## REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

of the

## DOMINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

The Council of the Dominion Rifle Association have the honour to submit the Sixteenth Annual Report of their proceedings.

The work accomplished, and the position maintained by the Association in the past year have, in the opinion of the Council, been such as to merit the approbation of the Association's members and supporters.
2. The Council tender the thanks of the Association to the Government and Members of the House of Commons for the aid granted by vote last Session of Parliament.

They also record their acknowledgacent of the liberal contribution of $\$ 500$ to the Prize Fund made by the Marquis of Lorne and H.R.H. the Princess Louise.

To the Marquis of Lorne also :-
For his personal efforts in securing for the Dominion so valuable a record of the good feeling of the Auxiliary Forces of Great Britain towards the Militia of Canada, as is represented by the "British Challenge Shield."

For his gift of Silver and Bronze Medals to the reveral Provincial Rifle Associations.

For his parting gift of $\$ 500$, for the encouragement of Military Rifle Shooting at the Dominion Meetings amongst those who attend from the distant Provinces ; and for the many acts of kindness received at his hands.

The Council also tender their thanks :-
To the Minister of Militia, the Hon. Adolph P. Caron, M.P., for his third donation of $\$ 200$ to the Prize Fund.

To Mr. Steward, Optician, 406 Strand, London, England, for a Telescope and Glass given in the year 1882, competed for at the last meeting, and for a handsome Silver Cup and Field Glass given this yearwhich being received too late for insertion in the Programme, are held over for next year's Prize List.

To Messrs. Smith and Wesson, of Springfield, Mass., for their gift of a highly finished Revolver Pistol.

To the Dominion Organ Company, of Bowmanville, Ont., for their second donation of a valuable organ-notice of which, although given by the Firm in good time, failed to reach the Council before the programme was published, and is therefore reserved for next year's. Prize List.

To the Managers and Officers of the Intercolonial, Grand Trunk, Canadian Pacific and Canada Atlantic Railways, for the facilities and advantages afforded to competitors attending the meeting.
3. The usual team of Riflemen was sent to Wimbledon to represent the Dominion in the macches of the N.R.A.

Lieut. Col. Ouimet, 65th Batt., the officer appointed to the command, being prevented by private affairs from leaving home, was reluctantly compelled at the last moment to resign, when Lieut. Col. Otter, Queen's Own Rifles, was appointed in Col. Ouimet's place, with Capt. Weston, 66th Batt., as Adjutant.

Acting on the suggestion made last year by Major Tilton, the Conncil directed the Team to assemble at Montreal a week prior to the date of embarkation, there to undergo a steady course of practice, in lieu of the practice formerly carried on after the Team's arrival in England.

This practice, conducted by Capt. Weston, is reported by Col. Otter (See page 22) as having been attended with very great benefit.

To the Quebec Rifle Association the Council are indebted for the use of the Point St. Charles Range, and for the welcome and assistance given to the Team.

The result of the shooting at Wimbledon was, on the whole, very creditable.

In the Kolapore Match-(competed for the first time with the Martini-Henry Rifle, a weapon comparatively new to Canadians, the Team also being pitted against the pick of the British riflemen selected to meet those of the United States)-Canada was only defeated by 18 points.

The Canada Club of London, again presented the team with a handsome silver cup. It was given to the highest aggregate score made at the meeting, and won by Lieut. P. Thompson, G.G.F.Guards.

To the representations of Lieut.-Col. Otter, the Association is indebted for 100 Martini-Henry Rifles, obtained on loan from the Home Government through the N.R.A.
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These rifles the Council have decided to issne, on loan, to affiliated Provincial Rifle Associations, to be dealt with by them in such manner as may seem best fitted to disseminate knowledge in the use of this weapon.
4. The Annual Prize Meeting, held on the Rideau Ranges, Ottawa, commenced on Monday, the 3rd September, and concluded on the exening of Friday, the 7th September.

The prize programme contained cash prizes amounting to $\$ 5,135.66$, of which $\$ 1,330$ were contributed by the banking and manufacturing corporations named on page 25 .

In the list of cups offered for annual competition, there appeared for the first time a new and handsome prize, "The British Challenge Shield," which was presented, through the Marquis of Lorne, by the Auxiliary Forces of Great Britain to the Militia of the Dominion of Canada.

In accordance with the conditions of the competition, the Shield was placed as a prize in the Military matches, and won by the 6th Fusilier Batt, of Montreal.

The extra prize list included a valuable Telescope and Field Glass, presented by Mr. Steward, Optician, Strand, London; and a Revolver Pistol. presented by Messrs. Smith \& Wesson, of Springfield, Mass., U.S.

As regi ds the general arrangements of the meeting, the Council are glad to obsorve that the system in force gives satisfaction.

Slight changes in detail may have to be made from time to time as experience shows the need, but as long as the changes are confined to detail, and do not extend to the principle it may reasonably be expected that each year will see an improvement in the working.

One such moditication in detail as above referred to was this year carried out with undoubted gain.

The change from squadding a certain number of men to the hour, to detailing each pair of competitors to a fixed time for firing, resulted In the saving of sufficient time to allow-of an increase in the number of competitions on the programme-of an increase in the number of shots from 63 to 70 to determine the Grand Aggregate,--and lastly, of the completion of the work in five instead of six days.

The attendance of competitors was large, but the weather most unfavorable. Continuous gales of wind and heavy rain materially affected the shooting, but notwithstanding all the discomforts experienced, the competitors, without exception, punctually observed the new and necessarily rigid orders for firing.

In the Military Matches, sections of five men from ten Battalions entered.

In the British Challenge Shield Skirmishing Match, the ten sections, firing. in all, 495 rounds, made

67 Head Hits,
21 Upper Hits.

In the Gzowski Challenge Cup Match, the same ten sections, firing, in all, 980 rounds, (Skirmishing 10 rounds, Volley 5, Independent Firing 5 per man) made,

Total $605 \mathrm{Hits}=61 \cdot 72$ per cent. 375 Misses $=38 \cdot 28$ per cent.

Note-In the above matches, one section bad but four men competing in place of five.

The average in the Gzowski Cup, compared with that of last year, shows an improvement of 9.00 per cent. of hits.

On the last day of the meeting, the Association was honoured by the presence of the Governor General the Marquis of Lorne, H.R.H. the Princess Louise and H.R.H. Prince George of Wales.

His Excellency the Governor General the Marquis of Lorne, and H.R.H. the Princess Louise having most graciously acceded to the request of the Council thai they would present the prizes, it was determined, as in all probability it would be the last public appearance of H.R H. in Ottawa, to arrange for a gathering that should be worthy of the occasion.

By the kind permission of the Hon. Sir Hector L. Langevin, C.B., K.C.M.G., Minister of Public Works, the use of the Senate Charsbe:
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was granted to the Association for the evening of Friday, the 7th of September.

The proceedings were opened by the presenvation, in the name of the Dominion Rifle Association, of an Address of Farewell to His Excellency the Governor General, in the following terms.

