Political Letter From Ottawa

Ottawa, March 26th, 1921-Parliament resumes its sittings after the Easter races with little accomplished in the way of solid legislation. More over, there are hints, which appear to he well-founded, that the financial position of the Grand Trunk, liability for which the Government is about to assume, is much more serious than believed, and that, in addition, the annual report of the Mercantile Marine will disclose considerable losses. The Mercantile marine last year showed a profit. This year, however, the conditions have been a falling off of imports and exports, which mean small carroes or empty bottoms, a surplus of maring tonrage such as has not existed since pre-war days, and a tremendous decline of ocean freight rates. The result for shipping was bound to be bad. In England and Sweden and the United States the consequence has been that thousands of ships are idle, that severe losses have been sustained, and that shipp ing values have had an enormous de cline. Canada has not been so hard hit, but has not entirely escaped, and there is small comfort for the Caradian Treasury in the fact that the exchequers of other countries are worse off than our own. Nor is it a situation from which it is easy to emerge. Last year, the argument was used, and with force, that at any time the forty owned could be disposed of at least at cost, but this argument no longer holds. The price of ships has fallen more than 50 per cent.

Under the circumstances, it is perhaps little wonder that the Government is remorselessly paring down any and all expenditure that is not absolutely mescapable. The great trouble is that the vast bulk of the expenditure is for items over which it has absolutely no control.

As for the railways, Parliament as whole realizes that there is no short cut to a solution. Impartial observ ers, except for a few partizans like Mr. King, who are bent on making political capital out of the matter, know that the situation is not of the present Government's making, that on the contrary, it is one for which the people of Canada as a whole are responsible and the proposition that a committee of the House be appointed representing all three parties to study the situation and make helpful suggestions upon matters of policy has been well received. The Govern ment, for its part, is not in a position to take any drastic action one way or the other, but there is reason to believe that reorganization of the Board of Directors will shortly be brought about.





Observations On Sunflowers

The Dominion Experimental Farms System has during the last two years paid considerable attention to the question of utilizing sunflowers for ensilage. Experiments have been conducted at the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa, in northern Ontario, on all the Farm's and Stations on the prairies, and in British Columbia. Although the results so far obtained are somewhat conflicting and by no means definite enough to allow unqualified deductions as to the value of sunflowers as an ensilage crop, yet some observations have been made which may be of interest to prospective sunflower growers.

Generally speaking sunflowers out yield corn. according to observations made so far, in such sections where on account of scant rainfall or cool seasons the latter can not be grown successfully. In sections where corn is grown to advantage, sunflowers may also outyield the latter. Thus, an acre of sunflowers grown at Ottawa last year yielded about 30 tons while the best corn variety only gave 20 ton to the acre.

The yield of sunflowers may, however, be influenced by several factors most important one perhaps being the method of planting. According to observations made so far. seeding in rows 21/2 to 3 feet apart will probably GENUINE ASPIRIN prove satisfactory for most sections

For the Maritime **Provinces**

Of the \$1,100,000 granted annually for the aid and encouragement of agriculture and agricultural education under the Agricultural Instruction Act of the Dominion, \$177,176 is alloted to the Maritime Provinces. Of this amount. \$12,800 goes towards meeting and paying the salaries and expenses of agricultural representatives, of whom there are ten with five assistants; \$68.800 towards the salaries and maintenance of agricultural colleges and schools, and for education in agriculture in public, high, and normal schools: \$12,000 towards stitutes and the enrouragement of women's work, and the balance of \$83,966 to various forms of work such as demonstrations, lectures. short courses, and for preparing and circulating instructive literature. In Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, in the five years following the coming into force of the Act in 1914. there has been contributed from this fund no less a sum than \$273,535 towards buildings and equipment and maintenance of colleges and schools of agriculture. This is quite apart from the large sums devoted to the spec ial training of teachers and the giving of instruction in agriculture in the public schools and short courses at the colleges. Encouragement has also been given on a liberal scale to boys' and girls' clubs, school fairs and school and home gardening. Other features are the service rendered for the advancement of the live stock and dairying industries. Some indieation of what is being accomplished will be found in the fact that upwards of 250 schools in Nova Scotia exhibited vegetable products, that thirty poultry club fairs were held in New Brunswick in 1920, that the Rural Science department of the Prince of Wales College at Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island. was entirely equipped, and is being maintained solely from the grant under the Agricultural Instruction Act, and that, from four in 1916, the number of school fairs held in the Island increased to 40, or ten times as many in 1919. The especial attention given to entimological work is also worthy, particularly in Nova Scotia where \$8.500 of the grant is expend,

ed in this connection

Potato Certification

During the season of 1920, 7,613 cres of potatoes were inspected by nspectors of the Division of Botany Experimental Farms Branch. Of this number 2,850% acres were, on acount of the general freedom from lisease and excellent condition of the growing crops ,classified as Grade No. 1, and, subject to a further in spection of the tubers after harvest these crops were considered to be worthy of certification for seed pur poses. Again, of the total inspected, 1,105 acres were found to be reason ably free from disease as to warrant their certification as Grade No. 2, sub ject to tuber inspection. The pre sence, however, of a considerable amount of rot in the tubers at harvest-time, owing chiefly to the gener al prevalance of Late Blight in 1920 appreciably reduced the amount o seed which would otherwise have at tained the standard of certification Notwithstanding this, it has been re ently ascertained that in Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba there is a total of approximately 120,000 bags of seed of several varieties of potatoes, from fields which passed field inspection, available for sale as certified seed this spring, subject to final inspection at hipping points.
