That part of the Fourth Report of the Commission of Conservation recently published relating to agricultural conditions in the various provinces of Canada, obtained by means of an agricultural survey, makes very, interesting reading. We are naturally more interested in the conditions found to obtain in Quebec than in the other provinces, consequently we shall contine our remarks to the findings of the Report with regard to this province.

It is very evident that the majority of Quebec farmers are still following old methods and are not giving much heed to the advice of the experts or to the examples set by their more progressive neighbors. To such sundamentally important matters as systematic rotation of crops, the selection of seed grain, the growing of clover and use of manure they pay but little attention. As a result the weed problem has become a serious one. The lands are polluted with persistent weeds such as couch grass, chicory, ox-eye daisy and paint-brush.
