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# ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRADE.

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The annual general meeting of the members of the Quebec Board of Trade was held in the Exchange Reading Room, Arthur street, at noon, yesterday.

The chair having been taken by Wm. Walker, junior, Esq., Vice-President, and the meeting called to order, the Chairman proceeded to read the following

## ANNUAL REPORT.

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In compliance with the terms of a resolution adopted at the last annual general meeting of the Board affirming the necessity for the construction of a graving dock at this port, for the repair of ships, the Council transmitted to the Harbor Commissioners a letter recommending the subject to the attention of that body. They regret, however, to have to state that no action has been taken by the Commissioners in furtherance of the suggestion, and that no progress has been made towards providing an early extension of wharf accommodation along the river front. Meantime, the yearly increasing trade of the port more than ever requires extended facilities for dockage and wharfage. A communication setting forth the difficulties to which vessels navigating the River St. Charles are exposed by reason of the existence of large boulders and other obstructions in the channel was also forwarded to the Commissioners.

The question of a classification of waney board timber has been made the subject of earnest and careful consideration. Practical men, well acquainted with the requirements of the trade, have been consulted and the opinions as well of shippers as of producers of the article have been obtained. The report of a committee specially appointed in relation to the question is on the table for reference. In connection with this subject, the Board is indebted to Mr. Quinn, the Supervisor of Cullers, for a box containing specimens of wood, the produce of the Province, and for one of his models illustrative of the system of measurement of waney timber.

## TRADE AND COMMERCE OF

Petitions have been transmitted to Her Majesty the Queen, to His Excellency the Governor General, and to the Legislature, praying that in the event of alterations being effected in the Reciprocity Treaty with the United States, provision may be made for the admission of British shipping to the American Registry, and to a participation in the coasting trade of the United States. Copies of the petition have been forwarded to the various Boards of Trade in Canada and in the Lower Provinces, as well as to the Chambers of Commerce of the leading ports in Great Britain and Ireland.

The extension by the French Government, to Canadian built ships, of the privileges enjoyed by ships of British build, will no doubt prove advantageous to the ship-building interests of this port. The number of vessels now building here is 25, measuring 21,000 tons. The number on the stocks last year at the same date was 18 measuring 18,000 tons, shewing an increase in favor of this year of seven ships and 3,000 tons,

The Council received from several of the leading associations of underwriters in Great Britain, memorials urging the repeal or amendment of the "Pilots' Act." Copies of these memorials have already been laid before you at a quarterly meeting, the originals having been transmitted to the Government at the request of the petitioners. With a view to its improvement the Act has been carefully examined by a special committee and their report has, with some trifling exceptions, been concurred in by the Council.

No further communication has been received from the authorities in regard to the suggestion of the Board, that official enquiry should be made into the causes of accidents to shipping navigating the St. Lawrence. The Council consider the suggestion a most important one and would recommend their successors again to press the matter upon the attention of the Government.

Owing to the energetic steps taken by Mr. Maguire, Inspector and Superintendent of Police, in enforcing the laws relating to the desertion of seamen, but few complaints on the subject have been made during the past year. With some slight amendments the law will so far strengthen his hands as to enable him to reduce very materially any remaining causes of complaint on this head, but in the opinion of the Council the true remedy lies in engaging seamen for the passage out only.

To an application for the approval by the Council of a proposal to incorporate the ship-laborers of this city, under the name of the "Ship Laborers' Benevolent Society," a reply was returned that the Board was not prepared to support the measure; such organizations generally tending to interfere with the freedom of trade and the value of labor. A petition for an act has been presented to the Legislature and it will be for the Council to take steps to prevent a bill being passed.

The Council regret exceedingly to have to remark that notwithstanding the yearly recurring complaints of the unsatisfactory manner in which the ferry service between this city and Point Levi is conducted, there is no immediate prospect of improvement. It was supposed that the city Corporation had taken measures to remedy the evil, but, from recent reports of the proceedings of that body, it would appear that owing to some miunder-

standing there is to be no present or material change in the system--mean-time the commerce of the city suffers very considerably.

