five lay members who shall have attended the least number of meetings of the Board shall not be eligible for re-election; except in cases where the non-attendance has arisen from illness or absence from the country, in which cases the Board may nominate such member or members for re-election.

V. Each Branch Society shall be entitled to a representative on the General Board. The President of the Branch shall be *ex officio* such representative, or any other resident member whom the Committee may appoint as a substitute, who shall be a member of such Branch.

VI. At any meeting of the Directors, the President, or, in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list then present, and in absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII. Each person paying annually one dollar shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying fifty dollars at any one time, either to this Society or to any of the Societies in connexion therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society, or who may have rendered important services, shall, at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII. Each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a certificate of membership, under the corporate seal of the Society, duly signed by the President and Secretaries.

IX. The Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of the Permanent Secretary, Agents, Depository, Colporteurs, Bookkeeper,

and Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances ; and shall have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal, of the corporation, as well as the management and control of its general affairs and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorporation.

X. The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business on the third Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7.30 p.m. Special meetings may be called by the Secretaries at any time, at the request of the President, or of any three Directors.

XI. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held on the second Wednesday in the month of May in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors, for the time being, may deem best for the interests of the Society ; when the officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen. A report of the operations of the Society during the foregoing year shall be presented, together with the Treasurer's and Depository's accounts, duly audited. Special general meetings may be called at any time by the Board.

XII. In case of the death or removal of any Director during the year, the Board shall at the next ensuing meeting thereof fill such vacancy.

XIII. No alteration in these By-laws shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the proposed alteration has been given to the Board.

RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS RELATIVE TO GRANTS TO SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

That in all applications for grants of Bibles to Sunday Schools, the applicant be requested to furnish the Secretaries with an account of the state of the School ; the number of Scholars and Teachers ; the amount of funds at the disposal of the Managers ; who are its officers ; and why it is necessary to make such application :—all which should in every case be certified by a Minister of the Gospel, or some person of known respectability. And further, this Board recommends that the Secretaries make grants in future only to destitute settlements ; reporting the same to the next General Meeting of the Board of Directors.

RULES

RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES.

I. That a Society be formed in connection with the British and Foreign Bible Society, through the medium of the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment: the English copies being of the authorised version *only*.

II. That the Society be denominated "THE———BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY."

III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually, or five dollars at one time, shall be members of this Society.

IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee consisting of not less than———other members; five to constitute a quorum.

V. That all Ministers of the Gospel who join the Society shall be reckoned members of the Committee.

VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly or oftener; time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.

VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operations into Districts, and appoint visitors for each district, to solicit subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the Word of God.

VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Society shall, after deducting incidental expenses, be remitted, yearly, to the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the Word of God into the Indian languages, and for supplying other nations, through the Parent Institution, with the pure Word of God: or for the purchase of Bibles and Testaments to supply the neighbourhood *at cost price*, or gratuitously to those who cannot purchase.

IX. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the——day of——, in each year, at——, when the accounts shall be presented; the proceedings of the past year stated; a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon; the Report to be published under the direction of the Committee if required.

X. That on the formation of a new Committee, the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

THE FORTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

Twelve months ago the Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society expressed their hope that the tenth jubilee of the completion of Wycliffe's version of the New Testament would be celebrated by marked progress in Bible Society work. Three months ago the well-known, honoured, and Reverend Dr. Stoughton expressed the same desire. In addressing the Wycliffe Commemoration in Edinburgh he said, "You have done wisely in constituting this anniversary a Wycliffe commemoration. But let us all remember that the fashionable hero-worship of the day by no means necessarily implies on the part of the worshipper a possession of the same spirit as the hero honoured. It will be a good thing for us to ask: are we penetrated with the love of the Bible which wrought so mightily in the life of John Wycliffe?" Then, after urging the call upon all English-speaking people to identify themselves with the Bible Society, he went on to say: "I trust you will not let this celebration evaporate in sentiment. In America I find Mr. Winthrop proposing a group of statuary at New York or Boston, which should include Wycliffe, Tyndale, Coverdale, and Luther. I do not know whether you contemplate anything of that kind in this city, but I do trust that you will signalize this year by some special effort to cherish and circulate the Book which has made Scotland what it is; and in humble dependence on the Spirit of God, to send forth afresh His Word throughout the world."

It is an interesting coincidence that the revised version of the English New Testament will be issued so nearly just five hundred years after the first complete version, the date of which some historians make 1380, and others 1381. That it will be the best translation yet produced, not only in English, but in any language, there appears to be no reasonable doubt, and the Directors trust that the Society will very soon be able to circulate it. But in this, as in all important matters, they desire to follow the leading of the Parent Society as closely as the circumstances of our country will allow, and they regret that they are not yet in a position to state what course will be adopted.

Though the hope expressed in the last report has not been fully realized, as the progress is not very marked, and all the great Societies engaged in this work complain that the increase of their means does not keep pace with their opportunities; yet a review of the year just closed presents several encouraging features, and the hearts of the Directors are cheered by recent accounts from the great Parent Institution and other Bible Societies. A letter lately received from England tells them that though the total income of the British and Foreign Bible Society during the last twelve months shows a decrease, there is an increase in the free contributions, and that their financial position has encouraged the Committee to occupy fresh ground, and so extend their operations of sowing the good seed of the Word of God. The income

of our own Society has been \$29,173, shewing an increase of \$1,087, and the issues have numbered 32,334, being 1,150 more than last year. Moreover, though there are complaints of thinly attended meetings in many parts of the country, yet in others good gatherings have come from long distances in bad weather to hear of the Society's work ; and evidences are not wanting that it has a strong hold on the affections of the people.

Several very handsome donations and bequests have been received during the year. Dr. Wolverton, of Grimsby, has given \$400, Mrs. Robert Richardson, of Kincardine, \$100, Mrs. Sloan, of Esquesing, \$100, Mr. J. W. Ball, of Niagara, \$100, Mr. F. A. Ball, of Toronto, \$50, Mr. Walter McFarlane, of Toronto, \$50, Mr. Robert Black of Blenheim \$50, Mr. John Pickering, of Lucknow, \$50, and Mr. Donald Fraser, of East Williams, \$50. This is not the first time that Mr. Fraser has indulged his own liberal spirit and cheered the hearts of the Directors by a similar contribution in aid of the good work. In the last report mention was made of a bequest of \$1,000 left by the late Mr. McCraney, of Oakville, of which \$500 was then paid. Within the year just closed the balance, with interest, \$540, has been received from his son and executor, Mr. D. McCraney, M. P. P., of Bothwell. A bequest of \$50 from the late Miss Foote, of Etobicoke, has also been received.

For the first time in a number of years death has made no breach in the ranks of the Directors. Whilst they desire to express their thankfulness for this mercy, they cannot but record their very deep regret at hearing the recent news of the death of the Rev. Dr. Punshon, who was for several years a Vice President of the Society, and who, during his residence in Canada, identified himself so thoroughly and so heartily with her interests. The Directors regret to have to report the serious loss the Society has sustained in the death of Mr. Edward Tyner, the Assistant Depository. Having served the Society so faithfully and efficiently for eighteen years, and his face being so well known to the customers of the Depository, he will be long missed.

BRANCHES.

New Branches have been formed at Ayr, Beeton, Brougham, Courtland, Delhi, Eglinton, Elfrida, Midland, Mimosa, Parkdale, Queensville, and West Tilbury. Some of these have made a very promising beginning, especially Beeton, which has sent \$43 as its first free contribution. At the formation of the Branch at Ayr, the Chairman was pleased to call it "a wee little Branch," and to characterize it as "quite ornamental ;" but it is hoped that a thriving place like Ayr, with so strong a Scotch element, will do its share in helping to disseminate the Book which has done so much for Scotland, and that the Branch there will be fruitful as well as ornamental. In addition to these, Depositories have been opened at Magnetewan and Roseneath. On the other hand, five Branches have been struck off the list, one has been reduced to the status of a Depository, and three will hereafter be worked as sub-branches of more vigorous organizations in their immediate neighbourhood. This makes the Society's list to contain at present 397 Branches, and eleven Depositories. It is encouraging to find that the system of sub-branches is being developed, and that some Branches which have not actually held any meetings in surrounding localities, or formed any subordinate organizations, have yet considerably widened the fields canvassed by their collectors. Galt and Clinton have been reported as specially note-worthy in this respect. The Directors regard this as a very hopeful feature in the work, although the beneficial effects of it may not be very manifest until it is more widely adopted. One agent, of several years' experience, urges in his report the development of the work in country localities. It is plain that this can only be done effectually by the formation of sub-branches, as otherwise it would very much increase

the expense of agency, which the Board is anxious to curtail as far as possible, consistently with the interests of the cause.

The Agents were in the past year instructed to pay special attention to the inspection of the Depositories of the Branches. In a few places they found the stocks ill-assorted and ill-cared for, and in a few they found advanced prices charged and accounts confused; but in the very large majority they found the Bibles sold at invoice prices, and matters generally in a very satisfactory state. One Agent reports that "the decision of the Board in respect to stamping the price in each book is hailed with pleasure, Depositories stating that while it will assist them, it will also be a satisfaction to the public." In some places, however, the Committees of the Branches do not realize their responsibility in regard to their Depositories, and it is much to be desired that when the stock belonging to a Branch is changing hands, the Committee would make a point of ascertaining the state of the account with the general Depository in Toronto, and see that it agrees with that kept by the out-going officer.

It would also be highly desirable in the interests of the cause, if the Committees of Branches would either themselves, or through their lady friends, canvass every house within their respective bounds, to see that every person has a copy of the Word of God for himself, and if not, endeavour to induce him not only to buy but read. Here and there this has been done; but it is not at all general, as it should be. In the past year the Committee of the Brampton Branch, and especially the President, Mr. Dawson, have been active in this way.

AGENCY.

In accordance with the plan adopted in 1875, the Board endeavoured to have every branch visited in the past year, as in 1877-78. A few however have preferred to do without the help of an Agent, and the Directors had no desire to force the visit of an Agent on any Branch unwilling to receive it. Indeed they would rejoice if Agency was altogether needless, as some good people seem to imagine, and as might be the case if the officers of all Branches had the same constant zeal for the dissemination of God's word which a few exhibit here and there. But in managing the affairs of the Society, the Board has to deal with men and matters as they are, and cannot be guided by a pleasant theory as to the possibilities if most men had arrived at perfection or somewhere near it. Unfortunately practical experience leaves little room to doubt that the large majority of our Branches could not, or rather would not, live without visitation, and it is quite certain that, even in some important towns, the Branches would die out altogether in a very few years, were it not for the visits of the Agents.

The visitation has been done by one Permanent and twenty Provisional Agents. In addition to these there have been appointed during the year two Local Agents, Mr. A. McPherson for the Southern part of Manitoba, and the Rev. R. Jamieson, for British Columbia. The latter appointment is so recent that Mr. Jamieson has not yet had time to get to work. Two quarterly reports have been received from Mr. McPherson, which shew that although he is somewhat disappointed by finding more difficulty than he expected in awakening an interest in the Society, he is nevertheless getting the work in his field into better shape than it was before, and the Board expects valuable future results from his appointment. The cost of Agency during the year has been \$3456, the salary and expenses of the Permanent Agent being \$1653 and the pay of the Provisional and Local Agents \$1803. This shews an increase on the previous year, which however is principally due to the fact that in that year the Society was several months without a Permanent Agent.

Most of the Agents' reports are encouraging in their tone. There are, how-

ever, not a few complaints about the small attendance at the meetings, for which various causes are assigned. One reports that in his section "at two or three places the meetings were seriously interfered with by outside amusements, tea-meetings, concerts, &c." Another, speaking of one of his visits, says "the smallness of the meeting was somewhat accounted for by neglected announcements from the pulpits on the previous Sunday," and that he is inclined to think that, in more than one case, the announcement is either overlooked entirely, or read without note or comment, and he closes his report with the remark that "Ministers should give more prominence to Bible Society work in their churches as such." This shews the importance of getting as many ministers as possible throughout the land interested in the Society by becoming well acquainted with its work. This is one of the great advantages of the Provisional Agency system. Former agents are always found ready to help their successors in the work, and to use their influence heartily on behalf of the Society. Whilst the Directors are sorry to thus report that many of the meetings in the country have been thinly attended, they are thankful to say at the same time that there are not wanting evidences of the interest with which many of our people regard the work of the Bible Society. The following passage from an Agent's report is an instance. "At noon on the day of meeting at Maple Valley, a severe snow storm, accompanied by violent wind, set in, and before the hour of service had arrived, some eight inches of wet and heavy snow had fallen. The chances of a meeting, as I left the home of a friend, seemed desperate, indeed hopeless; but after walking through the pelting storm nearly a mile, I was more than surprised to find a fair attendance of both men and women. Some of them had come on foot four miles through that tempest." Another Agent says in reference to one of his Branches, "the Committee may not receive all they desire this year owing to church improvements, &c.; but they have the hearts of the people in full sympathy with them." These and other similar passages encourage the Board to believe that, notwithstanding the multiplicity of other claims advanced, the people of our Province will give a hearty and increasing support to the Society.

Another very cheering feature is that several Agents note the fact that at some of the meetings the attendance was largely made up of young people. For several years one of the standing complaints of our Agents has been the absence of the youth of our country from among their audiences, and there is no doubt that one of the problems most pressingly in need of solution is: "How to gain and retain the interest of the young in the great work of the Bible Society?" The old friends are staunch and earnest; but as they are taken to their rest, our ranks, which ought to be increased, are scarcely filled by the rising generation. Fifteen or twenty years ago the Bible Society meeting was looked forward to as quite a treat; but now there is such a multiplicity and variety of other attractions that it is difficult to get the young to come to hear the story of the Society's work. As a remedy one Agent suggests that "it would pay in more than a financial way for the Society to have an Agent who loves children to visit and address masses of our little ones in the interest of our Society. We could prevent any future financial straits by winning the men and women of Canada while they are passing through our schools." The Directors think it will be well for their successors to make an experiment in this direction. The success will of course depend very much on the readiness of the Society's friends to get together the meetings of children.

The importance of interesting the children in the work of the Society has not been overlooked by the Board, and the Directors have always felt that in distributing the Bibles furnished by the Ketchum Trust it was an important part of their duty to use the occasion for this purpose.

The circulation of the "Gleanings for the Young" more freely than at present among the Sunday Schools would also greatly promote this interest; and considering the readiness of the Society to do everything in its power to help those engaged in Sunday School work, the Directors think they may reasonably expect superintendents and teachers to do what they can to introduce this excellent, attractive, and cheap little periodical among their scholars, and otherwise endeavour to interest them in the great work of the Society.*

FINANCES.

The receipts during the year have been as follows :—

In addition to the above, the Board has during the year voted two grants to the Quebec Bible Society, one of \$100, and another of \$500, in aid of French Colportage among the people of that Province, and has placed \$500 at the disposal of the Colportage Committee for work in Manitoba. There has been remitted to the Parent Society on purchase account \$9,248.77.

DISTRIBUTION.

The number of Bibles, Testaments and portions which have been issued from the Society's House during the year is 32,334, being 1,150 more than in the previous twelve months.

Of the above 2,766 copies were sold, and 2,169 issued gratuitously, from the Toronto Depository, including those furnished to city Sunday Schools on account of the Ketchum Trust, 22,544 supplied to Branch Depositories, or sold to the trade, and 4,855 were issued to Colporteurs. Of these 1,521 were in foreign languages, and 3 in raised characters for the blind.

The total issues of the Society since its commencement is 1,147,218.

COLPORTAGE.

