

LET LONDON CITIZENS BUY PORTION OF DEBENTURES IS NEW PLAN BROACHED

Proposal Made That Part or All of the \$764,500 Issue Be Purchased Outright by a Bank or Loan Company, and Certificates of Small Denomination Be Issued Against the Debentures.

SCHEME HAS BEEN TRIED WITH SUCCESS IN THE UNITED STATES

London is calling for bids on \$764,500 debentures. The tenders are to be in the hands of the city clerk on Monday. The money market is exceptionally tight. Interest rates are high.

It is proposed that part, or all of the issue, be purchased outright by one of the local banks, loan companies, or capitalists. The actual debentures will be held by the purchasers.

Another Angle to Scheme. Mr. Hume Cronyn, of the Huron and Erie Loan Company, when approached on the proposition, said it was the first time he had heard of the scheme.

MANY TO ATTEND GREAT CONVENTION OF PRESBYTERIANS

All Clergymen of the Church in City Going to General Assembly at Toronto.

All the Presbyterian clergymen in this city, with their wives, will be absent in Toronto next week attending the great general assembly in Toronto.

Preparations on an extensive scale are going forward at Toronto, as the gathering is expected to be the biggest religious convention ever held in Canada.

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BOY TRAMPLED BY LORRY HORSE AND SERIOUSLY HURT

Animal Scared by Lad's Wheel Bolts and Knocks Rider to Ground.

Runaway Caught After Narrowly Missing Running Down a Number of Children.

Trampled upon by a heavy lorry horse, Cyril Dockstader, son of M. H. Dockstader, residing on Quebec street, six doors above Salisbury avenue, was seriously injured shortly after noon today on Princess avenue between William and Palace streets.

The horse continued west along Princess avenue and almost struck several other boys on bicycles, who were coming from school. It was caught after a run of two blocks.

Dockstader was picked up by men who saw the accident, and though faint and weak, was able to get to his feet. His face was cut and bruised, and he complained of pains in the chest.

Within the last year the guarantee between the city and the builders of the incinerators has been changed, so that the company is responsible for repairs for one year, while in the original contract as prepared by Former City Engineer George W. Wright, the time stated was five years.

The two former city engineers, Messrs. Brazier and Wright, disclaim all responsibility for this change, and state that they are unaware who is responsible. Aldermen communicated with said they had no knowledge that the change had been made.

Another Strong Point. The information to the effect that the city of London could hold the contractors responsible for the efficiency of an incinerator that cost \$40,000 of the taxpayers' money and that involves a much larger expenditure ONLY FOR ONE YEAR will come in the nature of another evidence of bungling in municipal affairs, to say the least.

Realizing that Mr. Wright was in charge of the incinerator work for a portion of the time, and that he might know the facts of the case, The Advertiser wired him at his home in Toronto, requesting that he tell if the change had been made, and who was responsible for it. Mr. Wright's reply was received this morning, and is as follows:

Guarantee on incinerator according to the arrangement as it left my office was for five years. Why it has been changed to one year and on whose authority I do not know. I was confined to my bed at this time, and having refused plans, etc., the deal was put through without being brought again to my attention.

To the best of my knowledge, there is no penalty clause in the specifications as drawn by Messrs. Laurie & Lamb, which were accepted.

In the city's contract general conditions are included, and form part of the contract, and are signed by the contractors. Those general conditions of work contain a penalty clause, and also make it necessary for the city engineer to pass on the agreement, plans, etc., before council can take any action, and as I was city engineer at this time, I doubt very much the legality of the steps taken.

C. N. R. SUBSIDY OF \$15,000,000 TO BE GRANTED

New Lines Will Be Built Mostly in Ontario and British Columbia.

Many Government Bills To Be Dropped to Hasten Prorogation.

The Senate threw out the bill. The Province of Ontario gets a lift of million dollars for having built a railway.

Last year the Government brought in a separate measure to give Ontario a bonus of a million dollars by way of subsidy for having undertaken the construction of the Temiskaming-Northern Ontario Railway.

The Ontario provincial subsidies are given at the rate of \$8,400 a mile for a line of 252 miles from North Bay to Cochrane; Englehart to Charlton, 8 miles; Cobalt to Kerr Lake, 4 miles; Troquois Falls to Timmins, 23 miles; Earlton to Elk Lake City, 28 miles; Troquois Falls Station to Troquois Falls, 7 miles.

The Canadian Northern gets a double subsidy of \$12,000 a mile on the line from Ottawa to Port Arthur, 910 miles. It gets a subsidy at the same rate on a line 260 miles long, from Edmonton to the boundary of British Columbia. This figures out a total subsidy of \$15,640,000. The money is payable to consolidated revenue under the ordinary conditions on the authority of the governor in council.

