

ale Burgaz, the town captured by the Bulgarians in the three-day battle ending Thursday, will readily be found near the centre of the map. lines between the various towns are the roads used by the opposing armies, but the battle stretched across country to Serai. The Turks have now been driven back to Tchorlu. The losses have not yet been officially estimated, but it is probable at least thirty or forty thousand men fell. It will be noticed that the fighting is getting closer to Constantinople, which is only seventy miles from Tchorlu. Adrianople is still holding out.

Foreigners in Constantinople are fearful for the safety of the Christian populations of the Turkish towns, and the European powers have taken steps already in this connection by the dispatch of warships to Saloniki, Constantinople and other Turkish ports for the protection of their nationals.

Old residents of Constantinople, who know the Turks thoroughly and are not inclined to take an alarmist attitude, say the foreign warships could afford some protection at Saloniki, Constantinople and other ports, but the widelyscattered missions and Christian populations in their opinion are already seriously endangered.

Bulgarian troops, who have shown much dash since the opening of the campaign, are not likely to give the Turks much time to reorganize. It is said they have hundreds of dead and wounded, both Turkish and Bulgarians, to dispose of, and this must, according to military experts, delay them somewhat. Torpedo Boat Enters the Gulf of Saloniki, Destroys Warship Feth-I-Bulend and Makes Its Escape Unscathed.

Athens, Greece, Nov. 1.—The Turkish battleship Feth-I-Bulend Was sunk during last night in the Gulf of Saloniki by a Greek torpedo

The Greek commander's daring enterprise was carried out under the guns of the Turkish forts, without being observed, and the torpedo boat escaped unscathed SHELLED A LIGHTHOUSE.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Nov. 1.—The Turkish cruiser Hamidish discharged nine shells yesterday at the Cape Mine lighthouse, between the Bulgarian ports of Burgas and Varna. The lighthouse was damaged. The Bulgarian Government intends to protest against the bombardment of a building devoted solely to peaceful purposes.

Constantinpole, Nov. 1 .- The sinking of the Turkish battleship Feth-I-Bulend by a Greek torpedo boat in the Gulf of Saloniki, is confirmed in a dispatch from Saloniki. The warship sank in five minutes. Part of the crew was on shore at the time, so that the number of lives lost is not known.

LONG-AWAITED REPORT ON ELECTRIFICATION, PUTS COST AT NEAR \$900,000

Hon. Adam Beck Now Announces Himself in Favor of Operation of Line as a Municipal Enterprise.

YEARLY OPERATION WOULD BE \$220,000 LAST YEAR'S RECEIPTS WERE \$131,000

Yet Mr. Beck's Engineers Claim That Road Can Be Operated at a Profit-The Total Cost Figures Are Brought Down.

The long-expected report secured by Hon. Adam Beck on the cost of electrifying the London and Port Stanley Railway, was presented to Acting Mayor W. G. Coles at noon today, and given out for publication.

According to the figures submitted, it would cost \$890,573 to electrify the road, double-tracking it from London to St. Thomas. The total yearly operating expenses, including interest and sinking fund, on the money needed to electrify the line, and also on the expenditure already made, would amount to \$220,545. The hydro-electric engineer who made the report thinks that even with this expenditure the line could be made to produce a revenue of \$17,500, or more.

Catholics May Eat Meat Today; First Time Indulgence Is Granted

Under a recent decree of Pope Pius, Roman Catholics the world over are today permitted to eat meat, this being the first Friday (excepting when Christmas falls on a Friday), in history on which such an indulgence was granted.

Pope Pius has ruled that when a feast day falls upon any day of abstinence, Catholics shall abstain on the previous day and celebrate the feast. Today is the feast of All Saints, and meat may accordingly be eaten.

ELECTIVE SENATE FOR THE IRISH

London, Oct. 31.- The Government offered its amendment to the home rule bill providing for election of members for the Irish Senate according to proportional representation schemes in the House of Commons tonight. The members of the first senate are to be appointed by the Government. Introducing the amendment, Augustine Birrell, the chief secretary for Ireland, intimated that it was intended as an additional safeguard and defence against the objections of the Unionists. The debate on the amendment then began.