The Board of Directors is glad to report that, notwithstanding the resignation of two colporteurs, and a smaller amount of time spent in the work of colportage, the circulation of the Scriptures through this channel has even in-

creased. In the aggregate of 37½ months there have been sold by the Society's Colporteurs, 2,662 Bibles, and 2,682 Testaments; and given 151 Bibles, and 127 Testaments—5,622 copies in all, being 547 more than were distributed in an aggregate of 41 months in the previous year. In addition to this, the colporteurs of the Tract Society have sold 1,322 Bibles, and 938 Testaments, of this Society's stock, so that, during the year, there have been distributed by this instrumentality, 7,882 copies of the Holy Scriptures.

The Directors were somewhat disappointed by the sudden withdrawal of Mr. Rouleau from the service of the Society at the close of November. But correspondence showed that it was with the approval of the Committee of the Winnipeg Branch, who have superintended his labours, and who have always expressed themselves as pleased with his faithfulness and efficiency. As it was expected that he would return to the work in the spring, it was not thought well to take any steps to secure the services of another in his place. But quite recently a letter has been received from Colonel Kennedy, the Secretary at Winnipeg, informing the Board that Mr. Rouleau is unable to return to this service as he feels called to other work, and asking that another colporteur be sent in his place. To this end, correspondence has been begun with the Montreal and Quebec Bible Societies and other friends, asking them to help in finding the right man for this important work. To find one of the right spirit, with sufficient physical strength, able to speak both French and English, and ready to go, is not easy. Mr. Rouleau, during his eight months work, visited several parts of the Province of Manitoba, and made one very extended tour to the West, where he had some stirring adventures, and showed his usual zeal, energy, and courage.

The resignation of Mr. McPhail, at the close of February did not take the Board by surprise. They felt that, at his age, he could not be expected to continue such arduous work, and therefore they could not refuse to relieve him of the duties which he had almost uninterruptedly performed for fifteen years. The last eleven months of his service were spent in the County of Simcoe and in the northern part of the County of Hastings.

Mr. Lowry has, during the year, worked six months at colportage in the townships of Aldborough, Yarmouth, Orford, Chatham, and York, and has done so with his wonted perseverance and success. Mr. Badger has spent two months at the work in Muskoka and Morrison and has had more than usual success in the way of sales in those back townships. Mr. Taylor has been working in Walpole, Townsend, Erin, Eramosa, &c., and was, as in several years past, sent to a number of Agricultural Shows in the autumn. He has shown his usual aptness and efficiency, and has been remarkably successful in sales. The places visited in this way were Toronto, Hamilton, St. Thomas, Thamesville, Watford and Dresden. At the Fair in Toronto, the Rev. Dr. Hodgkin, who first suggested this method of interesting the people in the Society's work, kindly took charge of the large case of Scriptures in one hundred languages. The Rev. gentleman spared no pains in giving to visitors accounts of the various translations, and thus helping them to comprehend the importance of the Society's past and future work; and the Board would here acknowledge its obligation for the time and trouble thus given gratuitously and heartily to the service of the Society.

There has been nothing very remarkable in the Colporteurs' reports during the year, though there have not been wanting encouraging incidents here and there, and the numerical results are, as before stated, very satisfactory. But the Directors feel that the greatest encouragement in this work is God's promise that His Word shall not return to Him void; and when they remember that the Colporteurs have not only sold and given the Holy Scriptures, but have carried them into houses where otherwise they would still have been unsought, and have led fellow sinners to read the Blessed Book;

they feel that this is eminently a work, the importance of which cannot be measured by mere figures.

Extracts from Colporteurs' reports will be found further on in the Report.

SISTER SOCIETIES.

As before stated, the Directors are glad to report that the past twelve months have been encouraging to most Bible Societies. Our next neighbour at Kingston, occupies a somewhat difficult field, but still holds on its way. Its colporteurs have been at work both in winter and summer, and have found much need of their labours, not only in the back townships, but also in some of the oldest settled townships of our Province. The report of the Ottawa Bible Society shows that, in the year just closed, both the amount of its income and the number of its issues have been considerably increased. Its Colporteurs have been active and successful, and the account of their work is both interesting and encouraging.

The report of the Montreal Society also indicates progress and tells of increase both in the number of issues and the amount of income; so that the Committee is feeling encouraged to resume colportage work in the English-speaking districts. It has had four French Colporteurs employed for longer or shorter periods. The Committee having advised the Parent Society to publish the four gospels in the Iroquois language, an edition of 1,000 copies has been printed in Montreal, with the imprimatur of the British and Foreign Bible Society, and at its expense. All Canadian Christians will regret to hear that the translator, Chief Joseph Onesakeurat, has since been taken from the Church on earth. But they will rejoice when they think how sweet must be his rest, not only from his labours, but also from the persecution to which he was subjected; and probably it may be said of translators of the Holy Scriptures more truly than of any others, that "their works do follow them."

The Quebec Society occupies the most difficult field in the Dominion, and it does so with indomitable energy and courage. The Committee felt constrained to seize upon the opportunity offered by the great St Jean Baptiste celebration last June. Extra Colporteurs were employed, and large numbers of New Testaments, each stamped on the cover as a "Souvenir de St. Jean Baptiste," were circulated among the crowds flocking to Quebec from all quarters on that occasion. That a number of these copies have been destroyed we do not doubt; but that many of them are now in homes where otherwise they would not have been, and are both read and loved in some, is an ascertained fact. As the cost of this effort was more than the ordinary limited resources of the Quebec Society could meet, the Board gladly voted an addition of \$100 to the usual grant of \$500. The Committee at Quebec express their thanks very heartily, and as they say, their work among the French is almost entirely dependent upon this grant. The Directors regret that reports have not been received of the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Bible Societies; but trust that they are sharing in the general improvement reported by others.

The report of our great neighbour, the American Bible Society is, of course, not yet issued; but the Rev. Dr. Gilman, the esteemed Senior Secretary, has kindly furnished us with the following interesting items. He says that the year just closed has been one in which their work at home and abroad has been prosecuted with much vigour. Their receipts have amounted to \$606,484. The issues from the Bible House in New York have numbered 1,155,017, and their foreign circulation was considerably larger than in the preceding year. Some of their colportage work at home has been remarkably satisfactory, and in Japan the demand for the New Testament has been unprecedented. Their Agent in that country had issued 65,973 copies besides about 38,000 which he

had furnished to other Societies. Many of our members will regret to hear that Dr. Allen, who has been President of the American Bible Society for several years, has been obliged to retire from this post of high honour during the year, and especially when they understand that failing health was the cause. They will remember how he cheered our anniversary meeting by his genial presence and kindly words in 1877, when he came as the representative of his Society to express its friendly greetings.

The Hibernian Bible Society, amidst many discouragements, holds on its way and does most useful work. In its last report its issues for the year are given as 65,400, and it had sent a donation of £500 to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

The National Bible Society of Scotland reports encouraging advance in circulation, and though its total income shewed a slight diminution, there had been a decided increase in its free contributions.

These Societies are in constant friendly communication and most hearty co-operation with our great parent,

THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

The last report of our Parent Society begins in a tone of high thanksgiving, for which three principal reasons are given as follows :

It had been in some countries a year of reaction, but no old field of labour had been closed ; it had been in some countries a year of exhaustion, nevertheless new fields had been opened ; it had been in all countries a year of depression, in spite of which the Committee had to acknowledge the receipt of funds sufficient to hold their own, and even to go forward.

The total free income of the Society for the year had amounted to £110,806 7s. 9d. as against £96,426 11s. 5d. last year ; on the other hand the amount received by sale of the Scriptures at home and abroad was £99,734-16s. 4d. as against £106,168 15s. 10d. Thus the income of the Society on account of the General Fund, was £210,541. 4s. 1d., and adding the amount received for the Special Fund, £1,854. 2s. 3d. ; for the Roxburgh Fund, £159 5s. 11d. ; and for the Paris Exhibition Fund (including the amount received for the sale of the chalet used at the Exhibition, and the land upon which it was built), £820 2s. 5d., the total receipts for the year had been £213,374 14s. 8d. The total payments had been £193,539 12s. 7d. The issues had been :—From the Bible House, 1,375,673 ; From the depôts abroad, 1,404,689 copies. Total issues, 2,780,362, or from the beginning, 88,168,489.

Reviewing, then, the three subjects which fill the foreground of their statement, they call on their friends to join them in earnest and heartfelt gratitude to Him who once more had shown Himself able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think. One qualifying remark, not intended to check thankfulness, but rather to promote effort, had to be made, viz., that the free contributions from Auxiliaries showed a falling off of £2,772, and that more than a quarter of the free income for the year was derived from legacies.

FRANCE.

The interest of the work in France during the year had not been of that public and conspicuous character which attached to it in the previous twelve months ; nevertheless, it had abounded with instances of blessing in every part of the field.

The experience of the year had shewn the importance of colportage. Not fewer than 72,000 copies were distributed by colportage alone, and the circulation by other means swelled the total to 110,000. All these were circulated by sale ; free grants are not included.

In one place people followed the colporteur to the inn to hear him talk of the Book he had been selling. "These things happen often," says the colporteur; "and when I ask them how they have become interested in the Gospel, they ascribe it to a Bible or a Testament which some colporteur had sold them, and then I understand how important our work is for the welfare of France." This is especially true of the southern districts of France, from which it is impossible to pass without remarking the repeated testimony of the colporteurs to an awakening desire for the Gospel. It is not once or twice, it is not only here and there; but it is repeated, and it is widespread.

Mr. Monod's report affords pleasing glimpses of active Christian effort in Paris and out of Paris; in the centre, and at the circumference; no longer carried on in a corner, but permitted without let or hindrance in places as conspicuous as the Boulevards, and near edifices as commanding as the Madeleine.

After describing these evangelistic efforts, he goes on:—

"Now, it is well worthy of observation, that all this work does not open the way to the Bible Society's work; but is a consequence and a fruit of our work. It is well understood by all the members of the Committee of Evangelization of France, that they only send evangelists and pastors where these are asked for, and where there is some probability of their being well received, whereas our object is precisely to go where nobody asks for us, or even knows of our existence. Our colporteurs are, in the truest sense of the word, pioneers, who sow the first seed in uncultivated ground; and when it increases, then the people who have, by the single reading of the Scriptures, received a first ray of light, ask for more light, and cry out for evangelists and pastors."

On the whole, the year's work had not either declined in extent, energy, or fruitfulness. The number of colporteurs engaged was sixty.

GERMANY.

This is the fiftieth anniversary of the establishment in Germany, by the Society, of a distinct agency. Dr. Pinkerton was appointed in 1830, and although for a quarter of a century before that, the Society had done much to quicken the zeal of others, and to provide them with funds, it was not till 1830 that the work could be said to have struck root in the soil of Germany itself. In 1830 the Society's issues were under 450,000 in all the world; this year they had been three-fourths of that number in Germany alone. In 1830 we had no colporteur in Germany; now there are sixty, and the Continental circulation had increased fourteenfold. The year had been marked in Germany by a slight check in the circulation, evidently in sales to the poor. The total figures were 334,898, as against 353,786, but the receipts for these sales were £12,500, the highest sum ever received in the agency for Scriptures sold. The able representative of the Society in Germany, the Rev. G. P. Davies, had found it a trial to have, in his jubilee year, to give himself to measures of economy and curtailment, but he had found abundant solace in the results of his labour, and in the character of the men by whose daily toil those results had been achieved.

The German colporteurs, sixty strong, had had a hard year's work, and in addition to the the depressed state of industry had to contend with the severest winter known for years. A heavy knapsack carried along over roads deep with snow, requires a vigorous frame and a light heart beneath it, or the journey will soon end. Of twenty-nine colporteurs attached to the Berlin District, thirteen had been more or less laid aside.

Of the spirit which actuates these men, the following pathetic letter is an interesting manifestation. It is written by ex-colporteur Orlowski, and is given in his own words:—

"When one has been thirty years at Bible work you can understand that it has become a second nature. I feel so wretched. Had my good wife been still with me I might feel better off. But she is gone, and my work is gone, and much else is gone. What remains is a broken down body. May God soon take me home! I was delighted with the reports. But when I read them I have no rest within the four walls of my home. I cannot range the land with my Bibles, so I rush out into the open field to get breathing room, so strong is the memory. Whenever you write, every line is precious. If I were thirty years younger I would begin the work over again and choose by preference the very hardest fields. But it is of no use. I will write every three months. If you do not hear, you will know that either I am ill or dead."

AUSTRIA.

In this great Empire, so old and yet so new, containing so many races and speaking so many languages, where the aspirations of the peoples are so various, and often so antagonistic, the work of the Society must always be exposed to great vicissitudes. The task of harmonising the diversities which exist and have their home under the Austrian flag must be an exceedingly difficult one to the Government. Nor is it to be expected that the Roman hierarchy will use their power in favour of a Society whose one object it is to spread the Word of God.

Three causes were at work in Austria to lessen the circulation of the Scriptures in comparison with that of the two preceding years. The first cause was one for thankfulness—the cessation of war; the second is for sympathy—the spread of distress in the land; the third is a matter of economy—the increased scale of prices. The circulation reached was 116,000, the lowest for many years. Glancing at the second of these causes—the spread of distress—and looking at the field of labour through the eyes of the colporteurs, it was a landscape full of trouble.

ITALY.

In the previous Report the Committee remarked that no rapid progress could be discerned in the mighty work of rousing in Italy a deeper and truer religious feeling than existed in the days of repression and oppression, of alien rule and Papal supremacy.

Their information leads to the same disappointing conclusion this year. Still, with rare exceptions, the rich, and the noble, and the educated refuse to lament to our mourning, or to dance to our piping. Godly sorrow and Gospel joy alike leave them unmoved. This deadly atmosphere, like its type in the natural world, broods especially over Rome. It is rich and increased with goods, rich in art, rich in history, rich with the spoils of time, but all the while to the spiritual eye it is wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked. "Even the colporteurs," says Mr. Bruce, "think it quite a wonder if they sell a Bible to a Roman."

Nevertheless, the Committee had the pleasure to report a total of 56,000 copies, an increase of 6,000 upon last year's result, and that, too, in a year of bad harvests, of terrible inundations, and of unusual snow storms blocking up the roads. Whither, then, have these copies gone? The answer is—they have gone into remote villages, into small towns, into the hands of the poor, the simple, the laborious. They have been carried thither upon the shoulders of men as simple and as laborious as themselves. More than three-fifths of the circulation have been thus disposed of, and no man can read the journals of these itinerant labourers without feeling that they have been, and still are, the very truest evangelists at work in that land.

SPAIN AND PORTUGAL.

The Committee commend these countries to the best wishes and prayers of their friends. There were bright spots here and there, but no extensive hungering and thirsting after righteousness was apparent as yet. The circulation in Spain was 39,000, as against 54,000, and a large proportion of these consisted of Portions. In Portugal, the bigotry that opposes the work is more distinctly than in Spain a bigotry of ignorance, and as this clears away, progress will become more marked. The total number of copies circulated was 5,806, as against 8,238 the previous year.

DENMARK.

In Denmark, the year began with improvement, and left off better than it began. The circulation had risen to 33,000 copies, and a reduction in the amount of the royalty payable to the Orphan House will enable the Committee still further to cheapen the Word of God. The visit of Lord Radstock, Mr. Reginald Radcliffe, and other evangelists to the principal places in Northern Europe, had been much blessed to the quickening of religious life, and in Copenhagen it had led to a demand for a pocket edition of the Danish Bible.

BELGIUM, HOLLAND, NORWAY AND SWEDEN.

