THE STEEL RAIL CONTRACT.

MR. WHITE MORE THAN INDICATED. Montreal, Oct. 20.—The *Gazette* this morning publishes the certificate of partnership between Messrs. Cooper and Fairman entered into on the 4th May last, and in answer to a charge that this must have been seen by the person who made the first search, says:—"Our answer to these charges is, that there is no such register as that we have printed in the book in which the original register of partnership is entered. It should be remembered that there are two books, one for the registration of limited and the other for general partnerships. This being a limited partnership, appeared in the first book, and the certificate of partnership was registered by a register in the second book, which is not accessible to the public. And after quoting the law, the *Gazette* says:—"There has, therefore, been no dissolution of the partnership, there being in fact two partnerships, one a limited and the other a general one, under the same name." Referring to the contradiction between the last letter of Cooper, Fairman & Co., and this certificate, the *Gazette* says, referring to the letter:—"Now any one reading that would infer that the articles of the new partnership were entered into on the 8th April, and that on that account Mr. Mackenzie was nominally a partner up to that time. The register, however, shows the document was prepared on the 30th July, and that it was not until the 10th August, that Mr. Cooper & Fairman had

which a more permanent mark would be made, and one that is not easily obliterated.

In the same way, the lines were ditches may hereafter be dug for carrying off the water that accumulates in the spring may be marked. Every wet spot upon the farm should be thus marked, and a drain therefrom to an established water-course or pond laid out. The stone to fill these drains should be gathered into piles as they may be hauled on sleds during the winter. By such preparations as these the work of draining may be carried on long after the surface is frost-bound, and when the farmer is forced to suspend altogether his outdoor labor.

We have been able to hint at the multifarious opportunities there are to improve the condition of a farm at this season; but sufficient has been here pointed out to find work outside for all the fair days, and inside for all the stormy ones, for the remainder of this year. In addition to these we mentioned, there are many other necessary things to be done that will occur to every farmer who reads these remarks, and we would advise him to lose no opportunity of preparing now for the season when he must of necessity rest from his out-door labor.—New York Times.