The subsidy on the line between Ottawa and Port Arthur, amounting to \$1,000,000, is continued on page eleven.

NAVY BILL MUST BE DECIDED BY A VOTE OF THE PEOPLE IS MANDATE FROM SENATE

Sir George Ross, in a Masterly Address, Turns the Tables on Mr. Borden by Urging Him to Make Good His Pledge.

Urges Right of Canadian Electors to Give Their Judgment On Question of Such Moment to Canada and the Empire.

Ottawa, May 27.—On motion of Sir George W. Ross, seconded by Hon. Hewitt Bostock, the Senate this afternoon decided that the House is not justified in giving its assent to the navy bill until the proposal has been submitted to the electors of Canada.

In a memorable speech, Sir George went fully into the question, and emphasized the importance of allowing the people to settle a matter of such moment not only to them but to the future of the Empire.

In the forcible manner which has won for him the title of the "silver-tongued orator," he brought Premier Borden face to face with his own challenge to go to the people if the Senate turned down the bill, and invited him to make good his pledge.

In a telling manner he showed how the Borden proposals have already caused needless friction, and urged that they would cause more if proceeded with without the people having a chance to express their views.

Sir George's speech was a masterly one, delivered with all his dramatic earnestness, and filled with the highest imperial ideas.

No Separation. "Mr. Borden stated in Toronto that I was a good imperialist," declared Sir George. "It is because I am an imperialist, because I am a good imperialist, that I cannot support this measure. Mr. Borden is the separatist. He stands convicted by his own mouth. He declared that the course of contribution for which this measure calls, would cause friction. I want no friction. He declared that it would lead to separation. I want no separation. If what Mr. Borden himself said was true, that the adoption of any such course as is called for by this bill would lead to friction, and would lead to separation, then I want none of it." (Applause.)

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Why Was Period of Guarantee Changed? LONDON'S APPARATUS KEPT IN REPAIR ONLY FOR ONE YEAR; ORIGINAL AGREEMENT WAS THAT CITY SHOULD BE PROTECTED FOR FIVE YEARS.

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MR. NUTTER ISSUES A WRIT AGAINST MAYOR GRAHAM

Mr. J. M. McEvoy, acting for Mr. Arthur E. Nutter, formerly city architect, today issued a writ against Mayor C. M. R. Graham for unstated damages for slander.

The writ charges that the defendant uttered slander of and concerning the plaintiff in his trade and profession.

The case will probably go to trial at the session of the high court in October.

EXPECT WAR WILL START ALMOST IMMEDIATELY

Sofia, Bulgaria, May 28.—The military circles of the Bulgarian capital expect an almost immediate outbreak of hostilities between Bulgaria and Serbia.

Anxious to Fight. Saloniki, May 28.—The most severe tension still exists between the Greek and Bulgarian armies facing each other some distance to the north of this city. Several clashes during which shots have been exchanged occurred yesterday and today, and the Greeks accuse the Bulgarians of assuming the aggressive.

In spite of the declaration made at the Bulgarian capital that the Bulgarian troops have been ordered to observe a moderate attitude, and to avoid conflicts with the Greeks, the Bulgarian commanders apparently are preparing to attack Eleftheria, with a view to gaining complete occupation of the dominant position of Mount Panghion. They have already placed guns on crests of the hills to the southeast of Prava, commanding Eleftheria. The Bulgarian troops have also occupied the heights commanding the village of Bulakta, to the south of Lake Doiran, and the town of that name which is occupied by the Greeks.

It is the belief of the Greek generals that the Bulgarians are systematically creating incidents, and endeavoring to drive the Greeks toward the sea and seize the positions vacated by them.

Objections to the Bill. Sir George defined his objections to the naval bill. It was absolutely unnecessary, in that all it proposed to do could be done under the Canadian naval service act. It established a cleavage between the two parties in matters of naval defence of Canada, if passed it might lead to friction with the Empire.

Philadelphia, Pa., May 28.—Alter Weiss, 55 years old, a clothing manufacturer was found dead today sitting upright in his automobile in his private garage. Gas was escaping from a fixture in the garage, and the police say the man undoubtedly committed suicide.

BISHOPS DEPRECATE MOVE OF CHURCH UNITY LEAGUE

Proposals Will Hinder Rather Than Forward Real Movement, Declare Leading Montreal Anglicans—Dr. Paterson-Smyth's Warning.

Quebec, May 28.—At the meeting of the Anglican Synod of the Diocese of Quebec, held here yesterday, the efforts of certain clergymen of Montreal and Toronto in the direction of church unity was deprecated both by his lordship Bishop Hunter Dunn in his charge, and by Rev. Dr. Paterson-Smyth, of St. George's, Montreal, in a special sermon.

