Norfolk, Va., Nov. 3.—Lashed to the cross-bar of a broken mast, nearer dead than alive, Capt. Fred Godfrey, of three-masted schooner John Maxwell, was snatched from the boiling surf at New Inlet, N.C., off Cape Hatteras, early this morning by life-savers.

He is the only survivor of the seven members of the crew of the ill-fated sailing vessel, which went to pieces during the night. She was pounded to kindling wood by the raging in-shore storm. The John Maxwell from New York or Savannah, coal laden, went ashore after midnight Friday, and the lone survivor clung tenaciously to the rigging of the wreck when darkness fell, while life-savers from three stations watched anxiously, but hopelessly for an opportunity to rescue him.

Five of the men disappeared in the cold waves before dawn. The sixth sailor hung on to the rigging until late in the afternoon, when he was lashed to the mast, and exhausted by the lashing of the waves, he was swept into the sea and drowned. The lone survivor, who through glasses appeared to me an aged man, was making a brave fight for life. An all day battle was waged from layback by the life-savers, but the tremendous seas and forty-mile gale made it impossible for them to launch their boats. Repeatedly during the day the life-savers shot lines over the Maxwell, but the two men in the rigging were apparently too numb by the cold or too exhausted by their long fight against the elements to attach it to the rigging. Failure to get the line fastened so he breeches buoy might be sent out prevented the life-savers from rescuing the men in this way. The coast guardians again and again tried to out their lifeboats to sea, but each time were repulsed by the relentless waves.

Word was sent up the coast to Norfolk, where the Navy Yard's wireless flashed the plight of the case and men to the Atlantic fleet in the Southern drill grounds. News came back that one of the ships would steam as near the shoals as possible, and attempt to rescue the man. The telegraph also brought word that the revenue cutter service would send a vessel to assist in the rescue.

The survivor, who proved to be Capt. Godfrey, saw his comrades, exhausted by the cold, one by one drop into watery graves. All night he was alone, lashed to the mast, beaten by lant waves and almost insensible from exposure. Just before dawn the mast snapped and he was hurled clear of the vessel into the raging sea. He attributes his salvation to the fact that the cross-bar held firmly and kept its head above water. It was only after an all-day struggle that physicians and life-savers rough Godfrey back into the land of the living and heard his story.

Standing with her father and her lance to witness the firing of a furnace of the Empire Steel Company at Macungie, Pa., Monday, Miss Katharine Conrad was killed when an explosion blew a large piece of scantling into the crowd at the door of the furnace. Her skull was crushed and death was instantaneous. A large crowd had gathered to witness the re-firing of the furnace which had been idle for a number of years. Several other spectators were injured but none seriously.

When a carpet has become dingy cooking wipe it over with a cloth wrung out of a pail of warm water to which a teaspoonful of ammonia has been added. Rinse the cloth frequently while you work, and wring it out each time. White paint is cleaned more satisfactorily with whiting than with soap. Dip a cloth, dip in the whiting, rub over the paint just hard enough to remove the dirt, rinse with clear water, and wipe dry. To clean sheepskin baby carriage robes, remove the lining and rub the skin side of the robe thoroughly with sweet oil, letting it dry in a warm room. Then take the robe on a wide board, rub well with strong white soap jelly—made from melting the soap in water—and rinse thoroughly in warm water. Stand the board upright in the sun and air to dry, and when it is quite dry comb the wool out. Wipe over the skin side with gasoline to remove any surplus oil; then replace the lining.

MORRIS'S EXPLANATION.

What value that explanation of Sir Edward Morris?

Did he convince anybody that there was no discrepancy between the statement he had no interest in the timber wealth of Newfoundland and his 40,000 shares in the St. George's Lumber Company?

"I now desire to point out to you that the damaging inference against me sought to be drawn by you from the documents to which you refer, is unwarranted." So says Sir Edward. But what do the public say.

