

Training of Teachers.

We do not see that any good purpose is to be served educationally by ploughing the sand. It seems to us that the question of denominational education is a closed question in Newfoundland and there is no advantage to be gained in reopening the issue.

We agree with Mr. Blackall and others that there is much to be done in the matter of training teachers to educate the young. It must not be imagined, however, that the training of teachers has reached a satisfactory standard of efficiency where non-denominational systems prevail. This standard, reached in one degree, and the best systems prevailing leave much to be desired. Our system of training teachers is not good. Teachers are not "in" classes with other scholars in our colleges and obtain what they can in the way of scholastic knowledge. Of professional training in the art of teaching and of the acquirement of skill in the craft of education, there is little, and little there will be while the idea prevails that a teacher's chief duty is to impart knowledge, to pump information into a pupil and make him a sort of ready encyclopedia. Shakespeare's admonition to the player who would play upon him is much in point. He handed a player a flute and asked him to play upon it. The player expressed his inability from lack of skill in the art of handling the instrument. How then, Hamlet asked, could he expect to play upon man, a far more intricate and difficult instrument without knowledge of the art of dealing with man.

Shakespeare's conception of man may be grasped from the following quotation:

"What a piece of work is man! How noble in reason! How infinite in faculty. In form and moving, how express and admirable! In action, how like an angel! In apprehension, how like a God!"

Yet we are careless of the efficient training of the high faculties of this noble being and indifferent whether the trainer is a butcher or a master-workman.

Appointed Administrator.

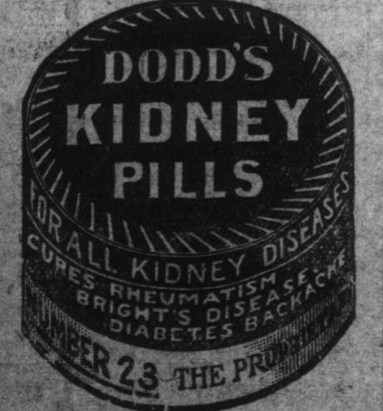
The Halifax Herald of recent issue says:

Mr. Reuben Williams of Bay Bulls, who came from British Columbia last fall, is building a new motor boat there which is being fitted by Mr. T. Cook with a Gideon kerosene motor. The craft is 26 feet over all, 6 feet beam and is modelled after Rev. Fr. O'Brien's patent. She will be used as a trawler and will be a fine rough weather boat, carrying sail as an auxiliary. Crookwell Bros. are also building one and Art O'Brien another. If these craft prove their worth, motor boats will come into general use at Bay Bulls next season.

1. Dry goods and hardware stores to close at 6 p.m. from the present date until April 29th; Saturdays at 9.30 p.m.
2. To close at 9 p.m. from Monday, May 2nd until June 4th, Saturdays at 9.30 p.m.
3. To close at 6 p.m. from Monday, June 6th, until Sept. 30th; Saturdays at 9.30 p.m.
4. To close at 9 p.m. from Monday, Oct. 3rd, until Dec. 31st; Saturdays at 9.30 p.m., except from Dec. 19th to 24th (Christmas week), when the stores will close at 10 p.m.
5. To close at 6 p.m. from Monday, Jan. 2nd, 1911, until April 21st, the date of the annual meeting; Saturdays at 9 p.m.
6. Holiday as proclaimed in June to celebrate the birthday of His Majesty the King.
7. Half holidays, Wednesday, the 8th, 15th and 22nd of June; 8th, 20th, and 27th July; 10th, 17th and 24th of August; stores to close at 12.30 p.m.
8. Holidays, Wednesday, July 13th, August 30th, September 14th, Regatta Day and Labor Day.
9. Half holidays, Wednesday, 1st, 8th and 22nd February; 1st, 8th, 22nd and 29th March; stores to close at 12.30 p.m.
10. Holidays, Wednesday, Jan. 25th, Feb. 15th and March 17th.

Beothic Coming With Erik in Tow.

At 10.30 to-day Messrs. Bowring Bros. had the following wire from Capt. Wm. Winsor of Westleyville:—"Beothic passed at 10 a.m. with Ranger in tow and Beothic looking deep."

Since then Jon Bros. & Co. had a message from Capt. Job Keen of the Erik at Westleyville saying that the ship had broken her shaft 40 miles E.N.E. of Bell Isle, in the Straits, and hailed for 6,300 young harps, so that it appears Capt. Winsor was mistaken in mentioning the Ranger. The first message in this morning stated that a third ship was coming, but this was an error. Both ships will be here tonight.

Badly Crushed Hand.

While at work discharging the S. S. Siberian, at Shea & Co.'s, Friday, James Rodgers, one of the labourers, had his hand caught between two casks of oil, and had his right hand badly crushed, one of the fingers being broken. He was treated by the ship's doctor. He is a poor man with a sick wife and heavy family; cannot work for some time owing to the accident, and some help should be extended to him.

