Will Cities Rise Higher or Spread Out?

Some startling ideas have been put skyscraper buildings running to a height we know nothing of at the present day, several of them at various levels far above the ground. A city would thus be in layers, one atove the other, and connected at intervals by means of perpendicular street cars, or electric elevators.

It is not an altogether ugw idea.

In Toronto it has been proposed more than once that the street level on Youge Street should be given over entirely to vehicular traffic and the sidewalks raised one storey. In The Star Weekly there appeared a year or so ago drawings showing the city of the future with all the street levels used by trolleys and motors and elevated sidewalks at various heights above the ground and connecting the different skyscrapers.

It is not likely, however, that the city of the future will be like that. There is a very direct connection between congestion of population and lack of transportation. The skyscraper, to some extent, resulted from the fact that the electric elevator for use in buildings improved more rapidly than the trolley service for transporting the public. Also it was easier to go to the fifteenth floor of the building you were in, than go two or three blocks to another building.

There is less reason now than ever there was in the past for concentrating people, either for business or residential purposes, on a small area.

The motor car gives rapid individuat transport, and a man can run about and make half a dozen business calls in the downtown area in rapid succession. He can live ten or twenty miles from his office and reach it as quickly as he did twenty-five years ago when he resided only a mile or so away and walked to and fro.

It is the habit to think of the motor car as a vehicle that has reached its highest perfection. This is most improbable. No doubt, for individual use, there will appear a much smaller car, costing far less and requiring reduced street room. A motive power vastly better and cheaper than the gasolene engine may be expected by the time it is urgently required. The tucking of cars away downtownhanging them up out of the way when they are not needed—is a problem that nobody has seriously tackled as vet, nor will while cars can be left on the streets.

Flying, too, is in its infancy, and in due course business men will be flying too and from their offices, and a few miles will mean nothing. Can anyone doubt that flying will develop to this extent?

With transportation making such progress as seems imminent, one may feel justified in expecting to see cities not more, but less, congested than in days of slower going .- Toronto Daily

MANCHURIAN WAR LORD WITH-DRAWING FROM CAPITAL.

Pekin, Nov. 14,-(Associated Press Despatch)-The danger of fighting in the vicinity of Pekin between rival military chiefs has been averted for the time being.

The chief executive, Tuan Chi-Jui, is telegraphically informed by Marshal Chang Tso-Lin that in order to preserve peace he is willing to withdraw his troops from around Pekin

to Tientsin and to the north. The Manchurian war lord's troops near the capital are in fact already in motion, some being in the course of withdrawal while others have already boarded trains for Mukden. In addition the Mukden authorities are re-moving their army headquarters to a



The two were charged with murder and remanded. No man knew better than Murray how fragile was the case

Fortune favours the bold. He found, saying with the Birchalls at their notel, a young man named Pelly, the son of an English elergyman of good amily. He, Benwell, and the Birchalle had come out from England in one party. One day Birchall and Benwell had gone off together. Benwell never returned. It was Pelly who had seen the dead man's picture in the paper and had insisted that Birchall should go and identify the body.

This explained the mad audacity of that action. Convinced now that he had the right people. Murray purcovered that Benwell, like Pelly, had been trapped by an advertisement that appeared in an English newspaper. This ran:

"CANADA.-University man having farm wishes to meet gentleman's son to live with him and to learn the business, with a view to partnership; must invest five hunired pounds to extend stock; boardlodging, and five per cent. interest till partnership arranged."

Both Benwell and Pelly had fallen to this lure, and to the glowing descriptions that Birchall gave of life on his up-to-date farm in Canada. Pelly, as a special favour, had been allowed to pay only £170.

It was after they reached Buffalo that Birchall had taken Benwell to see the mythical farm. He returned alone in very good humour, and said that Benwell did not like the farm, and had gone on to visit some friends in the neighbourhood. A comparison of dates showed Murray that this must have been the day on which the murder was committed.

One sinister episode was related by Pelly. He had been taken by Birchall to view the Niagara Falls. At the former's instigation they went down some secluded steps near the swirling current. At the bottom a stranger stood watching the roaring waters. They returned. The presence of that stranger unquestionably saved Pelly's life.

The following day they went for another walk, and Birchall tried to induce his companion to stand near the edge of the falls. But Pelly, who seemed to have had some instinct of danger, refused to take his place in a spot where the slightest push would have sent him over. On their return he heard of the murder in the

Once again Birchail tried to effect his grim purpose, He induced Pelly to walk over the bridge to the Am-

erican side, and they came back over the lower suspension bridge. "It was storming and blowing," said Pelly. "When out near the contre of the bridge, Birchall walked over to the edge and looked down at the rearing rapids.

said Birchall, beckening me close to the edge. I drew back, He grew white and walked on. I lagged behind out of his reach. Come, walk with me, he said, halting.

"I shook my head. He repeated his invitation. I declined. He stopped, turned squarely and looked back. Then he advanced a step towards me. I stepped back and was about to full over the bridge when two men came walking across, and Birchall turned and walked over towards Canada." Murray now cabled to Scotland Yard. He found that Birchall had hat

to leave Oxford under a cloud, and had eloped to Canada with the daughter of a railway official. There he had lived by his wits, and he and his wife had duped many people at Lord and Lady Somerset.

Picking up the Threads.

With the pertinacity of a bulldog Murray tracked Birchail's movement on the day of the murder. He found people who were able to identify him as travelling with a young man on \$ train to East wood, four miles from Blenheim Swamp. 