In Belgium, notwithstanding the terrible prevalence of materialism on the one hand, and superstition on the other, 17,000 copies of the whole or part of God's Word had been sold. In Holland, and still more in Norway and Sweden, commercial adversity and even destitution had caused a considerable diminution in the circulation of the Scriptures.

ICELAND.

An interesting letter had been received from the venerable Bishop Pjeturson, of Reykjavik, in which he says, "The large circulation of the Bible in this island is proof of its acceptance as 'excellent,' and the inhabitants are animated with a deep thankfulness for the Bible Society's great work, a feeling which has many times been expressed to me. May God bless the honoured Bible Society's noble work for the extension of the Kingdom of God upon the earth!"

RUSSIA, NORTH AND SOUTH.

The Committee are thankful to the Government for the protection and even the sanction given to their work. In South Russia, where colportage is extensively employed, not a single ground of complaint has come to light; colporteurs simply had to exhibit their license to obtain the consent and often the God-speed of the authorities, and in North Russia the interruptions have been exceedingly few. The Holy Synod had shown even more than its usual readiness to supply the agents of the Society with Scriptures. Mr. Nicolson in the North was increasing his staff of colporteurs, and Mr. Watt in the South was preparing to concentrate upon his field the energy which has enabled him up to this year to cultivate Trans-Caucasia also. During the year an extensive tour was accomplished by the Rev. Henry Lansdell through Siberia, and it may well be hoped that the Scriptures had found their way in some measure through the length and breadth of the Empire. In North Russia the circulation was 231,377; in South Russia, 92,369, including 20,168 copies disseminated beyond the Caucasus. The number of languages in which this distribution took place was over forty in North Russia alone.

TURKEY AND GREECE.

This empire, the politician's difficulty and the philanthropist's despair, has surprised the Committee with an increased circulation. A total of 43,600 copies, against 39,000 in the previous year, is not a little remarkable; and when the condition of Turkey is remembered the astonishment increases. Even in the Turkish language itself the number of Scriptures circulated had increased sixfold. Bulgarians flying from Turks, Turks flying from Bulgarians, agriculture suspended, commerce paralysed, taxation grinding, money scarce, coinage debased, brigands everywhere, and famine and pestilence just held at bay by the money and the energy and the Christian devotion of the country which sends forth also the Scriptures. These things are the sad background of the picture of work in Turkey. In Crete and in Cyprus excellent work was done during the year, and in Iona and the Islands generally colportage was successful. The Greek Archbishop of Cyprus continued to show himself friendly to the work. But the Agent complained of the Greek Government and the Greek Church in Greece itself in the strongest language as hindering the circulation of the Scriptures, and incurring the reproach, which cannot be laid to the charge of the Turks, of denying to their children the sacred book of their religion in the tongue understood by the people. By a recent law, however, the New Testament in the original will now be read in all the primary schools.

SYRIA, PALESTINE AND EGYPT.

The three most interesting lands in all the world do not at present furnish much encouraging Bible Society news. In Egypt, it is true, there had been an increase in the circulation, and missionaries generally were feeling somewhat encouraged. But the condition of Syria is described as wretched, and "darkness slowly dispersing" is the description which the Society's Agent gives of the condition of the Holy Land.

EAST AFRICA.

The importance of pushing on the translation of the Scriptures into the Suaheli language becomes every day more and more manifest. Romish missions largely equipped, strong in numbers, are found pushing to the very heart of Africa, and disputing with Protestant missions for the possession of the field. Contrast, if not conflict, there must needs be. The Bible reveals the way—the King's highway—to truth and life, and any other "way," by whomsoever recommended, than the one way, and the one name provided for man in Christ Jesus, must stand condemned by all who "understand the Scriptures."

Bishop Steere, in writing to the Society accepting the office of Vice-President, says: "I feel here that our work must be all unsound without a vernacular Bible."

WEST AFRICA.

The receipt in a single year of £200 as a free contribution from Western Africa, demands a note of thankful praise. Sierra Leone sends £130 and Lagos £70. Few contributions come to the Society richer in blessings than these. Nor are these the only offerings which these African brethren have made on the altar of gratitude to God. They have given largely to the support of their own ministers, to the maintenance of their own fabrics, and to the various funds for spreading the Gospel to the regions beyond themselves. They were slaves, but the Lord Christ has made them free in His providence and by His grace. They are "free indeed." "Liberal" and "devising liberal things, by liberal things they shall stand."

SOUTH AFRICA.

The report from South Africa is of an exceedingly cheering character. Annual meetings were well attended. Branches were bearing fruit. Contributions were increasing. When these things come to pass, work has been well and prayerfully done, it may be for a long time before. The Rev. Dr. Hole had forwarded an account of the year's work which it is a great pleasure to read.

MADAGASCAR.

The general aspect of this field of Christian effort is such as to awaken some solicitude for its spiritual welfare. The harvest truly is great, but the labourers are in proportion few, and of late have decreased. The return of the fever epidemic, with increased severity, had seriously interfered with the circulation of the Scriptures.

In a recent speech the Prime Minister and husband of the Queen declared that her conversion to the Christian religion was the result of Bible reading during a period of sorrowful seclusion.

CEYLON.

A brief account from one part of the field will sufficiently describe the rest. It is evident that the Word of God is permeating the dense population. Even the staunchest Sivites admit the superiority of the Bible to their own Shastras; but they lack in too many cases the moral courage to face opposition and make open profession of their faith. Said one old man. "I believe what you say, but I am too old to walk in this narrow path; let my son embrace your religion if he will." "I believe the Bible to be God's revelation to man," said another, "but my faith is too weak to face the hatred and opposition of my friends which my becoming a Christian would stir up against me."

INDIA.

Passing over Persia, where Mr. Bruce is preparing to occupy the field more fully, and Afghanistan, for which the time for settled work has hardly come, the Report then gives an account of the work in the well-known field placed especially under the care of England—the great peninsula of India. From Madras, Calcutta and Bombay, reports had come of enlarged effort and increased interest. In the Madras Presidency, 87,300 copies had been circulated by various agencies, of which 48,695 copies had been sold by colporteurs. During the year covered by the Madras report, more than 60,000 persons had come out from Hinduism and united themselves to the Christian Church, and nearly every Missionary Society in the Presidency had received a greater number of converts than in any previous year. This had largely increased the demand for Scriptures. In both the remaining Presidencies, increased efforts to spread the Word of God had been made by the respective Auxiliaries, and attention was given to the important work of revising and improving the great master versions, as well as providing for the aboriginal people, many thousands of whom are now found pressing into the kingdom of heaven. The Calcutta Auxiliary reported a circulation of 53,458 copies, and the Bombay a total of 9,185 copies.

CHINA.

The work of the Society in this vast empire grows in importance from year to year. No expense has been spared in the preparation of versions of the Divine books in the various colloquials, as well as in the great master versions which are amongst the most brilliant achievements of missionary scholarship. The incorruptible seed has been abundantly provided, and there is

a vast field in which it must now be sown. As yet, it is the day of small things, but of small things which, like the grain of mustard seed, have a mighty capacity for enlargement. Never before was the Society so well provided with able labourers; never before was the interior of China so widely traversed; never before was there so good a hope that, by all means, we should save some in every province of this widespread empire.

The heart of China is hidden from us, but beneath her placid face strong feelings are at work of which we see signs at both extremities of her vast diameter. The moment is propitious for enlarged effort, and the Committee are prepared to make it. An old friend of the Society, who conceals his name but reveals his character under the aphorism, "God's book is the best," had placed £1,000 at the disposal of the Committee for colportage in China. The arrangement made the year before with the China Inland Mission, by which two members of that body were set apart for colportage in the famine-smitten districts was to be continued and enlarged. Never before was the interior of China so widely traversed; never was there so good a hope that in every province, including even the remotest, the salvation of God would go forth as a lamp that burneth.

Two Chinese magistrates had been found willing to contribute to the expenses of a colporteur—a very unusual circumstance—and other instances of pleasant treatment had occurred.

The circulation during the year had doubled itself, reaching to 135,000.

JAPAN.

The Committee had been anxiously solicitous to occupy in this great field the position which their responsibilities so clearly impose upon them. They had already done something through their Corresponding Committee, and have been in communication from time to time with the Secretary of that Committee, the Rev. S. McLaren.

One example of Japanese colportage is given as a glimpse of the life of the people, and as reflecting, in its broken English, a clear picture of the young and undeveloped Christianity, which is springing up in Japan. May God in His mercy make this little one a thousand.

"Of a certain Mr. S—, of I—, in the county of S—, the colporteur says: 'I sold this man portions of the Bible often, and having read, he felt very much of God's blessing, and he saw the deep love of God, and was so very glad, and wants me to let him have a preacher to come and preach the Gospel.'

"Of a Mr. Isriai, in the neighbouring county of Pâtômi, he says: 'This man is my friend, and I met him in good opportunity, and he is studying the way of salvation himself, and has opened religious assemblies with the magistrates and officers of his village, and spake of God's grace with them.' Of Mr. Yeto, in the same county, he says: 'This man is my old friend, and did not see him for a long time before, but this time, by the lead of God, I can see him, and I was very glad, and spent one night here telling him about God, until two o'clock in the next morning; and at last he received for the first time of God's mercifulness, and bought the Bible, and from now he promised to believe in Christ. Afterward he tried to persuade his wife to Christ, but she would not, and at last they were about to quarrel, speaking loudly, when I calmed them, telling him it is not good to lead a person to God so shortly, but persuade her by degrees.'

The Japanese New Testament already exists; the Old Testament is in progress. The Books of Samuel, ready for the printer, were lost in the great fire which occurred in December, and which burnt the results of much labour through many days on the part of the Rev. W. Dening. To the brethren of

the American Missions belongs a large share of the honour and the privilege of translating the New Testament. No fewer than ninety-one missionaries from America are at work amongst the Japanese. Some indications of Christianity taking root are to be seen, and a great reversal of a great indignity is seen in the fact that a Christian native bookseller, as a private venture, had brought out during the year an edition of part of the Bible in Chinese and Japanese, which he sells, without molestation, on his own premises, "at the Sign of the Cross."

Having before them fresh correspondence and fresh evidence, bearing upon the subject of the necessity for extended efforts in Japan, and having regard to the rapid and extensive spread of knowledge in the country, and the necessity of seizing the acceptable and propitious time, the Committee had decided to enlarge their efforts, and to respond as fully as God's providence shall enable them, to the call which comes across the seas from Japan.

SOUTH SEAS.

Perhaps no part of the world has shewn such quick results of Missionary labours, and nowhere is the work of the Bible Society more appreciated than by the natives of some of these islands. Their eagerness to possess the Scriptures is most remarkable, and their gratitude most practical. They not only send large sums to pay for Scriptures for themselves, but send free contributions which may well shame us who have been living longer amidst greater privileges. The reports from the New Hebrides, the Loyalty Islands, Eromanga, Niue, Tahiti and others, are most encouraging.

SOUTH AMERICA.

The condition of a large part of South America is in the highest degree deplorable and disastrous. The war between Chili and Peru had greatly hindered the peaceful work of the Society. The Santiago Depot, which had been closed, had, however, been reopened, and the Committee have renewed their grant in aid.

The report concludes as follows: "The Committee have now completed their annual survey of the world-wide field in which they have been employed.

"Scholarship, trained in the schools and sanctified at the mercy-seat, has provided them again and again with seed for the sower, and the gifts of the living and the legacies of the dead have enabled them to turn the seed of the sower into bread for the eater.

"Your agents have gone forth to sow beside all waters, and your Committee take a final glance at the waters beside which they have been at work.

"The reports from every part of Europe with one consent bear testimony to the hardness and the pressure of the times. Alike in countries involved in struggle and in countries which lie outside it, your colporteurs have been eye-witnesses to the deepest poverty, and ear-witnesses of its pitiful wail.

"In Finland, a colporteur abandoned his work having utterly lost heart. In Norway, Testaments have been paid for by a stand for a bee-hive or a pair of wooden skates. In Lithuania a colporteur was paid in potatoes. In some parts of Austria the Government has had to step in to help to keep the people alive; and in Poland, men have even committed suicide that they might awaken compassion for their wives and children.

"These are 'waters of bitterness;' by them the colporteurs have sowed, for only the knowledge of God's compassion can sweeten these.

"In Holland and in Belgium a mighty controversy is raging ; and though the forces are diverse the field of battle is the same. In Holland, an unbelieving Rationalism, with the law at its back, thrusts the Bible out of the schools, and that, too, in the land which gave nurture to Erasmus.

"In Belgium, a godless freethought refuses to distinguish between the claims which are of heaven and those which are of men, and is alike indifferent to Christ and Anti-christ. The land is divided into two camps, the population is involved in hopeless struggle, and the end no man can foresee. These are the 'waters of strife.' By them also your Agents have sowed, for only the knowledge of the love of Jesus can pacify these.

"In Poland, in Russia, in Asia Minor, and in other places where Jews are dispersed, your colporteurs meet with earnest and open-minded men, who come like Nicodemus by night to buy and to read the New Testament of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. For such persons, it would seem, has Dr. Delitzsch been raised up to provide the New Testament in the sacred tongue. For these, also, have others laboured to provide the various versions in which Hebrew mixes with modern speech. These are the 'waters of Shiloh,' which go softly. In these, if he plunge, may Israel lose his guilt and his blindness together ; here, therefore, also, have the colporteurs been sowing, believing that God's Holy Spirit can vivify these.

"Lastly, in the islands of the seas, too numerous for mention, the 'wild eyes which watch the wave' have seen Jesus walking upon those waters. He has come to them with gentle aspect, and made them gentle too. He has driven out the spirit of cruelty, born of terror and of night. No other name is known to them. A blessed ignorance and a blessed knowledge leave them the disciples of an undisputed Master. His word is their library, his revelation their rule of life. These are the 'waters of comfort.' The visions of the Prophets are realized beside such waters as these.

"It is no abrupt transition of thought to pass from the contemplation of these 'earthly things' to the contemplation of the 'heavenly things,' of which at the best they are a faint reflection, and towards which at the worst they are an unconscious struggle.

"And he showed me a pure river of water of life, clear as crystal, proceed out of the throne of God and of the Lamb. In the midst of the street of it, and on either side of the river, was there the tree of life, which bare twelve manner of fruits, and yielded her fruit every month ; and the leaves of the tree were for the healing of the nations.'"

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion, the Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society would express their hope that they have discharged their duty to the satisfaction of its members, and their trust that whatever mistakes or omissions may have been made will be overruled by God to the glory of His own name."

EXTRACTS FROM AGENTS' REPORTS.

REV. E. M. C. BOTTERILL.—“*Galt* excels every branch visited by me in the genuine and spontaneous enthusiasm manifested in our operations. The Secretary-Treasurer has all the good points I have ever found in such officials, abiding in himself. The President, Rev. J. P. Hincks, Church of England, gave the most telling address I have ever heard from the Chairman of any Bible Society meeting. The speeches of Revs. D. A. Duff, United Presbyterian, W. Walker, Baptist, J. K. Smith, Presbyterian, the introductory services of Rev. J. A. R. Dickson, Presbyterian, and the letter from Mr. Andrews, Methodist, all were brimming with spiritual power and tender pleading for enlarged benevolence this year. Our Bible Society, when properly understood, anticipates the coming unity of the sympathies and services of the regenerated Church of Christ Jesus. This Branch has been in existence 30 years, and its income this year has been the largest, with one exception, since the formation, and all present pledged themselves, by the hearty manner the suggestions were received, to lift the income for 1880 a hundred dollars over 1879. Ten places in the neighbourhood of *Galt* were visited last year and meetings were held. This, of course, is the explanation of the liberal income. Two Sunday schools sent in collections amounting together to \$17. These names deserve a more permanent record than I give them, ‘Little School-House Sunday School,’ and ‘Dickie’s Settlement Presbyterian Sunday-School.’

