Worried Mother Dies in Hospital; Poison Victim

Montreal, Nov. 22.—The misfortune of two of her four children, a little blind boy and a little crippled girl, are thought to have played upon the mind of Mrs. Hugh Glasgow of Rosemont, that she took poison. Mrs. Glasgow, 35 years of age, died yesterday in the Notre Dame Hospital.

IS MOST COMPLEX POLITICAL FIGHT Situation in Canada on Nomination Day.

Four Parties and Also Independents—Women Candidates Number Four—Ontario Looked On as Central Battle Ground.

(Canadian Press) Ottawa, Nov. 22.—Candidates for Canada's fourteenth parliament were nominated today in the 228 federal constituencies of the dominion, and the most complex political battle in the history of the dominion entered on its final phase. Three covered fights will be common in every province. In Ontario, where there will be four, five and in one case, even six candidates for one seat. Never in a federal election before have there been so many district parties in the field and apart from official party well in evidence. Quebec has around thirty of them; Ontario and the western provinces have some.

The election will also be the first with women candidates, but they will not be so numerous as was thought might be. Today's nomination campaign in Ontario, with its eighty-two seats in the central battle ground. In almost every riding, there will be a Conservative, a Liberal and a Progressive. The premier leader, will return to Ontario this week to renew their campaign. Hon. T. A. C. Crerar, leader of the Progressive party, will spend the time remaining before election day in Saskatchewan and Manitoba and U. E. O. campaigners, are carrying on the Ontario fight for the Progressive.

But whatever the result of the elections, the next house will be a house with many unusual features. Public life for many years, will be missing. Sir Robert Borden, who was prime minister from 1911 to July of last year, has retired. Sir George Foster, who was first elected to the House of Commons thirty-five years ago. Hon. N. W. Rowell, Hon. J. D. Beld, Hon. J. A. Calder, Hon. J. C. Sibley, Sir Thomas White, Hon. T. W. Crothers and Hon. R. W. Wignome, all of whom have occupied seats on the front government benches, were not numbered among today's candidates. Of their number, Messrs. Rowell and Crothers have been appointed Calder and Crothers to the upper house.

In party ranks too, there will be numerous changes. A. Mahabir prominent in the Progressive party since its formation, has left the federal arena. In the Ontario government, Sir Thomas Crothers, who made a special study of soldiers re-education, was chairman of the special public committee too, has left public life. Dr. Clark, orator of the Progressive movement, last session, has returned to the Liberal party.

Of cabinet ministers nominated today, six did not sit in the last parliament. Hon. R. B. Bennett, minister of justice; Hon. J. P. Norman, president of the privy council; Hon. Andre Fontaine, solicitor general; Hon. L. G. Beldy, postmaster general; Hon. Rodolphe Poirer, secretary of state and Hon. B. M. Baxter, minister of customs.

For William, Oct. 21.—The opening of what probably will be the most strenuous period of Mr. Meighen's election campaign was featured by two large meetings in Fort William and Port Arthur last night.

Quebec Fight. Montreal, Nov. 22.—With Liberal candidates chosen in every one of the sixty-five constituencies in Quebec, and with fifty-three Conservatives, twenty Progressives and twenty-nine Independents selected official indication is that every seat will be fought for. The Independents are mostly men with labor affiliations or Liberals.

The four French-Canadian who became ministers when Mr. Meighen's government was organized, running in Charlevoix-Montmorency: Hon. A. Poutoux, running in Terrebonne; Hon. J. P. Norman, secretary of state, candidate in Beauharnois, and Hon. Dr. L. P. Normand, president of the privy council, running in Three Rivers—have spent a very strenuous time since opening their campaigns. The conscription policy of the late government was the issue in their fights.

Hon. C. C. Balthazart, minister of marine, running in the St. Lawrence division of Montreal, has against him the only independent candidate to be nominated. Mrs. Roscoe Henderson, who is running on a Labor ticket. He also is being opposed by H. M. Mather, a Liberal nominee.

St. John-Albert Contest Three Cornered One

Six Candidates Nominated at Proceedings Before Sheriff Wilson Today—Some of the Names—News From Outside Points.