We drew but one inference and expressed it lucidly, and that inference was there was a discrepancy between his declaration that he had no interest, direct or indirect, near or remote

in timber wealth and the possession of 40 shares in a Company which held licenses to cut timber.

Does Sir Edward object to our placing the two statements together? Does he object to the contrast we established between them? Does he object to us drawing attention to the conflicting nature of the two statements?

Has Sir Edward not admitted he used the words which we contended were in conflict with his possession of shares in a Company holding timber licenses?

True it is. He said he had never gambled in timber wealth. But we never accused him of gambling in timber property.

True it is. He said he had never applied for a timber property, but we never said he had applied to the Government for timber or any other property.

What we did say was that there was an apparent discrepancy in a man stating he never had an interest, near or remote, direct or indirect in timber wealth, when he held shares in a lumber company which had timber property.

Was there not a discrepancy? Was not the discrepancy apparent? Has not Sir Edward Morris's explanation made the discrepancy more apparent?

How then have we drawn a conclusion from the facts which was unwarranted?

Our inference was inevitable and is now corroborated by the letters of Sir Edward and Mr. Prince. Our expression was mild and as inoffensive as it was possible to put, if it was put at all, and has been abundantly justified.

(1) A Minister of Justice who forgot the law about a licensee cutting on Crown property; but is keen on the profits of a timber deal

(2) An unsophisticated member who rose the price of spars;

(5) A leader who draws no salary, but is great on fees, and who did not take many bites to grab \$6,000 on a herring arbitration; \$6,000 worth of herring would satisfy many fishermen, who would never give a hanker after a fee.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day. Turkey has now formally applied to Bulgaria for peace. No armistice has yet been concluded. Difficulties have arisen about terms. It is said Bulgarians demand the evacuation of Adrianople, Scutari, and Monastir as a condition to agreeing to an armistice. Negotiations however continue. The censorship again is exceedingly severe. The fall of Adrianople is removed from both Serbian and Turkish sources. But this is still unconfirmed. Another report says Bulgarians have occupied Hadzidakmi 21 miles from Constantinople. If it is true it is a very important capture, as that town is Maxim Pasha's staff headquarters. A battle is imminent at Monastir where the garrison endeavored to make terms of surrender but imposed conditions which the Serbian Crown Prince was unable to grant. Should an attack on Monastir be made, the Turks expect to offer serious resistance to combined Serbian and Greek armies. The fate of Monastir is likely to follow that of Saloniki. A report through Bucharest places Bulgarian losses in the war at far greater figure than have yet been estimated. According to a report the killed and wounded number between 60,000 and 80,000 out of total 320,000 men. It is pointed out after an allowance made for holding the lines of communication, only 160,000 effective men are left for fighting.

ELK, To-day.

Steamer S. & Y. Upper Ontario Steamboat Company en route from Park Rapids to Flat Rapids sank in minute and a half, after striking a dead head snag in Montreal river last night. The boat headed for the shore, 15 passengers saved themselves by jumping into shallow water as the boat struck the bank. Most of the baggage all the mail and freight went down with the craft.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. The British steamer Annetta from the States has been captured. She had a cargo of war stores for Albania.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day.

The Turkish naval gunners are doing execution among Bulgarian troops attacking Tchatalia fortifications, according to reports from the commander of the Turkish cruiser Hamididih. A squadron lying off Bogados on the coast of the Sea of Marmora, he says, found the range from 3,000 to 3,500 yards poured such a withering hail of shells into the Bulgarian ranks that the besiegers were forced to retire from positions at Delmontepe, Tchistik, Dere, Dragankovi to the Northward from Bosados and withdraw behind heights as they suffered heavy losses.

LONDON, To-day.