“*Guelph*.—According to a time honoured plan, the annual meeting of the *Guelph* Branch Bible Society was held on the 6th day of January. I was glad to be the representative of the Upper Canada Bible Society at that gathering. The meeting was large and appreciative. The resident ministers were all present, and in warm emphatic words commended the Society to the practical sympathy of all present. The honoured President of the Branch has been officially connected for 45 years, and declared his increasing admiration and love for all its work.

“*Rockwood*.—Rarely has your agent been more gratefully surprised than in this field. Snow knee deep, high rocks all around, a handful of population, and yet our meeting would have been an honour to a town. The Depository was all any one could desire. Books well advertised, well displayed, well cared for. *Rockwood* answers the question, how may we have live Branches in our country places? Select officers consecrated to the work. Give the people a Bible ministry.

“*Eden Mills*.—Here through a blinding storm and snow knee deep, some 50 children came to the first Children’s Bible Society meeting, and a blessed service we had. The public school was closed and the children were well trained in singing. The young people realized for the first time how greatly God had favoured them in the gift of His Word, and from the large meeting in the evening, I learned how carefully and gladly the children had carried home the story of our year’s work. If we are wise we shall make friends with the coming generation. The evening meeting was a success. It was the

worst night the Society has had for its meeting, and it was the largest gathering. Mr. Davidson, the worthy President, deserves honourable mention.

"*Norval*.—Harmony, efficiency, enthusiasm, characterized all departments of the work.

"*Mimosa*.—At the suggestion of the Committee at Eramosa, and with your consent, I held a meeting in this district. I found a tract of country altogether outside our influence, with a very faint knowledge of our existence and none of our work. It was a time of breaking up of fallow ground and a seed sowing in faith. I found a great help in Rev. Mr. Milligan, of Douglas, who drove some six miles to be present and aid us. People came full of curiosity and expectation, the report of our work was listened to attentively, and at the end a Branch was formed. The choice of officers was wisely made, and all that an intelligent interested Christian Scotchman can do, will be done by the Secretary, Mr. James Grant.

"*Nelson*.—I was greatly refreshed by contact with the brethren at Nelson. The officers are sterling men, who, for Christ's sake, do this God-given work.

"Should you honour me with Branch visitation next year, I shall use every persuasion to have all meetings held in the month of October, believing, that for nearly every reason, that is by far the best time for a good meeting and bountiful collections."

REV. T. M. CAMPBELL.—"*Theford*.—This Branch is thrifty. The officers are alive to the importance of keeping the Christian community interested in the Bible and its spread. The anniversary meeting was held in the M. E. Church. The attendance was good, the singing hearty, and the attention to the addresses of the Agent and local clergy very close. The President conducted the meeting very happily, which added to its interest. In its hold on the community and its contributions this Branch grows.

"*Camlachie*.—This Branch is always well cared for. The earnest and laborious President, the Rev. Mr. Goodwillie, serves this cause of God well. The Committee meeting found most of the members in their places, and the public meeting was a very interesting one. It was held in the Presbyterian Church, with a good audience, good singing, led by the pastor, and a good collection. The close and careful attention of the President to the matters of the Society and the Depository makes the work of the Agent light concerning this Branch.

"*Sarnia*.—The anniversary of this Branch was held in the Methodist Church, on the 22nd of November. The local clergy were present, except the Rev. Mr. Thompson, who was absent through sickness. The meeting was well attended, and the collection in advance of last year. The officers and the Committee of this Branch are all active men in their work, and the interest in the spread of God's Word is general in this community. The ministers present, each addressed the meeting on a special topic in the range of this work, and the interest was sustained throughout. The Collectors are doing even more this year than last, which is a matter of surprise, as last year such a strong effort was made. The Depository is in the hands of Mr. Elliott, and is given as much prominence and care, as if it were a matter of trade of his own."

REV. JAMES CARMICHAEL.—"*Beeton*.—Formed a new Branch at Beeton with bright prospects of doing good work.

"*Cookstown*.—Is resolved to do very much better than any year in the past.

"*Alliston and Rosemont*.—Good meetings.

"*West Essa.*—Splendid meeting in Burns' Church, with the pastor, Mr. Acheson, present, who gave a good address.

"*Bond Head.*—Fine meeting, with the venerable President in the chair.

"*Bradford.*—A good meeting, with the Rev. Mr. Panton in the chair."

REV. E. COCKBURN.—"I have sought to obey the instructions received, and have found them of great assistance in overtaking the work. Although a large part of the district is far back and thinly settled, I am pleased to be able to state that, on the whole, I have succeeded in securing good meetings, and, I trust, awakening an increased interest in the Society.

"*Manilla.*—After a delay of several weeks, in order to secure moon light, I visited Manilla on the 9th of November. We had an excellent meeting notwithstanding the bad roads. This Branch is most efficiently worked. The Branch made substantial progress last year, contributing upwards of \$42, as against \$29 the year previous. The Rev. Mr. McKinnon (Congregational), and the Rev. Mr. Kestle (B. C.), pastor of the Church in which the meeting was held, delivered short and pointed addresses. I also had the assistance of Mr. McBrien, Inspector of Public Schools, who gave us a strong address. Altogether, the meeting was one of the most enjoyable and satisfactory I ever attended.

"*Cambray.*—I visited on the 11th. The meeting was about twice as large as last year. The President, Rev. D. Macdonald, a devoted friend of the Society, was in the chair. For Cambray, the amount, \$43, is most creditable; more than half of this, however, was drawn from Glenarm, a district about six miles off, where the President held a meeting and addressed it in Gaelic. It was held on the afternoon of the day I visited Cambray. I intended to be present, but, owing to the dreadful state of the roads, I failed in reaching it in time.

"*Woodville.*—The roads very bad and the evening very cold, nevertheless the meeting was a good one. The Revs. Messrs. Ross and Jewell were present, and did much to make the meetings interesting and profitable. This is one of the strongest rural Branches of the Society, and gave us a free contribution, not far short of \$100 last year. Here, as in the other Branches visited, considerable care and time were taken in appointing suitable collectors.

"*Dunsford.*—Here we had a good meeting. I had the help of the Rev. Messrs. Wilkinson and McFarlane. This Branch did nothing last year. The President, who was in the chair, in the true spirit of a penitent, in his own behalf and that of his brother officers who were absent, confessed their shortcomings, and, sensible man as he was, suggested, as they had done nothing, other officers should take their place. The suggestion was adopted by the meeting, and I believe that a similar confession will not be forthcoming next year.

"Having had two years' experience in this District, I think I may venture to report manifest signs of improvement. The times are improving, and I trust the good hand of Providence will be acknowledged in more liberal contributions to the U. C. B. S. I cannot close without recording my thanks to the Branches for the uniform kindness with which I, as the Agent of the Society, was everywhere received. I thank you also for the honour done me in intrusting to me such important work, and I hope I may have been instrumental in awakening a more heartfelt interest in one of the most important and glorious works entrusted to the people of God. May the work go on until every fellow creature shall be in possession of a copy of God's Word, and be obedient to its liberating and life-giving power."

REV. JAMES DONALDSON.—“*Harriston*.—Mr. Baikie, gave me the first part of the services. Addressed his people from Heb. i, 1, for half an hour. Mr. Campbell, Knox Church, was just concluding his discourse, called me forward to plead the cause of the Bible Society. Did so for twenty-five minutes, basing my remarks on 2 Cor., viii, 24. In the evening preached to a large and attentive audience, from Mark xvi, 15. Had an opportunity of speaking to the Meth. S. School, on the work of the parent Society. There were nearly 300 children present, very attentive. The *Recorders*, I found from the post master, were regularly received. Mr. McCreadie, P.M. is an old and tried friend of the cause. If our Annual Meeting was not so large, it is pleasing to think that the claims of the Society were brought, by your Agent, before three of the Churches, and two of the Sabbath Schools.

“*Lakelet*.—As the roads were bad and no stage between Gorrie and Lakelet, Squire Dorland, the excellent and judicious president of our Branch, drove me back; am very grateful for the kind Christian hospitality. The state of the roads being such that it took us from 11 a.m. till 2 p.m. to get to Lakelet. No other minister being present, the burden devolved mainly on your Agent, who was listened to by an attentive audience till 9 p.m. The whole proceedings terminated with singing, prayer and the benediction at 10 o'clock. On our return, at a critical part of the road, we had a narrow escape. I received slight bruises but no damage was done to either party. Had pleasure in extricating the other cutter from the perilous situation. The crackling sound which made the occupants cry out that their cutter was going to pieces, and frightened our horse, must have been brushwood under the snow. Though I was dragged some distance by having been entangled in the reins, and Mr. Young falling over me, yet am no worse.

“*Fordwich*.—A very pleasant and, I trust, profitable meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, of which Mr. Muir is pastor. He was for many years the Depositary in Montreal, and said I was the first who had asked him to open his mouth in a pulpit. So I constituted all present preachers for the Bible Society, requesting that every one present would carry away as many facts as possible, and proclaim them first to all at home, and then to his neighbours, so that the collectors should get a hearty welcome, when they went to gather up the fruits.

“*Arthur*.—I preached in the morning and evening in the Presbyterian Church, and in the afternoon in the Baptist Church; also visited and addressed three Sabbath-schools, setting forth the claims of your Society. Felt exhausted after these six services, but was happy in the sense of having done my duty.”

REV. W. B. EVANS.—“*Thorold*.—Here the Branch is evidently quite alive. The officers had everything ready.

“*North Pelham*.—This old and established Branch is quite alive. The free contribution will exceed that of last year. There was a very fair meeting, and a good deal of interest was manifested.

“*Welland*.—I think the Branch will awaken, and if the meetings are held before the end of November each year, I feel that a collection made soon after will result in good contributions.”

REV. JOHN GEMLEY.—“*Oneida*.—The Presbyterian Church was completely filled, and the meeting was most enthusiastic. The choir enlivened us, and the pastor of the church, the Rev. A. Grant, M.A., gave his cordial assistance. This, the Oneida Branch, is indeed a healthy one.

“*Jarvis*.—I preached in behalf of the Society in the Church of England morning and evening, and in Hagersville in the afternoon. A portion of the collections were given to the Society.

"*Binbrook*.—The anniversary of this Branch was held in the Baptist Church, the attendance somewhat larger than last year. I had the cordial support and assistance of the valued President of the Branch, the Rev. W. P. Walker, Presbyterian Church, and of the Rev. S. G. Harris, minister of the church in which the meeting was held. The former made a vigorous speech, the latter said only a few words, from the lateness of the hour, but they were of the right kind.

"*Caledonia*.—The annual meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, the Rev. Mr. Black's. After the address of the Agent, suitable and excellent addresses were given by the Rev. T. Stobbs, Methodist Church, and the Rev. Messrs. Black and Wilson, of the Presbyterian. Here also we had good music from the choir to help us; and a congregation not at all discouraging for a cold night.

"*Hagersville*.—Notwithstanding the bitterly cold night and the superabundance of snow drifts, we found a large congregation assembled in the Methodist Church, although some of the people came some miles in order to be present. Few choirs could excel that which cheered us this evening with notes of sacred song. The Rev. T. S. Howard, minister of the church, and the Rev. G. Johnston, gave us effective addresses in aid of the grand old Society. The latter gentleman came six miles to attend the meeting. True to his word, although the storm might have tempted him to remain at home.

"*Jarvis*.—The public meeting held in the Methodist Church was, for another exceedingly cold evening, very encouraging; and once more the choir came to our help, and with excellent music too. Addresses, besides that of the Agent, were delivered by the President elect, the Rev. Gabriel Johnston, M. A., of the Church of England, and the Rev. T. McGuire, of the Presbyterian Church, earnest and able friends of the Society."

REV. JAMES GRANT.—"*Kintore*.—The meeting in this place was excellent, much better, I was told, than last year. An interesting feature, in connection with this Branch, was that the young people came out in large numbers to the meeting, listened with the greatest assiduity, and were apparently much interested in the Society's prosperity at home and abroad."

REV. JOHN GRAY.—"In most instances officers were prompt in their replies to communications relative to the appointment of the Annual Meeting, and in every case the reception of your Agent was most kindly and cordial. Contrary to my experience of all former years in this part of the country, the latter part of October, in which I commenced my work, proved rainy, in consequence of which the roads, in some sections, were bad, notwithstanding which the meetings were well attended and the interest manifested in the work of the Society most encouraging.

"*Corunna* is a good Branch, in all respects well managed. The meeting here was good. An interesting address was given by the Rev. Mr. McCutcheon, in which he narrated many interesting incidents that came under his own observation while travelling in the East, connected with the work of the B. and F. Bible Society.

"*Amherstburg*.—This excellent Branch, under its able management, as has been its custom for some years past, gave a good account of itself at the Annual Meeting. The work is carried on with energy and ability. The churches, with their Pastors, are united in promoting its interest.

"*Orford*.—The attendance at the Annual Meeting was the best they ever had, and most encouraging to the officers of the Society, who do their work

well. The ministers of the Church of England and Presbyterian Churches were present and delivered interesting addresses.

East Williams.—The Annual Meeting of this excellent Branch was truly a grand meeting. The Presbyterian Church was well filled. The officers and Committee are able and earnest in carrying on their work. The Rev. Messrs. Mills and McRae were present and delivered brief addresses. Those who have been long interested in this Branch, regard it the most encouraging meeting of many years.

Kintyre.—This Branch, which owing to the burning of the Depository, the death of their respected President, and some other discouragements, had fallen back for the past two years, was fully organized anew, and will, I trust, prosper well in time to come.

East Westminster.—This noble Branch, one of the most complete in organization and hearty in everything that pertains to the real progress of the work that it has been my pleasure to visit, fully sustains its honourable record this year."

REV. DR. HODGKIN.—*Oshawa.*—Here a good meeting was held with a full representation of all the ministers sympathizing with the Bible Society. The place of meeting was cheerful and elegant, the singing excellent, and the audience attentive. Much has not been done of late. The town has suffered much from financial depression. The prospect for the present year is better, and the returns will, I think, indicate improvement.

Whitby.—All the arrangements were duly made, but the Teachers' Convention and the lecture of Mr. Farewell were a counter attraction. The meeting was a good one, the Congregational, Methodist, and Presbyterian ministers participating. There had been considerable difficulty in connection with the meeting and its time, but with the above exception all passed off happily.

Port Perry.—I called upon the various ministers of the village, receiving very kind attention from the Rev. Mr. Bishop, the M. E. minister, in whose church the meeting was to be. The attendance was much better than I had anticipated, the speakers being Rev. Messrs. Abbs and Goff, in addition to the Agent. I was made both comfortable and welcome at the residence of Dr. Jones, who on the following day drove me to—

Prince Albert.—I had called here on my way to Port Perry, and had found in the Secretary an old neighbour thirty years ago at Pine Grove. The report had been very carefully and fully prepared by this gentleman. The meeting was somewhat affected by a shower of rain. It was held in the B. C. Church, and was addressed by the Rev. Messrs. Phillip and Richardson.

Greenbank.—Here a large and enthusiastic meeting was held in the C. M. Church—the interest being greatly increased by the excellent addresses of the Rev. Mr. Bishop, C. M., who occupied the chair, and the Rev. Mr. Acheson, of Wick. The Secretary gave a most concise but full report, and shows himself well worthy of the position.

