Says Dominicn's Contributions To Naval Defence Inadequate

London, March 3. — Canadian Associated Press. Urging that the Imperial Government make an immediate statement of its naval intentions, Admiral Adair, speaking in the Commons last evening, declared that, with the exception of Australia and New Zealand, no dominion was making an adequate contribution to the naval defence of the Emipre. The dominions, he said, ought to contribute twofifths of the cost of the Empire's navies, but India contributed mighty little, Canada's navy was a lamentable failure and South Africa's contribution was ridiculous in view of her trade. The under secretary to the admiralty said no statement on the naval plans of the Government could be made until the estimates were presented.



OF CUBISTS Cities of Duisburg, Dusseldorf and Ruhrdorf Will Be Occupied First by Allied Troops—Important Mines and Iron Plants Are in This Area—Tax on German Merchandise Will Be Levied by Each Allied Nation — Customs Boundary Along Rhine Under Allied Control Will Be Established—Plans Completed to Enforce Payment of Reparations. * : * Problem & Tolking

London, March 3.—Germany was today given until Monday noon to accept the fundamental conditions laid down by the supreme council at Paris. The German delegates were informed by the Allied representatives today that if Germany does not accept those terms the Allies will take immediate steps.

The first will be the occupation by Allied troops of the cities of Duisburg, Duesseldorf and Ruhrdorf, the region in Germany which contains important mines and iron plants. Second, each Allied country will place such a tax on German

merchandise as it may deem proper. Third, a customs boundary along the Rhine, under Allied control, will be established.

The German delegation was informed the Allies would not reduce the period of 42 years allotted for the payment of the total amount of reparations by Germany.

Under-Secretary Makes an Announcement in Commons.

London, March 3.—Latest reports received by the British Government tend to show that the Russian Soviet Government troops have suppressed german in addition, a grave violation of the obligations of Germany toward the Allies. He reminded the German representatives that their government had not fulfilled the Treaty of Versallies relative to coal deliveries disarmament, the payment of 20,000,000 marks in gold and the punishment of German officers and soldiers accused of crimes during the war. Turkish and Greek representatives will be heard by the Allies on Friday. At that time Premier Kalogeropoulos, head of the Greed delegation to the Near East conference, will, it is sa do inform the Allies that his government has been unable to accept the plan for an investigation of conditions in Thrace and Smyrna by an inter-allied commission.

FISHING THE THAMES.
To the Editor of The Advertiser:
Dear Sir,—Having been informed that the fishermen have applied for net seine licenses for use on the River Thames between Chatham and Lake St. Clair for the season of 1921, I thought it advisable to refer to a few matters in connection with same. Now, I might that when they were granted to Ingersoll, St. Marys and a large number of smaller towns too numerous to mention, which represent a very large population of the western part of Ontario, and they should be entitled to the benefits of the said river for pleasure and recreation. Some fifteen years ago the Government of that time took up this matter and gave it due consideration and refused to grapt our process. SEES DEFICITS NOT SURPLUSES POTATOES PLENTIFUL

McGill Professor Disagrees With Radial Estimates of Hydro.

TORONTO, March 2.—Dr. L. A. Herdt, professor of electrical engineering at MoGill University, Montreal, who gave evidence here yesterday before the royal commission that is inquiring into the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission's radial railway projects, was on the witness stand again today, when he was cross-examined by Robert Mc-Kay, K.C., counsel for the municipalities which favor the radial railways. Dr. Herdt, who in answer to a question placed the cost of steam railways operation per car mile at about 16.7c, said that the railway operation per mile did not matter, as it was no basis of comparison with the radials.

Estimates of surpluses on three of the five radial railway lines would prove to be deficits, he said, would be as follows: Toronto-St. Catharines, \$204,049; Toronto Eastern, \$342,391, and the Hamilton-Guelph-Elmira line, \$94,457. Assuming that a sinking fund of 1 per cent should be allowed for, Dr. Herdt found that the total deficit would amount to \$711, 291, as contrasted with hydro estimates of a surplus of \$807,642; less the sinking fund charge of \$456,411.

Only on the Toronto Suburban and Nagara Central did Dr. Herdt agree with the hydro commission's estimates.




