# Extra Edition! BRIISH MEET DEFEAT. 

Boers Are Victorious in the Orange Free State.

## 

Surprised in the Hills, They Are Surrounded and Mowed Down.

The Boers' Unerring Marksmanship Is Proven by the Heavy Casualties Suffered by the British-Large Re-Enforcements Now En RouteJeffries and Sharkey Prepared for the Fight-Col. Wholley Promoted.

Special to The Klondike Nugget. London, via Skagway, Nov. 6.Actual hostilities have again been resumed in Natal after a short cessation upon both sides, and this time the British arms have met with decided re verses. General White as stated in last reports. has heen for some time past concentrating his forcès in the neighborhood of Ladysmith. Flushed with his previous victories, Gen. White has beell awaiting only for more reinforcements to arrive from Glencoe to begin an immediate invasion of the Orange Free State, Bester's Station being the immediate objective point. On -November 1 an expedition con sisting of the Roval Irish Fusileers, a mounted battery and the regiments fromi Gloucestershire, was dispacthed with the above named point in view.
Information of the proposed invasion having reached the Boers in advance of the departure of the troops, a force sevyeral times the numerical strength of the British detachment was dispatched immedrately toward the border.
The opposing forces came together in the hills, where the nature of the ground largely favored the Boers' peciliar methods of fighting. The Birtish forces taken by surprise, halted and made instant preparations to give battle. Such entrenchments as could be made were hastily thrown up and the batteries were drawn into position.
Meanwhile the force was exposed to a pitiless storm of bullets which rained down upon the devotel band from every knoll and crag. As long as any show of sustaining the attact remained, the British maintained a vigorous defense, but after suffering severe losses it became evident that a prolonged continuation of the struggle meant final extinction of the entire detachmient, and in conseqeunce a surrender was made. No d tailed report as to the casualties has yet heen received, but according to: a dispatch just received from Gen. White, they were very severe.