> To His Excellences' the Right Honorable Sir John Douglas Sutherland Campbell, commonly called the Marquis of Lorne, P.C., K.T., K.C.M.G., Gevernor General of C'anada, etc., etc.

May it please Your Excellency: The members of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association cannot permit this opportunity to pass of approaching Your Excellency without giving expression to their most hearty thanks and grateful appreciation for the unceasing interest taken by Your Excellency in the work the Association has sought to accomplish, which together with the generous contributions of Your Excellency and Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise, as well as the interest awakened on the part of the Banking and Manufacturing institutions of the Dominion in response to Your Excericncy's appeals, have not alone contributed to the material success of the Association but have greatly enhanced its permanent usefulness. The Association, while proffering the assurance of its gratefel appreciation desire in saying farewell, to express the hope that Your Excellency and Her Royal Highness may be spared to enjoy many years of health and happiness, and that in looking back on your sojourn in our loyal Dominion, the goodwishes of Canada's riflemen may not be among the least pleasant of your recollections.

His Excellency, having in kind terms acknowledged the address the Prizg Presentation was proceeded with.

The attendance of competitors, and of those interested in the Association, was very large. The ceremony will long be remembered by all who were present, as forming, on the one hand, a fitting close to the most successful of the meetings of the Association ; and on the other hand, of leave-taking by the militia and citizens of Ottawa, of those at whose hands they bad received such marks of honour.
5. The Council have much satisfaction in stating that His Excellency the Marquis of Lansdowne has honoured the Association by becoming its Patron.
6. Beyond ordinary repairs and renewals, the work on the Ranges was ${ }^{\circ}$ limited :-

1. To the completion of the Ricochet Parapets.
2. To the strengthaning and patching the now thoroughly worn out Brunel Targets, which in the past have proved most serviceable.
3. To the adoption of Lieut.-Col. Beer's system of marking, and for which the Council hereby convey their thanks to Lieut.-Col. Beer.

The Council have to report that the ground on which the 600 yards Firing Points were placed has been sold and is no longer available.

Permission to enter thereon for the purposes of the late meeting could only be obtained by payment of the sum of $\$ 200$.

Such a rental for the week of the meeting only-added to the uncertainty whether even a higher demand might not be made in the near future-urges the Council to recommend that the targets in the present Long Butt be thrown back 100 yards, so that all the firing points might be brought within the limits of the ground leased by the Government.

The change proposed would improve the Range and secure uninterrupted rights for the Militia and the Association during the continuance of the lease.

The Target System of the Association works well, and is now very generally adopted by the Provincial Associations of the Dominion.
7. In the alministration of the year's business, it has been made clear to the Council that, if, in the future, the Association is to maintain the same steady annual progress as that by which the past has been marked, there must be an adequacy of funds at its disposition as well as good organization.

Without adequate funds, it will be impossible to frame such a programme as will make the meeting attractive, and develop the power of the Association to benefit the Militia force of the Dominion. And without efficient organization, the successful execution of any programme, or of economical expenditure of its funds, cannot be ensured.

In these essential points the Council feel that in organization only has the Association as yet achieved any solid progress.
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In the matter of funds, there is no certainty of income, and therefore no basis on which can be determined the amount that may prudently be offered in the prize list.

The cost of working the annual meeting (on the scale of lasy year, inclusive of prizes and exclusive of Wimbledon charges) may be taken at about $\$ 8,500$.

To meet this outlay, $\$ 2,250$ (the balance of the Government grant after paying the average cost of the Wimbledon Team), is all that the Association can ,ith ce tainty depend on.

The remaining $\$ 6,250$ has to be collected from private sources, and from competitors in the form of membership, entrance fees, etc.

In the past three years, mainly owing to the personal exertions of the Marquis of Lorne, a liberal response from 'anking assomiations and manufacturers has been made to the appeal for help, but such a source of supply is neither constant, nor can it be expected to be permanent.

In view of these facts the Council feel much anxiety as to the financial future of the Association, but trust that the Government may be induced to restore the grant to the original sum of $\$ 10, C 00$, and thus render possible a continuance of the work in which they are engaged, as they believe, with no slight benefit to the Militia force of the country.
8. The year now closed has been marked by changes which this Council cannot pass unnoticed.

In the Marquis of Lorne the Association will miss a friend, who, recognizing its usefulness, was ever ready to help it, with counsel, with practical suggestions, and, when needed, by his personal influence; and in Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise-a Patroness, who, with gracious sympathy and kindly personal interest, heartily encouraged and lent her aid towards the realization of any proposal having for its object the welfare of the Association.

In Col. Gzowski, who retires from the Presidency, they will lose one who has been its mairstay for years. His labours in the cause of rifle shooting, his never-tiring and self-sacrificing efforts to bring the claims of the Association prominently forward, not only in the Dominion, but in England also, are known to all. To none but those, however, who acted with him on the Council, can it be so well known how faithfully and efficiently he has served, and how deep the debt of gratitude he has earned from all.

The Council sincerely trust that the example that has been set may stimulate all to unite and to lend their aid to maintain the truly national character of the Association, which those who have left it have done so much to establish.

## FINANGE.

The Treasurer's statements of finance, duly audited, is submitted herewith.

It shows receipts from all sources, including the balance of $\$ 219.78$ from last year, amounting to $\$ 14,867.90$, and expenditure $\$ 14,826.93$, leaving a balance of $\$ 40.97$ to the credit of the Association.

The annual subscriptions for the past year amounted to $\$ 174$, as against $\$ 166$ in 1882.

The receipts from affiliated Rifle Associations amounted to $\$ 595$, to which may be added $\$ 266$ received from associate members as qualification for competition in annual matches, making a total of $\$ 861$ as against $\$ 884$ in 1882 , decrease $\$ 23$.

The number of Associations affiliating this year is as follows :-

Receipts from special donations, including $\$ 870$ from banks, and $\$ 460$ from manufacturers, amounted to $\$ 2,326.66$, as against $\$ 2,455$ received in 1882, a decrease of $\$ 128.34$.

The entry fees to matches this year, including sighting shots, blowoff tickets, post fees, fines and pool gains amounted to the net sum of $\$ 2,584.91$, as against $\$ 2,526.53$ received in 1882 , increase $\$ 58.39$.

A detailed account of expenditure made by Lieut.Col. Otter, commanding Wimbledon Team of 1883 , will be found in the Appendix.

## REPORT OF

## Lt.-Col. Otter, Commanding Officer.

## WIMBIEDON TEAM, 1883.

Toronto, 9 th November, 1883.
Sir,--I have the honour to forward you my report of the Wimbledon Team of 1883.

Being appointed commander of the Team at very short notice, I was unable to join it until four days after it assembled in 1 Kontreal, for a week's practice before proceeding to England.

On reaching Montreal I found that regular practice had been going on since the 18 th of June under the Adjutant, Captain Weston, 66th P. L. Fusiliers, who had in the meantime procured the signatures of the Teain to the usual agreement, and seen that their uniform and equipment was correct and in order.

