Germain and Union Street Work Is Arranged

GRANITE INSTEAD OF BRICKS

Strike Ties up Supply of Vitrified Brick and Granite Blocks Will Be Used on North Side of King Square—The Contracts and The Estimates

Contracts for laying permanent pavements were awarded at a special meeting of the common council this morning. The contract for foundations, curbs, etc., in Germain street and Union street were awarded to Ernest Ryerse and A. R. C. Clark & Sons, respectively.

The mayor announced that the meeting had been called to deal with pavements for Union and Germain streets. The foundation work has been progressing so rapidly that it is necessary to deal with the contracts for granite pavements in order to save delay.

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A SENSATIONAL ENGLISH TRIAL

HOPE TO AVERT A GREAT RAILWAY STRIKE

Meditation Act Amendment Is Rushed Through the U. S. Senate

Washington, June 27.—With a view to averting the threatened strike of 30,000 railway employes east of Chicago, the senate yesterday rushed through the passage of amendment to the Erdman mediation act sought by the railways and railway employes as affording suitable machinery for the settlement of their pending disagreements.

The amendments enlarge the board of arbitration provided under the Erdman act, from three to six. The railways have declined to submit the present disputes to a board composed of only three members.

London, June 27.—Hon. Winston Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, has bowed out the critics who have tried to fix on him the charge of entering into a secret understanding with the admiralty in October, 1911, he had spent 192 days absent in inspecting naval ports and bases in the United Kingdom and the Mediterranean.

London, June 27.—Claude Graham White, his first voyage journey from Paris to London yesterday. He started from the French capital 5.30 of the Seine. He arrived at Havre at 9.30 and at Boulogne at 10.30. He crossed the channel and reached Dover at one o'clock in the afternoon. Thence he followed the Thames from its mouth and landed at Putney at 7.15 last evening.

London, June 27.—According to the usually well-informed Birmingham Post's London correspondent, impending cabinet changes include, besides the promotion of Sir Rufus Isaacs, to lord chief justice, the transfer of Postmaster General Samuel to the presidency of the board of trade, with John Burns taking the postmaster generalship, and Solicitor-General Sir John Simon or C. F. G. Masterman becoming president of the local government board.

Murray Scott Case Is a Cause Celebre

LETTERS FIGURE IN IT

London, June 27.—Council resumed yesterday the opening statements in the suit contesting the will of Sir John Murray Scott, who bequeathed about \$5,000,000 to Lady Sackville. It is becoming a cause celebre of the first order. Numerous letters from Scott to Lady Sackville were read in them he addressed her as "Dear Old Joe," and they were written in familiar style. In one he wrote:

"I got a rather short letter from you today. I hope you are not going to be a naughty girl. I am very glad you are coming next Saturday. Then he bent down to plead with her to forgive Sir Benjamin Franklin, Scott's doctor, for his intimate friend, for refusing to allow her to see him (Scott), when he was seriously ill. But Lady Sackville was inexorable and insisted that Franklin must leave the house before she would enter it.

Two cupsful of cream sauce, 1 can of salmon picked fine, 3 tablespoons Worcester sauce, the juice of a lemon, salt and pepper to taste. Fill a baking dish, cover the top with buttered crumbs and brown in a hot oven.

CHERRY BOUNCE.
Mash and bruise 4 pounds of wild cherries in such a manner that the stones will be broken and the contents bruised. Over the cherries pour 5 quarts of rum. Let them stand in a stone jar two weeks, stirring daily. Press the fruit to remove all the liquid. To this add 5 1-2 quarts of water in which 2 1-2 pounds of sugar has been dissolved. Filter and bottle.

Action of Minister of Railways in Ordering Removal of Chelmsford Section of Canada Eastern Bitterly Resented

Chatham, N. B., June 26—That the interview with the minister of railways on Tuesday and the various protests that have gone to Ottawa on behalf of the Chelmsford section of the Canada Eastern railway have not been without effect, it is all too apparent today, for the men are now at work preparing to tear up the rails on the Chelmsford side, and it is said to be the intention of the railway management to take these up from the Blackville bridge down to Maloney's Sliding, about three miles from Chatham Junction.

