

THE "WATERTUBE Naval Committee Reports Such Boilers Suitable for Use on British War

LONDON, Aug. 8.—Water tube boiliers for naval purposes have been vindicated by the final report of the committee on Naval Boilers. In forwarding the report of the committee, Sir Compton Domville, the chairman, writes:—"I am compelled to say that my experience with Believille boilers in the Mediterranean has been very favorable to them as steam generators, and it is clear to me that the earlier boilers of this description were badly constructed and badly used."