Captain Weston reported the practice as very satisfactory, and as far as I could learn the new system of a collective practice before sailing, as tried for the first time this year, is a decided improvement upon the old plan of a long practice in England immediately before the Wimbledon Meeting, as giving the men a rest and an opportunity of beginning fresh, in place of being " shot out," as was too often the case in former years.

Leaving Montreal on Friday evening, the 22nd June, we arrived in Quebec on the following evening, and immediately embarked on the Allan S.S. Sardinian, Captain Dutton, and after a pleasant passage Liverpool was reached on Tuesday, the 3rd July, at 8 a.m. Mr. Dyke, Emigration Agent, met us there and, with his kind aid, the customs was soon passed, and we were enabled to get away by 11 a.in. en route
for Wimbledon.

At Derry I had taken the precaution to telegraph Captain Mildway, Secretary N.R.A., asking to have our tents at Wimbledon ready on Tuesday, and as I had no intimation at Liverpool as to the certainty of our being able to procure the ranges at Wormwood Scrubs for practice, I decided upon going into camp at Wimbledon at once. We were therefore comfortably settled under canvas upon our old ground seven hours after leaving Liverpool.

I wish here to note the great assistance rendered by Captain Corbin and Staff-Sergt. Ashall of the Team, who took the entire charge of its baggage from Montreal to Wimbledon.

Having received permission late on Tuesday evening to use the Scrubs ranges, the Team, under Captain Weston, began practice on Wednesday morning, which was continued through Thursday and Friday, Saturday being given to rest.

In connection with these practices I must acknowledge the great obligations we are under to Major Bircham, Adjutant of the St. George's Rifles, who went to no end of trouble to procure for us the use of these ranges.

Monday, the 9th July, saw us fairly at work in the regular competitions of the meeting, in which 1 think I may say that the success of the Team was at least equal to that of its predecessors. A return of the prizes won with the value of the same will be found further on.

The match of niost interest to the Canadians, viz., for the Kolapore Cup, was fired on Wednesday, the 18th July, and resulted, I regret to say, in our defeat by 18 points, at the hands of the Mother Country team ; Jersey, Guernsey and India following us in their order named.

Without desiring to make excuses for our defeat, I cannot help. calling attention to the fact that this competition was for the first time shot for with Martini-Henry rifles, in deference, I believe, to the wishes of some of the other teams, a fact which no doubt handicapped us from our comparative slight knowledge of that weapon, and consequently contributed in no small measure to our defeat. Another feature in the match was the remarkably strong section which the United Kingdom brought against us, easy to imagine when such men as Corporal McVittie were " in waiting."

The selection of our Team, an arbitrary one, was made with the greatest care, and I am satisfied no better could have been obtained from the contingent. I have much pleasure in testifying to the care and pains taken by the Adjutant and each individual throughout the match to ensure a successful termination of it.

To enable Canadians to compete upon fair terms at Wimbledon, where there is now so much shooting done with the Martini-Henry, it is absolutely necessary that more opportunity be given them for practice with that arm, and, with that end in view, I took it upon myself to make application for the loan of 100 of those rifles of the latest pattern, from the Home Government, which loan has been granted, and the rifles sent on to Ottawa. In this course I trust my action may meet with the approval of the Council.

Shortly after our arrival in England, Mr. G. Molineux, Hon. Sec. of the Canada Club, informed me that the Club was again desirous of offering a silver cup for competition among the members of the Team, upon such terms as they might agree upon. The feeling was found to be decidedly in favour of its being awarded to the highest aggregate score made during the meeting, and it consequently fell to Lieut. Thompson, G.G.F. Guards, the presentation being made at the regular distribution of prizes by H.R.H. the Princess of Teck.

I have great pleasure in recording the many kindnesses extended to the Team, and could not but notice the particularly hearty wishes expressed by all we came in contact with, for its success.

The Commissioners of the Fisheries Exhibition, through the Secretary of the Canadian Court, Mr. W. D. Dimock, kindly sent tiekets to all for free admission to the Exhibition, while Earl Brownlow, Chairman of the C. R. A. Coyncil ; Sir Hy. Fletcher, M.P.; Col. Sidney North, M.P.; Col. Buller, Camp Commandant ; Major Urquhart, Camp Adjutant; Capt. Mildmay, Secretary; Mr. Rooke, Accountant ; Major Waller, and the several other members of the Council and Executive Staff, were constant in their attentions and ever willing to assist in every way towards making our visit a pleasant one.

Sir Charles Tupper, K.C.M.G., the High Commissioner of Canada, manifested his interest in the Team by frequent visits to the camp, and was presen ${ }^{\text {t }}$ during the whole of the Kolapore match.

To Mr. J. G. Colmer, of the Canada office, we are under many obligations, his time, advice and assistance being at all times at our disposal. Emigration pamphlets were forwarded to us from the High Commissioner's office for distribution among the many enquirers for information representing Canada.

The correspondents of the Toronto Globe and Mail were also most assiduous in their efforts to place before us the latest news from home, as well as to convey to Canada full reports of our proceedings.
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I have also to record the kindness of Mr. Ennis, the manager of the Allan Line at Liverpool, who took great pains in seeing that members of the Team were provided with good accommodation returning home.

Among the numerous visitors to our camp were their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, who came without previous warning, and so unexpectedly that but few of the Team were present to receive them.
H.R.H. the Duke of Cambridge made his usual official inspection, and was pleased to express his satisfaction with the appearance of the Team and gratification at again seeing Canadians at the Wimbledon Meeting.

Earl and Lady Dufferin, Earl and Lady Brownlow, Earl Morley, Sir Leonard and Lady Tilley, Sir Bartle and Lady Frere, Lord and Lady Romilly, Sir. Henry and Lady Wilmot, Sir Henry and Lady Fletcher, General Sir Selby Smythe, Hon. Oliver Mowat, General Sir Montagu McMurdo, Sir Charles Shakerly, Earl Fortescue, General and Mrs. Gibbon, Charles Tupper, M.P., Dr. Almon, Col. G. T. Dennison, Col. Sandham, Col. and Mrs Dennis, were also among our numerous visitors.

In concluding my report, I cannot forbear placing on record my entire satisfaction with the conduct and bearing of the Team; from first to last their demeanour and keen desire to do their best was most gratifying to me and left absolutely nothing to be wished for, nor to cause me a moment's anxiety. On the other hand, the substantial evidences of their good will, left with Captaip Weston on the breaking up of the camp, leads me to think that its members were satisfied with our efforts for their comfort and welfare.

There remains but one other to whom I owe more than a passing reference, viz : my Adjutant, Captain Weston, for in him I found not only a most practical intelligent "coach," but a capital business man and disciplinarian; his former experience at Wimbledon was of the greatest possible benefit to the Team, while his zeal, good humour and willingness really left but little care or trouble upon my shoulders.

It is with great pleasure that I feel enabled to place before the Council so favourable a resord of the Wimbledon Team of 1883.