Bonar Law speaking to a big Unionist demonstration at the Albert Hall last night said he did not regret the disturbance in the House and did not try to stop it. While he would rejoice if a way out of the difficulty was found possible by the Speaker, it would not end the crisis. The Government is trying what it had most right to do. The opposition would continue its endeavors to wreck the Home Rule Bill in the commons. It was their intention to press for a referendum and the bill to the electorate for their judgment and thus prevent the degradation of the Commons and what was worse than civil war within United Kingdom. Lansdowne, leader of opposition in Lords, and Bonar Law were the principal speakers. Lansdowne however said little about Wednesday's scene in Commons and gave no hint as to feature of the policy with reference to this. Dealing with Home Rule question he said, he believed the reason of the support accorded to Home Rule in the country was that people were feeling intense. That he declared was a feeling of cowardice which was unpatriotic and unstatesmanlike.

Here and There.

CAME FOR OPERATION. — Mr. Lawrence O'Rourke, the well known hotel keeper of Holyrood, arrived here yesterday to undergo an operation at the Hospital.

HAD TO RETURN. — A fleet of schooners which left here for the northward last evening were compelled to return this morning owing to the wind veering up to the N. E.

The S. S. Portia left North Sydney at 10.30 last night. The S. S. Prospero left Catalina at 8.30 a.m. to-day.

THE HERRING FISHERY. — Herring have made their appearance at Bay of Islands, and two cargoes of salt bulk have been taken there. Some schooners are now there awaiting cargoes, and a number of others should soon arrive.

FELL THROUGH WINDOW. — Last night a drunk passing down Water St. West fell through the window of the Avalon Hotel breaking the glass and narrowly escaping serious injury. He had no money to pay the damage and was taken to the police station.

GLENCOE'S PASSENGERS. — The Glencoe arrived at Pincenia at 7.40 a.m. to-day bringing J. Hanham, C. J. Cox, S. Dowden, N. J. Murphy, A. E. Chown, Jas. Purchase, V. P. Burke, Capt. H. Ross, T. C. Fitzherbert, F. H. Donnelly, Mrs. Migu, Miss R. Vey and 11 steerage.

THE HOME ARRIVES. — The S. S. Home arrived at Humbermouth at 4 p.m. yesterday reporting that she experienced very disagreeable weather on the first three days of the voyage, though she had it fine latterly. Winter weather has set in on the Labrador and slob is making on the coast.

VESSEL REFLOATED. — The new banking schr. Ada S. Bishop, referred to by the Telegram yesterday as being ashore at St. Pierre with a cargo of fish from Burn to Gloucester, shipped by C. F. Bishop & Co., was successfully towed off the rocks yesterday by a tug and will be docked at St. Pierre to-day. She is a splendid vessel, built at Gloucester, and sustained little damage.

A LABORER HURT. — While at work in the hold of the s.s. Nascope strapping hay at 4 a.m. to-day, Pat Woods, of Brennan Street, narrowly escaped death. A heavy bale fell from the sling as it reached the main deck and falling into the hold struck the keelson and rebounding, felled Woods. He was rendered unconscious for some time and on recovery was taken home. He was severely hurt about the chest and shoulders. Had the bale hit him on the head he would have been killed instantly.

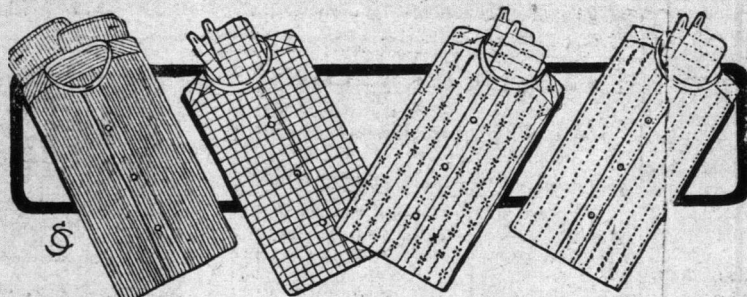

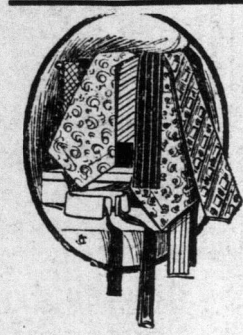

From Fortune Harbor.

