



ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

PARIS, Nov. 9.-(Official.) Too our left wing the Germans have again taken the offensive on Dixmude and in the region of Ypres; especially southeast of the latter town. Their aftacks have been repulsed everywhere. To sum up: at the end of the day on the front from Dixmude to La Lys we have progressed on nearly every point, but our advance is slow owing to the offensive of the enemy and the very important organization they have had time to effect around our points since beginning.