The men of a section will be at liberty to fire at either or both of the targets told off to them, and in their own time; with the proviso that the score of a section should be determined by the value of the hits made in the five rounds, or as many of the permitted five rounds as were fired within three minutes.

# Memorandum for the guidance of <br> Captain Charles 

 Costin, Secretary Dominion of Canada Rifle Association.Extract from a letter from His Excellency the Governor General, to Colonel Gzowski, A.D.C., dated Ottwwa, 9th Sept., 1883.

"I send you a cheque for $\$ 500$ for the new prizes. On reflection, I believe it would be best to try to encourage the distant Provinces to send men to the central and national meeting, and I should like the conditions to be as expressed in the accompanying memo.

The belief in the distant parts that there is no use in competing with Ontario and Quebec, I believe will always be strong, and a special attraction should be offered the members who come from far."

Prizes to be shot for at Ottawa at the Meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association as a Military Match, $\$ 500$ equally divided between the following five Provinces :-
$\$ 100$ open only ta members of British Columbia Militia.

Each $\$ 100$ to be divided into 3 Prizes for the best individual scores : 1st prize of $\$ 50,2$ na prize of $\$ 30$, 3rd prize of $\$ 20$.

There shall be no competition among the members of any one Province, unless the Province be represented in the Military Matches of the Meeting by a duly qualified team of non-commissioned officers and rank and file, and the $\$ 100$ allotted to each Province shall remain at interest until the first Meeting at which the Province is represented in the Military Matches of the D.R.A., when the capital $\$ 100$ and interest accrued shall be competed for by all members of the Province then. attending at Ottawa.

Sir,-I am authorized by His Excellency the Governor General to request that you will bring before the Council, for record on their minutes, the conditions under which the English Challenge Shield (a gift from the Auxiliary Forces of Great Britain to the active Militia of Canada) is committed in trust to the Dominion Rifle Association.

1. That the Shield shall be for ever reserved as a Prize for the encouragement of Rifle shooting in military order by Sections or Teams of non-commissioned Officers and Rank and File of the active Militia of Canada.
2. That the said Sections or Teams shall be composed of not less than five non-commissioned Officers or Rank and File, from each Regiment or Independent Troop of Cavalry, from each Brigade or Battery of Artillery, from each Regiment or Independent Company of Engineers or Infantry, subject, however, to the same concession in regard to the formation of teams from the Provinces of Prince Edward Island, Manitoba and British Columbia as is granted in the Dominion of Canada Match. No Regiment or Independent Company shall be entitled to enter more than one Section or Team.
3. That said Sections or Teams shall wear during the competition the uniform and equipment, as is at the time being issued to and worn by the Regiments or Corps they represent.
4. That the Targets to be used in the competition shall not exceed 2 feet 6 inches in height, that they shall either be raised and lowered from behind a parapet, or moved laterally to the right and left at certain intervals of time during the competition, and that the limit of time that a target be exposed to fire shall not be more than 10 or 15 seconds, as the distance from which it is fired at is under or over 250
yards.
5. That the Shield shall be held for the Winning Team under such conditions as the Council may annually determine.
6. That the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association maysoffer the Shield for competition at their Annual Meetings to be held at Ottawa, so long only as the spirit of the conditions as herein laid down is observed.
7. That in the event of neglect on the part of the Dominion of Canada Rifle A ssociation-to hold a Prize Meeting-or to offer the Shield for competition in any year,-or of the establishment of conditions for
the competition at variance with the spirit of the gift,-or of the dissolution of the Dominion Rifle Association,--then, the said Shield shall pass into the trust of His Excellency the Governor General of Canada for the time being, and be held by him until claimed again, either by the Dominion Rifle Association or other organization taking its place and having for its object the encouragement of military shooting among the active. Militia of Canada; when, on engagement bsing entered into, to observe and give effect to the conditions laid down, it may again be offered for competition, and be included in the Prizes of the Association holding its meeting at Ottawa, provided always, that on any subsequent breach of the trust, it (the Shield) shall, as at first, be subject to forfeiture and transfer to the keeping and care of His Excellency the Governor General for the time being.

Toronto, 14th September, 1883.
Sir,-For some time past I have had the intention of submitting in a succinct form, the conditions; which, verbally and by letter, I have at various times given to you for the governance of the competition for the " Gzowski Challenge Cup," and now, in view of my retirement, the present seems to be the most fitting time to carry that intention into effect.

I have therefore to request that this communication may be taken by the Council as the record of the intent and conditions, under which the "Challenge Cup " called "The Gzowski," has been presented to the active Militia of Canada, and on their behalf to the conditional trust of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association.

The regulations laid down in the Prize Programme for the Meeting just ended embody in the main my views, but to place them beyond doubt I here recapitulate them in extenso :

1. The Cup is given with the special object of encouraging the Active Militia of Canada to practice the art of Military Shooting in military order, and of ensuring at least one annual match at Ottawa as a test of their progress, fitness of accoutrements, Atc.
2. That the competition shall be confined to one section or team of not less than Five men, (non-commissioned officers, or rank and file) from each Regiment or Independent Troop of Cavalry, from each Brigade or Battery of Artillery, from each Regiment or Independent Company of Engineers, or Infantry, subject, however, to the same concession in regard to the formation.of Teams from the Province of Prince Edward Island, Manitoba, and British Columbia, as is granted in the Dominion of Canada Match.
3. That the sections or teams shall wear and carry during the competition, the uniform and equipment as is at the time issued to and worn by the regiment or corps they represent.
4. That the targets to be used in the competition shall not exceed $2^{\prime} 6^{\prime \prime}$ in height, that they shall be raised or lowered from behind a parapet, or moved laterally right and left at certain intervals of time during the competition, and that the limit of time that a target shall be exposed to fire shall not be more than 10 or 15 seconds, as the distance of the firer from the target is under or over 250 yards.
5. That the competition shall embrace skirmishing, volley and independent firing.

I would, however, in volley firing, recommend that all the sections fire their volley at one time, by one word of command, and that the penalties in force last year for "Independent" and "Bad" volleys be altogether abandoned.
6. That the Cup shall be held for the winning team under such conditions as the Council may annually determine.
7. That the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association may offer the Cup for competition at their Annual Meetings to be held at Ottawa, so long only as the spirit of the conditions as herein laid down is observed.
8. That in the event of neglect-on the part of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, - to hold a Prize Meeting,-or to offer the Cup for competition in any year,-or of the establishment of conditions for the competition at variance with the spirit of the gift,-or of the dissolution of the Dominion Rifle Association-then the said Cup shall pass into the trust of His Excellency the Governor General of Canada for the time being and be held by him until claimed again either by the Dominion of C'anada Rifle Association, or other organization taking its place and having for its object the encouragement of military shooting among the active Militia of Canada, when, on engagements being entered into, to observe and give effect to the conditions laid down, it may again be offered for competition, and be included in the Prizes of the Association holding its mueting at Ottawa, provided always that on any subsequent breach of the trust it shall as at first be subject to forfeiture, and transfer to the keeping and care of His Excellency the Governor General for the time being.

