Normal School Statistics.

Mr. E. B. Wood recently called for a return relative to the cost of, number of admissions to, and other information concerning the Normal and Model Schools, and it has been brought down, and laid before the Legislature by the Government. The statistics were prepared under the direction of Rev. Dr. Ryerson, and will be of great value to members in connection with the question of additional Normal School accommodation, which they will, we expect, shortly be called upon to consider. Passing over the original cost of building, the total number of students during twenty-five years, the number of certificates granted, and the number of persons holding the same who are now engaged in teaching, we find that the current expenditure of the two schools since 1847 amounted to \$2,999,578, or an annual average expenditure, including interest at six per cent. on capital account, of \$15,526. The average annual expenditure for each individual student has been \$95, for each certificate-holder \$100, and for each student now actually engaged in teaching \$343. Out of the 6,235 who attended the Toronto institution, during the past twenty-five years, the twenty Eastern Counties only sent 1,568; while the twenty-one Western Counties sent 2,799, or very close on double the number. Our own County sent 125, while the County of York and city of Toronto, during the same period, furnished 1,868. From this we should judge that there is greater need for the establishment of another Normal School in the West than in the East, and we doubt not the Government procured the return for the purpose of guiding them in this particular.

Meeting of Workmen.

The Toronto Mail devotes a column of small type to a description of a mass meeting of workmen, held in Toronto on Tuesday night, for the purpose of considering several bills, affecting their interests, now before the Legislature.

We would rejoice to see intelligent mechanics assembling, for the purpose of considering all measures affecting their interests, and calmly discussing the same, but we must enter our protest against an assemblage of wire-pullers, meeting in the name of workmen of Ontario, and not content with condemning the measures which they conceive to be inimical to their interests, but make fools of themselves by the utterance of such words as the following:

The Toronto workmen had seen enough to come to the conclusion that they could get nothing from the present Ontario Government worthy the name of Reform. They could not expect a clean thing to come out of an artisan thing, and what could they expect from a Government biased by the unwholesome views of the Glasgow newspaper. (Applause.) He then commented very severely upon the character of the contract said to have been entered into by the Ontario Government with the Canada Car Company, and characterized the system of convict contracts as most pernicious to the country.

Will our readers believe that any body of intelligent mechanics ever encouraged such clap-trap as the above? No. The assemblage was not a meeting for the purpose of considering the interests of the artisan, although this was made the pretext, but a congregating together of men whose conduct upon the occasion says very little for their intelligence. The reporter takes very good care not to say a word about how many were present, contenting himself by giving the names of a few men, representatives of Unions, who were upon the platform. He does not say that there was another person present, and we take it for granted there was not. The dodge is too transparent. The Tories have long been trying to induce the workmen of Ontario to look upon Sir John A. Macdonald as their champion, but they have signally failed in convincing them of any such thing, and their labor will be in vain, should they continue the experiment in this direction till doomsday. — The "presentation" to Sir John A. and Lady, by the "workmen of the Dominion," in Toronto last summer, was a ruse, and the meeting on Tuesday night was its twin brother.

Editorial Items.

Judge Taschereau has been appointed Chief Justice of the Province of Quebec.

Mr. Chauveau, it is said, will be appointed President of the Senate, in the place of Mr. Cauchon.

Both chambers are being thoroughly refitted and decorated for the opening of Parliament, under the direction of Wm. McKay.

In the House of Lords Tuesday night, Earl Granville announced that the British Survey Commission had every hope of early arriving at a satisfactory solution of the boundary line between Canada and the United States.

Messrs. Gzowski, Kefer and McAlpine, composing the Board of Engineers to whom is referred the question of the route for the enlarged Welland Canal, arrived on Wednesday, and have entered upon the consideration of the data collected on the site of the projected improvements.

It is said that Hon. Mr. Abbott will be the Solicitor of the Canada Pacific Railway Co., and that he will receive an annual salary of \$12,000. Mr. E. L. DeBellefeuille, one of the two secretaries, will receive \$7,000 per annum. The Merchant's Bank will be the bankers of the company. It is said that the Pacific Railway Company has received the offer of Messrs. P. A. Macdonald, Donald Robertson, James Ross, Duncan Macdonald, and Alex-



Ontario Legislature.

Feb. 12. Mr. Speaker informed the House, that the Clerk had received from the judges their report on the Bill to declare the limitations of the Legislature with respect to the Goodhue Estate Act, the effect of which had been set aside by the recent judgment of the Court of Error and Appeal. The report declared the proposed legislation to be highly objectionable, and pointed out that the residence of some of the persons interested beyond the jurisdiction of the Act might present difficulties in the way of its effectual operation. Mr. Sinclair moved for statement of the expenses incurred in connection with the "Proton Outrage" investigation. Mr. Scott (Grey) asked what action they intend to take in cases where the sections on School lands are unable to pay for, them or where such lands have been found on inspection to be inferior in quality, and not worth the price for which originally sold.