A copy of a resolution of the Board, recommending that Leadenhall street, connecting St. Peter street with the Custom House should be repaired, was transmitted to the city Council. It is hoped that this much needed improvement will be proceeded with as soon as the season will admit.

Some correspondence passed with the Post Office authorities on the subject of mail communication Westward and Southward. Every disposition was shown to meet the views of the council, and some alterations in the hours of arrival of the mail trains were ordered, but, owing to causes beyond the control of the department, these alterations were not productive of any improvement.

No action appears to have been taken by the authorities in relation to the substitution of Provincial coinage for the British silver still in circulation, though it is understood that a supply of the new bronze coins is now ready to be issued, when it is hoped that some measures will be adopted for the speedy withdrawal of the copper coins now in use.

The Council regret to have to state that the evils attending the existing mode of advertising sheriff's sales of moveables, respecting which application was made to the government last year, have not been in any way modified.

During the year the vacancy created in the office of Inspector of Beef and Pork by the death of the late Inspector was filled up by the appointment of Mr. David Nolan.

Mr. John Fraser was appointed Inspector of Butter.

The Council are indebted to Mr. Dunscomb, collector of customs at this port, for returns of the trade between this city and the free port of Gaspé during the past year.

These returns, together with statements showing the quantity of Beef and Pork and of Ashes and Flour inspected here during the year are on the table for reference, as are also the minute books and correspondence of the year.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE

ON THE

## CLASSIFICATION OF WANNEY BOARD TIMBER,

AS ADOPTED BY THE COUNCIL:—

No stick to be less than (12) twelve feet long and sixteen (16) inches Calliper.—The Timber to be well hewn and butted.

*Taper.*—Not to exceed one inch in lengths of twenty feet and in proportion for longer or shorter lengths.

*Bend or Twist.*—Not to exceed two inches in lengths of twenty feet and in proportion for longer or shorter lengths.

*Wane.*—To be as per Mr. John Quinn's printed scale of date 26 November 1859.

No stick to have less than fourteen inches flat surface.—The heart to be shown on each of the four sides of the stick three fourths of its length.

The Timber to be sound, straight grained, free from rotten and black knots, gum seams, wormholes, rings, or cross shakes—a small straight shake not objectionable.—Six Knots of one and a half inch equally divided on the four sides or ten of half the size may be allowed.

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## TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

The Petition of the Corporation of Quebec  
Board of Trade humbly sheweth,—

That your Petitioners have reason to believe that during the present Session of the Legislature of the United States of America, efforts will be made to modify and extend the terms of the Treaty concluded between the government of that country and your Majesty, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and known as the "Reciprocity Treaty;" under the provisions of which, various articles, the growth and produce of the British North American Provinces, and of the United States respectively, are made interchangeable between the two countries, free of duties.

That the Reciprocity Treaty confers upon the people of the United States of America many privileges, and amongst others, that of taking and curing fish within the limits of the waters, and on the coasts of the River and Gulf of St. Lawrence; in return for which, your Majesty's British American subjects receive no adequate equivalent.

That, in addition, the navigation act passed by your Majesty's Imperial Parliament in the same year, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, grants to American shipping the right of admission to British registry, and to a free participation in the coasting trade of the Empire; whilst the people of the United States grant no such privileges to British shipping.

Your Petitioners humbly conceive that in part return for the many advantages secured to the people of the United States of America, under the provisions of the Reciprocity Treaty, and of the Navigation Act, your Majesty's British American subjects have a right to demand from the Government of the United States the admission of their shipping to American registry, and to a free participation in the coasting trade of the United States.

Wherefore, your petitioners humbly pray, that in the event of alterations being effected in the Reciprocity Treaty, your Majesty will be graciously pleased to command that provision be made accordingly.

And, as in duty bound, your Petitioners will ever pray.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE  
ON THE  
**PILOTS ACT;**  
AS AMENDED BY THE COUNCIL.

" 1ST.—The number of Branch Pilots to be not less than two hundred and twenty five.

" 2ND.—Fifty pilot apprentices to be kept constantly on board the Pilot Schooners, acting as sailors.—The Superintendent of pilots to ascertain monthly that such has been done and to report to the Trinity House.—A fine of forty dollars per schooner to be imposed on the Corporation for each month during which such schooner shall have been short of the full complement of apprentices.