In reference to the intimation from Col. Gzowski that His Excellency the Governor General had forwarded the sum of $\$ 500$, to the end that a new series of prizes should be offered in the Prize List of next year for the further encouragement of Practice in Military Rifle Shooting: It was resolved, that the Secretary do convey to His Excellency the gratitude of the Council for this further proof of his interest in the Association-and for the prevision evinced in the conditions which tend to increase the prestige of the Dominion Annual Rifle Meeting, and at the same time aid the distant Provinces to bring to the front those who practise on home ranges and acquire skill in the peculiar requirements of Military Rifle Shooting. Further, that the Council-recognizing the importance of the object for which His Excellency has, by the institution of the British Challenge Shield Match, already done so much to encourage,-and now by the gift of further prizes to more firmly establish-tender their assurance that it will be their pleasing duty to give effect to His Excellency's wishes.
2.-On the question of settling the conditions and by whom "the British Challenge Shield" and the "Gzowski Challenge Cup" should be held for the year, it was decided that the "Shield "should be held by Lieutenant-Colonel Gardner, Commanding Officer of the 6th Fusiliers, Montreal, the winning Battalion: and the "Gzowski Cup" by Lieutenant-Colonel Grassett, the Commanding Officer of the 10th Royal Grenadiers, of Toronto, winner. The Treasurer to obtain receipts from each and an engagement to return the several pisces of plate before the next meeting. The question of Insurance was left for further consideration.
3.-Authority was given for the issue of 25 Martini-Henry Rifles to those who had obtained places on the list from which the Wimbledon Team for 1884 would be selected.
4.-The Secretary was authorized to proceed with the printing of the tabular matter of the Annual Report. The number of copies to be printed was fixed at 450 .

Other business was left to stand over until the meeting re-assembled on a call from the chair.

## REGULATIONS <br> OF THE

## dominion of canada rifle association,

FOR THE YEAR 1883.

The Prize Meeting of the Association will be conducted by a Special Committee of five members, three to form a quorum, appointed by the Executive Committee either from the Executive Committee or other Members of Council, with power of substitution by the Executive Committee from time to time as occasion may demand, and said Special Committee shall have power to hear and determine all matters arising at the meeting submitted for their consideration, and their decision or a majority of them, shall be final, conclusive and binding, but they or a majority of them may at their discretion refer any question to the Executive Committee, in which case the decision of the Executive Committee shall be final.

## NOTICE TO COMPETITORS.

1. Competitors must make themselves acquainted with the Regulations, as also with the Conditions of any Match for which they have entered, as in neither case will the plea of ignorance be entertained.
2. Competitors must refer to the Notice Board morning and afternoon to ascertain whether orders have been issued altering the original detail of the shooting, or affecting them personally.
3. Competitors must comply with the orders given by the Executive or the Range Officers on duty.
1.- GENERAL REGULATIONS.
I.-No active Militiaman shall shoot as a member of more than one corps.
II.-No officer, non-commissioned officer, or private employed by the D.R.A. for duty at the firing points or in the butts shall shoot either for a prize or for practice.
III.-In competitions restricted to Active Militiamen, or in which they shoot as such, the uniform of their corps shall be worn viz :-
a. Tunic, patrol or regulation fatigue jacket.

## b. Trousers.

c. Regimental head dress, or a cap cover, with or without a cap under it. Cap covers or puggarees may be worn over the regimental full or undress cap, and greatcoats or waterproofs over uniforms.

Officers of a corps must all appear dressed in the same order, as must also non-commissioned officers and privates, Where a duly authorized undress for officers exist, they (the officers) may appear in it, although the non-commissioned officers and privates may be in full dress. Waists or cross belts need not be worn.
d. In competitions not restricted to the Active Militia, competitors must appear either in complete uniform or wholly in plain clothes.

Any objection on the score of a competitor's dress must be raised before he takes up his position to shoot.

Note-In "Military Match " competitions the above rules shall not apply, but special details for dress will be issued.
IV.-All protests or objections should be made to the Executive or Range officers on duty on the spot, and, when practicable, in writing. When a protest is in the first place made verbally, it must subsequently be put in writing, and handed to the Secretary not later than one hour after the "cease fire" next following the occurrence upon which the protest is founded.
V.-Competitors must submit their rifles and ammunition for inspection whenever required.
VI.-Hair triggers will not be allowed.

- VII.-Fixed artificial rests will not be allowed, except in the Skirmishing Match.
VIII.-Competitors shall only use the mat and sheets provided by the Association. Cork beds and elbow rests shall not be allowed.
IX.-In competitions open to " Any Rifles," the competitors may wipe out or clean their rifles during a competition, provided they do not delay the squad by so doing. In ordinary competitions, restricted to
"Military breech-loaders," this will not be allowed except between the
distances in the competition.
X.-When a breech-ioader is used, the competitor must not load until he has taken his position at the firing point, and the Register Keeper has given the word "All clear."
XI.-Competitors may " blow-off" in the pits at the firing points only before firing, and after the presentation of a "blow-off" ticket to the Register Keeper.
XII.-Slings may be used in all matches, but when the competition is restricted to military breech-loaders the slings must be of the Government length and pattern, white, brown, or black, and attached to the rifles as in Government arms.
XIII.-In Individual Competitions-a Competitor may use a binocular or telescope, not mounted on any kind of stand, provided his doing so causes no delay in the shooting.
XIV.-After a competitor has taken his place at the riring point, no person excen the Register Keeper or an officer on duty will be permitted to speak to him.
XV.-In Matches where both team and individual prizes are being offiered for competition, coaching of any kind shall be prohibited.
XVI.-In Matches where the prizes are offered to teams only, the members of such team shooting together will be permitted to "coach" or "spot" for each other, and to use binoculars or telescopes for that purpose, provided their doing so does not delay or impede the shooting. The duly recognized Captain or Adjutant of a team, although not himself shooting, will be permitted to assist his team in like manner, and to appoint a spotter to assist him. With the above exceptions no other person will be allowed within the ropes.
XVII.-Any violation of these rules, or any part of them, must be at once reported by the Register Keeper to the officer in charge, who will caution the offender, and on any repetition of the offence shall report the same to the Executive, that the case may be dealt with by the Special Committee as laid down under the head of "penalties," and the person or persons offending may be removed from the firing points.


## 2.-PENALTIES-DISQUALIFICATION.

## XVIII.-Any competitor-

(a) Who shall fire in a name other than his own; or
(l) Who shall fire twice for the same prize, unless permitted by the conditions of the competition to do so ; or
(c) Who shall intentionally discharge his rifle at the wrong target; or
(d) Who shall offer money, or a bribe of any kind, to any employé of the Association, under any pretence whatever ; or
(e) Who, being cognizant of any attempt to defraud the Association shall fail to report the same with due diligence to the Council, Executive or Special Committee ; or
$(f)$ Who shall be guiity of any conduct which the Council, Executive or Special Committee may consider discreditable ; or
(g) Who shall be reported to the Council, Executive or Special Committee as having been elsewhere guilty of such conduct or the aforesaid offences; or
(h) Who shall directly or indirectly make any arrangements with any cther competitor for pooling or dividing the prize,

Shall, upon the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Council, Executive or Special Committee, or on the receipt of such report from any affiliated or duly recognized Association, forfeit all his entrance fees and prizes, and be disqualified from competing at any Prize Meeting of the Association, until reinstated.