Nomination day finds six candidates in the field for the joint constituency of St. John-Albert. Those nominated were: Dr. W. P. Broderick and H. R. McLellan on the Liberal ticket; Hon. J. E. M. U. N. B. AFFAIRS ARE DISCUSSED

Deficit of \$5,550 in Finances of Year. The Senate Considers Some Changes—Chancellor to Visit West—The New Scale of Fees—Valuable St. John Gift.

(Special to The Times.) Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 22.—The semi-annual meeting of the U. N. B. opened this morning and will be continued this afternoon. There is a large attendance. The report of Dr. C. C. Jones, chancellor of the university was adopted.

A deficit of \$5,550, was reported by the finance committee in considering the accounts for the year. Changes in scholarships, on account of changed conditions, were considered. It was decided that the holder of the Beaverbrook Scholarship should not be eligible to hold a county scholarship. The question of writing the Carnegie Corporation of New York, with a view to having arrangements made for the pensioning of professors, was discussed. Mr. Sills, president of Bowdoin University, representing that corporation, was here recently completing a review of conditions in the maritime provinces as far as the institutions of higher education are concerned. It is probable that correspondence with the Carnegie Corporation will be opened.

Instructions issued for Dr. C. O. Jones, the chancellor, to visit the western provinces during the Christmas vacation for the purpose of getting in touch with the large number of U. N. B. graduates and former students resident there, with the view of getting in connection with the proposed war memorial building. It was reported that the repairs made to the university building during the year cost \$16,000.

The new scale of fees for the various courses at the university were considered. A petition of the under-graduates protesting against the new scale without notice, was considered. There also is a bill of the former rate of fees would hold good for the present term but beginning with the new year the higher scale would be in effect. It being considered that sufficient notice has been given.

A donation of a valuable piece of apparatus for the electrical engineering laboratory was accepted from Frank P. Vaughan of St. John. It is valued at \$1,000.

Chancellor Jones reported as the representative of the university to the centennial celebration of McGill, a communication from Sir Arthur Currie, principal of McGill, was read.

Students' delegations are being heard this afternoon. Increased grants for the University Monthly and other student activities are requested. There also is an objection to the existing system of operation of the university contingent Canadian Officers' Training Corps.

LLOYD R. DAVIDSON. The death of Lloyd R. Davidson, son of Mr. and Mrs. John B. Davidson of Hampton, occurred at his parents' home on Sunday. He was only seven years of age. The funeral was held yesterday afternoon from his parents' residence to St. Paul's Episcopal church. Rev. C. G. Lawrence conducted services.

Western Nominations. Calgary Nov. 22.—Hugh Gillis, Blairmore, was nominated yesterday as Liberal candidate for the Macleod federal constituency, and H. B. Feidhouse, Blairmore, for Battle River.

REPORTS CAUSE GLOOM IN CONSERVATIVE HEADQUARTERS

(Special to Times.) Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 22.—When the tale of nominations is completed today, it is expected that it will be found that some third party candidates will have retired, having obtained a fair idea as to their chances. Tory headquarters is rather gloom as a result of reports coming from everywhere. Liberals are still enthusiastic and confident. The farmers express complete confidence of being the second group.

C. H. FAIRWEATHER OF SUSSEX DEAD

(Special to Times.) Sussex, Nov. 22.—The community was shocked this morning by news of the death of Charles H. Fairweather, who had worked on a drug business here for forty years. He had attained the age of seventy, and is survived by his wife and one son, Major Charles Fairweather, who was overseas with the famous 26th Battalion, and who is now assistant manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia in Ottawa. The late Mr. Fairweather was himself much interested in military affairs and was for a time lieutenant-colonel of the 74th. Known to the whole citizenship of Sussex and surrounding country, he was highly esteemed by all, and was always ready to respond when the call for assistance in providing the well-stocked military stores of the local militia. He has, however, been appointed permanent secretary to the ministry of justice and head of the civil service in the northern parliament.

MORE RIOTING IN BOMBAY IS REPORTED

London, Nov. 22.—Owing to the differences in time, and telegraphic delays, the dates of happenings in connection with the Prince of Wales' tour of India are somewhat muddled in the advice reaching London. Official messages and some press despatches report everything as quiet in Bombay on Monday. A large number of rioters, however, says that rioting was renewed there on Monday, two parades being organized and one of these parades was directed by the late Mr. Ghandi, leader of the "non-co-operationists" apparently having a pacifying effect.

