



Nothing said about the one and only ef-ficient way of teaching geography— viz., drawing maps from memory. The inefficiency of our text books is a woe-ful defect in our educational system. All lovers of Newfoundland, all true intends of education should exert all their influence for a common united system of education. It is in the small outports that the evils of sectarianism