## EXCLUSION FROM FURTHER COMPETITION DURING THE MEETIN(x.

XIX.-Any Competitor-
(a) Who shall fire when the danger signal is up ; or
(b) Who shall discharge his rifle on the range except in accordance with the regulations for shooting ; or
(c) Who shall be found with a loaded rifle, except when at his proper firing point and engaged in competing ; or
(d) Who from a proper want of care discharges his rifle accidentally. [If such discharge is due to a defect in his rifle an ample and satisfactory explanation must be given] ; or
(e) Who shall fire a pool shot before delivering his ticket to the Register Keeper ; or
(f) Who shall alter or make any erasures on hís firing ticket ; or
(g) Who shall act in any way that might prove dangerous,

Shall, upon the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Special Committee, be excluded from all further competition at the meeting, and shall forfeit all his entrance fees.

## DISALLOWANCE OF SCORES.

XX.-Any competitor-
(a) Who shall fail to comply with the conditions laid down for any particular prize ; or with the orders of the Executive or Range
(b) Who shall infringe on any of the instructions and regulations for the conduct of the meeting while shooting for any particular prize ; or
(c) Who, when competing for the Grand Aggregate, shall fail to fill up the aggregate score ticket, or shall enter his scores incorrectly, or shall fail to deliver the same to the Statistical Officer within one hour after the conclusion of his firing in the last

Shall, on the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Special Committee, have his scores for that particular prize disallowed, and if such disallowance refers to the Grand Aggregate, he shall forfeit all claim to shoot in the Governor General's Match.
XXI.-FINES.

Any Competitor-
Who in "blowing off" shall fail to go close up and point his rifle into the pit provided for that purpose ; or who shall "blow off" when the danger signal is up; or who shall accidentally fire at the wrong target, shall be fined one dollar, to be paid forthwith to the range officer.

In cases where a competitor is "excluded from further competition" or where his "score is disallowed" for any particular prize, the circumstances only under which the penalty was incurred shall be posted on the notice board, as a warning to others, without the name of the individual implicated.

In cases of "disqualification" the name of the offender as well as the particulars of the case shall be posted on the notice board.

## XXII.-MITIGATION OF PENALTIES.

The Special Committee shall have power to mitigate or remit any of the above penalties.

## XXIII.-PRIZE WINNERS.

Unless otherwise specified, no one will be allowed to take more than one prize in any competition.
XXIV.-Winners of prizes must apply for their certificates at the statistical office, and on signing the reeeipt attached thereto will receive the amount or amounts due to them from the Treasurer of the D.R.A.
XXV.-If a formal presentation takes place, winners, being Active Militiamen, must parade in the full dress uniform of their corps.

## XXVI.—DISTANCES AND TARGETS.

The Ordinary Targets, divided into three classes, shall be of the following dimensions:-

2. When two shots strike a target simultaneously, that which has the highest value will alone be marked with the marking disc, and the competitor whose proper turn it was to fire at the target will be credited with that shot, provided he has fired. Both hirs will, however, be shown by spotting discs.
3. On a target being lowered, the position of a hit, if any, and its value, will be shown by the spotting dise when the target is again
4. The marking when signalled shall not be questioned, but if a shot is not signalled, and the officer in charge of the firing points be satisfied that a reasonable donbt exists as to whether the shot may not have struck the target, he may ask the officer in charge at the butt to examine the target, and the result of such examination as signalled shall be final. Any competitor challenging a shot shall deposit the sum of fifty cents with the officer in charge at the firing point, which shall be forfeited in case no hit is found on the target.
5. If, at the moment at which a competitor fires, his target should be lowered in such a manner as to falsify the result of his shot, the Range Officer is empowered to cancel the result of such shot, and to permit the competitor to fire another shot in its place.
6. All alterations of the registers must be initialled by the officer making them, but no alterations, except in the case of a clerical error, shall be made without his having first signalled to the butt.
7. No person will be permitted to go to and examine a target during the meeting except the Executive Officer or such person or persons as he may duly authorize to do so in his behalf.

## In Skirmishing.

When the number of hits counted on the targets exceeds the number of shots allowed in the competition, three marks shall be deducted for every such hit in excess of the number of such shots unless it be proved that such hits on the target in excess of the number of shots allowed could only have been made by competitors in the squad firing more than the authorized number of rounds, in which case the squad shall be disqualified.

## XXVIII.-RIFLES.

The rifles shall be classed as follows :-
CLASS I.

## Military Breech-Loaders.

Snider, (Long and Short) rifles and Martin-Henry rifles, either of Government issue or of bona fide Government pattern, and bearing the Government viewer's mark.

1. Weight of Snider not to exceed, without bayonet, 9 lbs .12 oz .

Weight of Martini-Henry, without bayonet, not to exceed 9 lbs.
2. No pad or shoe for the heel plate of the butt will be allowed.
3. Minimum pull of trigger 6 lbs .
4. Sights to be strictly in accordance with those of the Government issue. Filed sights will not be allowed.
(a) All sights may be temporarily blackened or whitened, but black and white must not be mixed so as to produce a grey. No application of a permanent nature will be allowed. No shading
of sights will be permitted.
(b) The back sight may be tilted forward or backward, or supported at any angle by any extemporized means.
(c) The sliding bar may be reversed, and used on either side of the uprights. One permanent centre line for the Snider, and three for the Martini-Henry will be allowed and temporary marks or line of any kind removable at pleasure may be used.

## CLASS II.

## Any Rifles.

1. Weight-Maximum, 10 lbs.
2. Pull of Trigger-Minimum, 3 lbs .
3. A pad or shee for the heel plate may be used.
4. Any description of sights except telescopic and magnifying,

## XXIX.-AMMUNITION.

## 1.-In Competition Restricted to "Military Breech-loaders."

(a) None bat the ammunition issued by the D.R.A. on the ground shall be used or allowed. Price for Sinder, 17 cts. per package of 10 rounds, or 3 packages for 50 cts. Price for Martini, 25 cts. per package of 10 rounds.
2.-In Competitions open to "Any Rifles."

Any ammunition may be used. Competitors will bs required to
their own supply.

No restrictions will be made as to the arrangement or composition of the charges or cartridges,' provided that, in the case of Breech-loading Rifles being used,
(a) No part of the charge is inserted at the muzzle.
(b) That the Rifle is not loaded until the word " all clear" is given.
(c) That no time is lost, and
(d) That no dangerous practice is resorted to.
XXX.-POSITION.

Unless otherwise specified the shooting at all ranges shall be from the firing points, and may be in any position, with the head to the target.

## XXXI.-SIGHTING.

Unless otherwise specified, two sighting shots will be allowed at each range on payment.

