### A MADMAN AT THE HELM.

Desperate Struggle With a Maniac on a British Ship.

An extraordinary story is told by the crew of the British ship "Albani," which recently arrived in New York from Hong Kong. One of the crew taken on at Hong Kong was a Russian Finn named Ivan Maston, who grew moody and despondent as the vessel was rounding Cape Horn. One day when the Finn was at the wheel, the first mate observed that the "Albani" was deviating from her course, and was steering in a most erratic manner. He shouted to Maston to know what was the matter, but the only reply was that he got from the latter a blood-curdling series of oaths. The first mate now knew that something was wrong with the helmsman, so he told one of the crew to summon Capt. Burnett on deck. In the meantime Maston was steering all over the compass, and the vessel was in danger of being capsized. His appearance was enough to strike anybody with terror, as he had drawn a huge jack-knife which he flourished in his right hand, tending to the tiller with his left. His eyes were rolling to his head, and he was foaming at his lips, and he threatened to cut the heart out of anybody that would come near him. Matters were now in a terrible position, and Captain Burnett saw that he had to capture the maniac at once or his ship. ### A RELIGIOUS CRAZE.

Causes Lucien Legere, of Scoudouc, N. B. To Mysteriously Disappear.

In Friday week's Manchester Telegram there appeared the following:

"Lucien Legere, quarryman at East Long Meadow, has disappeared, leaving a note stating that he intended to kill himself. He is alleged to have been insane on religion."

The man in question, says the Montreal Transcript, was a native of Scoudouc, near Shediac, where his family now resides, but has worked in the above place for the last two years. On Monday of last week Legere arrived in this city by the afternoon C. P. R. and was accepted at the station by a resident of Barachois, with whom he was well acquainted.

During a brief conversation that ensued, Legere informed him that he had been home visiting his parents and was then on his return to East Long Meadow. He was to all appearances perfectly sane. On Saturday following the day of his disappearance from East Long Meadow a telegram was received by his relations at Scoudouc, informing them of the matter. The news spread rapidly and during Saturday night and Sunday it was the chief topic of conversation. On Monday evening several of the neighbors of the Legere family gathered at the latter's house and the matter was discussed, the unanimous opinion being that mental derangement was the cause of the escape.

On Tuesday morning as one of the missing man's brothers was passing through the back yard to his work in the fields he noticed a piece of paper stuck on the side of a post near the house. On the inside of the paper written in lead pencil and signed Lucien Legere, was, "I am home and heard you talking last evening. I am not crazy as you suppose but am suffering from a religious mania. I am suffering for Christ and will never see you again. There will be no use in my trying to catch me as I am going to end my life."

A short distance from the place where the paper was found a bark was picked up which gave indication of having contained a man. Wednesday morning Mr. Legere found another manuscript with contents of similar import lying in the field near a patch of wood some distance from the house. On Thursday and Friday he picked up a vigilance watch was kept by some of the neighbors and the Legere family, but he did not put in an appearance, and Saturday morning one of his brothers arrived in this city for the purpose of consulting a clergyman. ### SLAVERY STILL LIVES.

Where Convicts are Sold for What Their Work Will Bring.

ATLANTA, Ga., August 14.—The recent revelations of Georgia's barbaric system of farming out female convicts have aroused great indignation, even here where the methods have come to be looked upon as a matter of course. In this state the female convict is made to work, not as in the north for the gain of the State, but for the benefit of the man who gets the contract to keep her. A corporation takes charge of all the female convicts, for which privilege it pays \$25,000 a year. This year there is about 1,250 female convicts which makes the lease price per capita \$11.85 or a little less than \$1 per month. The contract is to expire in 1899, and probably will not be renewed by the company now controlling the convicts, the claim being that even at the low rate of hire it is impossible to get the required work from them.

Colonel W. H. Mattox, planter, who has 5,000 acres in the northern part of the state, has the contract. The women whom the state has sold to him are as much his slaves as ever negroes were in antebellum days. There were several white women among them.

The women, the captain says, are vicious. He gets all the work he can out of them, and no questions are asked as to his method of bringing this result about. He is an ex-convict, officer and he is used to having his orders obeyed. Notwithstanding that the army under him is an army of women, he finds ways to make them amenable to discipline as strict as any ever sustained at the farm. He has his guards—and he has need of a great many—are all men, and a moment's conversation with any of them will prove that they are not above the prejudices and faults that exist among northern turnkeys, while the fact that the women are in chains and that they often work in lonely places of an enormous farm offer many temptations for immorality and brutality that is impossible in the comparatively well regulated prisons of the North.

Many of the women are in chains and all of them wear a striped prison garb of short skirt, half sleeved waist and something else if they want it. Few of them want it.