HELP CHINESE GOVERNMENT OVER CRISIS

Peking, Nov. 22.—The financial crisis which threatened the stability of the Chinese government, has been averted temporarily by military remittances for the provincial military government, and by the remittances of the provincial governments. Such heavy remittances from the provinces are unprecedented, and the action of the government is regarded as indicating the seriousness of the situation.

GERMAN VIEW OF THE FRENCH CONTENTION

Berlin, Nov. 22.—German official quarters continue complacently to regard the charges that Germany will ever again become a menace to world peace. Herr Woltf, minister of foreign affairs, has prescribed definitely the limits to which Germany is expected to disarm.

WAS ASHORE IN THE SAGUENAY

Quebec, Nov. 22.—The British steamer Gry. Capt. Isaac, bound from London to Chicoutimi to load with pulp, was ashore at St. Rivens Bay in the Saguenay River on Saturday. The vessel was refueled by the steamer Lord Strathcona of the Quebec Salvage and Wrecking Co. and came to this port yesterday afternoon under her own steam. A survey will be made here.

Rostons, too, registered a quarter point loss at 71.4, while Wayagamac, in keeping with the other issues, weakened a half at 41. The close, like the opening, was unaffected. Abitibi registered some weakness by dropping three-quarters of a point to 22.2. Laurentide made up its early point loss and closed at 27.2. Rostons remained unchanged, while Wayagamac recovered half of its drop to 41.4.

SAY JOE MOORE IS PROFESSIONAL

(Canadian Press) Chicago, Nov. 22.—The world's 182nd bulk line billiard championship play will end today when Willie Hoppe, world champion, and Young Jake Schaefer, meet in the final game. Roger Cronk, also will play this afternoon. Hoppe has won five matches and is the only player of the tournament who has not lost a match. His closest call came last night when Gochran beat him in the tenth inning, but Hoppe rallied, shot a 91 and made his necessary 400 points. Schaefer has played five games, losing one of them. A victory for Schaefer over Hoppe tonight would throw the two into a tie and necessitate an extra game to decide the title.

Declares Skating Champion Has Violated a Rule—Barred from Meet Last Night—Billiard Tournament—Late Sport.

New York, Nov. 22.—(Canadian Press)—Joe Moore, international sport skating champion, was no longer an amateur athlete today as a result of ruling of the middle Atlantic skating association, which refused to allow him to compete in a skating carnival here last night. The association charges that Moore violated the rule that forbids the use of amateur athletes' names for advertising purposes.

LAST JOINT IS IN POSITION

The last joint in the new thirty-six inch reinforced concrete water main from Manchester's corner to Spruce Lake was put into position by the contractors, the Canada Lock Joint Pipe Co., yesterday afternoon. This joint, which formed the union between two sections of the line, was found to be a few inches short of the required length and the joining was completed with a block of solid concrete. The pipe will be allowed to stand as it is until the end of the week when it will be filled with water to test it. If satisfactory, the service to West St. John will be turned in through this pipe.

C. N. R. STATEMENT

Toronto, Nov. 22.—President D. B. Hanna of the C. N. R., believes that a statement by a prominent official of the Canadian Order of Railway Carmen made last week, to the effect that the national railways had awarded big contracts for the building and repairing of cars outside their own shops, had reference to the announcement by the company regarding a great deal of work which was planned in an effort to relieve the unemployment situation. The railway said President Hanna had decided to increase their freight car repair force by 100 men at Montreal, River Du Loup, Que., and Toronto and instructions were sent out during October 19 to general managers of these shops to re-employ men laid off during the last six months.

MONTREAL HANDLED 106,310 TRAVELERS BY OCEAN ROUTE IN SEASON

Montreal, Nov. 22.—Approximate figures of passengers carried by the ocean liners to and from this port during the season now ending show that 106,310 voyagers have passed over the local wharves. While this total is considerably below that of last year, which was abnormal in many respects, it is up to the mark for this season. Of the total 65,218 landed at Montreal from British and continental ports, while 41,092 sailed from Montreal.

NINE HURT IN HOME BREW BLAST

Seven Firemen Trapped After Explosion of Distillate Injures Father and Baby.

New York, Nov. 22.—Richard Cardullo, 31 years old, is believed to have been drinking liquor in his apartment on the 10th floor of Madison street, when something which he was stirring on the stove exploded. He and his six-month-old son, Frank, were so badly burned they probably will die.