Boil two hours. Strain and mash the potato through the strainer. Add one even teaspoon of salt. Serve with egg dumplings.

Break one egg in a large cup, add pinch of salt and flour in which one teaspoon of baking powder is sifted; add flour enough to make a stiff dough. Drop these a little from a teaspoon into hot soup and boil five minutes without a cover on the kettle.

Corn Pone—For southern corn pone, take 2 cups of yellow cornmeal, 1 cup of flour, 2 teaspoons of baking powder, 2 cups of milk, 1 tablespoon of lard, 1 tablespoon of butter and 2 eggs. Beat the eggs and add the milk. Sift the flour, salt and baking powder together, add the milk and eggs, and beat well. Bake in a moderate oven.
Apple Compote—Select moderate-sized apples; pare, halve and core them. Then add prepared syrup and let simmer until tender, adding a little lemon juice. Lift out the apples, and boil the syrup a little to thicken it. Cool and pour the apples. To make the syrup, allow 3 cups of water for each pound sugar; boil it 15 minutes, removing the scum carefully as it rises.
Rock Cakes—Half a cup butter, 1 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 2 cups flour, 1 cup walnut meats chopped, 1 teaspoon baking powder. Drop off a spoon onto a buttered pan.

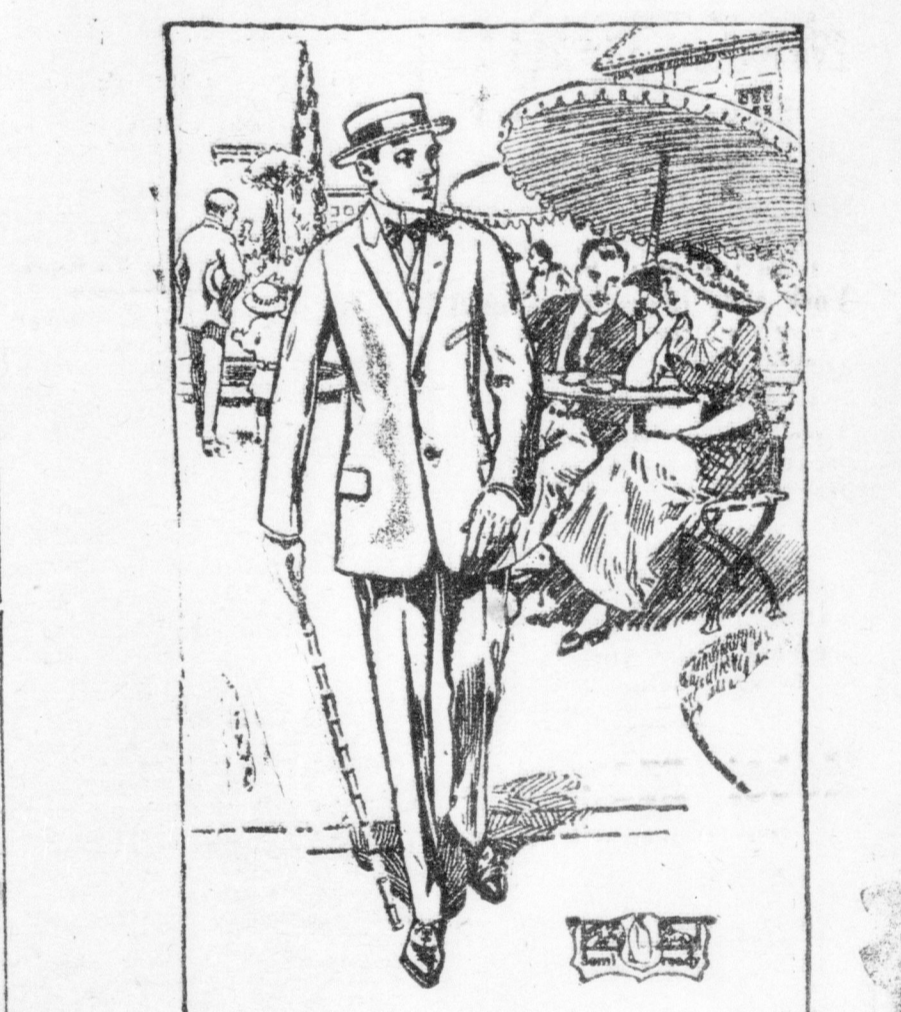

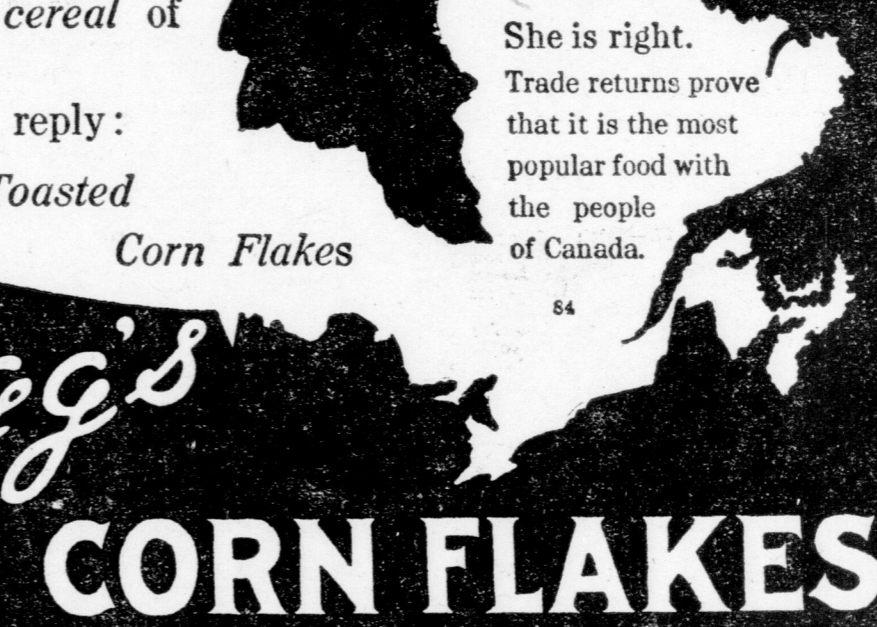

NAVY BILL MUST BE

Continued From Page One.

Britain. There was no evidence of public approval of it. It introduced a new principle in legislation...

What should we do now? asked Sir George. In his eloquent peroration, "Find out what the will of the people is, and obey that mandate."

Shall Children Be Ashamed? "Is there anything in this bill to produce that effect?" he asked. "Shall our children of twenty years hence read the history of Canadian naval defence and glory in the days when they discover that it was proposed in the Senate of Canada to place at the disposal of the British admiralty a certain number of modern battleships, but not a single Canadian ship?"

Empty and Soulless. "The bill looks for money, not men," exclaimed Sir George, with fine scorn. "For models of steel and iron, not for models of courage and daring."

Deep Responsibility. "Sir George Ross, on resuming the debate on the naval aid bill was greeted by Liberal cheerers."

Allow me to join with him in expressing a similar sense of responsibility, and at the outset assure the Senate that I support the discussion of the bill with a deep sense of my responsibility to the Senate and to the country.