This action following so closely upon the minister's visit and the protest addressed to him on that occasion and during the past winter have greatly stirred the people along the route and the loss of the railway is made even more bitter by reason of the circumstances attending it. The government's total disregard of their rights and necessities has aroused deep resentment and the people find it hard to believe that their line, that they have used for nearly thirty years, is actually a thing of the past.

On Wednesday work will start at Blackville received orders to start the next day to work on the Chelmsford side, tearing up the rails from the condemned Blackville bridge and working down to Maloney's Sliding. The train went up the line yesterday and is at present taking up the ties that have been placed along the line to repair it and it is expected that the tearing up of the rails will begin as soon as this work is completed.

C. B. BROWN, NEW CHIEF ENGINEER

C. P. R. Man Given Responsible Position on Government Railway, Formerly Stationed at St. John—His Career

Montreal, June 26—The appointment is announced of Collingwood B. Brown to the position of chief engineer of the government railways in Canada.

Since graduating in civil engineering at Cornell, fourteen years ago, Mr. Brown has been in the employ of the Canadian Pacific railway, filling various engineering positions from rodman to principal assistant engineer, a post to which he was appointed two years ago, and which he now resigns to become head of the government railways engineering department.

Mr. Brown is very well known both in eastern and western Canada, having been in turn resident engineer at London (Ont.); assistant divisional engineer at Calgary; division engineer at St. John (N. B.) and Montreal, before becoming chief assistant of the C. P. R.

Although a graduate of an American college, Mr. Brown is a Canadian. He was born at Kingston (Ont.) thirty-six years ago, and is thus a comparatively young man. Later he resided with his parents at Oshawa and Ithaca, where he took his college course.

The management of the Intercolonial and Prince Edward Island railways feel they have secured a particularly able and experienced man in the new chief engineer, who will take up his residence at Montreal on July 1.

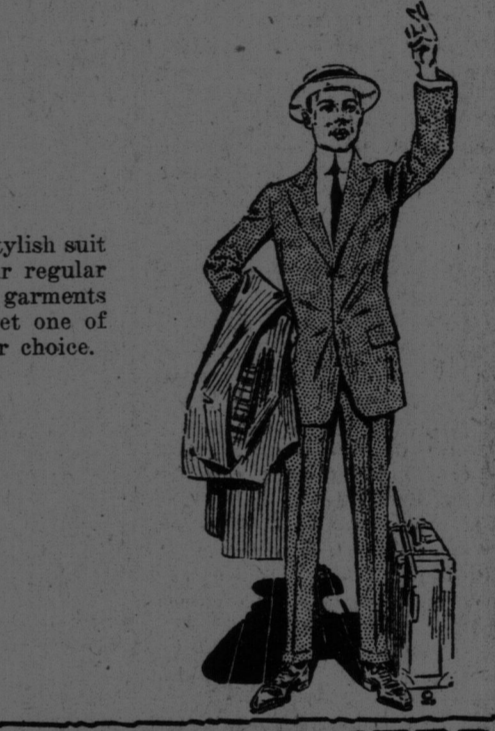

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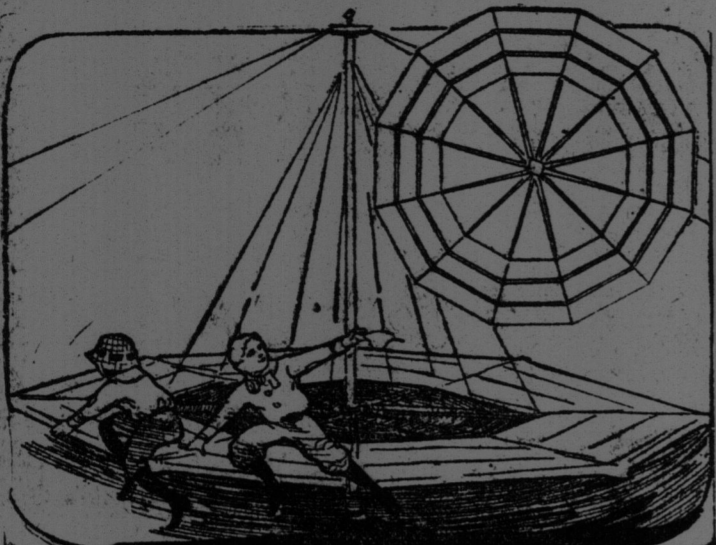
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A MERRY-GO-ROUND IN EVERY YARD