When firemen entered the apartment, they found a highly inflammable liquid which they said was "hooch", tipped over and the firemen were trapped. Seven were painfully burned. They confiscated many cans and jugs of the place, but left a still to be investigated by the Fire Marshal.

NOMINATION DAY.

CANDIDATES AT G.W.V.A. MEETING LAST EVENING

All Answer Several Formal Questions Submitted to Them

GET FINE RECEPTION AND GOOD HEARING

Spirited Criticism of Government's Action and Attitude in Claiming Credit For What It Has Done For the Returned Men - A Challenge to Government Standard Bearers to Hold Joint Meeting.

Hon. J. B. M. Baxter and Dr. Murray MacLaren, Conservative candidates, and Dr. W. P. Broderick and H. R. McLellan, Liberal candidates, in the constituencies of St. John last addressed a meeting of the local branch of the Great War Veterans Association in their hall last evening and answered a list of questions which had been submitted to them for the purpose of ascertaining their views on the returned soldier problem.

The candidates were given a splendid hearing and briefly explained their views with respect to the matters under discussion. Mr. McLellan made a spirited attack upon the government for the manner in which it has been taking credit for what it has done for the returned men, and severely condemned some of the government advertisements in this connection.

THE QUESTIONS

- 1. Will you support legislation which will grant pensions to ex-service men, completely compensating them for the loss of their earning power?
2. Are you in favor of granting pensions sufficient to enable the dependents of deceased soldiers to live according to the Canadian standard?
3. Are you in favor of setting aside an amount equal to one year's pay, which, on the death of the pensioner will be paid to those who have assumed responsibility for sickness and funeral expenses?
4. Are you in favor of giving preference to returned soldiers in appointments to the Civil Service, making such appointments permanent after six months' satisfactory service?
5. If no, 4 is answered in the affirmative, will you support legislation, no matter by whom introduced, to bring the Canadian National Railway and the Canadian Marine into the scope of the civil service act with respect to appointments?
6. Are you in favor of the appointment of a returned soldier to the civil service commission?
7. What is your attitude towards the reimbursement of all ex-service men and women, of the amount of the pay and allowances, lost by the fluctuation of currency while serving overseas?
8. Inasmuch as there are a number of men made cripples by reason of the war and their pensions are inadequate to support them, will you use your influence to have the Federal Government give immediate employment in the capacity of clerks, watchmen, etc?
9. Are you in favor of all ex-service men and women who may have received gratuity in lieu of pensions, being accorded the right of medical relief?
10. Are you in favor of the creation and maintenance by the Federal Government of homes for aged and infirm veterans?

The hall was well filled and standing room was taken by the returned men. It was taken by Dr. G. G. Corbett, acting president of the association. The chairman said that the meeting was held to get the candidates' views on the questions that had been presented them, and he asked that no personal matters be brought up, as the G. W. V. A. was able to deal with any grievances.

The first speaker was Dr. Murray MacLaren, C.M.G., who paid a tribute to the chairman, and said it was a pleasure to have him in the chair, as they had gone overseas together. The returned soldier subject was one he was more familiar with than some of the other matters he had been recently discussing. This question should be a non-party one, and this was the attitude he would maintain. The soldiers did not go overseas as Liberals or Conservatives, but as loyal Canadians.

have to be passed on by the committee.

He was not sure No. 3 was a good proposal. In the case of small pensions it would be less than now available. He would leave this question also to the committee.

To No. 4 he would answer "Yes." Answering No. 5, he said he did not know whether or not the railway and merchant marine could be brought under the civil service. He did not see why a preference for returned soldiers should not be shown, especially for clerical positions. There were specialized positions, such as captains and engineers that required trained men. This also should be considered by a committee. The speaker here mentioned the appointment of Brigadier-General Macdonnell to the senate and said he did not see why it should be called a gold-blooded act, the general was a distinguished officer.

He would answer "Yes" to No. 6, providing the opportunity offered. He could not answer No. 7 as he did not have the facts. The committee could bring in a report on it, and if right he would support it. To questions 8, 9 and 10 the speaker answered in the affirmative. He was also asked a question of unemployment. Something should be done about this. He quoted Hon. Mr. Meighen as saying that the government would take care of all unemployed returned men, and he mentioned what had been done in St. John last winter. There were two things the government could do: Encourage workshops, such as the one at the new station, that would suit the men.

