A diagram prepared by the London liners were loading. Graphic to illustrate Austria's problem



CARELESSNESS CAUSES MANY FOREST FIRES

A Large Percentage of Forest Destruc-tion Caused by Campers and Sports-

(Conservation. An investigation oy the New York Conservation Commission as to the orig-in of forest fires in the Adirondacks shows that fully 85 per cent. of the fires which occurred durmg 1918 were pre-ventable. If smokers had not carelessly thrown burning cigars or tobacco upon the dry vegetation, one-third of these fires would not have occurred. If fisher-men had been more careful with their fires and tobacco, nearly one-fifth of these fires would not have occurred. Of the 688 fires reported, only 78, or 11.8 per cent. were caused by locomotives, while nearly 10 per cent were reported as being due to the carelssnss of camp-ers.—C. L
