## PRACTICAL ASTRONOMY.

(9) PERSEUS—ET CAPUT MEDUSAE and the Head of Medusa: to the fables of the Greeks, this represents Perseus the son of husband of Andromeda, who saved at the court of Cepheus, by princess from a marine monster, Medusa's head.

Perseus is usually represented in his right hand, the head of the Gorgon, which he set out to vanquish the Gorgon, the god of the internal regions, helmet, which had the power of bearing invisible; Minerva, the wisdom, furnished him with which was resplendent as glass, derived from Mercury wings and sword; thus equipped, he cut off Medusa, and from the blood which from it in its passage through an inflexible quantity of ether after entered the body of Minerva. Medusa was one of the three who had the power to turn those on whom they fixed their eyes was the only one subject to no but having violated the sanctuary of Minerva, that goddess of locks into serpents. Returning to his kingdom, Perseus found Andromeda to a rock, near Joppa, now Jaffa, to be devoured by a sea-monster, which her father Cepheus might his kingdom. Perseus turned into a rock by showing at the head, and thus rescued Andromeda immediately took to wife, as the her patriotism and filial piety.

Such much fine poetry of the respecting Perseus and Andromeda, but, however, the vision which offer that Perseus rises with the countries where astronomy is studied, and that Andromeda is directed to the Fishes, which when we treat of the zodiacal Magistars, and Planes.