Dr. MacLaren spoke of the medical office being removed from New Brunswick to Halifax and said that he and Hon. Mr. Baxter had taken steps to have it re-established in this province. He said that economy should not be practised in regard to returned men and the office ought to be re-established here.

Dr. Broderick. Dr. W. P. Broderick next addressed the meeting and paid a high tribute to returned men. Their devotion, patriotism and loyalty had placed the world, especially Canada, under a debt of obligation which would not be measured in dollars and cents. The resources of the country should be strained to the utmost in order to pay this debt. It was the duty of every Canadian to see that a fair measure of justice was extended to the returned soldier, whose pay had not been high and he had lost four or five years of valuable time. All this should be considered when the time came for settlement. He considered it a non-party question, but it often became a party one.

He then stated the attitude of the Liberal party as laid down by its platform, which included cash grants to soldiers, medical education, provision for insurance, pensions granted to maintain a liberal standard of living, soldiers to be paid while being trained for positions and later to be aided to positions. He quoted Hon. Mr. King as saying that all matters would be referred to a committee for investigation. He thought that all parties were willing to do the best they could for the returned men, but one might be ahead of the other in carrying out what was right.

He then stated that Hume Cronyn, chairman of the committee appointed to look into these matters, had recommended that a distinct preference be given to returned soldiers in regard to entrance into the public service. This recommendation had not been carried out, the speaker said.

He next took up the questions and in reply to No. 1 he said that it was fair that this consideration should be extended to returned men getting clerical or other positions they could fill. He replied to No. 2, the government should pay the difference. He replied in the affirmative to No. 3 and No. 4.

He would not say anything further as to what ought to be done. Speaking of the appointment of General Macdonnell, the government should be congratulated if the appointment was made as a returned soldier; if appointed as a member of any particular party when the appointment was open to question.

In conclusion, Dr. Broderick said that he was ever in a position to be of service to the returned men; they would always find him a friend.

 cussion in England against almshouses, and allowances should be given to enable the men to live in their own homes. The time would come when men without family would have to live in homes, but every effort should be exhausted to enable them to live in their own homes.
 The minister also touched on the insurance question and told of efforts to have the medical office re-established in New Brunswick. So far as the government was concerned it wanted to do what was right. All governments wanted to do this; they merely used different methods. It was the duty of members of the government and of parliament to see that the right thing was done.

H. R. McLellan.
 The next speaker was H. R. McLellan, who said that it was fit and proper that the candidates should answer the list of questions. Justice for the returned man was a practical question. It should appeal to the sense of justice of all. The representatives of the people could fill the patriotic position of that of representing the returned soldiers and in promoting legislation for the protection of their rights. He did not intend to detract from the efforts of the government, but it was fit becoming for the present government to advertise what it had done for returned soldiers. It was

fit becoming that any government should attempt to trade on the blood that was spilled in France. He produced an advertisement and read the line: "The Meiglen government and the returned soldier." He said that it should have been spelled "mean" instead of "Meiglen."
 He then proceeded to answer the questions. He answered "Yes" to No. 1 and would suggest an amendment to the act to make the character of the injury govern the amount of the pension, irrespective of rank. Some of the private and non-commissioned soldiers had earned more than some of the officers before the war.

To No. 2 he said that an average should be established.

He answered "Yes" to No. 3, and said that the dependents of those in the employ of the city who were incapacitated had always been granted two or three months pay. If the pension was small the government should see that it was sufficient to start with. Then there would be no trouble.

He answered "Yes" to No. 4, and said that he wanted no importations. Let local positions be given to local men.

He answered "Yes" to No. 5. He said that he was sick, sore and tired of committees of the house. It was absolutely necessary that some other means of quicker action be taken regarding the needs of returned men.

In reply to No. 6, he said "Sure," without any doubt.

He did not know much about No. 7. The Canadian, British and United States governments had decided that the standard of pay should be the pound at \$4.86 2-3, but the government had paid seven or eight cents for marks and changed the soldiers twelve cents. The government should not attempt to gamble in currency at the expense of the soldiers.

He answered No. 8 in the affirmative, and also No. 9.