They are employed at the hardest kind of manual labor—plowing and cultivating cotton fields like men. They rise at 3.30 in the morning, make their scanty toilets and must be at work at 5 o'clock. The breakfast consists of fried meats, biscuit and syrup. As soon as the meal is completed the women are taken to the chain with guards armed with horse pistols at head and rear of column, they march away. The plow women go to the stables for their mules, which they lead or ride from the stable, as they see fit.

The lesser work is done in the kitchen labor near his camp. The wages labor gets the alarm in case of an escape. They assist the guards by their presence and deter attempts to run away. Two or three wages men and women are always working within eight or ten quarters. There is also a pack of hounds kept for the particular purpose of tracking fleeing women.

Since Captain Mattox has worked the convicts there has only been half a dozen escapes. One woman was suspected by her companions of being an informer and was compelled to run away. Her fellow convicts furnished the money to pay her fare to Atlanta and provided her with clothes. On reaching the capital she experienced qualms of conscience, and made known to the police that she had escaped. She was sent back, received a whipping and was put at work which kept her away from the other women.

Altogether, one of the white women, once tried to escape. Her room overlooked the yard in which the convicts were kept. Every day she would carry something to her room and call the hounds to her window and divide with them. She made an especial pet of Reed, the best hound in the pack. The day Alice slipped away the dogs were out in the field. They were brought hurriedly and soon on the trail. They ran off in the direction the women were believed to have taken to Alice had a companion. For a mile the trail was followed. It led deep into a track of woods along the edge of the field. The surprise of the guards when Reed suddenly appeared from the bushes wagging his tail. Nothing could induce him to resume the search. Two weeks later when Alice was captured, she said that when Reed came upon her in the bushes she just put him on the head and he thought that he belonged to her as much as to any one else so he wagged his tail and walked off.

The penalty for running off is a whipping. The blows are administered with a strap, sometimes on the bare skin. And yet we hold up our hands in horror when we hear about Siberia.

Sunday is rest day. The prisoners go out in the lot which is surrounded by a barbed wire fence, and there are under the watch of a guard. A preacher comes and gives them a sermon, for which he gets \$3 from the state. In summer the convicts are sent to the river for a bath and swim.

It was not many years ago that men and women convicts were herded indelicately together on the same farms. The result was a moral horror. The State has at last had the decency to demand that the sexes be separated, but the present system is enough to turn a civilized northern sick at heart.

TORTURED TO DEATH.

Two weeks ago a vessel left St. Pierre for the banks, having as one of its crew a Frenchman who knew nothing about fishing or working a vessel. This engaged the other members of the crew and they set about torturing the unfortunate man to death. It is charged that the crew would strip him of his garments, and then each one would take a turn beating the victim on the bare back with a rope. After the man's flesh was cut and bruised, the flogger would then lift him into a punchion half filled with strong pickle. This was kept up day after day, until death relieved the unfortunate man. A few hours after the vessel arrived at St. Pierre, the terrible crime leaked out, resulting in the arrest of the whole crew on the charge of wilful murder.

MORE INVESTMENT.—Ora Gilpatrick, who is so largely interested in the lumber lands along the Keswick, has recently purchased a block containing a large number of acres of maple woods along the line of the Bangor and Aroostook near Houlton, and will at once begin operations thereon. Mr. Gilpatrick is perfectly satisfied with the results of his investments on the Keswick waters, which this year, were more profitable than before.

NEWTON LEE JAILLED.—The other day police magistrate Marsh fined Newton Lee \$25 and two months' jail for reckless driving on the Woodstock road. He was given a day or two to pay the fine, but made no effort to do so. Thursday there was a rumor abroad that Newton was preparing to leave the city. Sergeant Phillips put a damper on this project by going to Lee's home Thursday night and arresting him. He is now safely lodged in jail.

HIS Purses FOUND.—The St. John Sun says that detective King found the purses belonging to E. Tyler Barker, late of this city, who was robbed on the train between St. John and Vancouver. The thief threw the pocket book out of the window, and it has since been recovered. It contained some photographs of Tyler's lady friends in this city, and a ticket for Chicago, which are at Tyler's disposal if he will communicate with Mr. King.

GIBSON REBUILDING.—The village of Gibson, lately destroyed by fire, already presents a lively appearance, and is rapidly being rebuilt. About thirty fine new residences and shops are in course of construction, and from the Fredericton side of the river give the place the air of a thriving village. The new buildings will be far superior to those destroyed by the fire, and by this fall when the outside are embellished in paint, will look very handsome.

SHIRT DOWN.—Gibson's sawmill at Marysville shut down Monday at noon on account of the scarcity of logs. The main drive is five miles above Stanley. The second drive passed through covered bridge Thursday; the head drive is expected to reach the point tonight. The recent rains have produced a small rise in almost all the lumber waters of the province, especially on the Miramichi where there are two millions expected to be got out. Kilburn's drive in the upper St. John has taken a start.