Claremont.—I was kindly received by the Secretary, the Rev. Mr. Beattie. Here are very warm and long-trying friends of the Bible cause, upon some of whom I called and had pleasant intercourse with them

Dunbarton.—Here I found the Rev. Mr. Kennedy, with his deep interest in the Society, and his warm hospitality for the Agent. We visited the various officers and the Depository. The work has, of late years, been better than the meetings, which they complain have fallen off in interest. The attendance was good, and the prospect gratifying; they will do as well as last year; they hope better."

REV. H. D. HUNTER.—“*Evening*.—Held meeting in this far-back country village, in the C. M. Church. The Rev. Mr. Depew, the only resident clergyman in “all the region 'round about,” was unavoidably absent, much to the disappointment of your Agent. The attendance, notwithstanding the recent rains and bad roads, was good, the largest that I have ever seen there. One feature that particularly pleased me was the large number of young people who were present, and the evident interest they took in all the proceedings. The sales, free contributions and collections at public meetings have steadily crept up every year. I have had the privilege of visiting this Branch, with the competent staff of officers and the efficient Committee, that were elected. A good report may confidently be looked for next year.

“*Stayner*.—Meeting held here in a Baptist Church. Heavy rain and wind. In view of weather, however, we had a very fine meeting. The ministers of the village, in whose pulpits I spent Sunday, Revs. Messrs. Moodie (Presbyterian), Edwards (Methodist), and McIntyre (Baptist), were all present, and did good service by stirring speeches. Stayner reports this as decidedly the best year in the history of the Branch for Bible work. Everybody seemed not only hopeful, but enthusiastic. The officers had had collectors already appointed.

“*Churchill*.—This is one of the healthiest and best Branches in my district, and one of the most carefully managed. Too much praise cannot be spoken of the officers, especially of J. S. Lucas, Esq., the model Secretary. At my suggestion, a depository was opened here at the beginning of the year for the first time, and the results have amply justified the experiment. The sales have been run up to nearly \$30, and Mr. Lucas assured me they were almost certain to double during the next twelve months. Collectors promised to begin the canvass at once. Through the generous exertions of Mr. Lucas, and the popular pastor of the newly organized Presbyterian Church and congregation there, we had a full and most enthusiastic meeting.”

REV. T. W. JEFFERY.—“*Grafton*.—Here I was ably assisted by the Rev. J. W. Smith (Presbyterian), whose long-trying services as Secretary, upwards of three years, were acknowledged in a short but well arranged address, accompanied with several handsome volumes, which the congregation deputed Rev. Mr. Steir to present. Both presentation and reply were made in the cheerfully dignified manner we would expect from “old disciples,” who are conscious their Master had made their yesterday, to-day and for-ever full of sunshine. The Rev. Mr. Hogg, of Toronto, an opportune visitor, gave a very brief and forcible address, and the Rev. Mr. McCamus, pastor of the Church, rendered valuable aid. Congregation, speeches, singing, collection, officers, all combined to make this a gala evening.

“*Bethany*.—We, a snow storm and your Agent, alighted simultaneously in this growing village. Our reception was quiet, a correlation of circumstances had prevented the annunciation of our advent. I retired gracefully, leaving the storm, and a cheerful promise to return another day, which was fulfilled on Sunday afternoon, when I had the pleasure of preaching to a very large congregation in the Methodist Church, before whom the nature of the work and necessities of the Society were unfolded.

“*South Monaghan*.—A bitterly cold night, a large-hearted congregation, an efficient committee, a whole-souled secretary, a resuscitated depository, a chairman who stuck to the chair, an Agent who stuck to the speaking, an invigorating 12 mile drive afterward. Really, if Bible Society agency was like this all the time, it would be a winter vacation to indulge in.

“*Mount Pleasant (Cavan)*.—Here I was very hospitably entertained at the

home of James McLean, Esq., Secretary and Depositary. This is capable of being a very healthy Branch, if all who have influence use it wisely.

Omeme.—The indefatigable Treasurer, Secretary and Depositary, Dr. Geo. A. Morris, had every arrangement fully completed, and W. Curry, Esq., presided; was ably sustained by the Rev. E. Barrass, pastor of the church in which the meeting was held, and by the Rev. Dr. Hodgkin, minister of the Church of England; the Agent of the Society and the choir of the church added also to the success of the work. Omeme will not be behind this year.

Warsaw.—The 16 mile drive there and back from Lakefield was very stormy, but owing to the kindness of the Rev. Geo. Washington, M.A., very pleasant. The Methodist Church, in which the meeting was to be held, was situated on a hill side. The ascent was exceedingly steep and icy. Our pilgrimage to the church was an ignominious succession of ludicrous backslidings, crowned by the most pleasant success. A first class chairman, good singing, and assisted by Rev. Messrs. Washington, Watch and Fox, there is every reason to expect corresponding results.

Lakefield.—Here we had an evidence of the beneficial effects of hearty co-operation. Union revival services were in operation. I preached in the afternoon and in the evening, in the largest building in the town, which was filled, and every minister of every branch of Christ's Church was present, and most cordially assisted. It was grandly imposing. We wished we could become a member of every church, and our roused affections were only soothed by the prophetic utterances of the Master, referring to the good time coming, when we shall be "one flock under one shepherd."

The Branches on this route are improving in some points. The depositories are well supplied and well exhibited, subscriptions are in advance of last year, and true loyalty to the Upper Canada Bible Society is strengthening. The secretaries of the past year have been very energetic. Everywhere I have been received with great kindness. The only thing that marred the pleasure was that in a few places where the audiences were first class in respectable appearance, the collection positively looked ashamed of itself and the audience too. Improved the occasion by expressing public sympathy with the plate."

REV. S. KAPPELE.—"In presenting my report I am happy to state that I found no great difficulty in making the arrangements for holding the annual meetings. The weather on the whole was good, only on two nights bad weather diminished the meetings, which on the whole were not large, but characterized by a spirit of earnestness and a desire, on the part of those present, to do better for the cause.

New Hamburg.—Had a good meeting, attendance not so large as expected; but the ministers of the Evangelical Church were present, and heartily assisted; also the German choir contributed much to the interest of the meeting.

New Dundee.—Preached in the morning in English and in the evening in German in two different places belonging to the territory of the New Dundee Branch. Had our annual meeting in the German Lutheran Church at Dundee.

Winterbourne.—A well attended, good and spirited meeting, interest alive, officers the right men.

Ayton.—Preached on Sunday morning to a large German congregation at Alsfeldt, where collectors are appointed in connection with this Branch. In the afternoon I preached in the Presbyterian Church at Ayton and in the evening spoke on the Bible cause in the same church—the minister being

very kind and a great friend of the cause. On Monday evening, after a snow storm had just cleared off, which left the roads very soft, we had a very good although not a large meeting. Rev. Mr. Graff, German Evangelical minister, also took part and was appointed President. On handing round paper \$12 were subscribed and a good hearty spirit was manifested. Books well taken care of and kept in a drug store, in glass bookcase and sold at invoice prices.

REV. A. D. McDONALD—“*Goderich*.—The night was dark and stormy. The meeting was small for *Goderich*, but a good feeling prevailed. I had great assistance from the Methodist minister, and from Dr. Ure. *Goderich*, I feel confident, will soon take the place it used to occupy in supporting the Bible Society.

“*Blythe*.—I think, in some respects, it may be styled the banner Branch in my district. Here there was a good meeting and good addresses by the ministers.

“*Clinton*.—The largest meeting I had was here. All the clergy were present. The Episcopal Church, where we held our meeting, was full. All the ministers seem to be thoroughly in sympathy with the work. *Clinton* did me good, and I feel sure a good impression was made upon the audience.

“*Egmondville*.—Though the audience was not large, yet I feel sure the meeting will produce good results. Our meeting was held the evening before Thanksgiving Day. This prevented many from attending. The business places were all open. But an effort is to be made to make a more thorough canvass of the field than before, and I hope to see this Branch doing its duty.

“I can only add, in conclusion, while I have done my best to further the interests of the Society, I am deeply conscious that I did not do all that ought to be done, but I trust that the Great Head of the Church, whose work it is, will give His blessing and draw out the sympathy and the faith of the people.”

THE REV. J. G. MANLY.—“My field of labour, this last year, extended from *Picton* and *Napanee* on the east, to *Kincardine* on the west, and *Colpoy's Bay* in the north-west, and from *Port Colborne* in the south, to *Muskoka* and *Parry Sound* in the north. The autumnal and winter work extended continuously through about eight months—from the beginning of September, 1880, to the end of April, 1881. The short intervals at home were occupied in correspondence and reports, and the time from home was spent in, at least, two Sunday services and five following meetings for the week. The travelling amounted to five thousand eight hundred miles, in all sorts of weather, and by various conveyances. New Societies were formed at *Midland*, *Parkdale*, *Eglington* and *Elfrida*. I am very thankful that, amid all the vicissitudes and exposures of the long and severe winter, there has seldom been a failure in fulfilling an engagement or in finding an audience, and that I have had nothing to call sickness. A snow blockade on a railway prevented the visitation of one place, a furious snow storm another, and one day's indisposition another. Strength to work and success in working are from God, and demand our thanksgiving and praise.

“*Beamsville Branch* has been revived; the meeting at *Campden* was large and hearty; *St. Ann's*, better than I ever knew before; *Wellandport*, fair; *Centreville*, good; *Tweed*, cheering; *Roslin*, good; *Bolton*, progressive; *Mono Centre*, better than last year; *Coldsprings*, cheering; *Baltimore*, increased; *Fenella*, extending; *Campbellford*, doing well; *Armow*, excellent; *Underwood*, good; *Trenton* and *Port Albert*, good also; *Lloydtown*, encouraging; *Cobourg*, keeping well up; *Burlington*, good and hoping to do more; *Brantford*, ahead as usual, giving an Anniversary collection of \$300; *Chester-*

field and Ratho, quite a pattern ; Plattsville and Washington, likely to increase ; St. George, more promising ; Paisley, increases every year ; Paris, productive and promising ; Newburgh and Millpoint, better ; Barrie, largely increased ; Orillia, bereft of its excellent Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. Dallas, but not declining ; Minesing, always good and likely to do better ; Laskay, always doing well with its very effective Secretary ; Yorkville, better than ever ; Bloomfield, giving good attendance ; Cheapside, looking well ; South Cayuga, always good, though, like Drummondville, hindered by a snow storm ; Port Colborne, a living branch ; Tara meeting, first rate ; Chesley, well circumstanced and full of promise ; Pinkerton, better than last year ; Walkerton, much the same, with a model Depositary ; Palmerston, encouraging ; Rothsay, good, beside the bequest of \$100 from the late Mr. James Taylor ; Hollin, meeting excellent ; New Durham, gatherings on first day and second, in the Friends' meeting house, both indicative and productive of good.

"Many other places might be noticed, but for want of space in the printed Annual Report.

"Several places have been noted and reported to the Board as suitable for the formation of new Branches.

"Throughout the whole field and the whole year, I have met with the utmost courtesy and kindness, in the proceedings of the meetings, in hospitable entertainment, and in helps by the way. The meetings have been held in Presbyterian, Baptist, Anglo-Episcopal, Methodist-Episcopal and Friends' places of worship, and sometimes in halls, and have been effectively aided by Ministers of all Evangelical Churches. Upon these, I may be permitted to say, the success of the Bible Society everywhere mainly depends, by their manner of announcing the Anniversaries, by their personal presence and help, and by their influence in Committee meetings, and the encouragement of executive action. 'Like priest, like people.'

"Special attention has been given to the condition of the stock ; sometimes by making an inventory ; and it is gratifying to find that, with scarcely an exception, the books are well placed and kept. In a few instances, the protection of glass from flies and dust is required, to which the local Committees will doubtless attend. The gratuitous and faithful services of the Depositories, as well as the Collectors, deserve the hearty thanks of all the Societies.

"I have made it a rule, throughout my whole work of late, to give greater prominence and particularity to the operations of the Upper Canada Auxiliary, so as to evince its actual usefulness and the scope of its aims and efforts."

REV. C. R. MATTHEW.—"*Elimville*.—Had a good meeting in the Bible Christian Church, the earnest and excellent President, Mr. Thos. Werry, in the chair. This Branch is blessed with an active and energetic Secretary, Mr. W. Miners, Junr., to whose faithfulness much of its success under God is due. A full, clear, and very satisfactory exhibit of the Branch's work was given in the business-like report which was presented. After your Agent's address, officers were elected, collectors appointed, and promises given of an active season's work.

"*Millbank*.—Meeting held in the English Church, Rev. D. Caswell (Church of England) in the chair. Never had a more attentive audience, but would probably have had a larger one but for the sleet. Next day Mr. Caswell kindly drove me on to Milverton, and assisted me greatly in other ways.

"*Milverton*.—The secretary had written me long before that there had been no meeting there last year ; nothing done ; that no collectors could be got to work, and that he thought it no use to attempt a meeting. I had nevertheless sent notices to him, to the President, Mr. Ray, to the Depositary, Mr. Karns, that I should be there, and asking them to give the notices of meet-

ing. Nevertheless, I somewhat feared that there might be a failure. So we drove over early and interviewed the officers. Met the President on the road: the only resident minister in the village had been confined to his house suffering for some time with ulcerated sore throat. Had no Sabbath services, and had not given notice, and could not be present. Went into the Secretary's and arranged with him and the Depository to have the meeting in the Presbyterian Church. Went to the village school, and, by permission of teachers, spoke to the children about the Bible Society and the meeting, and asked them to tell their families and invite them to come. Went to the caretaker of the church and got him to promise that the building should be lighted and warmed. As result of our labours we had quite a gathering in the evening, fully as large a meeting as I have attended in this district, although half of it consisted of the large children of the school. The members of the Branch, who were present, seemed heartened, and cheered and stirred up to go on their way again, the old officers were reappointed, and collectors who, it was thought, would work actively. I saw as many of the collectors as I could afterwards, and got their promises to labour at once and earnestly in the Bible cause.

"*Stratford*—I went by appointment to attend the annual meeting of this important Branch; was most kindly received and courteously entertained by Jas. Hogg, Esq., the prompt, active, efficient Secretary. The annual meeting, held in one of the finest of the many beautiful church edifices of this place, was well attended not only by a goodly number of the townspeople, but by a large and influential representation of the ministering brethren. That veteran in Bible work, Rev. T. McPherson, occupied the chair. Rev. Mr. Waite, Presbyterian, pastor of the church, advocated most ably and eloquently the claims of the Bible and of the Society, as did also Rev. Mr. Hughes, Congregational. Others of the local ministers took part in the meeting, and an excellent collection was taken up. There seems to be in this large town a revival of interest in the Society and its work, from which we may hope still greater things in the future.

"*Fullarton*.—In the evening the best meeting I ever attended was held in the Baptist Church. The edifice was quite filled by a most respectable and attentive audience, who listened with earnest interest to the details of Bible work brought before them. Rev. Mr. Hamilton, of Motherwell, Presbyterian, an old and faithful friend of the Bible cause, in the chair. Rev. Mr. Philip powerfully defended the grand old book against the assaults of skeptical science. Mr. Hamilton gave a review of the prospects of religion and the Bible on the continent of Europe, and the collection even exceeded Stratford.

REV. J. L. MURRAY.—"*Trowbridge*.—Was the first Branch I visited. Our meeting there was in the Canada Methodist Church. The pastor of the church and Rev. T. T. Johnson (Presbyterian) were present and gave valuable assistance. The meeting was well attended for Trowbridge, partly because I visited the schools in the afternoon and addressed the children, urging them to remind their parents of the meeting in the evening.

