REDMOND RETURNS TO IRELAND IN HURRY

Report of Anti-Irish Coalition the Cause—Predicts Dramatic National Crisis.

New York, Nov. 5.—John E. Red-nond, M. P., and Mrs. Redmond sailed today on the Celtic for London, where Mr. Redmond will place himself at the head of his forces as leader of the Irish Nationalist party, "ready for the fray," as he expressed it. Cabled reports say that the Liberal and Conservative parties are considering combined action to check the Irish leader and his party, which now holds the balance of power in the British Parliament. This report caused Mr. Redmond, who has been on a speech-making tour through the Eastern States, to cancel several engagements in New York and Brooklyn, and hurry back to London. He declined before sailing today to discuss the reports of an anti-Irish coalition.

"I am not going to commit my-self," he said. "I have just finished the most successful American tour I ever had. I have the utmost confidence in the success of the home rule cause. Within the next three weeks or so you may expect haws from the other side of the most dramatic kind. If the constitutional conference does not result in a curtailment of the powers of the House of Lords, Parliament will come to an instant stop, and we shall at once be in the midst of a national

crisis.' Redmond said that he and the other Irish parliamentary visitors had received during their visit pledges for \$150,000 in aid of the Irish cause, and expected \$50,000 additional. This was twice the amount raised by him on his trip here two years ago.

KILLED HIS DAUGHTERS

Father Then Probably Fatally Injured Himself With Gun.

It was the Italian physician Salvioni who devised a microbalance of such extreme delicacy that it clearly demonstrated the loss of weight by volitization. The microscopic objects to be weighed are placed upon the glass thread near its free end, and the amount of flexure produced is observed with a microscope magnifying one hundred diameters. A mote weighing one-thousandth of a milligramme is said perceptibly to bend the thread.

England, Mr. Emile Hatzfeld, in the course of a lengthy paper on "The Land Question and the Budget," said that the budget of 1909-10, opinion of those who believed that at the bottom of all material social questions lay the land question, had been the greatest step taken by any government in the direction of social reform, at any rate for a very considerable time. The present owners of land managed to raise about £100,000,000 (Mr. Chiozza Money's figures) annum from ground rents. Were the state the real landowner, revenue could be raised from land rents without any taxation. No doubt they were far yet from the time when the state should own all the land; but, until that day came, they should have "social problems." The land must ultimately belong to the state, and the only ques-tion should be: "How can the state resume ownership without doing an njustice to the present owner?" Surely the small proportion which Mr. Lloyd George was taking from the landlords could not be described as tax, and might also be described as a small share of the rent. Their aim should be to extend the sharing of the rent with the landlords. The



### MR. J. H. BROWN HAS RESIGNED

Mr. Brown's letter to Mr. W. J. Reid, president, was as follows: W. J. Reid, president of the West-

ern Fair Association: "Dear Sir,-I sincerely regret being unable to continue longer under present conditions as superintendent of grounds and buildings. I therefore tender my resignation, and in doing so I beg to thank you and members of the board generally for the many

The Cause. Mr. Brown's retirement is due to the action of the board in making those who had privileges at the grounds pay for ickets of admission. those who had privileges and booths were given a number tickets which would admit their help. Last year it came to the notice of the board that these privileges were being abused—that some persons were using the passes who were not entitled them. It was then decided to make them pay for admission. Mr. Brown protested against this action at the time, and declared that it would make more trouble. However, the committee in charge decided to charge them admission.

OYSTER PIE.

Put two quarts of oysters on the fire with six ounces of butter, and let remain long enough to melt the butter. Season with salt and black pepper and add half a pint of milk and cream and a large slice of bread which has been ored suits is ratine. It is a rough macut into small pieces. Prepare a dish terial. It is raised wool in plain or with paste around the sides, put in different colored threads and comes in the oysters and bake.

CREAM CANDY.

Put two cups white sugar and one cup brown sugar into kettle and pour over it one cup water and two table spoons vinegar. Cook until it hardens when put in cold water. Pour into pan and cool. Then pull for about 30 minutes, cut into small pieces with scissors. Set aside to cool. When thoroughly chilled put into quart jars and seal tightly. In a couple of days you will have fine cream candy. Flavor with peppermint for "after dinner mints.

RICE HASH.

Take equal parts of roast beef, chopped finely and well seasoned, and boiled rice. Mix thoroughly, put in buttered baking dish, cover with tomato sauce, well flavored with onion and bay leaf. Cover all with buttered bread crumbs and bake about half an

QUINCE MARMALADE.

Wash fruit, core and cut in small Put in porcelain kettle with enough water to barely cover. over slow fire until soft. Put through colander and add three-fourths its quantity of heated granulated sugar. Cook in oven one-half hour stirring frequently. Turn into tumblers.

CHICKEN TIMBALE MIXTURE. Two tablespoons butter, one-quarter stale bread brumbs, two-thirds cup milk, one cup chopped cooked chicken, one-half tablespoon chopped parsley two eggs, pepper and salt. Melt butter, add breadcrumbs and milk, then cook for five minutes, stirring constantly, add eggs well beaten, then chicken and parsley. Season, place in macaroni molds and steam twenty to thirty minutes, then turn on a plate and remove cups after a minute or two, serve with tomato sauce.

TOMATO SAUCE. One-half can tomatoes or one and three-quarters cups fresh stewed tomatoes, one slice onion, dash of red pepper, three tablespoons flour, onequarter teaspoon salt, one-third teaspoon pepper. Fry onion in butter till crisp, then add flour, then add tomatoes and seasonings, and cook for fifteen minutes. Pour two tablespoons over the individual timbale with two or three olives for a garnish. Strain the sauce before serving.

### BRIAND IS AMONG FIRST STATESMEN

Place Given to French Premier Not Only By France But By All Europe.

Paris, Nov. 7.—Aristide Briand has taken rank among the first statesmen of his day, not only in the estimation of all decent Frenchmen, but in the opinions of Europe at large. After his masterful handling of the recent strike crisis and the reconstruction of his ministry he has established a new record in a French ministerial crisis by forming a new Government in 36

His declaration of policy, which he will make to the Chamber Tuesday, will be as clearcut and decisive as all his recent action. He is big enough to throw consistency to the winds, and will demand legislation depriving employees of the public services of the right to strike, while leaving them the right to form

His reasons, which happily do not exist in America, are almost imperative on the continent. It is worse than folly, he argues, now that Europe is an armed camp and 24 hours delay in case of war would be almost a fatal handicap, to put it in the power of workmen to render nugatory the nation's entire defen-

It was upon this point that such men among the old cabinet as Millerdisagreed with the Premier. Their remedy would be compulsory arbitration. M. Briand refused to imperil the nation by allowing the danger of paralysis under such circumstances. The indications are that he will carry the country with him without difficulty.


