LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

—A coal monopoly is threatened in Montreal.

—Two thousand immigrants landed at Quebec on Tuesday.

—The Buce canal is to be illuminated at night by electric light.

—The Supreme Court of Canada met at Ottawa on Monday.

—It has been decided that the American team shall go to Wimbledon.

—The writ of the Albert Election act, Nomination, July 3rd, polling, 10th, declaration, 17th.

—A tree supposed to have been 100 years old was cut down at Moncton on Friday.

—During April 118 sailing vessels and 17 steamers of all nations were reported lost or missing.

—Efforts are being made in Toronto to raise an endowment fund for the Toronto Women's Medical College.

—The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada commenced at London, Ont., last week.

—The English Bishops have decided that the church shall no longer countenance the Salvation Army.

—Star-router Dorsey now talks of making his headquarters at Sackville, which made things unpleasant for him.

—The Methodist Conference, in session at St. Catharines has rejected the proposed \$28,000 increase of silver, 140,000 tons of lead, and 20,000 ounces of gold.

—The American House, at St. Andrews, N. B., made her first trip on Monday, the inmates having a narrow escape with their lives.

—A four-year-old boy, son of Joseph Pickles, of Woodstock, was run over by a loaded wagon on Monday and instantly killed.

—The assessment of the City of Winnipeg, just completed, amounts to \$1,000,000, six hundred thousand dollars.

—A large amount of gray granite to be placed by Queen Victoria over the grave of John Brown in the Kirkcaldy of traffic.

—A large number of Nova Scotians, male and female, are out of employment in Boston, who would be glad to work at almost any wage.

—The contract for the erection of the basement of the new General Offices building, at Moncton, has been let to Peterson.

—The trains on the Intercolonial do not change till the 25th inst., the Grand Trunk not being ready for the change before that time.

—The amount of pensions to be paid in the United States this month is estimated as \$8,000,000. Last month the amount paid was \$4,000,000.

—A San Francisco firm paid \$28,400 as a new capitation tax on the 15th inst.

—In view of the fact that the duty will be increased from 8¢ to 10¢ a pound.

—A letter from Father Chiquery, received at Montreal, states that he had held the office of J. S. Kennedy & Co., New York, received a telegram from that firm a few days ago, offering to double his former salary if he would return. Mr. Carruthers, who many friends will be glad to hear of his deserved promotion, has accepted the offer, and is now on his way to New York on Saturday to enter into his former duties.

—Five ships laden with deals have sailed for Europe; five more are now loading, and more looked for to arrive soon.

—Councillor Wilson's new store, opposite the Protestant House, is now advancing to completion and will be quite an addition to the appearance of this part of the town.

—Pugwash is looking up, and we are beginning to feel the influence of railroad building, the disbursement of money in a community gives a valuable impulse to business matters generally.

—The proprietors and occupants of residences and stores are painting and brushing up. The large amount of variety of goods with which the merchants have stocked their shops, present quite an attractive appearance. New stores have been opened and new ones in course of construction.

—The railroad under the new contractors is being pushed forward as fast as possible. The heavy cutting through the hill near the Palmerston bridge will be about through this week. The track crosses the approach to the bridge. The station grounds are being graded and fitted for the necessary building.

—The Cumberland District court at Pugwash on 18th inst. On the previous evening, Mr. Buttrock, a candidate for the ministry from the Nappan Circuit, preached before the members of the District. The District was formally constituted on Wednesday evening, Mr. S. Kennedy & Co., of Oxford, in the chair. There was a large attendance of ministers and laymen. The review of the year afforded encouragement in the success, both material and spiritual, enjoyed. The circuits are becoming from year to year more largely supporting, while connoisseurs are not allowed to suffer. This year, after deducting for losses occasioned by death and otherwise, the District was enabled to show a net gain of 156 club members. The contribution to Home Foreign Missions are largely in excess of last year, and some four hundred dollars are reported as contributions to the Centennial Fund in aid of the Memorial Hall now being built at Sackville. On the evening of the 18th inst., a largely attended educational meeting was held, when Rev. Messrs. Borden, Gault, and Gee gave addresses. Before separating, the District passed a resolution acknowledging the kind hospitality of the Pugwash friends.