In the matter of the Companies' Act of 1890 and in the matter of the Mid. Steam Whaling Co., Ltd. This is an application on the part of the liquidator for directions from the Court as to whether he shall take proceedings to set aside the agreement made here-in in reference to the whaler Sabron M. W. Furling, K.C., is heard on the application. The Chief Justice said that the Court would not give any directions unless the shareholders would be ready to give security for the costs of the proceedings.

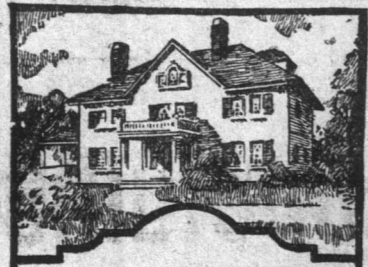

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The Tail of Comet Will Hit Venus.

PARIS, April 19. — M. Flammarion, the noted astronomer says:— Halley's comet creates a noble excitement in all scientific minds, and different expeditions are being organized in order to observe it in the best possible conditions, especially about the time when it will attain its greatest proximity to the earth. I have just received on this subject a very interesting letter from Professor Birkeland, of the University of Christiania, informing me of his plan to go with his assistant, Mons. O. Krogness, to Kaafjord, in the Province of Finnmark, in about 70 degrees latitude, in the most northern part of Norway, to make magnetic and meteorological observations there from May 7 to June 1, during the period when the comet will be nearest to us, and notably on May 18 and 19, during its passage before the solar disk at the moment when its caudal appendage thrown back by the repulsive force of the day star, will reach out in our direction and meet the earth if the length of this appendage is not less than twenty-three million kilometres.

Conclusions Expected. If, according to the present cometary theory, this tail is composed of cosmic particles electrically illuminated by the cathodic rays emanating from the sun, it may be presumed that, by the action of the terrestrial magnetism, its radiant matter will be powerfully attracted and concentrated about the polar regions of our globe in the zones where the aurora borealis spreads its most beautiful luminous draperies and projects its phosphorescent jets. These cometary radiations will then give birth to electric and magnetic phenomena which it will be particularly interesting for us to study. Moreover, if such is really the physical constitution of this comet's tail it is probable that its form will show considerable modifications and we will doubtless, adds Mons. Birkeland, witness luminous effects analogous to those that are obtained on a small sphere. He recalls, on this point, how these rays gather in rings which unfold in fluorescent spirals about the magnetic poles of the earth, but in an opposite manner, and to the regions in which the polar aurora are produced.

Magnetic Efforts. Sometimes these magnetic circles appear in the shape of a wide, continuous, uninterrupted band; sometimes, too, the rays appear in three lines clearly limited whose positions are well defined about the poles. Some experiments have been an equatorial ring, truly magnificent, but fleeting. It appears suddenly and vanishes almost at once, for the rays which circulate about the equator are difficult to concentrate, and the fluorescence is not easily obtained in very rarefied gases. In some cases there is noticed a characteristic point of light, as a sort of bridge between the source of the emanation of the rays and the points at which they end, on the little globe, showing the manner in which they are transmitted. It may then be not impossible that the cometary radiations produce on a large scale on the earth from May 18 to 19 phenomena resembling those we have just described.

The Example of Venus. As a prelude to that which may happen to us on the date of our meeting with the comet, a unique event is going to take place in the heavens on the morning of May 2, for Venus, which now appears as a morning star, will probably herself be plunged in the comet's tail. That will be an observation of the greatest interest. Perhaps we may see spindles of light starting from the polar regions of Venus, in form like a gigantic magnetic bridge thrown over the space between the comet and the planet, and realizing on a colossal scale the curious laboratory experiment of which we spoke a little while ago. The phenomena observed on Venus in this instance will be doubly interesting for us, because that world is almost identical with ours as to size, mass and density, and we shall have under our eyes an image of what may happen in our case some days later. It is very probable, in fact, that the cathodic rays and those imps of ions and electrons which now play such a bizarre role in the theories of contemporary physics are keeping back for us some surprises in this famous meeting.

Drowned While Pinned Under Heavy Logs.

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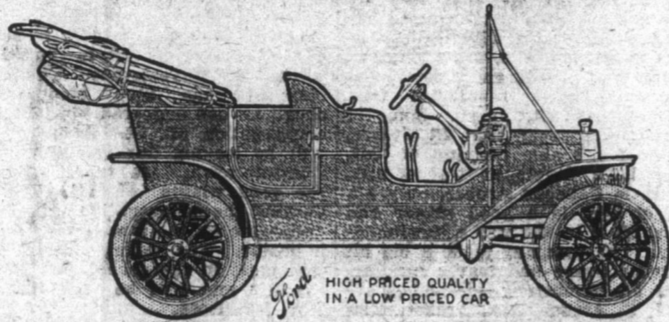
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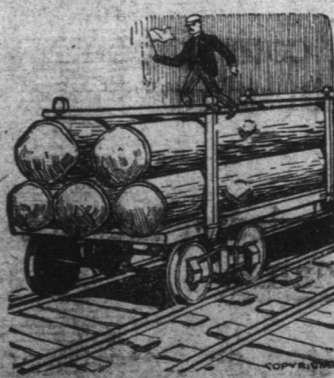
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
