**COMMISSION POWERS** 

Legislation Proposed to Congress / With Annual Report

Washington, Dec. 18—Legislation to extend the powers of the Federal Trade Commission so as to bring all individuals and partnerships operating in interstate commerce within its supervision is recommended in the commission's annual report made public today, outlining activities for the year ended June 30.

The commission also again urges enactment of legislation previously submitted to congress, designed to prevent the practice of commercial pribery.

During the year, the commission says, its work was chiefly devoted to assisting other departments and special war agencies of the government in matters concerned with the prosecution of the war. The report reviews many special activities and cost investigations prosecuted, an inquiry into control of enemy corporations, through which assistance was rendered to the alien property custodian and the intelligence sections of the army and navy.

### "DRY" CAMPAIGNER AND OFFICIAL IN B. C. HIMSELF ARRESTED

Vancouver, Dec. 12—Walter C. Find-lay, until yesterday commissoiner and administrator of prohibition legislation in British Columbia today was await-ing his arraignment in the provincial police court on a charge of having illegally imported liquor into the prov-ince. Findlay was arrested at Blaine, on the international boundary and brought back to Vancouver late last

brought back to Vancouver late last night.

"The arrest of Findlay," says the Vancouver Province today "is expected to be the forerunner of the exposure of some enormous dealings in liquor. A person closely in touch with the investigation, which the government has already made, stated this morning that further arrests probably will follow. It is said that the irregularities extend over many months and that instead of one carload, upon which the present charge is based there is knowledge which relates to eight or ten carloads."

The Province states that there is no suggestion of a shortage in the money returns at the government liquor stores, but, "it is stated that there will be a shortage of the liquor which the government is supposed to have had on hand." The same articles quotes a report, "in another quarter," that "probably fifty per cent. of the liquor said to have been irregularly imported was sent to Washington state, being smuggled across the international boundary line."

Findlay has retained counsel and today refused to make any statement. He took an active part in the campaign that voted British Columbia "dry."

And still another Shamrock, called Shamrock IV, was being sent across the Atlantic in the summer of 1914 for a contest for the cup when the European war broke out.

The America's cup was a trophy put up by Queen Victoria in 1851 for an International yacht race. It was won by the schooner yacht America, which at last accounts was lying in Boston.







Need of Industrial Research.

Of the need of heavy government expenditure for the benefit of industrial research he spoke very strongly and advocated special post graduate courses in research along industrial lines. The Atlantic fisheries, he said, could be raised in value from forty-six million dollars annually to one hundred million dollars if proper scientific methods were used. Here, too, the United States had proved the success of what he advocated and large industrial firms were themselves contributing a great proportion of their profits for research work. Germany, had she waited twenty-five years to begin the war, would then have been without a blow the commercial mistress of the world through successful scientific methods. The dominion and the provincial governments had not stinted agricultural research and industrial research would be equally profitable.

Regarding the relations of employers and employees, he said that the spirit of collaboration and good-fellowship was worth all the conciliation machinery invented.