No. 10 should not permit of any discussion. "Who wants to see returned soldiers go to municipal homes?" he asked. They were entitled to something better than charity. He hoped Canadians would be taxed and punished to death if they did not take care of the returned soldiers. He then asked what was intended to be done with the current fund. What right had the government to take this money that belonged to the soldiers?

A voice in the audience asked how about the questionnaire the government had sent out in regard to the fund. Mr. McLellan replied that the government would ask anything on the eve of an election. The chairman asked that there be no further interruptions.

The speaker said that he had some affidavits that he wished to produce but had been told to confine himself to the questions. He would be glad to discuss the affidavits and other questions at any time with the government candidates and invited them to meet him on the platform.

He said that if elected to parliament he would create some trouble before he got through, if there was any disposition to sidetrack the soldier issue. He would also find out why millions had been spent on the railroads. He would not be waiting for committees to report; there would be enough followers of Mr. King to do something themselves. If results were not secured he promised to resign. He was not going there to warm beds only.

In conclusion he said that anything he could do at any time, irrespective of politics, to further the interests of the returned soldier he would be pleased to do.

Hon. Mr. Baxter then made a short address. He said that no matter what government was in power business would have to be carried on as always and there would have to be committees to find out the facts. He had not come there for the purpose of playing politics or soliciting votes. They would make up their own minds.

Mr. McLellan, he said, had referred to the government improperly taking credit for what had been done for the returned men. He had always said that it was not a matter for the government to take special credit for. All it had a right to claim was that it had tried to do its duty. The advertisements had been published because some had misrepresented what the government had

done and said it had been neglectful of soldiers' interests. It was necessary to tell the country just what had been paid out and it was necessary for the government to defend itself.
 Mr. McLellan had said there was no need to have a board to inquire into conditions. Mr. Baxter referred to the platform quoted by Dr. Broderick. He replied to other matters brought up by Mr. McLellan and said that the business of the country must be sane and safely conducted. Remedies must be found and then applied.
 In conclusion he asked those present to use their sober judgment and common sense, and they would have to abide by the result.
 Dr. Corbet thanked the audience for the attention it had given to the speakers, and the meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem.




LABOR-FARMER TICKET FORMED

WHAT PAPERS SAY OF BRIAND SPEECH

Comment in London and in Paris on French Premier's Statement.

London, Nov. 22.—(Canadian Press Cable).—In commenting on Premier Briand's speech before the Washington conference, London morning newspapers follow the respective attitude which they have maintained toward France's policy in keeping a big army. There is one section of opinion which sees in France a militaristic, revengeful spirit, and another which is constantly distrustful of Germany and consequently regards France as justified in keeping prepared for a possible fresh attack. "The Times, always sceptical as to Germany's actual disarmament, is now 'With a chronic menace hanging over her, it would be criminal folly for France to relax her vigilance.' Referring to Secretary Hughes' remark about safety for the institutions of liberty, it says:—'The institutions of liberty will not be safe until Germany undergoes a change of heart.'"

Paris, Nov. 22.—"France speaks through the mouth of Briand," is the almost universal opinion in the Paris morning papers over the account of the French premier's address at the Washington conference. "The French press," says the London Morning Post, "is in a state of jubilation." "The only exception to this favorable opinion is taken by the communist newspaper L'Humanite, which uses the headline 'Briand Defends France's Militarism.'"

SYMPATHIZE WITH FRENCH POSITION

Representatives of the Great Powers Speak in Washington.
Addresses Following Statement by Premier Briand—The Anglo-Jap Alliance and Other Big Questions.