Editor Evening Telegram, Dear Sir:—A few remarks from this Government-forsaken place should not go amiss, in order to let the public know how we are treated in regard to Postal Telegraph affairs.

Firstly, if the official in charge draws the salary which we understand she does, the whole thing is, in the writer's opinion, nothing short of a sinecure, and it would be much more accommodating to the people of this place to have half that sum added to the local road grant.

Secondly, if one goes to the place where those offices are supposed to be kept, even for such trivial matters as posting letters; and finds the door locked, there is nothing else to do but stand around outside, till some one comes to open the door of the waiting room, which in all other places is left open for the purpose of "waiting," and this part of the building here would prove an important one. There is not even a letter-box. Certainly the Government could afford material enough to make one, granted that lumber is rather high priced.

And last, but not least, we would like to ask "is the person in charge of this Postal Telegraph office justified in spending office hours at a neighbour's house, thereby causing the greater part of the public to either wait around from a quarter to somebody's house before their business can be transacted?"

Another matter which should be considered by those whose duty it is to inspect such offices is this: The post mistress finds it convenient, presumably, to live at such a distance from her work (on the opposite side of the harbor) that she cannot, or at all events she does not, go to her meals and get back in less time than one and one half hours, and mails arriving in her absence are delivered to others, who as far as we know have no authority to handle mails or hold the key of the postal room.

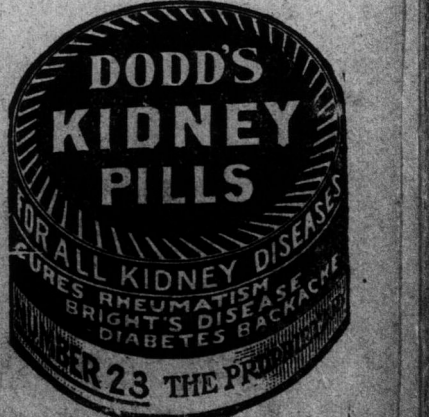

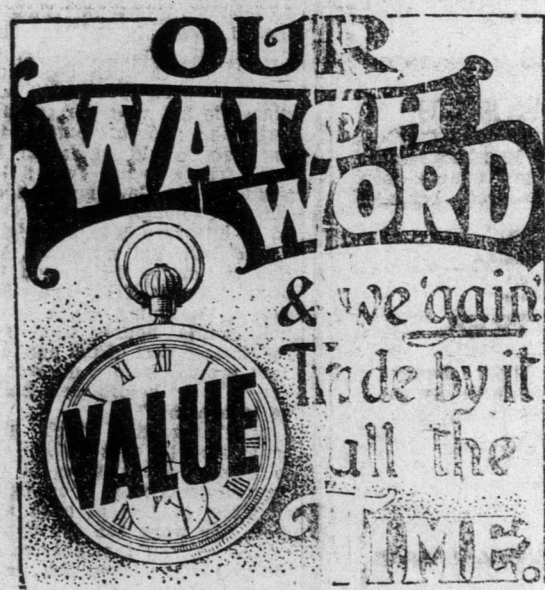

Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Nov. 14. A graceful apology from Ronald McNeill, the Unionist member who hurled a book at Winston Churchill last night helped to cool the atmosphere in the Commons to-day. The Speaker of the House in his remarks suggested that members take a period for reflection. He emphasized the undesirability of Parliament departing from its established precedents, and said he could not help thinking that some solution of the difficulty might be found acceptable to all parties, and which would be more in accordance with the precedents of the House, and thus avoid the setting of a new precedent. Asquith and Bonar Law both welcomed the Speaker's interpretation, which the Unionists welcomed as a victory for their contention. The House adjourned till Monday, acting upon the suggestion, which is believed to have emanated from the King himself. The proposal was made by the Speaker, who intimated that it would be advisable for the House to take further time to consider the points at issue between the two factions with regard to the Home Rule measure. Premier Asquith agreed, and moved the adjournment. No one in London doubts that the King was responsible for advising this turn of affairs. While the Cabinet was in session yesterday, after the turbulent outbreak, Lord Knollys, the King's Private Secretary, arrived direct from Buckingham Palace, and had a conference with the Premier at the Speaker's residence. It is considered that to-day's procedure was decided upon as the best means of wading off, and perhaps preventing a renewal of the violent obstruction to which many Unionists have pledged themselves.