It Is Easy to Make and is Insurance Against the Kiddies Straying Onto the Streets



There isn't anything like a merry-go-round to amuse the kiddies in the summer, and the house that has one on its front lawn is the haven for all the youngsters in the neighborhood. Most merry-go-rounds are expensive affairs and the average citizen cannot afford to install one in his household. They are great things to keep the children off the streets and out of danger of the horses and automobiles, and for this reason, perhaps, the investment would pay for itself.

It is not necessary to spend a lot of money for a merry-go-round that is at once a safe thing for the children to play with and a safety device in that it keeps them at home. A piece of 6 x 6 lumber 12 ft. long forms the centre post. Sink bolts 8-4 in. in diameter in each end of this post so that about 2 in. of the bolt protrudes from each end. Short pieces of wood are nailed to the post 2 ft. from the end that is to be the bottom. These are to form the hub for the spokes that are to hold the platform. The spokes are made from 12 pieces of 2x4 material 12 ft. long.

The centre pole is set in a heavy block of wood that has been sunk in the ground and bored to receive the end of the iron bolt. A washer of iron the diameter of the pole should be placed on this block so that the wood of the pole will not bear on the wood block. On top of the pole there should be placed an iron wheel or another heavy washer of iron and from this should be run at least six heavy guy wires or cables that are 3/8 in. long and fastened securely to stout stakes driven in the ground.

Twelve hooks are placed at equal distances about the centre pole about 1 ft. from the top and heavy wires or cables are run from each of these hooks to each of the spokes and fastened to the spokes about 2 ft. from the outer end. The platform is nailed to the spokes which are spaced so that there are equal spaces between them. The boards used for this purpose cover about 2 ft. of the outer part of the wheel.

All that is now necessary is for a couple of children to sit on the platform and give it a push. A little axle grease placed on the two washers will make the merry-go-round easy to operate.

ENGLISH MILL THAT ONCE WAS THE AMERICAN FRIGATE "CHESAPEAKE"

Timbers of the Famous Battleship Captured by the Shannon Just a Hundred Years Ago Were Used to Build a Water Mill in English Village of Wickham—"Chesapeake Mill" is Visited Yearly by Tourists

(Times Special Correspondence)
London, June 17—One hundred years ago the British frigate Shannon met the American frigate "Chesapeake" off Boston and captured her after one of the greatest sea-fights in naval history. Seven years later the Chesapeake was a water mill peacefully grinding out corn in the slumberous Hampshire village of Wickham, and there today she still stands. "One of the wonders which have been beaten into ploughshares," an English writer called her the other day.

The visitor finds Wickham a big peaceful square surrounded on three sides by quaint, low shops and inns and dignified houses with charming Georgian fronts, and with a trimming of cobbled pavements round it. Wickham is in the softly undulating Meon valley, the home of water mills, and Chesapeake mill is a water mill. The visitor expects to see a picturesque timber structure, and is disappointed. Chesapeake mill presents a flat stone face to the road. The only hint of romance lies in words carved on to one of its stones, "Prior Built 1820," for it was Mr. Prior who bought the Chesapeake from the admiralty as old timber, paying \$2,600 for her. The Admiralty paid something like \$107,000 for the Chesapeake.

The visitor, taken inside, sees a great spacious floor, running back into the shadows. Above him are huge beams. These beams were once the Chesapeake. In order to remove any chance of septicism he is shown how every beam is beaded. Millers did not go to the expense of beading their beams when building their mills. That is more convincing even than the shot holes; not that anyone ever doubted that the shot holes were caused by the Shannon's marksmen, for people do not amuse themselves usually by boring through beams, some of them fourteen inches deep by more than a foot broad, and these beams are bored clean through. A walking stick can pierce them.