"*Molesworth*.—This Branch, though limited in territory, is one of the most vigorous and thoroughly organized in connection with the Society. The presence of Mr. C. W. Watson, the Secretary and Depository of the Branch, will ensure promptness and accuracy in all its business. To him, more than to any other, the Branch owes its present healthy condition. The meeting was held in the Canada Methodist Church. The thermometer registered some 20 below zero in the neighbourhood, yet the meeting was the largest and the collection the most liberal ever known in the history of the Branch.

The presence of Rev. T. T. Johnson at this meeting also contributed to its success. The collectors appointed proceeded to work without delay.

Listowel.—Weather intensely cold ; meeting fair ; collection very good. Rev. J. W. Bell, Presbyterian, in whose church the meeting was held, presided and otherwise aided materially in securing interest and success. An excellent staff of officers conduct this Branch, who, of their own accord, arranged to hold meetings, in the interests of the Society, at various points within six or eight miles of the town. The Depository is carefully attended to by a competent business man.

Brussels.—This is one of the most vigorous Branches in the section assigned to me. The meeting was held in the Episcopalian Church and was fairly well attended, considering the extreme severity of the weather. The rector, Rev. F. Ryan, is President of the Branch, and throws much energy into the work. He is ably supported by all the clergy of the town. Rev. Messrs. Jones, Harris, and Ross were also present. Depository well kept. Collectors proceeded to work without delay. Collection of the meeting, \$7.62.

"I may add that books are not deteriorating in value by exposure to dust and sunlight. There seemed to be more spirit in the Branches this year than I had found a twelvemonth ago. The complaint of hard times was not so prevalent. Organizations are more complete. The precaution of having a list of collectors prepared by the Managers to be submitted to the meeting was quite common. If this had been my first winter's experience in Bible Society work I would say very confidently that the contributions for this year shall greatly exceed that of any past year in the history of the Branches ; but I have been occasionally disappointed in the most promising indications at meetings, so that I have learned to speak more cautiously of the future contributions of any Branch. I do not wish to speak despondently. The fruits of my last year's visits were apparent in increased contributions and in other respects. Yet the contributions had not doubled and quadrupled as I had reason (I thought) to expect in stirring up meetings by placing burning facts before them. The pastors of congregations have more to do in increasing the contributions of Branches than any others. I am more impressed than ever with the grandeur of this Catholic Christian enterprise, and with its claims on the entire Christian public. The advocacy of its principles is worthy of the tongue of an angel. It must succeed in the future as in the past, for the voice of God is in its favour. May the Spirit teach us the manner of giving the Word of Life to earth's famishing millions."

REV. DR. O'MEARA—*Enniskillen.*—I was again hospitably entertained by Dr. Hillier and his kind lady. The meeting was, here also, held in the English Church, and was very hearty. Rev. Mr. Howard, of the M. E. Church, President of the Branch, took the chair. Earnest addresses were delivered by him and by the Rev. Mr. Atkinson of the C. P. Church, on the claims of the Society on all denominations of Christians, and the greatest interest was manifested by the audience in the details, which were given by me, of Bible circulation in the past and at the present, and they seemed quite to concur with me when I urged on them the duty of making up, by redoubled exertions this year, for the fact of no returns having been made from this Branch last year. I visited the Depository, and found the books well cared for, and displayed in a prominent part of Mr. Hutchison's store, but there is no board or other notice outside, to indicate to passers by that Bibles can be had inside.

Hampton.—I was hospitably entertained by Mr. Elliott, the Depository. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, but none of the local minis-

ters were present. In the absence of the President in consequence of illness, Mr. Bunt, the Secretary, took the chair and filled it very much to the satisfaction of the meeting.

"*Bowmanville*—The morning was bitterly cold ; but the drive into Bowmanville was not so trying as the drive of the day before, the wind being from behind. On my arrival I repaired to the house of the Rev. Mr. Little, Minister of the Canada Presbyterian Church, who had kindly invited me to stay with him. Mr. Little had preparatory services for the administration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, which was to take place next Sunday ; but so arranged those services as not to interfere with the Bible Society's meeting, which was held in the town hall and was well attended by both ministers and people. Excellent addresses were delivered by the Rev. Mr. Little and the Rev. Mr. Nott of the Bible Christian Church, after which, I spoke for about an hour on the claims of the Bible Society as furnishing the only way by which almost the whole army of the Universal Church was furnished with weapons for waging the warfare which is being carried on under the guidance of the great Captain of our Salvation.

"I am thankful to say, that with the exception of the first appointment at Bowmanville, we enjoyed exceptionally fine weather during the whole series, and it is due to the Branches so visited to say that wheresoever I went I was received with the very greatest Christian courtesy and kindness, and on no occasion could any one present at any of the meetings have gathered from the proceedings that they were composed of Christians of different sections of the Church Catholic, such was the substantial unity of spirit and purpose that characterized those gatherings for the promotion of a work that must be dear to every truly Christian heart."

REV. W. R. PARKER.—"*Port Dover*.—The meeting of this Branch Bible Society was held in the Methodist Church, the President, P. Lawson, Esq., in the chair. Congregation very good, and a large and efficient choir contributed much to the success of the evening. The devotional exercises were conducted by the pastor of the church, the Rev. D. Chalmers, the Rev. Mr. Evans, Episcopalian, and Rev. Mr. Craigie, Presbyterian, also took part. The officers and Committee deserve special mention, not only for their attention to the interests of the Branch, during the year, but also for the satisfactory reports, duly prepared, and for the promptness and despatch with which they conducted the routine business of the Anniversary meeting.

"*Simcoe*.—The annual meeting was held in the Mechanics' Hall, his Honour Judge McMahon presiding. The Rev. Mr. Livingston opened with prayer, and the very competent Choral Society conducted the singing. The Rev. Dr. McDonald, of the Baptist Church, and the Rev. John Gemley, rector of the Episcopal Church, followed your agent with excellent addresses. The Rev. Mr. Brethour, of the Methodist Church, excused himself from speaking on account of the lateness of the hour. The report submitted showed that the management of the Branch is in competent hands. There was also expressed an earnest purpose to improve their former doings.

"*Lynedoch*.—I found a live, well-managed Branch here. The Depositary, W. A. Charlton, Esq., is a host in himself. It was found necessary to depart from the usual custom, and hold the meeting here on Saturday evening. But the loyalty of the friends and of the committee to the interests of your Society gave us a good meeting, and in addition to a good collection twenty-five dollars were subscribed, to be largely supplemented by the work of the collectors appointed.

"*Otterville*.—A real live meeting was held to-night in the Methodist Church, the Rev. J. P. Bell, Methodist Minister, conducting the opening services,

and afterwards delivered a good address. The President, Mr. Bullock, declined the chair in favour of Mr. Courtland, teacher, who filled it admirably, and was subsequently elected President. The reports were read in a business-like manner, and showed the Branch to be in a healthy state. A purpose was expressed to look after the adjoining districts, as well as to work the village thoroughly.

Norwich.—The meeting was well attended and marked by loyal adherence to the Bible Society work. The efficient President, James Barr, Esq., presided; and the Rev. John Mills, pastor of the Methodist Church, where the meeting was held, conducted the opening exercises, the Rev. Mr. Martin, Presbyterian minister, leading in prayer. The Rev. Mr. Benson, and his colleague, Mr. Gifford, of the M. E. Church, were also present, and took a lively interest in the proceedings. Deputations composed of a minister and a layman were appointed to visit the surrounding neighbourhood to give addresses and solicit funds. This is a rapidly growing village in the midst of a beautiful and fertile country, and the friends of the Bible Society seemed resolved to have the Branch worthy of the locality."

REV. A. M. PHILLIPS.—*Windsor.*—By request of the Branch the annual meeting was held during the 'Week of Prayer,' in the Town Hall; it was a large representative meeting of all the Evangelical Denominations, the ministers of all the churches being upon the platform. Rev. John Gray, one of the Society's Agents, rendered excellent aid by giving an address replete with information on the British and Foreign Bible Society work. This Branch is worked by an excellent staff of officers.

Chatham.—The annual meeting here was also held during the 'Week of Prayer.' The body of the Park Street Methodist Church was filled, an audience of 700 or 800 people, said to have been the largest and most enthusiastic meeting ever held in Chatham. The pastor of the church, Rev. A. Langford, in the absence of the President, occupied the chair, and all the other town clergymen were on the platform. Rev. H. Davidson, D.D., Baptist, and Rev. N. H. Martin, Church of England, delivered addresses. The Bible Society has some warm friends in Chatham.

Dawn Mills.—We were agreeably disappointed in the audience here, being much larger and more attentive than we had expected. The number of young people present was an encouraging feature, as in most cases our Bible Society meetings are made up of a few old and faithful friends.

Appin.—Here your Agent found some of the most enthusiastic, though among the oldest workers in the Society's interest. The meeting was well attended, and was pronounced among the best held for years."

MR. A. MCPHERSON.—"At the close of my first quarter's service as agent of the Upper Canada Bible Society for Southern Manitoba, I suppose it is expected that I should send a report of work done during the three months. I regret that, on account of ill health and other causes, I have had so little time to spend in the Society's work; still I have done what I could.

Emerson.—I attended the committee meetings of this Branch, and after conferring with them, and visiting West Lynne, and conferring with the people there, had the Emerson Branch reorganized so as to embrace the latter place in its operations. Collectors for the two places have been appointed, and although the canvass is not complete, I expect it will be properly attended to. Rev. Mr. Pope is Secretary-treasurer, and has charge of the funds. Rev. Mr. Young is President. Visited Dominion City, and after a conference with people there, it was thought best to postpone the forming of a Branch until early in the new year. The same in regard to Morris.

"*Mennonites*.—I found quite a demand for Bibles, but these people are so exceedingly frugal that they will sometimes take a week to think over the purchase of a 90c. Bible, and then want credit for a certain length of time. They complain of the price of the large type Bibles, and will not have one with small type at any price. I made no reduction to any of them, as they are generally well able to pay full price for what they may receive. I have got one good Depository on their reserve, about 28 miles from Emerson. I have not received proceeds of sales this quarter.

"I should not close this letter without mentioning the kindness of Mr. Theo. Jasper, of West Lynn, who has acted as interpreter for me among the German Mennonites, and of Mr. John Fraser, jeweller, of Emerson, who has kindly allowed me room for storing and boxing Bibles, &c."

EXTRACTS FROM COLPORTEURS' REPORTS.

JOHN LOWRY.—"June, 1880.—There were some interesting cases. One most interesting case was a little girl who bought a Bible for another poor little girl, who was unable to buy it herself, and made her a present of it.

"July, 1880.—The most interesting case was a little girl who bought a seventy-five cent Testament for her grandmother, with Psalms. The people were greatly surprised at the cheapness of the Books. A coloured woman, who could not read, bought a Testament; but, she said, Christ was her hope and confidence. She induced a woman that had no Bible to buy one. I had several opportunities of bearing testimony for the honour of my Divine Redeemer, and of praying with the widow and the fatherless.

"Sept. 1880.—I sold one Bible to a German Romanist and one Testament to another Romanist; a coloured woman bought two Bibles and five Testaments. I never saw the value of Colportage more than this month. Very few knew where the Bible Depository was; besides, many will buy the Bibles when you go to their houses, who never think of going for one.

"October, 1880.—Several days I have travelled from ten to fifteen miles, often leaving before seven in the morning and not returning till late at night. I have sold a large number of the seventy cent Bibles for family use. I found a family in the Township of Aldboro' without the Bible, although there are three Branches of the Society in the township, which shows that Colportage is the only means by which a certain class of society can be reached. A number of young people have been supplied with pocket Bibles. The month has been a most laborious one on account of the bad state of the roads and of the weather.

* * "There was a most interesting meeting of the Orford Branch, held on Thursday night, addressed by the Rev. Mr. Dickson, Episcopalian; Rev. Mr. Currie, Presbyterian; and the Rev. Mr. Gray, your Agent. It was the largest meeting ever held in Duart. All seemed to go heartily into the work. The Rev. Mr. Dickson invited me to stop at his house whenever I might be in the neighbourhood."

WM. MCPHAIL.—"July, 1880.—I am going to begin in Nottawasaga, and I know there are many Gaelic-speaking people there. I know they will be looking for Gaelic Bibles.

"October, 1880.—I beg to state that I encountered many difficulties getting through Nottawasaga, owing to the big hills ; and, crossing these steep hills I got through it and Sunnidale. It is not very easy to get through. In some parts of the latter may be found a Protestant, and then you have to seek another among a number of these poor Roman Catholics, who, when they find that they are strong, are quick in showing it. For my part, I got through them pretty well, as I can speak the Irish language, and though the greatest part of them cannot speak it, they like to hear it spoken. I several times experienced a good deal of kindness. May the Lord quicken them to a sense of their awful blindness.

"February, 1881.—(In north part of County of Hastings).—I received great help from the Rev. David Wishart, who kindly gave me information about the place. In my last report I spoke about having hope of getting more sales in another part, but I was disappointed in that as well.

"I am getting old, and do not like to venture far from home, and so would rather resign from the service."

JAMES BADGER.—"February, 1881.—After leaving home, I travelled in the south part of the Township of Foley to the back settlements, round Otter Lake, on my way to Muskoka Township. I sold a few copies of the Word of God. The country here is greatly improved, and many new settlers have come in since my last visit here. I gave a few copies to the destitute, some of whom were Roman Catholics, who said they had no Bible in their house. They promised to read it and to take good care of it. I read a portion of God's Word, and prayed and exhorted them to trust alone in Jesus for salvation. In the Townships of Muskoka and Morrison, many of the old settlers were glad to see me again among them with God's Word. Many of their families are grown up, and the young men and young women recognised me as the man who read and prayed with them nine years ago, and some of them are trying to love the blessed Saviour, and I trust that my visit among them this month will be made a blessing to their souls. I am sorry I have not been more successful in the distribution of God's blessed word, but I have done the best I could under the circumstances in which I have to labour to reach the back settlements. My pack is very heavy, but the roads have been good. Many thanks come from warm hearts to your noble Society for sending God's Word at so cheap a price among them.

"March 1881.—After visiting the Township of Morrison, I went to Gravenhurst West, this is a small village on the west side of the Muskoka Lake. The people here expressed their thankfulness to the Upper Canada Bible Society for sending the Word of God, at such cheap prices, among them. I sold quite a number of copies here and in the vicinity of Gravenhurst. I found some families without the Word of God. I gave the Bible and the Testament to those who were unable to buy, with the promise that they would read and study the blessed Word that leads us to salvation. The country has greatly improved since my last visit, and the Townships of Ryde and Draper show remarkable progress. Churches and school-houses are to be seen in these townships, which, a few years ago, were nothing but a howling wilderness, and a home for bears and wolves ; now, the forests have been laid low by the settlers' axes, and comfortable homes raised by the pioneers for their families. The Word of God is read, and a special regard for the Sabbath is manifested by the majority of the people. The snow has been very deep this winter, but the roads have been very good up to this time. You will see by my report this month, that I have been making steady progress through the country, and God has, I believe, owned and blessed my poor and feeble efforts in the distribution of His precious Truth. My sales have not been as

frequent as I could wish, owing to the number of book agents and other colporteurs on the leading roads and villages ; my labours have been among the sparse population and the remotest settlers. I love to follow the axe with the blessed Word of God, and to give to the pioneers the promise of a Divine protection if they only trust in the Lord."

J. E. TAYLOR.—" July, 1880.—I take this opportunity to thank the Committee for changing my field of labour, which will greatly help to cure the ague. I have had one bad spell since I came here, but I feel very much better now, and trust this will be the last time the ague will trouble me this summer. This is a very healthy part of the country, and I am confident I will do good work for the Society in it. My first journey was to the city of Guelph, where I called on the officers of the Branch, and told them the object of my coming. I saw the President and Treasurer, Messrs. Hough and Newton, who thought it was a good plan to work the city and township, where there is a good demand for Bibles. In some parts of the town the people were very short of Bibles, but at the same time very poor, but when I showed them our 70c. Bible and 9c. Testament and 14c. Bible they looked astonished, and could hardly realize it. I expect to make a good month's work in August.