Hon. Mr. Scott said that at present what the Government proposed doing was to remit one-fifth of the original purchase money where the lands have been returned by the valuator as of inferior quality, and as having been sold at a higher rate than they were worth. Until some arrangement was made with Lower Canada it would be impossible to carry out any other rule. His own opinion was that he should, at an early day, deal with Lower Canada, as to her share of these lands so as to enable us to do what is fair better than we can now. A great deal of embarrassment now arose in the case of two townships lying alongside each other, one being un-redeemed school, and the other redeemed Crown lands. He thought that the people who had gone there ten years ago to Grey and Bruce, and settled on inferior lands, should be relieved. The reductions in the Crown Lands had been on a much more liberal scale than one-fifth of the original purchase money. Mr. Scott (Grey) asked what length of time for payment, and what terms of payment, will be allowed to settlers on Crown lands which have been inspected and the price of which the Government intends to reduce. Hon. Mr. Scott answered that as to time there was no restriction at present. It was, of course, very desirable that many of the settlements should be closed up within the present year, but the Government was not prepared to insist upon even that being done. Mr. Ryker moved his resolution respecting Timber Licenses. Mr. McKellar moved that the order of the Bill to provide for taking vote by Ballot be discharged.—Carried.

Horrible Murder in Calcutta.

A horrible wholesale murder is reported in Calcutta. It appears that on Friday (says the Bombay Gazette of the 30th ult.) a native of the Dossad caste, armed with a massive chopper, sharpened on both sides, and two knives, set out of his house with the intention of murdering his wife and son-in-law, between whom, as alleged by him, an improper intimacy existed. Not finding them where he expected they would be, he attacked his daughter, who happened first to come in his way. With a stroke of the chopper he knocked her scalp clean off, so that the whole of her brain was visible. She immediately expired. In murdering her he is reported to have said that had she not been born, and had she not married the man, his wife would not have been estranged from him. He next attacked an old woman of the Dossad caste and despatched her in a similar manner. Finding then his mother in the way he dealt a blow on her head and she fell down apparently dead. He stated to the police that he struck her because he wished to save her the grief which would overtake her on his meeting with his deserved punishment. She is in a very precarious state, and no hopes are entertained of her recovery. He next attacked a woman of the Dhobi caste, inflicting a severe blow on her head. She is also in a very precarious state, and not expected to survive. He then attacked a young woman of the Kahar caste, whom he also seriously wounded on the head, her injuries consisting of several cuts. She is in a precarious condition. After attacking several other persons, all of whom he wounded more or less seriously, he was captured by an inspector of police.

Arthur Correspondence.

The congregation of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, of this village, held their annual tea meeting on Friday evening. The weather being very mild there was a good turn out, especially from the country. The tea was superb, and the provisions were rich and of the finest quality, reflecting great credit on those who prepared them. After tea the people gathered into the Presbyterian Church close by, to get the intellectual part of the programme, which was commenced by a tune from the Alma Choir, and a prayer from the Rev. Mr. Cobb of Mount Forest, after which Mr. W. H. Drummond was called to the chair who expressed himself pleased with the large turn out, and the general success of the meeting. He approved of tea meetings in general, as being the most innocent of all our social gatherings, and called upon the Rev. Mr. Cobb to address the meeting, which he did in a speech abounding with religious instruction. Addresses were also delivered by Revs. Messrs. Schram of Drayton, Brown and McDonald of Arthur, Langford of Durham, and Scott of Listowel. The resident minister, Mr. McNamara, read a detailed statement of the building fund, also of all monies that has passed through his hands, connected with the building of the church, since he came to Arthur. The Choir entertained the meeting with good music between the different speeches. At the close the chairman said, as there was considerable provisions left, it was proposed to give a free tea the next day, at one o'clock, to the Sunday School scholars of all denominations. After the usual votes of thanks the meeting was dismissed with the benediction, every one being well pleased with the entertainment. The proceeds, which are to go towards peeing the church, will amount to about \$50. Dime parties, in aid of the English Church, have been inaugurated here with great success. The hay parkers here are doing a good business, having packed about 200 tons and shipped principally to Toronto, via Narrow Gauge. The price paid per ton is from \$10 to \$12. An oyster supper was given at Green's Hotel, on Wednesday night of last week, by the Registrar, Mr. J. Anderson, and his Deputy, Mr. Ryan, on the opening of the new Registry office here. A large number of gentlemen sat down to supper, and after satisfying the inner man, the usual loyal toasts were proposed and duly honored. After having spent a pleasant time the party dispersed about 12 o'clock.

SAD ACCIDENTAL DEATH.—The accident sustained by Mr. Wislie, on Monday last, by a hand flying off one of the saws in his saw factory, has resulted in his death.