They are a lasting memorial to the close range at which the historic fight was fought. Smaller beams, beaded in the same way, cross the great ones, and it is the same above. The beams are of fir, probably Douglas fir from the forests of Oregon. Not so very long ago two portions of one of these beams were sent

WILL PAY \$175,000 IN PRIZES FOR LIVE STOCK

Panama-Pacific Horse Race Prizes Will Total \$225,000

San Francisco, June 27—Great prizes and valuable trophies are to be offered for prize winning live stock at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition. The exposition management has set aside \$175,000 as prize money for the live stock division alone and besides this there will be many special funds and trophies. The sum of \$225,000 will be devoted to harness races.

An innovation which has already attracted the attention of breeders all over the world is that live stock will be on display throughout the period of the exposition, which lasts for ten consecutive months, from February to December, 1915. This is a decidedly new venture in universal exhibitions and a record display is assured in the live stock division. Prize winning stock from all parts of the world will be shown.

Two race meetings will be held at the exposition during the year, one in the spring and one in the autumn. The \$225,000 is offered under the auspices of the Pacific Coast Trotting Horse Breeders' Association. The races will be international in character and will be held on a mile race track which is now being constructed.

FLEA-BEETLES AND THEIR CONTROL

The Division of Entomology of the Experimental Farms Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, has recently issued Entomological Circular No. 2, by Mr. Arthur Giblin, Chief Assistant Entomologist, on "Flea-Beetles and Their Control."

The flea-beetles are an important group of insects which attack the foliage of many plants. They are particularly destructive to the leaves of several kinds of vegetable crops, such as turnips, potatoes, tomatoes, radishes, etc. The chief injury is effected in spring and

early summer when the plants are visited by large numbers of the beetles. Numerous small holes are eaten into and through the leaves, in fact, some of the species completely defoliate certain plants. Owing to their jumping habit, these insects were given the popular name of flea-beetles. In size they range from one-twentieth to one-quarter of an inch. In Canada there are five species which are of considerable economic importance, and these are discussed and figured. In addition, descriptions are given of eight other species which occasionally appear in destructive number. A chapter on "Methods of Control" gives full particulars as to remedies which have been found most successful in the control of these insects.

The president was given the power to enforce countervailing tariff rates on any nation which refused to deal with the United States on a reciprocity tariff basis.

This provision would take the place of the present maximum clause in the Payne-Aldrich tariff law but would give a much broader power as it could be employed against countries which employ only maximum and minimum tariff rates against the United States.

A former policeman of Wilhelmshaven named Jaehnicke was convicted yesterday in an imperial supreme court of Germany on a charge of espionage and was sentenced to six years imprisonment. Jaehnicke with two other police men and a naval warrant officer had sold a navy signal book to England or France.

A large number of volunteers from Moncton and Shediac yesterday went to work on the highway between Moncton and Shediac and put it in the best of condition it has been in for a long time. The mix-up reported among the infantry at Sussex turned out to have been merely a practical joke perpetrated by some young men of the town. Rich Post Deposits According to Wm. McIntosh, curator of the Natural History Society, fuel sufficient to supply the city and the lower part of the province for at least 200 years to come is available within twenty miles of this city, and can be distributed at an extremely moderate cost, not exceeding \$2 per ton. Expensive is the value of the extensive bogs of rich dense peat stretching for miles around the city, particularly in the vicinity of Spruce Lake and or Rockwood Park, says Mr. McIntosh. The quality of the peat is far better, he says, making it quite as adaptable to use as fuel, than that found in any other part of the world. He believes there is a great opportunity to open up a new industry—the manufacture of peat briquettes.

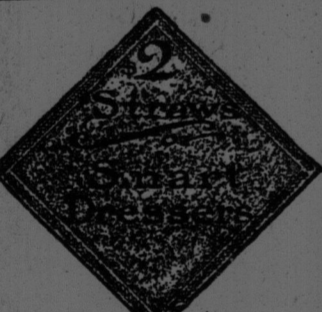

EXPRESS STEAMER ON RIVER NEEDED. A Fine Chance to Build up Summer Colonies - Busy City Man Wants It. The lack of adequate transportation facilities on the portion of the St. John river nearest to the city is a matter of keen regret on the part of many who would like to have summer homes along the river but whose choice is limited to places situated on the railway line. The river offers many choice locations for suburban resorts but heads of families who have to be at their places of business at a reasonable hour in the morning and who cannot get away early in the afternoon find no provision for them in the steamer arrangements.
