



Pueblo, Colo., June 27—J. H. Trimble, one of the chief stockmen of Texas, is at the head of an association which purposes to transport camels from the oriental deserts to those of New Mexico, Arizona and California, and the semi-arid wastes of Texas. The association purposes to import 200 camels and place them on a ranch on the Rio Grande about 150 miles south of Cape Verde.
