SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 15 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may fix within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 40 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead, entry (including the time required to secure homesteaded property) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.00.

PRECAUTIONS NECESSARY.

To the Editor of the Graphic:

Looking in view of the ever increasing ravages caused by tuberculosis under its different forms, especially by pulmonary tuberculosis, nearly all the countries in the world have organized a war against that terrible scourge. Here in Canada the fight is hardly begun, and we have yet much to do. The large cities only have commenced the crusade, but since the evil seeks its victims everywhere we must be everywhere organized to fight that redoubtable disease rightly called the white plague.

Considering the numerous victims which tuberculosis makes around us, I thought it would be doing a useful deed to group in a few lines the principal causes that should be taken by those suffering with the disease, as well as those who are exposed to it. People are considerably frightened by a few cases of smallpox, which rarely causes death, but they dread little the daily contact with careless persons affected with tuberculosis, who expectorate everywhere bacilli by the millions and sow the disease everywhere they pass. The aim of this little work is, especially, to teach how tuberculosis is contracted and how it may be prevented.

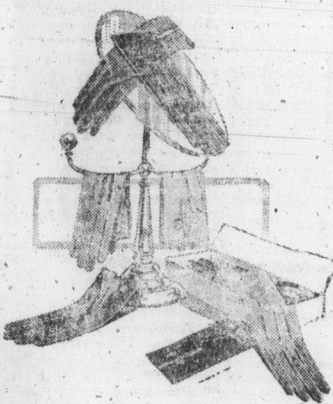