Equally Loyal. "Unfortunately the voice in which we speak on this question is, by circumstances for which I am not responsible, construed as the voice of party rather than the voice of the country. It is not for me to question the loyalty of those who disagree with my views, and I hope that those who read our speeches may believe that we are equally anxious, though by different means, to maintain the solidarity of the British Empire and to strengthen the bonds of defence and attachment which for over one hundred and fifty years have bound Canada to the motherland."

Mr. Borden again had noted that the policy of contribution had not met with the approval of the Australian people; that the policy of contribution would lead to entanglements and friction with the admiralty, and that permanent co-operation in the defence of the Empire was the only line upon which he should proceed was the line of having a naval force of our own.

Both Sides Sued. The opinions and policy then enunciated, said Sir George, suited him exactly. They suited both sides of the House. Out of them grew the naval service act of 1910.

No Navy or Dockyards. Moreover, there was no provision for the construction of ships in Canada or for dockyards. Was Canada less advanced in engineering, skill, or industry than Japan or Argentina or Spain or Italy or Austria-Hungary?

National Defence. Sir George laid down some of the fundamental principles which should guide Parliament in determining the national policy of defence. "The first principle was that nothing would live or thrive in the life or institutions of any country that did not appeal to national sentiment and national pride."

Many Objections. The first objection he had to the present bill was on constitutional grounds. Under the British North America act, the Parliament of Canada was intruded upon by the present bill sought to put under the control of another Government the money that the Canadian Parliament voted for the purpose of the exclusive jurisdiction conferred by the British North America act on the British Empire.

Unity of Purpose. The second great point to be considered was without unity of purpose. Confederation was a unit. The thirteen colonies were a unit. Mr. Borden in Toronto had said that the present bill would probably support the naval aid bill. It is because I am a good imperialist that I do not support his policy.

Danger of Friction. A second objection was as Mr. Borden had pointed out in 1909—that the placing of the control of the money voted by the Dominion Parliament in the hands of a British minister not responsible to the Canadian Parliament would lead to friction. It was a doctrine foreign to the whole trend of constitutional development in Canada.