" August, 1880.—This has been a very cheering month. I found quite a number of families in want of Bibles and Testaments. I have sold 254 Bibles and Testaments, one of the heaviest sales I have made in any month. I gave a 70c. Bible to a very old man, once a slave in the South, who was converted and brought to Jesus, and who is now rejoicing in the love of God, which he has found. There is quite a number of coloured people in this part of the country, and very poor, but most of them, I am glad to say, have given themselves to God. They were very thankful for getting such cheap Bibles. The officers of our Branch in Guelph are quite pleased with my visit in the township.

" September, 1880.—My next place (after the Agricultural Show at Toronto) was Hamilton, where I took the large case of Bibles in the 100 different languages, which caused quite a sensation. I called on the Secretary, Mr. J. Walker, to whom I owe many thanks for his kindness for securing space in the main exhibition building, and getting men to put the case in proper position, which he paid for out of his own purse. A very large number of visitors examined the contents of the case, which was the principal attraction in the main building. My next visit was to the Fair held in St. Thomas, where I called on the Secretary, Mr. Mackenzie. He very kindly gave a note to the manager of the main building, who assigned me a good stand, where the visitors had an excellent opportunity of learning something of the Society's work. I distributed a large quantity of handbills, and sold a good number of Bibles. I expect that a deeper interest in the Society will result from this work.

" October, 1880.—After the Fair at St. Thomas, I went to Thamesville, and called on the officers of the Branch. They were very much pleased and interested in the copies of the Bible in 25 languages. We had a very large Fair at this place. A good number of people said they were glad to see the Bible Society represented. I distributed a great many of our hand-bills, giving a sketch of the history and operations of the Bible Society. After the Fair, I visited all the families, and left a hand-bill in every house. I consulted the President about visiting the families, as I had a few hours to spare before the opening of the Watford Fair. He thought that it was a good plan. My next halt was at the Watford Fair, which was visited by a very large number of people. The President and Secretary were of great help to me in this place, and for their kindness I heartily thank them. No room could be found in the main

building, so we put up a booth outside, which turned out to be the most advantageous situation wherein to interest the people in our work in all parts of the world. They were very glad to see the Bible Society represented at this place. After the Fair, I visited all the families, and distributed our hand-bills, which will be very useful in making our Society better known. My next stopping place was Dresden. The Secretary of this Branch was of great assistance to me. The people took a very deep interest in the exhibition of the Bible in 25 different languages, and when I told them it is printed in 215 languages they were more than astonished. Here, I also visited the families, and sold quite a number of Bibles. However, the great encouraging feature of this year's work is the great demand for Bibles and Testaments. I have sold 1056 in the months of September and October. Many thanks to the officers of the above mentioned Branches for their kindness.

"November, 1880.—I found a great many poor people in the township of Eramosa, and they were very glad to get cheap Bibles and Testaments for their children. I visited a Roman Catholic family; that of a widow who got her living by washing. She said that her mother was a Methodist and her father a Roman Catholic, and she married a Catholic. She had no Bible of her own. I then read to her and the children about God's love to us in giving us the Lord Jesus to die for us, in order that we may have eternal life. I pointed out God to them, as their best Friend, who would be a Father to the children and a Comforter to the widow. I prayed with them, and gave them a 23c. Bible, which she promised to read and to teach to her children. She thanked me, and requested me to call again when near."

F. E. ROULEAU, "July, 1880.—The last report left me at Pembina Mountain. I went, on the north side of Rock Lake, as far as range fourteen, in the fourth township, to Mr. Stark's settlement. In the evening that I was there, two French half-breed families were tented near the house where I stayed. One of the Half-breeds sent word that they wanted to see me. I accordingly went to their tent, where they made me very welcome. They remembered what I had told them the year before about their souls, and they had the Testament that I gave them last year in their house, but they had not read it since I had read it for them the year previous. One of the men told me that he had always the hope that some one would come round who could read French, to do so for him. We had a profitable time together, talking of the love of God. The next day I met again with some Half-breed families, in another settlement, one of whom could read French. I gave a Testament, which was received with great show of pleasure.

"September, 1880.—I made very few callings before reaching Palestine. On the first day of my arrival, I went to a small settlement north of that place, and found a tent where there were two men and a woman, French Catholics. After speaking of the love of our Saviour for us, one of the men appeared anxious to get a Bible. Not expecting to see any French people there, I had left my box at Palestine, which contained the French Bibles, but the man came with me to get a Testament. On my way back from the West, I met him again, and he spoke to me about his Testament, saying that he was very glad to have it, and that he had nearly read it all.

"October, 1880.—I have found people in nearly every township who were destitute of the Scriptures. Last year, when I was at Rapid City, I gave a French Testament to a woman, who received it very thankfully, and at the same time asked me to give her a Bible when I would go up again. When, however, I went that way again, she was not at home, but her husband, who happened to be there, bought her a Bible, and told me that she was very anxious to have one, and had frequently spoken to him about it.

Both of them have read that Testament more than once, though they are yet Roman Catholics. I have reason to believe that they have already experienced great benefit from it."

ANNIVERSARY MEETING.

The forty-first anniversary meeting of the Society was held in the Metropolitan Methodist Church, on the evening of Wednesday, May 11th.*

The Hon. G. W. Allan, President of the Society, occupied the chair.

After the singing of the hymn "O Word of God Incarnate," the Rev. Dr. Potts read a portion of Scripture, and the Rev. W. S. Rainsford led in prayer.

The President then addressed the meeting. He referred to the prominent features of the annual report, and found cause for thankfulness at the general result. In reference to the necessity for adequately supplying the religious wants of our rapidly filling up North-West, he said he feared it would be a long time before the work could be overtaken there; but if they could not send a sufficient number of missionaries to the new territory to minister to the fast-growing population, they could at least send the colporteur with his Bibles and Testaments to circulate God's revealed truth. He hoped the people of Ontario would contribute liberally of their substance to help in this good work. After briefly alluding to the portions of the report referring to the operations of the parent society in Europe, he commented upon the revised version of the New Testament, which they might shortly expect, and which the Christian world was anticipating with great interest. He believed that the result would be that fresh light would be thrown upon the interpretation of God's Word. In the same spirit, he thought, would be welcomed the efforts of the Palestine Exploration Society, whose labours had tended to make clearer many of the events treated of in the Scriptures. (Applause.)

Mr. Robert Baldwin then moved the adoption of the report, which was seconded by Mr. James Brown, and carried.

It was moved by the Rev. John Smith, and seconded by Mr. F. A. Ball:—"That thanks be given to the Officers, Committees and Collectors of the various Branches throughout the country, to whose zeal and energy the Society is so much indebted; and that the following gentlemen be Officers and Directors for the ensuing year:"—(See names on page 4).

The motion was carried unanimously.

The Rev. John Burton said, I deem it an honour to address you from this platform; from one other only would I deem the honour greater—the platform of the Parent Society. With reliance upon Divine guidance, and your sympathy, I shall endeavour to discharge my trust. Wellington, once preparing for battle, desired to give some instructions to an officer in the forming line. The officer by whom the orders were to be conveyed, bound by some supposed rule of honour, objected, "My lord, I cannot convey these orders—and I am not on speaking terms; we are not friends." "You are friends," replied the Duke, pointing with his field glass to the foe, "there are your enemies." Thank God for this platform, since on it, free from ecclesiastical etiquette, we in this fair city, where vice, infidelity, intemperance threaten, can hear the voice, "Here are your foes, all ye are brethren." Eight years ago one, whose name is inseparable from this building, spoke from this platform upon "the Silence of the Bible," where men would only too readily

speak ; and proved that characteristic as collateral proof of its Divine Authorship. He has passed, only lately, into the eternal silence, "never to be questioned any more, save on the further side," yet we may hear the echoes of that voice as it still presses upon us the eloquence of that Word, when it calls the weary to rest, and freely opens to all the Word of the great salvation. Death severs not the workers under this Divine Word—

"Where is thy victory, O grave?
What dust upon the spirit lies?
God keeps the sacred soul He gave,
The prophet never dies."

The resolution put into my hands reads :—"The continuous increase in the circulation of the Scriptures, and the renewed attention the forthcoming revision promises to direct to the teachings of those Scriptures, call for gratitude and increased confidence ; acknowledging which, this Society resolves that the incoming year shall be one of augmented trust and work."

I am not aware of anything more than an approximate estimate of the circulation of the Scriptures, which, from our Anglo-Saxon land, may be put at about five millions annually. Three score and ten years ago the annual circulation might be set down at fifty thousand. In the short span of human life the increase has been a hundred fold. Certainly, in its steady increase, no other circulation can enter into comparison therewith. The intense interest evinced in the expected revision shows that the circulation is not likely to decrease. An inquiry into the reason of this continued interest may strengthen our faith.

There is sometimes deep philosophy in words expressive of childhood's faith : thus the lines

"I love to tell the story, because I know 'tis true,
It satisfies my longing as nothing else can do,"

contain a deep truth. Is Morley Punshon dead? Has Paul melted like streaks of morning cloud into the infinite azure of the past? Was the darkness which settled on Calvary the quenching of that life for ever? Does death end all? You don't know? Dare you not know? Call to mind Milton's description of Satan's flight from Pandemonium. He gazes out on a dark, illimitable ocean, without bounds, where length, breadth, height, and time and place are not—

"At last, his sail-broad vans
He spreads for flight, and on the surging smoke
Uplifted, spurns the ground, thence many a league
As in a cloudy chair, ascending, rides
Audacious ; but that seat soon failing
Meets a vast vacuity, all unawares
Fluttering his pinions vain, plumb down he drops
Ten thousand fathoms deep."

That dark void is the Bibleless region, and that falling angel the soul that essays life's pilgrimage from the cradle to the grave, without its truths to bear the spirit up. In such a void no living heart can beat. As a fact, the Bible does sustain "as nothing else can do;" therefore it must spread. This adaptation is seen in the great extension this century has witnessed in the work of missions, and the spread of missions is the enlarging of the circulation of the Bible. This is a century of missions, which had scarcely a beginning when the last century closed. "Sit down, when God desires to convert the heathen He will do it without your interference," could not be said by a body of Christian men to-day to an aspirant for the missionary cause. It was said just before this century began, but now Madagascar has been won. So have the Sandwich Islands, and the Malay Polynesia. What, looked at pro-

spectively, seemed miraculous, has been accomplished. Brahmins have been won for the Cross of Christ; China hears the voice of the colporteur; the native Indian of this continent is followed as he chases the buffalo over the prairies of the West, and to-day, under the shadow of the Vatican, the work goes on. And, assuredly, wherever missions are the Bible is showing its adaptation to human wants, its power to satisfy human needs.

In the smoke and fury of battle, an individual company or soldier may be hurled back, whilst the whole line may be marching on to victory. Let those who are weary with the discouragements that meet them, get occasionally above the din and see the host triumphantly advancing. "I have nowhere seen a new heathen temple. They are all old and dilapidated," writes one who lately made a mission tour of the world. If ever, the Church to-day can sing, "All the ends of the earth see the salvation of our God."

Our report and resolution refer to the coming revision of the old Saxon translation. Speaking on this platform, no opinion can now be given as to the merits of that version, or its subsequent reception, but in view of the great expectation raised by its announced completion, so far as the New Testament is concerned, it may safely be said that a new impetus will be given to Bible-reading. I sympathize deeply with the spirit that cherishes words of hallowed memories, words which, unforgotten, wherever we wander—

"Call back the hearts which once they stirred
To childhood's happy home."

Some of these memories may receive a start; nevertheless the tense and verbal changes to be met with will compel an attention from which we anticipate blessed results. There is much reading about and around the Bible, even Sunday School helps may keep from the true reading of the book itself: what we need is a face to face acquaintance with the Word: and the comparisons which even curiosity may institute between the old version and the new will loosen from a formalism which becomes fetichism, leading to a more living interest in the truths which underlie the words. Only let the truth, as the truth is in Jesus, be seen with open face, and it will manifest itself as the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth. Let it be understood, moreover, that they who are most truly loyal to that truth, court, rather than shun, investigation; only let investigation be thorough. "These things were not done in a corner." Truth, let it stand, heaven will not fall, but shine forth with ever increasing brightness, and the salvation thereof as a lamp that burneth.

Man *must* trust. You remove the Bible and its teachings: what do you get in our midst as the results? Spiritualism and its vagaries, fortune-telling, lucky and unlucky omens, superstitions far beyond any under the Christian name. Undeniably, the Bible may cease to be the object of a living faith and become the object of a superstition. Even so with Christ, and the creeds our fathers forged in the fires of conflict, a cruel shibboleth to some of their children in the hands of others; nevertheless, Christian superstition has never reached more than the penumbra of the darkness found in the total eclipse of God and His truth. Nor do we find a deeper dismay at the harmless ticking of the death-watch, or a more chilling shudder at the midnight howling of some imprisoned cur, than among those to whom the Bible is an idle tale and God a dream; their spirits, at these harmless sounds, are often blanched with fear as at the summons of the Judgment Day.

These considerations should deepen our missionary trust as we seek to spread the Bible; for what are scientific truths but verified experiments, and verified experiments are but corrected observations. What is experience but the knowledge gained by the experiments of life? May we not assert, therefore, some scientific truths regarding the Bible as a whole? truths as well authenticated as any discovered in the laboratory. It is a fact in history which is the record of human experience, that in proportion as the Gospel of Jesus

Christ has been recorded as the sure guide of faith and duty, in that proportion has peace and hope and purity been gained ; in proportion as men have set themselves to work to cut and carve and carp at the truths this Bible contains, in that proportion have they found "no end in wandering mazes lost ;" yea, and have succeeded in making themselves and others miserable, reckless, vile, only that, and nothing more. These are foundations of faith this Bible gives them ; wherever they are shaken, so is human integrity, so is the world's peace. "Better an ass which carries you than a horse which throws you." And I, for one, would rather be among the children crying Hosannah to the King riding upon a lowly ass, than be seated in the triumphal car, with loud acclamation, which was drawn through the streets of Paris when God was formally denied, and reason in the person of a strumpet was exalted. We do not need [to concuss the first car we find laden with nitro-glycerine to learn its destructive power. One experiment is sufficient ; so should one French Revolution be with its last echo, the Paris Commune. I hold it, therefore, as the plain teaching of experiment actually made, and therefore to be esteemed as scientifically true that the faith which inspires to nobleness, nerves to deeds of holy daring and self-denying love, which has produced such men as Paul and Luther, Knox and Hooper ; consecrated lives such as those of Howard, Carey, Duff and Livingstone, which, notwithstanding a court that could complacently endure George IV's reign raised a young maiden of eighteen summers to be and continue the crown of the purest, noblest Court that ever owned a Christian monarch's sway ; that gave to that Queen's earlier years a companion better than "great," seeing that he remains enshrined in the nation's heart as Albert the Good—that the Book which gives such a faith has done, is doing more for humanity than the know-nothingism which would supplant it, and which needs only to be carried to its legitimate results to bestialize the race and drape the earth in the funeral pall of anarchy and despair.