" 3RD.—Matane River opposite Point des Monts to be constituted the eastern most pilot station in lieu of Bic.

" 4TH.—The rates of pilotage to be—Inward from Matane 2ls. per foot outwards to the same point 17s.—Intermediate points same as at present.

" A deduction of one third to be made on all Vessels towing through the Traverse down-wards from or up-wards to Quebec.

" 5TH.—The Directors to be empowered to impose fines for infraction of By-laws by pilots at any point within the limits of pilot water.

" 6TH.—No Vessels under 150 Tons register belonging to the British North American Provinces to be obliged to employ a pilot.

" 7TH.—The corporation to be held liable to make good, damages which may have been sustained by any ship through the fault of any pilot.

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

N. B.—Parties in England will bear in mind that timber sold in the Raft subjects the purchaser to great expense in dressing, butting, and at times heavy loss for culs—if sold in shipping order, the expense of shipping only to be added.

## REMARKS:

In issuing our Annual Circular, at the present critical moment of political excitement, we are fairly at a loss to give any advice to our numerous friends on the Ottawa and St. Lawrence, as to the prospects of the coming season, for the stock in market ceases to be any criterion, when it is considered how greatly operations in the woods will be interrupted if war takes place, and what may be its effect on freights to Europe in Spring.

The past season has been on the whole very unremunerative to both manufacturer and exporter, for the American troubles have caused a depressing influence in the English markets on all our exports, although latterly the tone there has improved owing to the fall shipments being light.

The quantity of wany timber brought down has been excessive and the stock is very large, but much of it is inferior and does not deserve the name of board wood.

The accompanying tables for which we are indebted to our friends, Messrs. Wood, Petry, Poitras, & Co., will show the comparative Stock, Supply, and Expert, with reference to former years. Our Supervisor of Cutters, Mr. Quinn, was sent by the Provincial Government to Great Britain and France. In the former the system or rather want of system in the measurement of timber is commented on by him with great force, and it would be most desirable if the Imperial Government would determine on some uniform mode to be adopted in all its ports. In France and on the continent generally, Mr. Quinn has made known the value of our timber and the exports this summer are a convincing proof his mission has been a beneficial one. To all interested in the trade, this pamphlet will well repay a perusal.

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## (ANNUAL CIRCULAR.)

Quebec, 20th December, 1861.

At the close of another export year, we beg to forward you our annual returns of the Supply, Export and Stock of timber, with prices current, &c., at this port, for the year ending the 1st December, inst.

**WHITE PINE.**—Stocks on hand of this article are, of square 7,971,030 and waney, 6,346,602 feet, and now that this latter description of timber has risen into importance as an article of export, we would recommend shippers for another season, to enter it separately in their clearances, as without this, it will be impossible to keep any separate statistics on hand regarding this quality of wood. The supply of White Pine was late in coming forward in the spring, owing to the excess of water in the streams, but this circumstance did not add a corresponding buoyancy to our market from the fact of Shippers having been well supplied from stocks wintering: With such a stock of waney board timber on hand we might almost deem it superfluous to recommend curtailment in the supply of this wood for another season, but we are glad to find that there is a prospect of very little being brought forward, and what has been shipped from our market this season, we may say without fear of contradiction excels in both size and quality what has been hitherto exported to Great Britain from any quarter of the globe. The stock wintering of square is below an average one, and but a moderately small quantity remains to winter in first hands. We would recommend Producers next season to continue to pay particular attention both in the *selection* of the *standing timber* and to *superior manufacture* as attention to these points is absolutely indispensable, to protect the shipper from losses by Culls, and dressing into shipping order, (which is not unfrequently a serious item), and is essentially necessary to maintain the character of this article. The prospects for another season for this, (in common with our other products), seems to depend as much upon what turn political events may take, as upon the usual criterion of supply and demand.

**RED PINE.**—The stock wintering is 2,707,199, against 2,649,157, last year, and although this article has been dull of sale throughout the whole season, it has been pretty well worked off, and is now almost all in second hands. The stock does not warrant manufacture except on a limited scale, and we would recommend producers to bring nothing under 40 feet average and of prime manufacture.

