Strong," which left this Port on the 18th inst., is frozen in, about three miles from the wharf; she has been employed in cutting her out for the past six or eight days, and has succeeded in getting her to within about 200 yards of the open water, but it is thought there is no possibility of her getting away this season.

The chances are, that the J. B. Strong will get clear of the ice this morning, and proceed to sea (North about)—Is.

A Fast Sailed.—The Barque Undine, of this Port, owned by the Hon. J. C. Pope, has proved herself one of the fleetest ships afloat. This ship was designed specially for the trade between this island and Liverpool, and was modelled and built at Summerside during the present year by Mr. John McKinnon. She sailed from Charlottetown on her first voyage, for Liverpool, on August 10. In seven days after her departure, she had reached Long. 26 W.—but delayed by easterly winds the voyage was protracted to twenty-three days. In Liverpool she was classed and reported. Late in September she sailed from Liverpool, and in eight days after came to anchor off Georgetown. After taking in a cargo of oats, &c., she sailed from this Port on the evening of the 11th November, and arrived in Liverpool on the 26th. The passage from Liverpool to the island and back was made in one month and twenty-nine days—twenty-six days of which were spent in Port. This, we believe, is a feat never before equalled. The Undine is about 500 tons medium measurement, and is commanded by Capt. Lawrence Kiekham.—Is.

It is rumored that the Hon George Beer and James Duncan, Esq., have been appointed Members of the Executive Council, in the room of the Hon. Col Gray and J. C. Pope. The Hon. Mr. Palmer is understood, to be President of the Council and Leader of the Opposition.

The 'Islander' of Friday denies that the resignations of Hon. Col. Gray and J. C. Pope were occasioned through a difference of opinion among members of the Government on the Union question. We should like to know, then, what was the cause of the resignations, if not the former. The same paper asserts the public that the Confederation Scheme will not be forced on this Island contrary to the wishes of its inhabitants. Although the assurance is acceptable, yet it must not permit us to relax in our vigilance.

The 'Sea Breeze,' reported in our last, as abandoned at sea, was owned by Mr. Knight, baker, of this City, and was, we regret to learn, uninsured.

The Rev. J. Davis lectures before the Young Men's Christian Association to-morrow night.

A public meeting was held at Lot 28, on the 26th inst., to take into consideration the proposed Confederation of the British North American Colonies in its bearing upon Prince Edward Island. After several speeches had been made upon the subject, a Resolution disapproving of the Scheme was proposed, and unanimously adopted.

Monday last was observed as a general holiday in this City.

A Choral Society has been recently formed in Halifax.

The Catholics of Halifax have recently imported from the United States a magnificent Organ for St. Mary's Cathedral.

We learn that since the fall exportation of grain commenced, I. C. Hall Esquire, has shipped 82,500 bushels of Oats, for which he paid an average price of 2s 9d, amounting in all to about £2937 10s, nearly all of which was paid in cash. We hope soon to see a statement published of the whole exports of produce for the year. For this reason we have not prepared an account of last week's shipment.—Prot.

Chestnut is about five feet eight inches high, heavy built, dark hair, dark hazel eyes, about fifty-five years old. Clayton is six feet high, about forty-eight years old, hair turning grey, short, stiff beard; a good-looking man. Pat. Claburn is six feet one or two inches high, about forty years old, lean, iron grey hair. Bates is a well grown man, about thirty-eight years old, six feet high, dark hair, speaks pleasantly, and limps upon his right leg from wounds received in Georgia.

**Late European Intelligence.**

**GREAT BRITAIN.**

The storms during the last fortnight have produced terrible disasters on various parts of the coast. The loss of shipping at the mouth of the Tyne exceeds six hundred very sad, and the loss of life still more melancholy. Vessels have foundered with all hands on board, there and elsewhere; but the greatest calamity of all is the loss of the public life during the storm. Several steamers, including the Clarendon and the Niagara, were wrecked, and the crews were swallowed up by this terrible calamity. The vessel was an iron one, and was thought capable of living in any storm which she might be subjected. The general impression seems to be that the decks had been swept by the storm, the water descending into the engine-rooms, extinguishing the fires, and leaving the steamer at the mercy of the elements. All this, however, is mere conjecture, for no one lives to tell the tale. These storms were all foretold, but the precautions of Admiral Fildes appear to be too often neglected in these gale-strewn days.

**DEATH OF THE EARL OF CARISBRO.**—The intelligence of the death of the Earl of Carisbro has been received with a universal feeling of regret. It has not taken the public by surprise, for it has long been known that his case was hopeless, and that recovery was impossible. The disease under which he labored was a peculiar one, known by the name of "the creeping palsy," which may be better defined as a dying-by inches. During the last thirty years, the nobleman who is now no more played an important part on the stage of British politics. He was always attached to the Whig party, and made his appearance in public life during the stormy summer of 1830, when he followed the Reform Bill. He was distinguished by a combination of talents and a character. In this position he won and retained a high respect for the esteem and affection of the popular party in the sister country, which culminated some years after when he assumed the more imposing and responsible duties of the Irish Lord Lieutenant—an office that he only received when he felt the hand of death upon him. He had little of the aristocratic hauteur which mark too many English noblemen, but he was distinguished by classical attainments and other gatherings of the people, and brought all the resources of refined taste and amiable reading to bear upon the subjects which he had illustrated. He had a literary taste, and though fond of classic literature, was most at home in analyzing the poets of the last and present century. His poetry was above the average ephemeral productions, and his speeches in public were like the man—clear, general, and impressive, and spiced with a dash of humor which always rendered them acceptable. In the House of Commons, as long as he remained there, he always commanded attention, and respect, at a time, when party spirit ran high, and politics were marked by much greater divergence than at present.

When the Tories came into power with the late Sir Robert Peel, in 1841, the late Earl, still Lord Morpeth, made a visit to the United States, and American institutions, as they then existed, were treated in his book of travels with a homeliness rarely to be found in the productions of less high-bred critics. To the Whig party he was of essential service as a popular, reliable, esteemed nobleman, whose sympathies were always in favour of progress and the elevation of the nation. The fine talents of Lord Carisbro were another under the pomp and circumstances which encumber the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland; but in receiving deputations, in having a pleasant word to say to friends and foe, and in discharging the hospitality of his position, he has never been excelled. Lord Carisbro died in his 82nd year. He was never married, and the title descends to his brother, a clergyman of the Established Church.

**DIED.**

At Little River, Bay Fortune, on the 13th Sept, after a long illness, borne with exemplary patience and resignation to the will of his Heavenly Father, Mrs. Marianne Underday, widow of the late William Underday, Esquire, of Bay Fortune, in the 64th year of her age. The deceased has left one son and several daughters, many grand-children, and a numerous circle of other relatives, to mourn the loss of a most affectionate parent and very dear friend, whose character will long live in their remembrance. Her funeral, on the 14th Dec., at 10 o'clock, from St. Peter's Church, at her residence, St. Peter's Road, after a week's illness. Mrs. Ellen Barrett, aged 72 years, leaving a husband and 7 children to mourn her loss. Deceased and respected by a large number of friends for her kind and hospitable disposition, and her memory will be long cherished by those who knew her best.—R.I.P.
