DISASTROUS FIRES. HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Public Expenditure.

Mr. Mills, on motion that the House go into Committee of Supply, moved in amendment that "This House do hereby resolve that the public expenditure has increased, is increasing, and ought to be diminished." The expenditure, he contended, was out of proportion to the wealth and resources of the country. The public debt had grown from \$65,000,000 in 1887 to \$200,000,000 in the present year. The growth of taxation had been excessive compared with the growth of population.

Mr. Daly moved the hon. gentleman to Rip Van Winkle. Some sixteen years ago the hon. gentleman had presided, for a few months over the Departments of the Interior, and concluded that the department had not progressed since then. The statements and arguments of the hon. gentleman contradicted the policy of the Government of which he was a member.
