THE TRANSCRIPT.

QUEBEC, WEDNESDAY, JULY 10th, 1839.

There was no United States nor Upper Canada Mail this morning. Montreal papers of Monday (without news) were received yesterday, by steamer.

Martin Van Buren, President of the United States, arrived at New York on the 2nd inst., and, in reply to a political oration delivered by John Edwards, Esquire, made the following, among other observations, which we trust, may be borne out by future events:—

"The views which you have taken of particular points in our foreign relations, which recently presented a very unfavourable aspect, are conceived in the same just and enlightened spirit. The long contested question between Great Britain and ourselves in relation to the Northeastern boundary, there is reason to hope, is in a fair way for a speedy and amicable settlement, and the troubles on the Canadian border, have, I am persuaded, passed their utmost dangerous crisis.

To cultivate a spirit of liberal concession in our public relations, and at the same time, to maintain with every power our national honour unimpaired, are properly regarded by you as trusts of the highest nature. Experience has shown that these can be discharged by invariably demanding justice ourselves, and as invariably pursuing the same line of conduct towards others. A momentary forgetfulness of the latter and great duty by a small number of our citizens on the Northern Frontier, had well nigh broken up the peaceful relations of two great nations, and exposed to irreparable injury the dearest interests of millions of people, impelled to the most amicable intercourse by the strong ties of reciprocal interests, a common origin and a common language."

A circular has been addressed by Sir George Arthur to the Magistrates of Upper Canada on the subject of Orange processions. Amongst other excellent remarks, His Excellency says, "The short but eventful history of this Province during the last eighteen months, obviously shews that the great body of the people, without distinction of creed or party, were found remarkable for their fidelity to the Government, and their firmness in subduing domestic, as well as foreign, enemies; each class should therefore entertain for the high and generous qualities of the others, those sentiments of respect to which they must necessarily feel themselves entitled. * * * Considering the state of our circumstances, it seems hardly possible to conceive that any friend to the best interests of this Province can wish to maintain, here, associations which are inapplicable to our social or religious condition, and

which have been discountenanced by the high authority in the country of their origin."

His Excellency concludes by expressing his desire that the magistrates should by every means within their power, endeavour to make known his earnest wishes on the subject, an hope that by the mild measures of persuasion those processions may be discontinued, which have hitherto tended so greatly to provoke animosity and unkindly feeling.

Lieutenant General Sir Peregrine Maitland, on his return from Madras, by the Duke of Richmond.

Mr. Robert Forsyth Maitland, on his return from Canada, by the Bishop of Llandaff.

The July Term of the Court of Quarter Sessions for this District, opens to-day. The Calendar is not of very serious magnitude, but we shall lay before our readers a succinct account of such sayings and doings during the term as may appear to possess any public interest.

A newspaper published in Montreal, entitled *L'Aurore des Canadas*, the publication of which was some time since arrested by the seizure of the printing materials and imprisonment of the editor and printer, has been re-commenced.

The following order has been issued by the Magistrates of Montreal, and will, it is said, be rigorously enforced:—

"Notice is hereby given that all Licensed Tavern Keepers are to put in a conspicuous place in front of their Premises, that they keep a Licensed Tavern, if they do not do so, they will be prosecuted according to law.

All persons are duly notified that Dogs are to be muzzled until the 2nd August next, or the proprietors will be subject to prosecution.

Extract from MESSRS. CAVILLIER & SONS' circular dated Montreal, 1 July, 1839:—
"Public sales continue to be much depressed. Sugars have again receded in value. The present low prices must, however, deter any further heavy importations, whilst the low price of Tea, and the comparatively easy circumstances of the country, must induce a great additional consumption, which will soon produce its effect on the market. Fine Brandy maintains their prices, and the stock in first hands, has very materially diminished. The stock of Gin is heavy. The inferior qualities are altogether neglected. The large importations of Foreign Spirits has checked the demand for Lower Canada Whiskey, and prices seem to have a downward tendency."

United States.
Let, the murderer of Captain Usher, passed through this city yesterday on his way to Texas.—He made no secret of the affair, but publicly exhibited the carbine with which he shot him, and also one of the bullets he had cast for the purpose. He was armed with a brace of pistols, two bowie knives and a carbine. He may do very well for Texas, but a

man that would call another to his door at midnight, and murder him in cold blood, would never make a good member of society.

elopement and Duel.—The lovers of scandal,—and we are not the few in this city,—have had ample food during the past week, to gratify their vitiated appetites. It appears that an officer, belonging to one of the regiments now stationed here, and a Barrister's lady, suddenly disappeared. Diligent search was made by Mr. Mayor Powell and other relatives of the lady, but without success. She however, returned to her mother's residence, after an absence of but two or three days. The lady is highly connected and has three children. We have since heard that a duel took place on Thursday last, between John Stuart, Esq. of London, Barrister at Law, and brother-in-law to Sir Allan McNab, and Lieut. Grogan of the 32nd Regiment, which has lately removed from London to this city. Mr. Stuart fired twice without effect, Mr. Grogan discharging his pistol in the air, after which the parties left the ground, and it is said that further satisfaction will be sought in the Queen's Bench.
