IN A SNAKES' DEN.

Mr. Penloe's Five Hours of Torture in the Midst of Venomous Copperheads.

Bellefontaine, Pa., July 28.—John Penloe, of Noxelville, had an experience with copperhead snakes the other day, which almost unbalanced his mind. Penloe, accompanied by Nero M. Pouch, went into the Seven Mountains, north of Musser's Valley, in search of huckleberries. They mained together in the woods until o'clock in the morning, when, finding the berry crop short in their immediate vicinity, Penloe fell asleep, Pouch continued his search for berries until night, when, Penloe not having put in an appearance, he secured a lantern and went in search of him, hoping to find the missing man sleeping where

he had left him. hours, and although he called at the top of his voice, he received no answer. Pouch had scarcely sat down, however, when he was startled by a muffled cry. It sounded a great distance away, over against the side of another mountain, He called again, and was answered by the same faint response. Picking up his staff and lantern, he made his way in the direction from which the sound came. 



ALL LOST!

The Entire Crew of the Clipper Philadelphia Probably Perished. Philadelphia, July 28.-Information just received from Stanley, F. I., under date of June 9, proves con-clusively that the ship which foundered in that locality May 14 last was the Philadelphia clipper, City of Philadelphia, and that Capt. Johnson, his wife and family, one passenger and a crew numbering in all 25 men, perished. The articles saved by the salvors has been recognized by the shippers as the identical goods shipped to San Francisco by the City of

Philadelphia, which made sail from Sandy Hook on Feb. 2. No loss within recent years has attracted such attention as the reported sinking and safety of this ship. Over a month ago London speculators in-sured the City of Philadelphia at 90 guineas premium, and it may be de-pended upon that there was in their possession almost conclusive proofs of her foundering, else such enormous figures would not be paid for her reinsurance.
