Preparing for Publishing.

It seems that the present Government
of Canada investigates fraudulent practices
for the purpose of acquiring the
art of stealing to the best advantage,
instead of for the purpose of closing the
door to their repetition. The Fraser-
Reynolds investigation revealed the fact
that the firm that supplied the Nova
Scotia section of the Intercolonial
charged enormous prices. This was
known before the investigation began,
and the Government was thoroughly
disappointed in its hope—which was the
main object of the inquiry—of connecting
any member of the late Govern-
ment with the extortionate hardware
dealers. The Government partisans re-
fused to have the accounts of Black
Bos & Co. of Halifax, and I. F. Bur-
rows & Co. of St. John, compared with
those of Fraser, Reynolds & Co., which
is good evidence of their being extor-
tionate also. But the inquiry revealed
one fact, namely, that goods furnished
without competition are charged at a
very high price. Did this economical
Government hasten to close this door to
fraud? Did the pure patriots who vote
as the Premier dictates insist that there
should be no more stealing on the hard-
ware plan of charging one hundred per
cent profit? Not at all. The Premier,
as is shown by the following letter,
which was in the evidence given before
the Committee, has friends to serve in
Halifax:

OTTAWA, Dec. 2nd, 1874.

Sir: I am directed by the Honorable
the Minister of Public Works to request
you to purchase stock of the railway sup-
plies required in Halifax, N. S., as not
procured by public competition, from
the firm of Black Bos & Co., of Halifax,
N. S. [Signed]

Secretary.

These friends would be disappointed
by a regulation for procuring railway
supplies by public competition, and the
Premier decides that they shall have an
opportunity for gorging themselves to a
greater degree than their predecessors.
No supplies are procured by competi-
tion, and this firm has a clear monopoly
of the business, furnishing goods at its
own prices.

And yet, in the light of the develop-
ments of the Fraser-Reynolds inquiry,
and with the perfect knowledge that
two hardware firms—one in Halifax
and the other in St. John—were plun-
dering the public just as Fraser, Reynolds
& Co. did, the Government refuses, and
their followers in Parliament shameless-
ly sanction the refusal, to order that the
supplies shall be procured by public
competition. If, in any exceptional
case, the most infamously-deserving
ever exist in any legislative assembly,
and should be condemned by the people
in some expressive manner. Every
member who voted to continue, in the
interest of favored hardware dealers
who are permitted a monopoly of the
plunder on the Intercolonial, a system
whose fraudulent character has
been so thoroughly exposed, deserves
to be received on a rail by his
constituents. No honest Government
could refuse to assent to a resolution in
favor of procuring supplies by competi-
tion, and no honest member with a
spark of independence could support
such a refusal. "We intend to keep up
the practice of allowing firms in which
Cabinet Ministers or Government por-
turers are interested to gorge them-
selves at the public cost by furnishing
supplies at their own prices," says the
Premier, and his supporters in the
House of Commons answer, "All right!"

Has the plundering will go on just the
same, and to a much greater extent?
The infamous vote that sanctioned the
system of pilfering will sanction the ap-
plication of the same system to the
Pacific Railway, where this method of
enriching political supporters on public
plunder will be fully developed. Verily,
this Government of ours is a spangon of
economy and honesty—after the Tweed
model.

The prospects of the Philadelphia
Centennial Exhibition, which were very
dark for a long time after its concep-
tion, have been growing brighter during
the past few months. New York, Bos-
ton, Chicago, and other rival cities,
have suppressed their jealousy and
joined heartily in the scheme, and most
of the European nations have made ar-
rangements to be represented. The
Canadian Government has determined
to waste several thousand dollars in aid
of this celebration of the centennial of
the independence of the States, and the
next financial exhibit submitted to Par-
liament will show the spending of two
millions as has been voted. Some of
the friends of the Government will pro-
fit, whether the country is benefited or
not.

Has the little man got weary of his
legal playthings, and does he want to
go back to his mamma? Recent Span-
ish telegrams assert that such is the
case. Perhaps Don Carlos will be
chosen next by the Madrid king-makers.
He ought to stipulate first for a retiring
allowance before accepting.

The Legislative excursion to Wood-
stock, yesterday, was a pleasant affair,
and must have given the legislators a
favorable idea of narrow gauge rail-
ways. There is nothing like a trip over
this road for dispelling prejudices
against the narrow gauge.

A correspondent of the *Corrier* gives
the editor a conundrum by enquiring
whether it is proper to say twins, a pair
of twins, or two children born at the

same birth? The editor takes issue to

a deep interest is manifested in the
subject.

curred on the Intercolonial near Meta-
pebia. The Quebec Government is ac-
cused of apathy in the matter.

The *Moncton Times* notices the death
of C. W. Cole, Esq., Barrister, of Hope-
well, N. B., which occurred on Satur-
day last. The deceased held the office
of Judge of Probates since it was
vacated by Mr. Palmer in 1873. He has
not enjoyed good health for many years
and his death was not unexpected. Mr.
Cole practiced in St. John a few years
ago.

Forgetting appear to be in order every-
where. The *Burderer* cheerfully trots
out the last one, in which, as in the St.
John affair, a woman was the victim.
Her name was Robinson and she present-
ed an order purporting to be signed by
John E. Estabrook of Beech Hill and
drawn on an Upper Scotch merchant.
The merchant's clerk paid the order
thinking it was genuine. The woman
then decamped to the States with the
funds, which, however, were only eleven
dollars.

The Fraser-Reynolds Accounts.
From the *Moncton Gazette*.

The conversation which took place in
the House of Commons on Tuesday even-
ing affords a good illustration of the
manner in which public opinion is man-
ufactured in this country by skilful man-
ipulators. These accounts which formed
one of a series of charges in Mr. Byrde's
report, were, early in the session, sub-
mitted to a sub-committee of Public Ac-
counts, and several witnesses have been
examined. Last week Mr. Dymally, who
is a member of the committee, prepared
a draft report, stating a number of facts
in evidence, and omitting a number
of others, and this draft, during the
illness of Mr. Dymally, a member
of the committee, and before any
report was presented to the House,
after it was signed by the Minister
of Finance, was published in the
Ministerial press, not as the draft report
