



The annual report on shipping from the Department of Marine and Fisheries which has just been received shows

that the total number of vessels now on the register books of the Dominion, including, old and new vessels, sailing ship Company was about to order the construction of two new boats equal in size to the new Adriatic and fitted with vessels, steamers and barges, is 7,512, measuring 654,179 tons registered tonnage. The number of new vessels built and registered in the Dominion of Canada during 1906 was 397, the total tonnage being 21,741. The report assuming the average value to be \$30 per ton, estimates the total tonnage of the Domi-nion at 19,625, 370, while the new ves-

sels built during 1906, valued at \$45 per ton were worth \$978,345. There is a