FAKE BUILDERS.—Last week hon. James Mitchell, hon. H. R. Emmerson, C. E. Holl, C. E., and A. R. Wetmore, C. E., were at Milltown. The local government and the town of Calais are intending to buy out the proprietors of the toll bridges between St. Stephen and Calais with a view to making them free. The province and Calais will each pay one half the price of purchase. At present it is understood that the companies owning the bridges are a little too steep in price, and the government is waiting for them to come down.

A WELCOME VISITOR.—John Munro, of Lower Southampton, was in the city yesterday and gave The Herald a friendly call. Mr. Munro reports things flourishing in his section of the country. Farmers are just about finishing haying, and commencing to prepare for harvest. Mr. Munro says the hay crop on his own farm is about as good as usual, but that others have not had the same good luck. Other crops, especially grain, promise to give an abundant yield. The apple crop is short in quantity and of somewhat inferior quality.

A FINE BUILDING.—The new grammar school building on York street is rapidly nearing completion and will be ready for occupancy by the 1st of September. The building is of brick, of handsome modern design, and will comfortably accommodate the grammar and York street schools. Workmen are now engaged in fitting doors, building handsome door steps, and finishing the interior of the building. The old seminary building, which was sold to Stanley Chase, is being torn down and removed.

TROUBLED VISITORS.—Among the distinguished visitors in the city Tuesday, was Hon. E. J. Flynn, Surveyor General of Quebec, who in company with his secretary, M. Rouillard, late editor of Le Monde, made a hurried tour of the province. The gentlemen were in charge of Mr. Theriault, the general M. P. of Malawaska, and were much pleased with Fredericton. They drove around the city, visited the parliament and departmental buildings, leaving for St. John by the afternoon train. All who were brought in contact with Mr. Flynn were delighted with him, and it was so reported that his stay was so short.

Picnic.—The church of England Sunday school picnic will be held on Wednesday, August 29th. The F. C. Baptist church held their annual Sunday school picnic Thursday in the beautiful grounds of Mrs. McLean, Nashua Valley.

The Ancient Order of Hibernians will run an excursion to Calais and St. Stephen on September 11th. A special train has been chartered from the C. P. R., and the fare for the round trip will be \$1.50. The excursion will not be held if well patronized.

The Salvation Army will hold their annual picnic on Tuesday next, 22nd inst., at or near Oromocto. Among the officers present will be Staff Capt. and Mrs. Bennett, and Capt. Creighton and Gardner. The band of the corps will accompany the excursionists.

The Kirk Sunday School picnic will be held on the beautiful grounds known as McLean's grove, on Thursday the 24th inst. A good time may be expected. A fine lot of prizes will be given for the large team of sports to judge Marsh sentenced to the penitentiary for a term of years, and at a consignment of the matter was adjourned until Monday morning.

Investigation of the Fire.—Police magistrate Marsh commenced an investigation Thursday morning into the cause of the late fire. The only witnesses in attendance of those who were subpoenaed, was Arthur Staples, whose evidence was not of an important nature. He testified that he arrived early on the scene of the fire, and found the chief engineer breaking open the door of Lee's livery stable, which was then on fire. Four other persons, who were supposed to make a habit of frequenting the stable, were subpoenaed, but did not attend. Warrants were issued for their attendance, but on Friday morning it was found they knew nothing about the fire. The further investigation of the matter was adjourned until Monday morning.

It was FINE.—Yesterday morning at the police court Judge Marsh sentenced Russell Bird, of Marysville, to pay a fine of \$4 and \$7.50 costs for assaulting a woman at Marysville at an entertainment there not long ago.

York County Rifle Association Matches.

The annual competition of the York county rifle association was held on the old race course on Thursday the 17th. Firing began at 8 a. m. and was kept up continuously until shortly after 6 p. m. A strong northerly wind prevented very accurate shooting and kept the score much lower than it otherwise would have been. The first match was for the provincial rifle association silver medal and fifty-five dollars distributed in twenty prizes. The ranges were 200, 300 and 400 yards, seven shots at each. In this match the position of the competitors was as follows:

C. I. who competed, some of them excellent shots, were badly beaten, although the Martini-Henri is the regular arm of the school.

Burnt in Embay.—The St. John Globe says: Rev. L. Gaetz, formerly of New Brunswick, and now residing at Red Deer, Northwest Territories, was recently burnt in the embay for the alleged reason that he had spoken disparagingly of a school teacher. Testing the Hose.—It has transpired that the city hose used in the late fire on Queen street was in a very bad state. The firemen appeared to have laid their hands on some of the old stock hose in use for years, and as a consequence the hose burst three times at critical points during the progress of the fire. Chief engineer Lipsett, accompanied by alderman MacGott, chairman of the fire committee, and several firemen, paraded No. 1 hose company on Monday night and made a test of their hose. With 100 pounds of pressure one joint burst. No. 2 company Tuesday night, No. 4 on Wednesday night, and No. 5 on Thursday night all had the hose in their charge thoroughly tested.