Another year of Bible Society work is over, another began ; are we preparing for the work ? There is yet work to be done. Modern society is not to be saved by electric light, æsthetics, culture, and a boundless north-west. Armstrong guns are not a nation's surest defences. Unwalled Jerusalem, in Zechariah's vision, was to be encircled by Jehovah as a wall of fire. Righteousness and truth are a nation's best towers, and we may rejoice that such is being acknowledged by our leaders now. I am giving no opinion as to the political wisdom or folly of the act, but I rejoice at the moral motive thereof, when, notwithstanding the natural longings, we Britons have, for the Gibraltar of the east, a government holding we have no moral right to Candahar, on that ground evacuates. I am proud of the nation which shows that if its soldiers can and do, at their country's call, press forward, as at Balaklava into the very gates of death, Britons can, at the same call, relinquish what they have won ; because the vanquished have the greater claim. A noble Bible triumph, when the empty but alluring cry of glory is silenced by the noble call of duty.

Our motion speaks of augmented work on the part of the Society, that is on the part of individuals. This is the time for conflict ; rest comes by and by ; we are soldiers of Christ, let us then press on

"More than conquerors even now
With the war sweat on our brow ;
Onward o'er the well marked road
March we, as the host of God.

"Royal is the sword we wield,
Royal is our battle field,
Royal is our victory,
Royal shall our triumph be."

Rev. Dr. L. M. Miller, of Ogdensburg, N. Y., in seconding the motion, said,—Mr. Chairman,—It affords me great pleasure to be with you to-night, on this anniversary of the Upper Canada Bible Society, which occupies so large and important a field in its work auxiliary to the Parent Society—the grand “British and Foreign Bible Society.” All the more is it pleasant for me to second the resolution before you, because I am here as an active worker for the distribution of the Holy Scriptures in connection with the great American Bible Society. Having been a pastor for thirty-seven years, settled in only two parishes, I have been for thirty-five of those years a corresponding secretary of the Bible Society in the State of New York, and am a witness to the “continuous increase in the circulation of the Scriptures.” Shortly after the introduction of printing, Bibles and Testaments were multiplied, and their distribution began. Tyndale’s excellent version of the New Testament was issued in English in 1525, and revised in 1534. Then came an edition of the whole Bible by Miles Coverdale. Thomas Matthews’ Bible appeared in 1537. The *great* Bible was printed in 1539. The Genevan *Household* Bible and the Bishops’ authorised version soon followed. The King James version was published in 1611. This is the book which has made Great Britain and the United States what they are to-day, the leading countries of the world in civilization, good government, blessed homes, and powerful factors as Protestant nations in helping the nations of the world and settling their destinies. All these 270 years this Bible has been increasing in circulation, and giving counsel and comfort to the English-speaking race. It has imparted the strength and force of the Anglo-Saxon tongue to our thoughts and modes of expression. It has given character and stability to our language. To-day we have a roll of 273 new versions of the Scriptures in 200 languages and dialects as a part of the work accomplished by our Bible and Missionary Societies within the last one hundred years. These versions for the most part take our present authorized version as the basis from which these translations have been made. All honour to this grand old Book, which has conducted millions safe through the dark and dangerous pathways of life without ever leading one astray. And all honour to the British and Foreign Bible Society, and to the American Bible Society and their numerous auxiliaries, for their large and continually growing work in translating, printing and scattering these sacred leaves for the healing of the nations. Next comes the “Revision.” It remains to be seen whether the hopes which have been cherished in its expectation will be realized or not. I am not surprised at the large gathering here to-night—a crowd expressing intelligent interest and enthusiasm in behalf of the Bible. For, as I rode around Toronto to-day, a guest with some of your number, friends of the Bible, I saw with admiration your churches and school-houses, colleges, and asylums, and hospitals, and remembered that these all, with your palatial and cheerful homes, are the results of Bible education and Christian civilization. Such things abound in England and America because the church and the school-house and the Christian home are built upon the Scriptures, the foundation of the prophets and apostles—Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone. A colossal statue, beautiful as a monument and in its lessons instructive, stands on the rocks overlooking Plymouth Bay. On its pedestal are four sculptured figures, representing Law, Morality, Freedom, and Education. Above these rises majestic a beautiful figure of Faith, thirty-six feet from the pedestal to her brow, crowned with a wreath, with an open Bible in one hand, while with the other, pointed to heaven, the Throne of the God of Nations, she calls all to consider that the Scriptures only are the foundation of all morality, and they only can bring God and man together and exalt him to heaven. This is the inspiration which has exalted England and Canada and the United States to their wealth and power and moral eminence among nations. Let

us not forget this in our love for the Bible, and in our gifts to the treasury of our societies for increasing its circulation. The Report of your Society which we have heard to-night is encouraging. To increase its efficiency according to the urgent needs presented, you should liberally augment its funds. The Parent Society at London reports for the past year the magnificent sum of one million of dollars given for its work. The Society at New York has announced as received for its work some six hundred and seven thousand. It is thus that the daughter emulates the mother. As this fair child increases in womanhood, let the mother look to her laurels that she is not surpassed in her gifts and works of usefulness. Long may England's Queen and Columbia vie with each other in such a strife and for such prizes. The Christian use of money is the modern miracle. But let us not forget to-night that this Bible has its personal application to our own wants. It is the guide to our feet continually, and the comforter all our way along. The celebrated Jay, when dying, was asked what legacy he left for his children. He thoughtfully and solemnly replied, "They have the Bible." And that is enough; the Bible is surely the young man's best friend and strong helper. And equally is it for the aged. An old man lay blind and helpless on his couch. His little granddaughter was reading to him from her Testament. She read "The blood of Jesus Christ, His Son, cleanseth us from all sin." The old man said, "Stop, read that again." She read it. The blind man says, "Are you sure that is there?" "Yes!" "Put my finger on it, and read it again." The little child put her blind grandfather's finger on the verse, and read again, "The blood of Jesus Christ, His Son, cleanseth us from all sin." And he was satisfied. He fell back again upon his couch, and said to his child, "If any one asks how your old grandfather died, tell him I died resting upon the verse, "The blood of Jesus Christ, His Son, cleanseth us from all sin." Oh, yes, the Bible is sufficient, while young and strong, to live by; and when old, it is all-sufficient comfort by which we may die in peace and hope. Mr. Chairman, I am glad to be with you to-night, and to second this resolution. When you meet on your next anniversary, I trust it may be reported that your usefulness has been enlarged, and that the funds of your Society have been greatly increased.

The Very Rev. Principal Grant, of Queen's University, Kingston, moved the following resolution:—"That as the Scriptures are the symbol and outward basis of the spiritual unity that binds together Evangelical Christendom, and the common standard of faith to which it appeals, the duty of the Church of Christ, especially of the English-speaking churches, to disseminate them wherever Christ is preached is imperative;" and in doing so said—

Some persons, I am sorry to say, are uninterested in Bible Society Meetings, because, in their opinion, nothing new can be said about the Bible, and because nothing new is likely to be said. They are quite satisfied that the Bible is a good book, and that it should be circulated; but, not expecting to hear anything new, they prefer not to attend anniversaries. Facts certainly indicate that such people are mistaken; and that much that is new may be said about the Bible, and that the people's interest may be stirred to the utmost. For instance, an article on the Bible that appeared, two or three years ago, in the *Encyclopædia Britannica*, by Professor Robertson Smith, has stirred Scotland, as that Bible-loving country has not been stirred since the eventful times of 1843. It is admitted that the writer has as profound a reverence for the Scriptures as any man, and that his aim is to reconcile the old faith with the new scholarship and criticism. To him, the Bible is much more than a storehouse of texts and a *repertory* of doctrines. It is the history of a long and loving union between God and man, under unique conditions and leading to the unique result of the perfect revelation of Himself in His Son for our salvation. One good result of the article in question is that

Bibles which were never read before, or read as a matter of routine, have been carefully scanned. The points in question have been discussed with an interest that forces people to look beyond traditional views, forces them to study the times in which the various documents that constitute the Old Testament literature were written, to make allowances for Orientalisms of expression, and to separate incidentals from essentials. I am aware that the discussion of such questions is deprecated on the ground that it has an "unsettling" effect. I have faith enough to believe, however, that while every plant that our Heavenly Father has not planted shall be rooted up, believers will only be established the more deeply in the Truth. We all believe, also, that our Protestant freedom of biblical criticism is the legitimate fruit of our reverence for the Scriptures. Is there not a false reverence for the Scriptures akin to that which may be found in Abyssinian churches? A Bible is there kept on the altar, but it is swathed round by innumerable handkerchiefs and bandages, because it would be irreverent for men to gaze upon or look into the Holy Book! True reverence demands the fullest investigation, and cries to those who are afraid, "O, ye of little faith, wherefore do ye doubt?" However, all that I would now point out, is the fact that people should not assume that nothing new can be said about the marvellous Book. Nothing that leads to fresh interest being taken in it can be otherwise than helpful to true faith, in the end.

That the spirit of fearless faith animates this Society, I infer from what has been said with reference to the new English version that all of us expect to be studying in the course of a few days. That version will give an extraordinary impetus to Bible reading. Some favourite texts may be missed, on which powerful sermons have been preached, though many readers may be too ignorant of the Bible to be much struck with the changes. I find that, as a rule, people are singularly ignorant of the Scriptures. In connection with this new version, also, numbers of people are afraid of the "unsettling" process, but surely it argues very little reverence for the Scriptures to say that, when we can get what is, demonstrably, a more accurate version of what Jesus said and wrote, we shall continue to prefer the mistakes of copyists and translators to the pure Word. I do not at all mean that this Society should at once take the new and cease to circulate the old version. On the contrary, I think it should wait until the Christian consciousness of the people shall decide which is, on the whole, the better version, and that it should also have regard to the opinions and action of the parent Society. Better surely to continue to put up with a few mistakes, or even many mistakes, than to bring about divided efforts with regard to the one work in which all Protestant churches are united. I quite agree with the sentiment of the Rev. Mr. Rainsford, that the true expression of unity and the true path to higher unity, is in working together. We welcome, then, everything that induces men and women to study the Scriptures, just because we dread, not intelligence, but indifference, not enquiry, but routine, not the spiritual, but the formal.

The resolution I submit indicates some of our reasons for valuing the Scriptures. First, it is the symbol and basis of the spiritual unity that binds Christendom together. It is, indeed, the great symbolical Book of Christendom. Thank God for that unity, and thank God for the Book. If, then, we value symbols according to their sacredness, impressiveness, antiquity and permanence, how must we value the great symbol or creed of the Christian Church? After all, however, we should never forget that all symbols are liable to be abused under the plea of reverence. Men are fallen, and prone, therefore, to rest in the sign, instead of being led by it to the end signified. Think of the illustrations of this which the history of our race supplies. What symbol could be more precious to the Old Testament church than the brazen serpent? How God had honoured it! It was the very symbol

by which deliverance had been wrought, and the people might well feel that, should similar circumstances occur, it would be equally honoured again; yet when Hezekiah saw that the people worshipped it, what did he do? He said it was only a bit of brass, and ground it to powder. Again, when the Lord Jesus established sacramental signs and seals of the great blessings He gives to us, He, as if aware of the tendency in our nature to which I have referred, took those elements which were least susceptible of being abused. He takes a portion of the water that we use for every-day purposes, and He takes the elements of the ordinary meal of a peasant in Palestine. Yet what has the great majority of the Church done with those signs and seals? It has not looked through them to the Saviour but has turned them into idols; so that what were intended to point to Jesus, and to be bonds of love and union between Christians, have been worshipped as idols, and turned into the watch-words of schism and sect. Again, the history of the Bible itself in connection with the history of the Church, shows us that a symbol is not indispensable to spiritual life, because the Church has done without such aid in the past. What is the grandest period in the history of the Old Testament Church? Surely that from Abraham to Solomon, that period of which Jeremiah pathetically says, "I remember the kindness of thy youth, the love of thy espousals. Israel was holiness unto the Lord, and the first fruits of his increase." Yet how much of the Bible had the Church then? And what did men when they had the Old Testament canon complete, the men who valued it, who prided themselves on its possession, do? They crucified Him to whom it pointed. Again, what was the grandest period of the New Testament Church? Surely the first century. How much of the New Testament had the Church then? The first parts of the New Testament were not written till after a generation had passed away. The Church then had apostolic men, and God could give us successors to these. In one word, when we rest in the symbol instead of being led by it to the thing signified, we are guilty of idolatry, and the truly spiritual man hates and despises idolatry, no matter what form it assumes, and he hates and despises most that which the people of his own country and age are prone to. You see a Hindoo worshipping an idol that represents the Trimurti; the idol is very expressive, for it represents the great truth that there is a trinity in unity in the Divine nature, but you do not hesitate to warn him against the sin and degrading influence of idolatry. You read to him the graphic picture drawn by Isaiah, chap. xlv., verses 14-18. You do well; but now suppose that Hindoo came here and heard our reverence expressed for the Bible, and saw our ignorance of its truths; our reverence for its letter, and our disregard of its precepts in the daily life of individual Christians, and of the nation; could he not turn round and say, "Is not the idolatry of a book as degrading as the worship of an idol like Brahma, Vishnu or Siva?"

We value the Bible, then, not because it is a book, but because it reveals the living God to us, God the Father, God in Christ—human and divine, God the Holy Ghost, who unites Christ to our spirits. Can anything warn us more expressively of the inadequacy of any symbol in itself, than that Jesus did not abide in the flesh, but said, "it is expedient that I go away." It was necessary that He should go away in the flesh, that He might dwell with us in the spirit. It is on this spiritual truth of God, Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, that the unity of Christendom is based.

The external basis of that unity is the Bible. All Christians admit that the Bible is the authorized record of His revelations of Himself, and all believe that the humble, devout, seeking soul will find treasures here THAT CANNOT BE FOUND ANYWHERE ELSE, AND THAT ARE INTENDED TO BE A POSSESSION FOR EVER unto humanity. It is, therefore, the standard of faith to which all appeal. Every Church has its own dogmas on which it differs from others, but all Churches

increasingly feel that these are subordinate and the Bible supreme; that the points of difference between Churches must be of minor importance, and that the essentials are the truths which all find in the Bible. In conclusion, while it is manifestly a duty of the whole Church to circulate the Bible, so that millions may read in their own tongue the wonderful works of God, this duty is especially incumbent on the English-speaking Churches, for the Anglo Saxon race leads the van of the world in commerce, and in everything that tends to the material unification of mankind. Is it not then our duty to assist the spiritual unification of humanity, and seeing that this continent is destined to be the great home of English-speaking men and women, let us in Canada do our share of the work. Let us, according to the exhortations of the Chairman, follow the tide of emigration into the backwoods, and onward to vast untrodden plains, prairies and river courses in the North-West. With one hand let us do our duty to the pioneers of nations yet to be; with the other hand let us help the Parent Society to send the good seed to the teeming millions of the old world; and while both hands are thus at work, let our hearts and lips so reflect the Word, that all men shall see and hear through us, not a Deity that once manifested Himself in the world, but a present, living God and Saviour, "whose delights are still with the sons of men."

Colonel Moffat seconded the resolution, and it was carried.

After taking up the collection, and singing the hymn "Lord of all power and might,"

It was moved by Dr. Geikie, seconded by Mr. Warring Kennedy, and carried:—"That the hearty thanks of this meeting be presented to the Dean and Churchwardens of St. James's Cathedral, for the use of that Church on Sabbath evening last, and to the Rev. W. S. Rainsford, for the instructive sermon which he preached in the interests of the Society on that occasion."

It was moved by Mr. Herbert Mortimer, seconded by Mr. John Harvie, and carried:—"That the hearty thanks of this meeting be presented to the Pastor and Trustees of this Church for its use on the present occasion, and to the Choir for their valuable services in connection with this Annual Meeting."

The benediction was pronounced by the Rev. Dr. Castle, and the proceedings terminated.
