The wisdom of Mr. Hyman's course was peedily vindicated. With a none too scrupulous crowd to contend against, it was difficult to get a matter of this kind out of the hands of the committee and into that of Parliament, but in a day or two after the assault on the representative for London, Sir Richard Cartwright brought forward a resolution in the House of Commons which unreservedly took up the position assumed by Mr. Hyman—that the Public Accounts Committee of Parliament shall have a right to investigate every money payment, no matter though Minis-ters of the Crown may be brought into dis-Pepute by the exposure.

The resolution was so manifestly just that it was carried unanimously, and the six Ministers, including Messrs. Foster, Haggart and Chapleau sat calm'y by while Mr. Hyman was vindicated in his criticism and while the great principle for which he man-fully cont ended was indorsed by the house.

Though Mr. Hyman had done nothing else than was thus accomplished through his straightforward protest against the financial jugglery that has in recent years cost the taxpayers of the Dominion millions of dollars, taken from them by peculations and contract jobbery, he would be entitled to the indorsation and support of his con-stituents. Independent men like him are needed at Ottawa, and there are many Con-parvatives as well as Liberals in London





Among the petitions presented was one by Mr. Gibson (Huron), signed by William McPherson, reeve, and John Burgess, clerk, on behalf of the electors of the township of Turnberry, county of Huron, declaring it their opinion that from what has transpired during and since the last session of the Dominion Parliament, coupled with the state of affairs revealed by the census, that the condition of the county urgently demands that the greatest economy and soundest principles should prevail, and praying the House to reduce the number of county councilors to about one-third of the [Special to the ADVERTISER.] county councilors to about one-third of the present number and to abolish grand juries, and also to take the necessary steps, as far as may be in their power and sphere, to have the Act of Confederation amended so as to reduce the number of representatives to the various parts to about one-third of the present number and to abolish the

Senate.

Mr. Wood (Brant), and Mr. Balfour each gave notice of a bill to amend the Municipal Act by abolishing the power of municipalties