Special to Evening Telegram. PEKIN, Nov. 14. Lian Min Ling, Minister of Foreign Affairs, has resigned, the reason being it is understood, his refusal to comply with the wishes of the Cabinet to commence negotiations with Russia, concerning Mongolia, which Ling considered tantamount to recognizing the autonomy of Mongolia. According to a Chinese report, Russia has pledged herself in a secret agreement to help maintain Mongolian independence; extend Mongolian territory to the Great Wall; and obtain international recognition of Mongolia as a new state. In return, Mongolia is to grant Russia railway and mining concessions, and the supervision of foreign relations.

Special to Evening Telegram. HALIFAX, Nov. 14. The 32-ton schooner Newbourn, Capt. Wilson, is a total wreck on the western reef of Thrum Cap. The captain and crew are safe. The vessel was loaded with produce from Prince Edward Island for Barrington. She was owned by the Captain, and carried no insurance.

Special to Evening Telegram. OTTAWA, Nov. 14. According to the record of industrial accidents published in the Department of Labour, 104 workmen were killed and 324 injured during October. Compared with September, this is an increase of 15 killed, and a decrease of 95 injured.

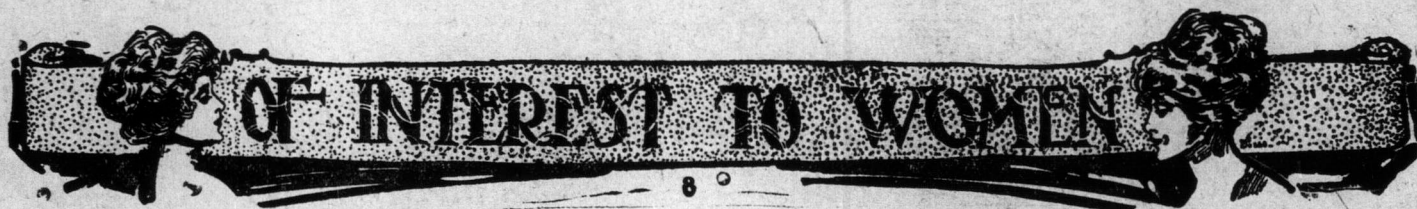

A Romantic Imposture

How Mary Wilcox Put Up a Trick on England's Wisest.

One April evening in the early years of the last century a Gloucestershire agricultural laborer was seated in his cottage, having supper with his family, when a timid knock sounded on the front door.

The good wife went and opened it, returning a moment later with a young woman of prepossessing appearance who made signs that she wanted rest and refreshment. Meat and bread, together with a mug of cider, were accordingly placed before her, and she was asked to sit down.

This hospitable invitation, however, she promptly declined, but all the while bowing and smiling, as if fearful of giving offence, and talking very rapidly in what her puzzled hosts took to be a foreign language.

Eventually, after much persuasion, she was induced to partake of a little plain boiled rice, and a draught of water, after which, refusing an offer to share the bed of her hostess' grown-up daughter, she shrouded herself in an Oriental shawl she was wearing, and lay down on the floor to sleep.

The following day, as nobody could make head or tail of the new arrival, she was taken before the nearest county magistrate, a Mr. Samuel Worrall, of Knole Hall.

But to this gentleman and his family the mysterious young woman proved an even greater puzzle than she had done to the humble laboring folk upon whom she had first dropped from the sky, as it were.

