### REPORT.

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The Report now presented emanates from the Committee of the Kingston Auxiliary of the Upper Canadian Bible Society, not, as heretofore, of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

This new affiliation was brought about, and ratified, with the cordial consent of both parties at the last annual meeting; the respected delegate of the Parent Society, the Rev. Dr. GILL, being present, and signifying his entire approbation of the measure. It is well to bear in mind, however, that, although we shall not in future report directly to the British and Foreign Bible Society, or stand in so close a relation as formerly to that noble institution, yet our affection for her need, and we trust will not, suffer any abatement, nor our interest in her prosperity be at all impaired by this change of circumstances. During the past year we have had the benefit of the services, first, of the Rev. Wm. Brookman, and secondly, of S. B. Johnson, Esq., both able and indefatigable agents, who have faithfully cultivated our field, and, we rejoice to say, have, with God's blessing, effected a perceptible improvement in it. 'Mr. Brookman commenced his visitation of our branches in May, and continued it for seven weeks. Mr. Johnson his towards the end of October, and finished in December. Both of these gentlemen have sent in interesting reports, containing valuable information. The improvement alluded to above has been manifested in such things as the following: - Meetings more numerously attended; arrears of debts paid up partially in some instances, wholly in a few; the reception of free grants to the amount of \$170:30, &c. The whole of the old debt has been paid off by the Madoc, Stirling and Bloomfield branches, and large remittances received from Napanee, Picton, &c., on purchase account.

Your Committee have to express their grateful acknowledgments to the Upper Canada Society for a liberal donation of 150 Testaments and 50 Bibles, for the use of the travellers and inmates of the hotels and taverns of this city. May they be carefully and prayerfully read by passers-by and residents, and the results in many be "a turning from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan unto God." They also beg to acknowledge the assumption of their Auxiliary's liabilities to the British and Foreign Bible Society, by the Upper Canada Society, as expressed in the following resolution, dated 17th August, 1865 :- "That, as the Society is now in the relation of an Auxiliary to the Upper Canada Bible Society, and remitting all contributions to the Parent and other Societies through it, the Board assumes the debt of the Kingston Society now due to the Parent Society, said to be \$1,000." Moreover, a grant of \$300 has been received for the support of a Colporteur, and Mr. J. FINLAYSON has been actively employed from the 27th of May to the 22d December, when leave was granted him to pay a short visit to his family. He has sold 308 Bibles and 389 Testaments in six months, being 109 more Bibles and 188 more Testaments than were sold by his predecessor during the same space of time in 1854.

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Your tried and worthy Depositary, Mr. Stacey, continues to perform his duties in a most satisfactory manner, and merits well of your Committee.

The Committee has great cause of thanksgiving to Almighty God for his goodness and loving kindness to them during the past year, notwithstanding their many imperfections and shortcomings; and here they would raise their Ebenezer, and say, "Hitherto the Lord has helped us; blessed be His holy name."

A few brief extracts from the monthly reports of your hard-working and deserving Colporteur, Mr. John Finlayson, may prove interesting. Thus he writes, upon commencing his work:—" Much need for such a mission—no less than five

families without a Bible, and only one having a New Testament." Other families not far distant were in the same sad predicament.

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He met with not a few who had need "to be put in remembrance of their sins, and their accountability to God." He spent a night in the township of ——. The master of the house where he lodged said "all our Bible and missionary work was for money." When the Colporteur stated the nature of his mission, he said he "did not know that, but all that work was not wanted." When asked if he read the Bible, he said, "By times." When asked if he did not keep family worship, he said "No;" and that such was not required of man, and there was no future place of punishment. He submitted, however, to the request of the Colporteur to have a portion of the Bible read, and prayer offered up; after which the argument was resumed, when at last, before retiring to bed, he was obliged to yield, admitting that he had not read much for a long time. The wife was much pleased at the defeat of her husband, and invited the Colporteur to return as soon as possible.

In July, he says, "I would find plenty of work in this county for a long time but for the want of money. I have met with many kind friends, and also with some of the worst of men, but God has sustained me by His Word and Spirit, so that I have found my strength according to my day of trouble and temptation."

In regard to the sick and dying, he observes, "I have visited some on a sick and dying bed, and comforted according to the different states of mind of the afflicted, and on leaving received many thanks."

He visited many Sabbath Schools, and "gave a word of counsel to teacher and taught, hoping the Lord would own and bless every effort for doing good."

In November he found eleven families destitute of the Scriptures. The general complaint throughout was want of a-

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money. The plenteous harvest will have placed many in more affluent circumstances; and it is to be hoped that they will evince their gratitude to God when the Colporteur next visits them, by furnishing each member of their families with a copy of the blessed Bible.

The sum of £5 stg. has been remitted to the British and Foreign Bible Society by the Ladies' Bible Association, and the Bath and Demorestville branches have voted, the former \$10:25, and the latter \$8:95, to the same.

In conclusion, let our hearts overflow with gratitude to the God of Providence for an abundant harvest, for increased and increasing prosperity in trade and commerce, for exemption from malignant diseases which have been permitted to devastate other lands; in short, for innumerable personal, domestic, social, and political advantages; and let these impel each one of us to devote ourselves with more singleness of purpose to the service of the Lord who bought us with His own blood, to pray for the prosperity of Zion with more ardor and perseverance, and to give to His cause with more liberality and cheerfulness.

Thus we may confidently hope for a revival of true religion amongst us, and that our souls shall prosper and be in health.