Ramsay Macdonald, the Socialist and Labor leader, astonished the House by asserting that though he was utterly op-posed to proportional representation he was prepared to allow the experiment to be tried on the Irish Senate because Ireland, he said, "represented a low form of social organization."

Bonar Law, the Opposition leader, opposed the amendment on the ground that it was utterly valueless as a safeguard. John Redmond, the Irish Nationalist leader, gave the amendment lukewarm support. He said he preferred a nominated senate, but as long as the nomination idea was to be maintained





It is the patriotic duty of every Canadian to place in the hands of his children the works of Francis Parkman. For in his works we have a series of moving pictures of the old French Regime; he has covered the whole period of the French rule in Canada, and he has performed his great task with an easy grace of style, a human interest, and a pictorial power that makes him one of the ablest writers that this, continent has produced. Many parents will be unable to procure the whole set of Parkman's works, even if they are admirers of such classics as "The Conspiracy of Pontiac" and "Montealm and Wolfe." The fact that Parkman's books have always been rather high-priced has been a great pity. believe that if some enterprising Canadian publisher could issue them in cheap form, say at twenty-five cents a volume, hat there would be an enormous sale in Canada. We need an Everyman's series of books of peculiar interest to the people of this country. We shall have to wait some time for such a series, however, and in the meantime let us be grateful to Miss Louise S. Hasbrouck for compiling "The Boys' Parkman" (McClelland and Goodehild, Teronto). 





TROOPS GUARD POLLS IN CUBAN ELECTIONS

Havana Expecting Trouble and Takes Radical Precaution to Prevent Disorder.

[Canadian Press.]
Havana, Nov. 1.—The general election, on which the fate of the Cuban Republic s believed to depend opened auspiciously. Despite the almost unanimous predictions that the event would be marked by nation-wide disorders, the hope is now-rising hourly that whatever the result of the election, the registering of the vote will be effected in exemplary order. The voting began at 6 o'clock this morning, and will continue till sundown. Many voters awaited the opening of the polls to cast their ballots, and these were combelled to disperse immediately afterward by squads of police and treops.

Throughout the city during the morning there was complete tranquility. This is considered to be largely due to the extensive military precautions taken by the Government, and to the realization in all quarters that the occurrence of serious Il quarters that the occurrence of serious nal disorders would almost certainle in the downfall of the republic. The approaches to every polling place in Havana were guarded from an early hour this morning by strong detachments of infantry and artillery, who stood on sentry duty with fixed bayonets, challenging all comers, and not permitting anybody except voters to pass, and these only singly. For the first time in the history of Cuba the sale of alcoholic iquors was prohibited, all bars and cafes being closed by presidential decree dur-ing politing time. No indication can yet be obtained as to the probable result of the election.

It comprised practically the whole of the Turkish troops remaining in Europe, apart from the garrisons of Adrianople, Saloniki, Menastir, Scutari and a few other towns.

This great army was under the personal command of Nazim Pasha minister of war and commander-in-chief, who was assisted by some of the most able Turkish generals serving in the army at the present time.

Scouts Start Fight.







TORONTO, Nov. 1.—The municipal bond Issues of Canada for October, as compiled by the Monetary Times, amounted to \$1,061,595, compared with \$1,998,605 for September, and \$1,739,075 for October, 1911. The September municipal bond sales in Canada included New Westminster's sale of \$2,000,000. These are now being sold in London, and the amount has therefore been deducted from the September total, which amended is \$1,998,605. 





Mr. Rowell Traces Development of the Imperial Conference.

CENTRAL UNIFYING BODY

All Sections of the Empire To Be Drawn Together Through Cooperation.

