

Only Meagre Supply of Provisions at Light Station.

Quebec, Dec. 27.-Marooned with Halifax, Dec. 27,-No word has been only a meagre supply of provisions, isolated from the outside world and staring into the sombre face of privation, such is the fate of fourteen or sixteen persons at Belle Isle, the famous sentinel of Canada, on the Atlantic at the entrance of the Straits of the same name.

Two lighthouse keepers, with their wives and children, their assistants and three Marconi wireless operators. totalling nine adults and six or seven children, are the victims. The news of their plight came here last night in the form of a message from a lower gulf village.

The Canadian Government steamer ontcalm, which was expected to call at Relle Isle some time ago, but was prevented by adverse weather and ice onditions, left Bonne Bay, Newfoundfor Belle Isle, and she should get there at sunset to-night. But there is much ice in the Straits and in the lower gulf, and, should a storm break

Shipping men here do not disguise their anxiety over the situation. 