**HARDWOODS.—OAK AND ELM.**—The stock on hand of Oak is 958,627 against 1,348,477 feet last year, and Elm 793,761 against 1,068,854. The supply of Oak although exceeding that of last year, has been less than an average one, and good and superior lots have been placed at fair prices, an improvement in the manufacture is perceptible over previous years. Elm after being dull most of the season experienced a revival towards the close and the stock being sensibly reduced, we may reasonably look forward to a fair demand next spring; the supply has been of good quality, and as a whole, we may say, excels that of former years.

**STAVES**—The stocks of Standard and Puncheon are, the former M. 984 and the latter M. 1226, being a considerable reduction from last year; our markets have not experienced any great activity, notwithstanding a considerable quantity having been diverted to the Montreal market, but in view of only a moderate production during the ensuing winter, fair prospects seem to open themselves for the spring.

**DEALS.**—The almost total cessation of trade in sawn lumber between Canada and the United States, although it may be only temporary, has contributed unexpectedly to our supply this year; and a corresponding effect has been produced in our market; the stocks have however not increased as much as was at first thought, being of Pine 1,577,469 standard, and Spruce 569,210 standard, and from the fact of the attention of parties being now diverted from the production of saw logs until a more permanently satisfactory state of things may be re-established with our neighbors, no more than an average supply may be expected next season. A portion of the shipment in broad deals has been decidedly superior to any hitherto exported; Spruce has been dull of sale throughout.

**FREIGHTS**—Opened at 30s. to Liverpool, and £4 15s. for London, for deals, and continued much the same until midsummer, when a downward tendency set in, and at the close 27s. 6d. was paid to Liverpool, 28s. to Greenock, and £4 7s. 6d. for deals to London.

## REMARKS.

STOCKS AND SHARES.—For the past year have been subjected to greater fluctuations than in previous years, owing to the threatening aspect of affairs

between the Governments of Great Britain and the United States, our local securities however did not suffer at all in proportion to those of Montreal, nor yet to those of Western Canada, owing most probably to our more secure position, had hostilities unfortunately, broken out between the two countries ; as also to the fact that a smaller amount of our stock is held in Europe, the reaction has fully set in and is greater than was anticipated, for not alone have the former holders in most instances re-invested, but others in England are seeking Canadian securities to a large amount.

**MONEY.**—Is consequently very plentiful, a fact which very seriously contradicts the assertion of the advocates of the old Usury Laws "that the enhanced rate of interest has brought no money into the country," the complaint from one end of Canada to the other being a scarcity of satisfactory investments, and on first class security a person of good standing or credit, could readily obtain what might be required @ 7 p. ct., and even at 6 p. ct. p. an. in certain cases ; further, there is but little doubt that the establishment of private Bankers would affect the Bank rate of discount on commercial paper, the same here as it does in England, causing a fluctuation incident upon a greater or less money supply.

**LOCAL SECURITIES.**—Of those which show the most marked advance are our Quebec Bank Stock, selling in former years @ 6 @ 7 p. c. discount, now saleable at 6 @ 7 p. c. prem., the Quebec Fire Assurance Company, and our City Corporation Bonds. The former on account of its having recovered by a steady prosperity the large losses suffered by the Great Fires of 1845, and the latter by a more judicious system of financial management than formerly existed.

**EXCHANGE ON LONDON.**—The rate of private ruled very low until some of our merchants commenced importing Gold, when the Banks advanced their buying rate ; and further, a considerable rise took place, owing to the suspension of specie payments by the Banks of the United States. The present rates are materially influenced by the large amounts drawn by H. M. Government for the services of the troops, and our importers who are the buyers of Exchange feel the benefit arising there from.

**BANKS.**—The stability of our Banks or the confidence reposed in them has in no way been shaken by the financial or Commercial troubles in the neighbouring Republic ; so far from it, our Bank notes command a premium there, while the Government of the United States have great difficulty in circulating their Treasury notes at par, though they bear Interest which our Bank Bills do not.

On the whole ; notwithstanding our proximity to the United States, where civil war has had such serious financial commercial effects, Quebec has steadily advanced in wealth and prosperity and holds out a cheering prospect for the future.