They kept her with them for several months, and many learned professors of languages were called in to try and converse with her, but none succeeded. By dint of signs, however, and by drawing rough sketches, at which she was very clever, the girl gave the Worralls to understand that she came from a far Eastern country, that she was a great personage in her own land, and that she had been kidnapped as a move in some dynastic plot or other, and afterwards brought to England and set ashore in a destitute condition.

Incredible as this story may sound to our ears, it nevertheless met with pretty general belief, so that in a little while all England was agog with the news. The highest in the land came to Knole Hall to interview the Princess Cariboo, as she styled herself, and the young woman, attired in robes of gold brocade fashioned by herself from materials the Worralls provided her with, made a sufficiently imposing and interesting figure.

And now the excitement was intensified by the news that the mystery of the princess' speech had at length been solved. A tramping Portuguese sailor called at Knole Hall, and pretended to interpret her language, which he averred to be a dialect akin to Chinese, used in certain parts of Sumatra and other islands of the Far East.

The girl was, he said, undoubtedly of royal descent, the daughter of an Achinese Rajah. This made the East Indian Company prick up their ears, for the Dutch were then pressing them sorely in that part of the world, and it would obviously be a feather in their cap if they could restore to the Achinese—the native inhabitants of Sumatra—a kidnapped princess of the royal blood.

A ship was accordingly placed at her disposal to convey her back to her "native land" and great preparations were made for the voyage.

Meanwhile the girl held a species of miniature Court at Knole Hall, dispensing "royal" favors and signing innumerable autographs in what purported to be Arabic characters.

It was owing to this that she was undone. A certain Mrs. Neale, a Bristol lady, paid her a visit, and at once recognized her as a former serving-maid of hers, a Mary Wilcox, hailing from no further away than the little Devonshire village of Witherde.

The story went that the recognition was mutual, and the "princess," being pressed, confessed to the fraud in the broadest West Country tones. She had, she said, conceived it and carried it out entirely on her own initiative. But there were many who doubted this.

Certainly the tramping sailor who pretended to interpret the gibberish that she had invented, or which had been invented for her, must have been an accomplice, unless we assume that he perpetrated a minor independent fraud on his own account. It seems inconceivable, too, that an ignorant peasant girl could have shown so intimate an acquaintance with Oriental manners and customs, unless she had been carefully coached by somebody.

Mary Wilcox, it may be added, was never punished for her share in the affair, but was packed off to America soon afterwards by her friends the Worralls.

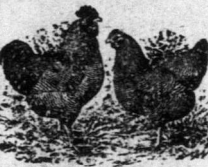

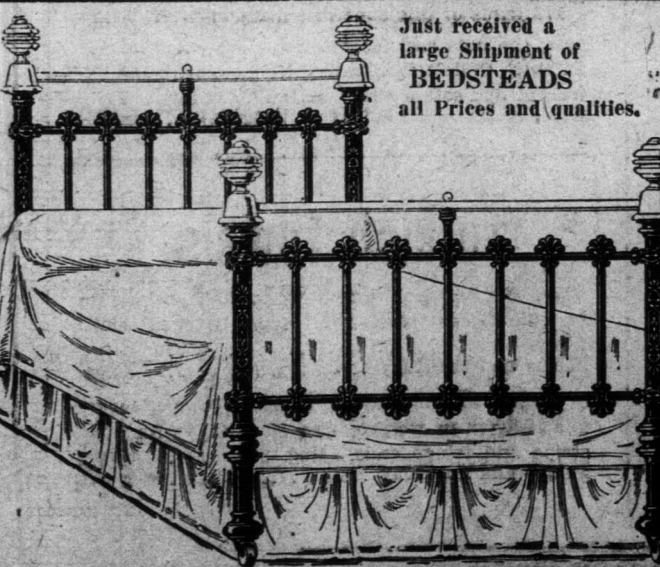