Toronto, Nov. 1.—Before the Empire Club yesterday Mr. N. W. Rowell, K.C., M. P. P., gave a lucid address on the Imperial Conference. He traced the history of the movement from the first Colonial Conference in 1887 until the formation of the first Imperial Conference in 1911, and suggested the line of levelopment that the imperial idea would probably take in the future.
In opening, Mr. Rowell pointed out that the question of imperial organization was one that was occupying a larger place in the public mind tothan it ever perhaps did. There four constitutions or forms which the Imperial Conference might

First, the older idea was that the self-governing Dominions would in time be represented in the Imperial House of Commons and in the House of Lords, and that the present imperial Parliament, with this representation, would constitute the real legislative body for the whole Empire in dealing with matters of imperial concern. This idea was presented by Mr. Chamberlain to the Colonial Conference of 1902, although he stated he preferred the creation of a real council of the Empire, to which all questions of colonial interest might be referred. These deas, which might be described as the centralizing of authority in London, were both abandoned in favor of some more modern conception. The conference was unanimously against Mr. Chamberlain's first proposal, and since that day it has not been proposed by any responsible statesman of Great Britain or any of the self-governing

Imperial Defence.

The second form was that of the new Imperial Parliament of defence, was presented by Sir Joseph Ward at the imperial conference last year. That was mainly a parliament which would deal solely with imperial concerns of defence and foreign policies. It would contain representa-tives of the mother country and of the self-governing dominions, and would be the legislative body of the whole empire for the purposes for which it was constituted, and should have power to impose taxation. This proposal was practically unanimously rejected by the imperial conference of 1911, some opposing it on the ground that it was premature, others that the proposal was one which was not in the best interests of the empire. The third idea was that the present imperiol conference constituted the

nucleus of an organization which might prove in time the real imperial for dealing with The imperial conference itself was development from the colonial onference, and the progress so far made in practical methods of co-operation was one of the best evidences of the possibilities in this conference, and just as the

British cabinet system was evolved on the British system of government to meet the needs of government in Great Britain, so this conference might gradually evolve into the real organ of government for the whole

Central Body. The fourth form of organization is that the committee on imperial de-

fence should be the central and unifying body for the forces of the empire upon which the mother cuntry and all the self-governing dominions should be represented, and that this should gradually work out to be the organ of government for the empire. One having been rejected years ago,





FOR CITY COUNCIL

\$10,000 Expected to Show on Right Side of the Account.

FINANCE BOARD BEST

The city council will finish the year with a small balance, but nothing to be compared to the record surplus of the council of 1911, who turned over \$45,000

At the present time, the committees are finishing up their work for the year. The board of works will not do much more than ordinary repairs and the like from this time on. No more roads will be built, although Horton street will be put in shape for traffic, when the London Street Railway finish double-tracking

The engineer's department has had busy season, a large number of sewers and walks being laid. In addition, 19 miles of streets have been oiled, and miles scarified and rolled. The repairs have been extensive, although it is admitted there was not as much of this work done as there should have been. Scores and scores of holes and ruts make driving over the city rather precarious. However, some of these will be filled up before the end of the month. Contractors on walks and curbs have quit, owing to the frosty weather.

Not a Large Deficit. With all this work, the committee will not have an overdraft of any serious dimensions. The finances have been well

onserved during the year. In No. 3 committee there will be small surplus. The street watering account was overdrawn, but the other acounts will be ahead.

The finance committee will have a good surplus. The expenditures have not been nearly so heavy as estimated, and the receipts have been larger than expected. There was a balancing account of nearly \$9,000, and this will be practically intact at the end of the year. The waterworks will show a surplus of \$2,000 more than was estimated, and this will make up for the deficits of all the other spending bodies.

Trustees Are Behind.
The board of education will have an overdraft of \$7.000, due altogether to the fact that the city solicitor would not allow the board to issue debentures for that expenditure. When the rate was struck, it was understood that this could be done. Later it was found out that it was impossible, and the trustees had to This overdraft will go as a legacy to Memorial Church, discuss Browning next year's council, the board of education having to provide for it in 1913.

The hospital trust will have a small surplus, rather an unusual thing. They are generally somewhat behind on the

season's business. Altogether it is thought that the munisipal finances will show a balance on the right side of the ledger of \$10,000. Of ourse, the electrical department is left out of the reckoning altogether, as their surplus, if there is any, will be utilized n the department