If a competitor be stopped in his firing by the "Cease Fire" at midday or evening, he shall be allowed one sighting shot, witḥout payment, when he renews his firing.

## XXXII.-ORDER OF SHOOTING.

1. Competitors must be present at the firing points punctually at the time detailed on their tickets, otherwise they will not be allowed to shoot ; the time to be regulated by the clock in the Secretary's office.
2. In all ordinary competitions competitors shall, when possible, be formed up by files, and fire shot and shot alternately.
3. When but one competitor is present, he shall fire his shots , without undue delay ; but the officer in charge of the firing point or some person named by him, must witness the shooting, and countersign the register. Failing such verification the score will be invalidated. Any person present whom the competitor may name will watch the score recorded, and if need be raise objection before the next shot is fired.
4. In competitions restricted to "Any Rifles," the competitors shall be formed in a squad, and fire shot for shot in the order in which their names are called.
5. No one shall be allowed to join the squad after the commencement of the second competitive round.
6. When once a competitor has joined a squad, he shall not leave it before he has either retired from the competition or has completed his fho, but leave may be given by the officer in charge to any competitor mistake in loading to fall muzzle loader, may find it necessary through a -
7. No two competitors shall shoot in any competition with the same rifle ; nor shall a competitor change his rifle at any range during a competition, unless his first rifle should become unserviceable through an accident, which must be verified by the officer in charge.
8. The competitor must, after delivering each shot, pay attention to the score called out by the Register Keeper, and himself see that such score is correctly entered on the register, so that any objection to the score recorded may be investigated before the , $\cup \times 1$ shot is fired.
9. In the case of unreasonable delay in firing on the part of any competitor, or of such delay as the Range Officer may consider likely to prolong the firing beyond the time allowed, the Range Officer shall have the right to caution and time the competitor by a sand glass, purporting to run one minate, more or less, and if after such caution the competitor does not fire before the sand glass has run out, the Range Officer ceed with his firing.
XXXIII.-TIES.

Ties shall be decided as follows:-

## A. In Individual Competitions for a series of Prizes.

 commencing at the longest range.2. By the fewest outers.
3. By the fewest magpies.
4. By the fewest inners.
5. By the value of each shot in inverse order.
6. For Money Prizes, by division.
7. For Prizes in Kind, by shooting off, as in Clause B.
8. In the case of a Prize Part in Kind and Part in Money, by shooting off for the Prize in Kind, and dividing the Money.
N.B.-In all competitions the order of the winners shall be decided by the foregoing rules, if possible, but in the case of absolute ties the names shall be arranged alphabetically and bracketted.
B. In Individual Competitions for a Single Prize.
9. By the aggregate score in three rounds at the longest distance.
10. By firing single shots until decided.

Absentees shall forfeit their claim to shoot.
C. In Team Competition.

1. If at more than one distance, by the aggregate range totals in inverse order.
2. By the fewest outers.
3. By the fewest magpies.
4. By the fewest Inners.
5. By the highest scorers in each team shooting off, as in Clause B.
D. Grand Aggregate.

Ties for the first place to be shot off, as in Clause B.
For other places :-

1. By the total score in each match in inverse order.
2. By the total scores at 600 yards.
3. By the total scores at 500 yards.
4. By the total scores at in0 yards.
5. By the total scores at 200 yards.
6. By shooting off as in Clause B.

Ties for places on the Wimbledon Team rules for the Grand Aggregate. In the Gove shall be decided by the for the first three places and for the tenth plat General's Match ties. E. In cases not Met by the Foregoing.

1. By any special rules attached to conditions.
2. By the fiat of the Committee.

## XXXIV.-ENTRIES.

The Executive and Special Committees reserve to themselves the power of refusing any Entry for any Match, or of cancelling at any moment any Entry that may have bsen previously accepted.

The right of Entry is restricted to members, and Associated members of the Association, who either have paid or pay their subscription of $\$ 1$
at the time of Entry.

1. Entries for the several competitions shall close on days to be
2. Every competitor shall enter and shoot under his own name, and not oftener than once for any prize, unless specially allowed by theterms of the competition.
3. No entry shall be accepted after the hour fixed for the commencement of the competition to which admission is sought.
4. Entries shall be classified :-
(a). Ordinary (at the published rate of entrance fees). To include those made and received by the Secretary of the D. R. A. on or before 4 p.m., Wednesday, 29th August.
(b). Post (at an increased charge of 20 per cent. on the published rate of entrance fees). To include those made or received after 4 p.m.,
N.B. -The acceptance of Post Entries will be entirely governed by circumstances. As a rule the privilege will be withdrawn as soon as the target accommodation allotted for each competition is absorbed, and whenever the Special Committee may determine.
5. To meet the case where difficuity may be experienced in select. ing the actual competitors in sufficient time to make the required entries.
by the 29th August, Officers commanding corps and Secretaries of Provincial or Local Associations will be permitted to send in their applieation for
(state No.) competitors, accompanying such application with the amount of the entrance fees ; and to postpone the rendering of the actual names of those for whom they make the entries uatil the selection of the competitors is definitely made. In such cases the Register Tickets shall not be issued before the nominal return is handed to the Secretary. Any payment made for entries in excess of the number of competitors nominated will be returned in full, as provided for under paragraph 1, A, (a), "Return of Entrance Fees."
6. Entrance fees must be paid at the time when the entries are made.

The Register Tickets wili be issued on application at the Secretary's office on the Range.

## , XXXV.-RETURN OF ENTRANCE FEES.

1 Entrance Fees in full will be returned to those-
(a) Who are prevented from being present at the meeting ; or
(b) Who attend the meeting but are incapacitated from illness or accident ; or
(c) Whose entries the Executive or Special Committee may have cancelled.
2. Claims based on other considerations than the above will, if allowed, be subject to a penalty of half forfeit.

> XXXVI.-SQU A DDING.

1. In the case of competitors classified as Ordinary Entries, arrangements will be made and detail published of the day, hour, and target at which each competitor will be required to atiend to fulfil his engagements.
2. In the case of Post Entries, the hour of shooting cannot be predetermined or announced, and competitors so classified must await the o:ders that the progress of the meeting may render practicable.

## XXXVII.-ALTERATION OF SQUADDING.

1. Ary alterations which the Executive Officer may find it neces sary to make will be duly notified on the notice board, and such notic will be a sufficient anthority for the change. In the absence of such notice, tickets will be available only for the target for which they were unless verified and any erasure or alteration will cancel the ticket, unless verified by the initials of the Executive Officer.
2. The place of publication for all notices affecting the detail of shooting shall be the board fixed without the tent of the Executiv: Officer, and the posting of a notice on such board shall be taken as : good service on all affected thereby.

## XXXVIII.-REGISTER TICKETS.

1. Should a competitor lose his ticket, or omit to take it to the firing point, or fail to attend at the hour detailed, or give a wrong ticket, and so by his own neglect miss the opportunity of competing for the prize fo which his ticket was issued, he shall forfeit lis claim on the Association in regard to such competition, and no duplicate ticket shall be issued to him except under special circumstances.
2. Any erasure or substitution of one name for another shall invalidate the ticket.

