



SLOWING DOWN AGAIN OWING TO NEW PROBLEM OF REPARATIONS

Although Differences Which Have Arisen Have Not Yet Reached Status of Deadlock, a Feeling of Apprehension Prevails Due to Delay On the Peace Treaty.

Paris, April 1 .- A feeling of apprehension over the lack of progress on the peace treaty persists in American circles, although it is said in authoritative quarters that differences which have arisen have not reached the status of a deadlock. The principal difficulty has been found in settling upon reparation according to the new method of payment suggested by the French delegation.
