In the United States-Blight and Rot Factors in the Shortage.

Compared with the liberal crop of last year there is an apparent falling off of nearly 30 per cent in tonnage and the quality of the whole is greatly deficient. County and township returns from all the leading potato growing states to this weekly newspaper show the yield of potatoes to be 174,000,000 bushels, against 245,000,000 in 1896; 286,000,000 in 1895; 185,000,000 in 1894, and only 155,-000,000 in the short crop of 1892. The average rate of yield per acre is placed at 64 bushels, taking the country at large, against 86 bushels in 1896, 89 in 1895, and 62 in 1892. The rea-sons for disaster to the potato crop, of 1897, are about as varied as a multi Standing out with more prominence than any other two factors are blight eminently without a rival. and rot, as a result of extremes of weather conditions. While the yield in bushels is small. The quality is almost as deficient. This is true of most, but not all states. The crop is best in the Canada. northwest. Such portions of Canada as make a specialty of potatoes, not-ably in Ontario and the Maritime Provinces, show a general but not serious shortage.

Liverpool and Newcastle occupied the second and third place, each showing about 140,000 tons, but Yarmouth and Bristol had fallen to the ninth and tenth places respectively. Southampton stood nineteenth on the list, and Glasgow barely obtained mention with 10,052 tons. Cardiff, destined to make so great a figure in our day, could muster at the begining of the century

only 1,096 tons. Now let us observe the changes which the last quarter of a century has witnessed. To this end let us compare the statistics for 1872 with those for 1893. At both dates London and Liverpool ranked first and second in respect of tonnage entered, the two ports being credited in 1893 with 7,782,402 and 5,251, 570 respectively. Cardiff, which occupied the fifth place in 1872, had risen to the third place 21 years later; Hull remained stationary in the fourth place, and Southampton in the sixth place. Newcastle sank from the third to the fifth place. Glasgow, which in 1872 was the tenth port in point of magnitude, had become the seventh in 1893, and during the same period Canada.

> Sketch of His Useful and Promising Career.

The Manner of His Death—Took Chloro form to Induce Sleep and Inhaled Too Much-A Kindly and Energetic Character.

The sudden death last evening of Dr. George C. Davis caused a profound sensation, the sad news spreading with the greatest rapidity throughout the whole city. Probably no man in London had a wider circle of friends, and to thousands who enjoyed his intimate acquaintance the report came with e painful shock.

Dr. Davis of late had been troubled with insomnia, caused by the illness of relatives, and had previously taken opiates, under Dr. Weekes' prescription, to induce sleep. Usually in the afternoon, after business hours, he would endeavor to snatch a short rest by reclining in his bedroom adjoining his office. Yesterday, between 4 and 5 p.m., he sent one of his students to a drug store for a small bottle of chloroform. This the doctor secured, and retired to his room, where Mr. James Frizell, his assistant, chancing to enter about 5 o'clock, found him apparently in a sound slumber. About 6:30 Mr. Frizell returned to awake the doctor for supper. He was greeted by a strong odor of chloroform, and, no-ticing a stain on the pillow, surmised that the contents of the bottle had been spilled, and that the doctor had been fatally overpowered by the fumes. He instantly summoned Drs. Waugh and Wishart, who tried in vain to restore animation. Death had ensued some time before. Dr. Flock, the coroner, was notified, and after full investigation deemed an inquest unneces-sary, as the circumstances were so