## XXXIX.-SIGHTING AND FOULING TICKETS.

Tickets for sighting shots, 10 cents, and for fouling shots, 2 cents, can be obtained at the Secretary's office. They must be delivered up to in any match during the meeting.

The Council reserves the right to alter, amend or rescind any of the foregoing regulations as circumstances may require.

## CONSTITUTION,

ADOPTED AT ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, 1877.

## 1.-That this Association be denominated "The Dominion of Canada Rifle Association."

2.     - Ary person being a subscriber of $\$ 2.00$, and paying the same before the lst day of September, or the second day of the Annual Prize Meeting, shall become a member of the Association for the current Association year ; and any member may continue his membership by the "annual payment of $\$ 2.00$.

Any person may become an Associate Member of the Association for the current year upon payment of the sum of $\$ 1.00$, and shall have the privilege of taking part in the annual matches, but shall not be entitled to vote at any meeting of the Association.
3.-Donors of $\$ 40.00$ at one time to the funds of the Association, or of a Prize of not less value to be competed for at the Annual Prize Meeting, shall be entitled to be enrolled as Life Members of the Association, they having the full rights and privileges of ordinary members, and their names to bepublished in the Annual Reports.

Donors of money or prizes in kind of Five Dollars value and upwards, but less than Forty Dollars, shall be pntitled to be enrolled as Members for the year in which they contribute to the Prize Fund, with rights and privileges of membership.
4.-Any Provincial Rifle Association of the Dominion subscribing not less than $\$ 25.00$ annually, and any other Rifle Association of the Dominion subscribing not less than $\$ 12.00$ annually, to the funds of the Dominion Rifle Association, shall be considered as being in connection with it. Each Affiliating Association shall be eatitled to receive a Silver Medal for competition by its bona fide members. The winner of such medal, being an efficient member of the Active Militia, or an efficer retired retaining rank, to be entitled to compete free of entrance fee in the
"Dominion of Canada" and "Affiliated Association" matches at the First Prize Meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association at which he is present after he wins the medal ; provided always that the name of the winner and details of the match at which it is won shall be communicated to the Secretary of the D. C. Riffe Association not later than the first day of such Prize Meeting.
5.-There shall be a Patron and Vice-Patrons, to be named by the Council.

The Governor General of the Dominion of Canada for the time being shall be respectfully requested to become "Patron."
6.-There shall be a President, to be elected at the annual business meeting of the Association.
7.-There shall be a Vice-President for each Province, to be elected in the same manner as the President.
8.-There shall be a Council composed of Fifty members of the Association, who shall be elected in the following proportions :-

11.-The President of the various Provincial Associations in connection with this Association, and the Deputy Adjutants General commanding districts, being members of the Dominion Rifle Association, shall be ex officio Vice-Presidents and all Vice-Presidents shall be members of the Council.
12.-There shall be a Treasurer and a Secretary at Ottawa, both to be appointed annually by the Council, and holding office during pleasure, who shall receive such compensation for their services as may be voted by the Council.
13.-The Council shall have the management of the income and funds of the Association, renaering an ccount to the yearly meeting, such account having been previously audited by a person or persons, not members of the Council, who shall be annually named by the Council for that purpose. The Council shall also have the entire management and superintendence of all the affairs and concerns of the Association, and shall or may do all such acts and deeds as shall appear to them necessary or essential to be done for the purpose of carrying into effect the object and views of the Association.
14.-The Executive Committee shall give effect to such instructions as the Council may from time to time order, respecting the management of the affairs of the Association.
15.-The Council may from time to time make such rules for their guidance as they deem necessary.
16.-The annual Prize Meeting shall be held at Ottawa, at such time and under such regulations as may be determined on by the Executive Comınittee, as to all points not previously decided upon by the Council ; and such Prize Meeting of the Association shall be conducted by a Special Committee of five members, three to form a quorum, appointed by the Executive Committee, either from the Executive Committee or other Members of the Council, with power of substitution by the Expcutive Committee from time to time as occasion may demand, and said Special Committee shall have power to hear and determine all matters arising at the meeting submitted for their consideration, and their decision or a majority of them, shall be final, conclusive and binding, but they or a majority of them may at their discretion refer any question to the Executive Committee, in which case the decision of the Executive Committee shall be final.
17.-An Annual Report, embracing an audited account of the Fin mnces, shall be drawn up by the Secretary under the direction of the

Council, and shall be published and at least one month previous to the sent to members of the Association 18 Th
18.-The Annual Business Meeting of the members of the Associa tion for the Election of Officers and the Council, and the transaction of the Assembling shall be held at Ottawa on the third Wednesday after At the close of such general session of Parliament of the Dominion. Association year will terminate.
19.-A General Meeting shall be held on the second day of the Annual Prize Meeting for the discussion of all matters that may be brought forward by any member or competitor attending the matches, But no changes in the constitution shall be made except at the Aunual Business Meeting.
20.-No alterations in the constitution shall be made except by a resolution duly passed at the Annual Business Meeting or some adjournment thereof, and no such resolution shall be proposed unless a notice in writing of the terms of such resolution, signed by two members as proposer and seconder thereof, shall have been given to the Secretary one month previous to the Annual Business Meeting at which the same is to be proposed, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to immediately notify all members of the Association of such proposed amend-
21.-The Council shall have power to fill any vacancy occasioned by death or resignation in their number, from among the members of the Association.

Meetings of
Council.

There shall be two Ordinary Meetings of the Council. The first of which shall be held immediately after the Annual Business Meeting of the Association, and the second, on the first day of the annual Prize Meeting.

Extraordinary
Mestings.

Extraordinary Meetings shall be summoned by the Secretary, if required, by the Chairman, or by any four of the members of the Council, at such place as the Chairman may direct-notification being sent to each member of the Council, at least fifteen days previous to such Meetingand the requisition for the Meeting, and the notices to the members, must state the object or objects of such Extraordinary Meetings.

The Council to keep minutes of all proceed-

The Council shall keep minutes of its proceedings at all Meetings, which shall be entered in a book kept for that purpose by the Secretary,-and open to inspection of any member of the Council.

Finance Com- There shall be a Finance Committee, consisting of mittee. three members of the Council, to be chosen at the first meeting.

Treasurer to deposit sums received in Savings Bank.

The Treasurer shall deposit from time to time, in such chartered Bank as the Finance Committee may direct, all sums of money received by him on behalf of the Association.

Expenditure of All expenditure of sums for current expenses which
sums for current expenses, may be required by the Secretary must be authorized by the signature of the Chairman of the Executive Committee, or in his absence by some member of the Finance Committee, and the Treasurer shall pay all orders duly signed in such manner.

Expenditures of a general nature.

Other expenditures of a general nature are to be made only upon the authority of the Council of the Association.

A cletailed statement of all Receipts and Expenditures shall be rendered annually to the Council by the Treasurer, made up to and closed on the 30 th November.
