The evidence of the detectives. said, had been revealed to Dietz friend, a short time before hi esth, and it is the general beliat the prosecution will endeavor rove that the husband was murder ed to prevent his taking action to ob tain a divorce.

There is much speculation as vhether an effort will be made prove that the wife was the actua layer of her husband. Physician who testified before the coroner 'ury expressed the opinion that great strength would not be required vield the hammer with which Die vas killed. Mrs. Dietz is a large

owerfully built woman. So far as is known there is no ev ence to connect Nurnberg with an hysical action in the murder. Mrs urnberg stated before the coroner's ury, and will probably give the same estimony at the trial, that she occuied the same room with her hus and throughout the night on which he murder was committed.