(Canadian Press.)
Washington, Nov. 22.—Following the address on the subject of land armaments, Secretary Hughes closed yesterday's session of the conference with a brief address in which he assured Premier Briand that France had the sympathy and support of the U. S. Mr. Hughes said:—
"We cannot go into a statement of detail now. Apparently the conference is so organized that this matter may have appropriate place in our discussion. We cannot foresee at the moment what practical measures may be available, but the expressions that we have heard from the representatives of the powers engaged in this conference make us confident that here will be generated that disposition which is essential to national security, the final assurance of security which grants and endures and endures material can never supply, that is, the disposition of a world conscious of its mutual interests, of their dependence, and upon the fact that if they desire, most ardently and wholly desire it, peace will be enduring among our peoples."
He concluded by suggesting that the addresses and the subject of land armaments be referred to the committee on armaments consisting of the plenipotentiary delegates of the five powers. The delegates manifestly assent, he adjourned the conference subject to the call of the chair.
Mr. Briand declared the old imperialistic party of Germany still was covertly teaching the world of war and hoping to turn to its advantage at the very door of France 7,000,000 of men trained in the use of arms, while beyond lay Bolshevik Russia with her millions straining in support whose final course no one could predict. He said it was quite certain the French government would further reduce service to one class and the republican French army would be reduced by half. But, if there should come a suggestion for further reduction, it would be impossible, without exposing France to the most serious danger.
Mr. Balfour, for Britain, followed in sympathetic vein as did Senator Schanzer for Italy and Maruy Kato for Japan. Balfour de Cartier, speaking for Belgium, said that the policy of that nation was to keep her land forces down to a level strictly consistent with the requirements of her national security. At this time he said, Belgium could not possibly proceed to further reduction of her armaments.
Mr. Balfour practically spoke for British support of France should the civilization of Europe again be threatened.

Passer was taken to a nearby drug store and Ambulance Surgeon Giebel of the Greenpoint Hospital responded to a call. He identified the liquid as muriatic acid and had Passer removed to the hospital.





Music and games were enjoyed by all and refreshments were served.

GLEN FALLS COMMUNITY CLUB

The tri-weekly meeting of the Glen Falls Community Club, held last evening at the home of the president, Mrs. G. S. Cuthbertson, developed somewhat into an indignation meeting regarding the condition of the road leading from Rothsay avenue to the Glen. It was decided that a committee consisting of George Simpson and John Whalen should interview the lieutenant-governor to ask his aid towards having the road repaired. A drawing took place in which the winners were as follows: York, Mr. Sullivan, city, ticket 776; runner, Mrs. Conroy, Glen Falls, ticket 71. Other matters of routine business were discussed.

REV. DR. WM. SPARLING

Rev. Dr. William Sparling, whose death occurred early on Monday morning, was a cousin of Lt.-Col. H. C. Sparling, D. C. Sparling, who leaves two daughters to mourn. During his long life of usefulness in the Methodist church in Canada, he had held some of the most important pulpits in the country, among them being St. James church, Montreal, Dominion church, Ottawa, Grace church, Winnipeg, Metropolitan church, Toronto Centenary church, Hamilton, and the First Methodist church, London. While preaching the evening sermon in the last named church on Sunday he was taken seriously ill and he died the next morning. He had suffered from kidney trouble for some time. On frequent occasions he had been appointed as president of conferences and was one of the leaders in the general conference of the church. He was one of the delegates to the Ecumenical Conference recently held in London, England.

COMMENTS ON THE NUMBER OF CRIMINAL CASES

Judge Chandler Sees "Craze for Liquor" in Crime of Today.

Opening Session of Circuit Court—A Sharp Word to Absentee Jurors—Paris Case First to be Taken Up.

There was a very lengthy criminal docket this morning at the opening of the November session of the Circuit court, causing His Honor Mr. Justice Chandler, who presided, to remark during his charge to the grand jury: "There is a very great deal of crime today and in almost every case it can be attributed to the craze for liquor." He explained to the grand jurors what their duties were in the several cases which he laid before them. He also commented upon the absence of eleven jurors and said that unless they could produce evidence which would be satisfactory as to their absence he would have to fine them. He had received several doctors' certificates, he said, but he had not read them even, for they were not evidence. "This kind of thing must be stopped," he said. Hon. J. P. Byrne, attorney general, was in court and will prosecute the Paris case, which will likely be the first taken up. It is understood that this is the only case which he will prosecute at this local attorney. Besides the case of the King vs. Paris, on a charge of murder, there are the following: The King vs. George Parker, two indictments, theft and receiving stolen goods. The King vs. Edward O'Brien, an action arising from the death of Albert Norris, the charge now against the prisoner being the stealing of a bottle of whiskey. The King vs. Joseph Neaves, theft of goods from the store of Wm. Jacobson. The King vs. John McShane and Leonard Craig, acting together in placing obstructions upon street railway tracks in Carleton. All of these cases were given to the grand jury this morning. The King vs. Campbell et al a charge of unlawful assembly was not placed with the grand jury this morning, but will be taken up later His Honor said. The non-jury cases will be heard in Chambers.
